

SAFETY UPGRADES CONTINUE ON KURANDA RANGE ROAD

Hon Vaughan Johnson MLA Minister for Transport and Main Roads

The \$0.52 million State Government project to improve road safety and access for heavy vehicles on the Kuranda Range section of the Kennedy Highway has began. Transport and Main Roads Minister Vaughan Johnson said the project was part of the strategy to improve safety on the Range, which included several asphalt re-surfacing projects in 1997 to improve skid resistance on tight corners. The new project involves widening and rehabilitation of a 350 metre long section of roadway which passes through a narrow rock cutting towards the bottom of the Kuranda Range, about 3 km from the Smithfield roundabout. Guard rail will also be installed along several corners and steep sections. Mr Johnson said construction had been programmed outside of peak hours to minimise disruption to commuter traffic. Traffic will be reduced to to a single lane between 9.00am and 4.00pm Monday to Friday, with traffic control officers working to reduce congestion as much as possible. Delays will typically be limited to five minutes. Environmental protection measures would be implemented to control erosion and sedimentation during construction. He also said that Member for Barron River Lyn Warwick had supported projects to improve safety on the Kuranda Range. The re-surfacing projects carried out in 1997 have been very successful in bringing down accident rates, almost halving the number of accidents. Fifteen accidents were recorded in 1997, down from 27 in 1996. Further re-surfacing projects will also be carried out this year under the Federally funded Black Spots Program.

A study into longer term upgrading requirements for a Kuranda Range crossing will commence in 1998.

AMEND A PLANNING SCHEME The Council of the Shire of Mareeba proposes to amend the Town Planning Scheme for the Shire of Mareeba.

Work will begin this week on upgrading the Kennedy Highway/Myola Road/Rob Vievers Drive intersection near the Kuranda township. Minister for Transport and Main Roads Vaughan Johnson said that preliminary works would include earthworks, bikeway construction, erection of road signs and the provision of temporary crossings for school children. The project will involve connecting the bikeway on the Kuranda side of the Kennedy Highway to the new bike lane on Myola Road. Traffic signals would also be installed to control access for school children through the intersection. This project is part of the overall upgrading of transport routes between the Kuranda township and the new Kuranda High School, which inlcudes improvements to Myola-Oak Forest Road. The Government is committed to school safety and has provided funding of \$517,000 to the Mareeba Shire Council under the Transport Infrastructure Development Scheme, as a 50% subsidy for the overall upgrade. MrJohnson said Main Roads had confirmed, in consultation with the Kuranda community, that installing traffic lights would provide safer access to the intersection for students travelling to and from the High School. Temporary works have already been carried out including installation of 60km/hr signs to reduce speed through the intersection. "Children Crossing" signs and amber flashing lights have also been installed to warn motorists of the temporary crossings. These will be activated on school days from 8am-9am and 3pm-4pm commencing on Tuesday 27 Jan. 1998.

Installation of traffic signals in the coming weeks will control both vehicle and pedestrian access through the Myola Road/Kennedy Highway intersection, and provide a safe point for children using the bike path to cross the road. Motorists should take caution around the intersection as children start back at school, and obey the temporary road signs and REDUCE

SPEED in the area.

KURANDA STATE HIGH

Exciting News: Kuranda State High School has welcomed its first students. On Tuesday 27th January the young people of the Kuranda area will at last be able to start their school year in their own community. We have had a long wait to see this happen, but at last Kuranda has its own fully operational High School.

Principal, Ms Jenny Jensen, said that she was very pleased with the support for the school to date. On day one, Jenny commented, "There is a distinct air of excitement and anticipation here today. Students are looking forward to being part of a new school and a new type of curriculum."

The curriculum will be based upon units of study in the full range of subject areas, with students able to plan their studies over a three year period for years 8, 9 and 10. Another key element of the curriculum will be "Learning Teams". Students will work in teams on Learning Challenges. This is a new initiative for junior secondary students in Queensland and focuses on developing Key Competencies across a range of subject areas. As well as promoting an integrated approach to Learning Teams will also foster the social development of students in that students will need to learn to work within a team.

The school enrolment is still not finalised, as some students are still enrolling. However, final numbers are expected to be about 170.

Final inspection of all facilities has occurred and except for a few minor defects the school is certainly able to cater for student needs.

Ms Jensen also highlighted the role of excellent teaching and support staff employed at the school. "We have the very best staff possible and I am confident they will be able to assist students to achieve their very best." All staff have undertaken induction and training and are very enthusiastic about their new roles.

Interim P & C President, Mr Ken Harley, emphasised the importance of the local community being involved in the school. Along with the Principal, he has offered an open invitation for any interested community members to visit the school and see what is on offer for students. "I know they will be impressed" said Mr. Harley.

ORGANIC GARDENING

Despite a deluge of rain shallots and garlic chives thrive. In fact they are growing better than when I water them. Cucumbers (acid free) are useful and can be vitamised and slowly drunk. I have had dozens to give away and despite the leaves turning a bit yellow with overhead (rain) watering.

Anyone needing cuttings of Heliconia or Ginger rhizomes is welcome to phone 40937205 and arrange to get some.

The weeds are growing violently but are easier to pull out as the soil is damp. Though my veg garden is mulched the weeds come up. They must be pulled out before seeding or seed heads in wheelie bin. I usually break off the seed heads and put into a super market bag. When full it goes into the wheelie bin. Roots and stalk are composted or put in piles on the low side of a fruit tree. My orchard is on very sloping land. On the lower side I build up with crusher dust or compacted vegetation. My wing beans are growing well and when shorter days come they will flower and pod. They must be picked very young (except for seed).

<u>Calatheas</u> are looking lovely to brighten shady places. Heliconias are bright but the butterflies like the Impatiens flowers. They need thinning out and shortening frequently to give light to the colourful striped leaves of the calatheas.

Lagestromias are now brightening the garden. Pink trusses can stand some rain and look lovely when the sun shines. The Lily Pillies and strawberry tree are attracting the birds.





GREEN RECIPE FOR FEBRUARY Warrigal Greens with Macadamia Pesto

This recipe is from the "Wild Lime" bushfood cookbook. Warrigal Greens (*Tetragonia tetragonioides*) are also known as Botany Bay greens or New Zealand Spinach. The discovery of this new green "spinage" in 1770 was followed by a period of fame in European Society which persists in France to this day where the greens are known as 'tetragon'. The greens are at their best in spring and summer although they do yield all year long. You may have to look out for them. Seeds are available in Kuranda from the Green House. The best aspect of growing warrigal greens up here is that they do not bolt or wilt like other greens in summer. An alternative for this recipe is to use English Spinach or very crisp silverbeet. Yield: 2 cups.



Ingredients: 1 clove garlic [crushed], 1/2 cup [50g] macadamia nuts [roasted and roughly chopped], 3 1/2 cups [250g] fresh warrigal greens [blanched and chopped], 1 teaspoon salt, a half teaspoon pepper (native), generous cup of light oil (250ml), 3/4 cup parmesan cheese [grated].

Method: If using a blender combine all the ingredients except the parmesan and blend until smooth. Gradually add the parmesan to the pesto, blending each time into the pesto thickens. If using a mortar and pestle pound the garlic and nuts together. Slowly add the warrigal greens and seasonings, grinding constantly until a smooth paste is formed. Slowly drizzle in the olive oil and mix to thorough combine.

<u>Serving suggestions</u>: with pasta, with roasted corn ears, with salad and wattleseed buns etc.

<u>Vegan alternative</u>: combine everything then add <u>slightly</u> steamed and crumbled tofu. Don't steam too long or tofu will go rubbery.

RESEARCHER WANTS TO MEET LOCAL PEOPLE!

A new and practical academic discipline is set to add another tool to the armouries of marine park managers. Dr Leanne Fernandes, who is both a qualified marine biologist and economist, is in Cairns to meet interested members of the community on behalf of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority (GBRMPA), CRC Reef Research Centre and James Cook University of North Queensland. She aims to help improve the way in which people's concerns can influence managers of the reef and to increase understanding of what drives decision-making at the GBRMPA. The idea of the project is to build a two-way street between the community and management, and then measure how well it's working. To that end, while some formal meetings have been arranged, she is keen for any member of the community to get in touch with her on 015 581 132. On the Great Barrier Reef there are often competing and multiple issues to be dealt with simultaneously. A proposed pontoon may be attractive to visitors but may degrade an important fish breeding site. Decisions about management are never easy and can impact different people in different ways, including people who rarely even enter the water but are interested in reef issues. Locally based advisory committees and liaison officers provide means by which information from the community can be fed to upper-level decision-makers. The information link, however between managers and people does not feed into any formal decision-support structure. The information is all available but in a less structured, informal way. What it seems we need is a central, independent and transparent process for determining and managing data requirements. This project works towards that end.



HOW TO BE HEALTHY THOUGH ELDERLY

The present hot humid weather is very depressing but we must take exercise to keep healthy. We must drink plenty of liquid. To avoid tea or coffee I havour the water with either cranberry juice or grape juice (both unsweetened). I also drink lots of herb tea, eg. chamomile or peppermint. I grow lots of herbs in the garden, eg. mint, peppermint and basil. After brewing they can be drunk warm or cold with a little honey to sweeten (if liked).

You can take yoghurt which goes well spooned down with a plate of raw fruit, eg. mangoe, pawpaw and/or banana. Often I use the vitamizer to mix the fruit and liquid but use a spoon to eat it as all food should be mixed with saliva before swallowing it. "Eat what you drink and drink what you eat" is an old old Health Motto. Even goats milk needs chewing. Goats milk is very good for us. It can be vitalised with a banana and eaten slowly with a spoon. You buy it deep frozen and slowly thaw it. The local G.P. suggested I take a powder that contains many vitamins with that mixture. I have more energy after 3 days of it - 3 times a day. Meantime I do not take my normal vitamin tablets. You can add a raw egg in the vitamizer with the milk. Cooked egg is not so beneficial. Home grown vegetables (raw or lightly steamed) plus brown rice and fish are my favourite dinner. Lunch and breakfast are fruit and in between water and goats milk.

WHAT IS BULLYING?

Professor Ken Rigby states that, "Bullying can be described as oppressing people who are less powerful than ourselves". He claims that there is a variety of ways in which bullying can occur which ranges from inflicting physical violence to using verbal ridicule, exclusion and rumour mongering.

Bill Rogers, Educational Consultant, states that "While physical bullying is to be deplored, so is behaviour such as spitting on someone or on a person's property, defacing property (e.g. writing derogatory comments or names on a pencil case), or repeatedly hiding another's property; persistent teasing, name-calling, repeatedly picking on someone because they are small, or fat, even extortion and threats".

Most bullying is psychological and not physical. It is intentional, often continues over a lengthy period of time, and is usually unprovoked. Australian studies have concluded that about 1 in every 7 students is bullied and approximately 5 per cent of students are bullies. Studies indicate that bullying behaviour decreases with age and that children who are victimised often have significantly lower levels of self esteem. Research undertaken overseas suggests that those students who engage in aggressive, bullying behaviour whilst at school run an increased risk of exhibiting problem behaviours, such as criminality and alcohol abuse, later in life.

Parents, teachers and care-givers alike have a responsibility to ensure children's personal safety. Recognising the problem for what it is - an intentional abuse of power relations - is important in helping children to deal with problem situations. Understanding the feelings associated with victimisation and bullying is also

HOW CAN PARENTS AND TEACHERS WORK TOGETHER?

* Many schools are developing a whole school approach to dealing with violence and bullying. These schools work towards making students understand their rights and responsibilities to themselves and to others. In these schools rules are fair, and inappropriate behaviour is managed consistently. Students are taught the consequences of both positive, appropriate behaviour and negative, inappropriate behaviour.

* It is in your child's best interests to communicate in a positive, open and respectful way with the school It would be expected that you could explain your feelings and the situation as you understand it and also that you would listen to the school's response. Schools that are clear about the management of inappropriate behaviour can enjoy a partnership with parents in which both parties are working collaboratively and supporting each other. Cooperate by supporting any positive programs that the school is pursuing.

* Parenting is a difficult task and one for which most people have no training. Bullying behaviour by children is usually learned. They learn it from the ways that adults and older children, well known to them, treat each other. Children who see or experience aggressive behaviour in the home are likely to be aggressive in their dealings with others. The more adults model respect and concern for others, especially in resolving conflict, the better the chance that children will not bully. Learning to relate with children in a respectful, assertive, consistent manner is most desirable.

A THOUGHT FOR FEBRUARY

This month we read a passage from St Luke's Gospel chapter 2 verses 22 to 40. On February the second every year the church celebrates The Presentation of Christ in the Temple. The old name of this festival "Candlemas"- reminds us of the great truth of Christ's coming as the Light of the World. Even in our age of electricity and swift power, the symbolism of the candle is still strong. We use candles on birthday cakes, we use them at Christmas on our Christmas decorations, and we use them on special occasions of pleasure or rejoicing. For us the candle is a symbol of pleasure, happiness, joy and remembra . To the older world, however, the primary meaning a candle was simply essential light. We find it difficult to realize the difference a few candles could make, to the drab darkness of a cottage, or a house, in olden days. So what a powerful symbolic action is the distribution of candles at the Eucharist, declaring the way in which Christ our Lord is to be regarded as the true Light, to enlighten the nations of the world, and how the light of his glorious gospel is to dispel the darkness of ignorance and unbelief. In the passage from St Luke we read of how Joseph and Mary complied strictly with the Law of Moses and took the first born Child to the Temple, declaring Him holy to the Lord by the same rite used upon the firstborn son of every Jewish mother. The Virgin devoutly submits her Babe and herself to the ancient customs, willingly obedient to the Law under which she had been born and had lived. So far, nothing to distinguish this particular couple and their infant from the many similar couples on an occasion which must have resembled a busy Sunday afternoon of baptisms in a large church today Suddenly, however, there is a difference. In the Temple, besides the throngs of pilgrims and visitors, there were a number of older worshippers who spent much time in the sacred courts. We may think of them like faithful Christians, who come to church for the daily Eucharist and who pray at regular times. So, among the people who came daily to the Temple were the old man Simeon and the widow named Anna. First Simeon, as we hear in our reading, sings God's praise over the Child; then Anna also gives thanks, and speaks prophetic words. Both give thanks; but the shadow of the Cross-casts its warning of pain and sorrow to come "A sword shall pierce your own soul also!" - so Simeon predicts. Yes there will be light and glory but we must remember the close connection between the Presentation of the Child, and the Crucifixion of the Lord the one is the consummation of the other. We must not forget that the whole life of Jesus, was one continued act of offering. This is what was meant, when on the Cross-Jesus cried out - to those there, and also to the whole world, and to all generations -'It is finished!' Once and forever he completed that great and perfect Sacrifice, to which he had pledged himself by his wondrous Incarnation. In our modern world it very fashionable for people to dedicate themselves to one course or another. Many of us were dedicated to God, when we were brought to church, as babies, to be baptised (a few were baptised later in life). So we, like Jesus, began life with an early dedication to God and his service. We should ask ourselves then are we fully aware of the promises made on our behalf at our Baptism? Are we mindful of the promises we made ourselves at our if Baptised as adults or if we have been Confirmed? Those promises should remind us of our duty as Christians the Question is how do we live up to

ARTIST PROFILE AL GALLO




SHORT MOVIES LONG ON LOCAL TALENT

Actor Kaeren Hubbard in Janet Bowron's " Sew it Today"








DEFENSIVE DRIVING COURSE

OVERCOMING DRUG ABUSE

You can't help people unless they are willing to be helped. I can't stress that enough. They have to want to do it, because if they don't it's like with alcoholics. You can push them, shove them threaten them and love them but no way. There has to be something strong enough that's going to make them want to at least try. Ultimately, it is the drug abuser who must win the battle with drugs. But that battle need not be fought alone. Families can help. In fact, former drug abusers most frequently cite family members as the biggest factor in recovery.

Recovered drug abusers can never get back all of the opportunities missed during the time of their addiction. Neither can family members recapture all the fresh optimism they expended during their initial efforts to help. however, drug abusers and family members can regain parts of themselves that have been buried for years. The prospects of recovery are better if the person with the drug problem has not progressed too far into drug dependence. Families are more likely to recover a sense of purpose if the drug abuse came in response to a particular problem of family life rather than in response to an accumulation of problems, and if family resources are available. No matter what the odds are, however, people do recover, and families are a key to the process.

Denial is a prime characteristic of drug abuse - denial that anything is wrong, sometimes denial of the drug abuse itself. Recovery, therefore, is marked by honestly facing the issues. Initially this can be overwhelming and painful, but the drug abuser must face the truth before permanent change is possible. We have seen many people who absolutely refuse to think about the many negative things they did when they were abusing drugs. These people seem most likely to relapse. Most programs encourage drug abusers to take stock of their wrongdoings, so that they can overcome their guilt. For example, self-help groups like Cocaine Anonymous ask participants to admit the exact nature of their wrongs, make a list of people they have harmed, and make direct amends to them whenever possible. People in recovery take stock of themselves, do what they can to repair the damage of the past, and avoid making the same mistakes in the future. In recovery, former drug abusers begin to change their idea of themselves as losers. For years they may have given up easily, half-heartedly trying to stop using drugs and then saying, "Oh, the hell with it. Life without drugs isn't worth the effort." Here is where the family can help. The change in attitude must come from within; the family cannot change the person's self-image. However, by expecting success instead of failure, the family can help the process.

TIPS FOR WIN 95

To change font size on Taskbar buttons

- 1. Right-click anywhere on Desktop, context menu appears.
- 2. Select Properties, then the Appearance tab.
- 3. Select "Active Title Bar" in Item: drop down list.
- 4. Adjust font size and select Apply to see what it looks like.
- Select SAVE AS. Choose a name for your color scheme in the Save Scheme dialog box.
- 6. Select OK to close Display Properties.

Remember that this selection not only changes the Taskbar button font and size, but also the Active Title Bar in all of the programs that you run in Windows 95. So, choose a font that looks acceptable and readable in both places. That is all that there is to it!

Right Mouse Button and the Shift Key

To format a floppy in adrive, right click on that drive's icon in Explorer or in My Computer.

To minimize, cascade, or tile all windows, right click on the Taskbar (in a spot with no buttons on it).

To empty the Recycle Bin quickly, right click on its' icon on the Destop and choose empty.

To close, restore, maximize, or minimize a window, right click on its' button on the Taskbar.

If a file has an associated application, but you would like to open it with a different application, hold down the shift key and right click on its' icon. To restart Windows without restarting the computer, go to the shutdown menu and choose Restart the computer. When you click OK, hold down the shift key.

CHOCOLATE LOGS

These don't need cooking and taste great.

Melt the butter in a saucepan.

Put in all the other things and mix them together well. Leave the mixture in the fridge until it is firm. Make small logs and roll them in coconut or hundreds and thousands.

TREVORS TIP:

POISONS:

A poison is any substance which causes injury or illness when introduced into the body. Some poisons can cause death.

Poisons include liquids, solids and fumes (gases and vapours). They may be swallowed (ingested) inhaled, absorbed or injected.

Swallowed poisons include food, shellfish, alcohol, medications, cleaning products, plants etc.

Inhaled poisons include carbon monoxide from an engine, carbon dioxide from natural decomposition, chlorine gas found in commercial swimming pools, glues, paints. Petrol etc.

Absorbed poisons include chemicals splashed on skin, pesticides, insecticides, plants etc.

Injected poisons include bites or stings from ticks, bees, spiders, snakes and other animals as well as drugs or medications injected with a hypodermic needle etc.

The most important thing is to recognise that a poisoning has occurred.

As you approach the victim survey the scene. Be aware of any unusual odours, flames, smoke, open or spilled containers, an open medicine cabinet, any overturned plants or anything which may arouse your suspicion. The signs and symptoms of poisoning may include: Nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, chest or abdominal pain, breathing difficulties, sweating, altered conscious state and seizures.

They may also have burns around the lips or tongue or on the skin. You need to know:

*What type of poison was taken

*How much was taken

*When was it taken

FIRST AID FOR POISONING:

* Survey the scene to make sure it is safe to approach and gather clues about what has happened

*If necessary remove the victim form the source of the poison if it is safe to do so.

*Do a primary survey to assess the victim's airway, breathing and circulation.

*Care for any life threatening conditions

*If the victim is conscious do a second survey to try and gather more information.

*Look for any containers and take them to the telephone.

*Call the <u>POISONS INFORMATION CENTRE</u> on 131126.

This number is attended 24 hours a day by experts who can give you information to help the victim while the ambulance is coming (if in fact it is needed).

*If unable to contact THE POISON INFO, centre call for immediate Ambulance medical assistance on 000.

*Do not give the victim anything to eat or drink unless directed to by a medical professional.

*If the poison is unknown and the patient vomits, save some of the vomit which the hospital may analyse to identify the poison.

More next month on the specifics of Ingested, Inhaled, Absorbed and Injected poisoning.

Coconut ice

You will need:-

1 cup of desiccated coconut

1 heaped cup of icing sugar

1/2 tin of condensed milk

Sieve the icing sugar and mix it with the coconut in a large bowl. Add the condensed milk a little at a time, pounding the mixture with a wooden spoon.

Add a few drops of food colouring if you want to.
When all the condensed milk has been stirred in, the mixture will make a stiff lump.
Put the mixture on to a slippery surface

and roll it into a flat slab.

Dust the slab with icing sugar.

Leave it overnight to harden and then cut the coconut ice into chunks.
