







MAREEBA SHIRE COUNCIL WASTE MANAGEMENT AT GROVE CREEK TRANSFER STATION

The Grove Creek Transfer Station has been upgraded at considerable expense to assist you with disposal of your rubbish. Council has, at public request, allowed the facility to remain open at all times and removed the charges for using the

Unfortunately, a number of people using the facility are abusing the system and not following the instructions on the signs. Instead of placing their rubbish in the bins provided, they are indiscriminately throwing their rubbish anywhere on the site. Council has been forced into additional site clean-up at high cost. This cost is an unnecessary added financial burden to the whole community attributable to a few people who are acting irresponsibly with their rubbish.

Should this problem continue, Council will, regrettably, have no choice but to reintroduce regulated hours and a gate charge for a person to be in attendance at the facility to prevent the abuses from continuing.

Council will be investigating and identifying the people who disposed of their rubbish contrary to instructions and will consider prosecuting the offenders.

MAKING TRACKS

with Councillor Oliver Gilkerson

 Council meets in Kuranda - Each year for the past two years Council has taken the opportunity to reach the far flung areas of the Shire. All of the Councillors and the senior staff have taken a mini bus to places like Irvanbank, Watsonville, Chillagoe, Petford, Dimbulah, Kuranda etc. Public meetings have been held in each township and points of concern inspected en route. This year Council will be going further and holding full Council meetings in some townships as well as public meetings in others. On Thursday June 20, 1996 Council will be holding its all day meeting in the CWA Hall, Kuranda. And at 4.30pm the "Question Time" session introduced by Council into its day meetings last year, will enable any member of the public to address issues or questions to the Council.

2. Coondoo Street Design Options - The detailed landscape architectural design for the Coondoo street component of the Strategic Management Plan is being prepared. Two design options have been prepared for public comment and are on view at Council's Kuranda branch office. After the period for public comment Council will make a final decision with guidance from respected landscape architects, Pawsey

and Prowse.

3. Traffic Flows - The flow of traffic in the village area was analysed in the Strategic Management plan with the recommended option to be implemented in stages. A change in traffic flow creates confusion until the new pattern has become established. Whilst seeking the benefits of the traffic flow option recommended under the plan, Council is also anxious to minimise inconvenience and ensure practicality of access. With this in mind the Engineers have been asked to assess the conversion to two way traffic flow of Therwine St (adjacent to Centenary Park) and the upper section of Thongon Street.

4. Youth Development Officer - Council has appointed a new position following a successful application for subsidy funding. The new officer, Megan Byrnes, lives in Kuranda and already is developing a number of

youth orientated initiatives for the Shire.

Historic Meeting for Kuranda

Mayor Chris Lewis said that for the first time in the history of the Council. formal Council meetings will be conducted in Chillagoe and Kuranda, on

the 6th and 20th of June respectively.

"Since the current Council has been in office it has adopted the practice of face to face consultation with the Shire's ratepayers and residents. This is an important initiative which gives all of the Shire's elected representatives the opportunity to gain a first hand appreciation of the diverse needs of the large Shire they are responsible for managing.

In carrying out its commitment to consult with Shire residents this Council has conducted an annual tour of the Shire accompanied by public meetings in centres throughout. In general these meetings have been well attended

and well received, particularly in the outlying centres.

This year the Council is taking the added step of holding formal Council meetings in two centres which really do underline the diverse nature of the Mareeba Shire, that is the outback town of Chillagoe, to the west, and, to the east, Kuranda, the village in the rainforest. These meetings will provide residents of these areas with an opportunity to see at first hand how their Shire council, which often seems so remote from them, works".

Meetings continue be well attended. A welcome addition to meetings is increased attendance and participation by members of the Aboriginal community - both at general meetings and on committee. Meetings now start at 7pm sharp. Council, State and Federal representatives are usually in attendence as well. The following points are lifted from the minutes. Full and comprehensive monthly minutes are mailed to ARK members. Membership is \$10 annually (\$5 pensioners).

*AIRCRAFT NOISE: Concern and complaints continue to grow regarding the increase in air traffic over Kuranda. Direct complaints can go to the Cairns Control Tower, phone 50 5380. If Kuranda appears to be 'accepting' these increases, the danger is they will become permanent as an alternative to the more vocal northern beaches areas. Speak up now.

*HERITAGE PARK DEVELOPMENT: Council has requested further studies (Economic Impact Study, Transport Impact Study, Environmental Impact Study, Landscape Impact Study) to be prepared by "independent and suitably qualified expert". Council will also take advice from their own experts. ARK has contacted the Wet Tropics and Queensland Rail expressing concerns that the development proposes to establish an interpretive centre and museum within a commercial operation. Contrary to some reports ARK has not been approached to take a position on a 'steering committee' for this project.

*ABORIGINAL CONSULTATION: Andy Duffin, chair of Djabugay Tribal Council, has been advising the management committee on matters of concern to the Aboriginal community. The most obvious and pressing is the lack of formal consultation with the Aboriginal community. ARK has recommended the formulation of an Aboriginal cultural policy which recognises the need for Council to consult extensively with the Aboriginal community, in recognition of and respect for traditional ownership of the land. Public artworks under the KSMP will also seek to support more visibility of Aboriginal culture in Kuranda.

* ANNUAL SHIRE TOUR: Full council meeting in Kuranda all day Thursday June 20th from 8.45am, CWA Hall. Public is welcome and can address council by arrangement after 4.30pm (general length 5mins). Contact Council on 921222.

*COUNCIL RESTRUCTURING: four new managerial positions established: Corporate Services: Peter Clark, Civil Works: John Grant, Commercial Services (& KSMP Project Officer): Michael Ganza and Environmental Services: Tim Nevard.

* REGIONAL WASTE MANAGEMENT STRATEGY: Council has rejected landfill, supporting an anerobic treatment facility for regional waste. Studies put the anerobic treatment costs higher in set up costs but this does not take into account ongoing (forever!) maintenance and monitoring costs of landfill. It also did not take into account the possible revenue of the anerobic system from power generation (methane gas), soil conditioner etc. Other benefits could be more employment but the biggest was caring for the environment. Rail is the preferred method of waste transport.

 KURANDA SEWERAGE: significant reductions in nitrogen emission levels have recently been achieved - over 2/3rds reduction - due to controlled use of aerators.

* GROVE CREEK TRANSFER STATION: Unfortunately the irresponsible and illegal dumping continues- at great cost to ratepayers - Council will do a letter drop explaining that if this continues the facility will be closed and a fee system re-instated.

* RURAL STREET NUMBERING: Pilot program in Speewah has begun at request of emergency services. Speewah residents should take down their lot number and put up new street number. Should also make mail delivery much easier.

* TOURIST DEVELOPMENT(DERAKSHAN) APPLICATION for Black Mt Rd: has been rejected by Council on a number of reasons, including conflict with DCP.

 NO CAMPING SIGNS ON BARRON RIVER: Council objected to these signs being erected last year. They should not still be there.
 If they are contact Council 921222.

* COONDOO STREET REDEVELOPMENT: Following requests to reexamine original plans a further consultation process is underway, please examine at Council office and make comments. Work witself will not start until March next year, after Park is finished.

* SKATEBOARD FACILITY: Some skaters have requested facility to be constructed at Kuranda Amphitheatre. Amphitheatre and Council supportive, negotiations continue. Also facility is planned for at Mantaka Bush Sports Club.

* FLAGGY CREEK DAM: Cairns Mayor Tom Pyne has agreed to a meeting to be organised by ARK to bring together ARK, Mona Mona Aboriginal Corporation, Mareeba Shire Council representatives and relevant Cairns City staff to discuss Flaggy Creek & Mona Mona.

KURANDA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND TOURISM

The Chamber had a very busy agenda at the last meeting with a good attendance in spite of the public holiday. We had a very detailed debate on the Chamber's view of the proposed Kuranda.Heritage Park development on the site stretching from the existing Heritage Markets up to the Railway Heritage Centre. The result was that the Chamber does not condone the development with concerns expressed about the increase of retailing space and the "fencing off" of part of the commercial village.

The Chamber also had a report on the submission to be made to Council on the proposed collection methods of the Kuranda benefited area rates. The Chamber believes that at present these rates are collected on an inequitable basis with a few ratepayers paying a very high level of contribution and many other businesses benefiting without a commensurate contribution. As the Main Street programme is to be funded from an increase in these rates; It is essential that all businesses pay their fair share towards the marketing

and cleanliness of the central village area.

The coordinator for the Main Street Programme started work on Monday 27th May and we are determined to give her every assistance in promoting our town. We see her role as establishing the long term planning of Kuranda's commercial and cultural directions. A public meeting and workshop will be held in late June and the public is urged to attend. This is a similar process to that which established the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan and we will be seeking input on festivals; architecture; greening the village and many other initiatives. More information in the near future.

Strong concerns were expressed about the effects of the one way streets recently introduced into the central village area. It was stated that this did not appear to be in conformity with the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan and this will be debated fully at our next meeting after receiving information from that committee and from the Council.

The Kuranda VIIIage Guide is now in the process of preparation. Advertisers should have placed their advertisements. Its production is a matter of urgency as the Chamber's supply of brochures is now exhausted.

Advertising signs and their proliferation throughout the village area was discussed and will be debated fully at the next meeting. We understand that Council is in the process of deciding the approval of signage but this process has taken many months already and seems no nearer to finalisation.

We will be receiving a report from CAFNEC on the Tully Millstream scheme at the next meeting. At a future meeting we will also have report from the other viewpoint before deciding our stance on this matter. Obviously, the provision of power supplies; roads and water supplies is of considerable concern to all commercial; developmental and lifestyle activities in this region. We will also be examining the Flaggy Creek Dam proposal and the alternatives at future meetings.

The Chamber is actively working towards ensuring that the village does not become another Gold Coast or Caims Esplanade and the membership is contributing thousands of dollars towards the maintenance and beautification of the Kuranda central area. We are putting our money where our mouth is!



From a Letter from Paul Kelly
My father taught me to swim
at Norwood public baths in
Adelaide during the summer
of '60-'61. Every Sunday we
drove there after Mass. Four
of my brothers and sisters
were older than me, and

three younger. I couldn't wait the learn to join the older ones who would all rush straight up to the deep end. The younger ones paddled around in the shallows while Dad took me through my paces, supporting me with one hand while I kicked my legs, milled my arms around and, most importantly, worked out how to breathe.

Deeper Water to me meant danger, meant power, meant growing up. I was mad for it. By 1962 I was swimming like a fish.

Images of summer appear in a number of songs on Deeper Water, so it's probably appropriate that I start touring here in Summer. I missed last summer while I was in America and Europe, which means I've had three winters in a row. They say that one is prone to depression if deprived of sunlight too long. It's hard to tell. Being in a studio is not a bad way to avoid winter.

On my return to Australia in May '95 I put a band together to play a month of Mondays at the Esplanade Hotel St. Kilda. The idea was to try out new songs. The band was much the same as the '94 line up except Shane O'Mara played guitar instead of Randy. In June we went back to the studio and did eight songs.

The last Australian tour was extensive, lasting three months. At the end of the tour we went into Platinum Studios and recorded eight songs.



Seven of the songs on Deeper Water come from the June '95 session, and four from September '95. The odd song out is Difficult Woman which was recorded in New York while on tour. It was originally written for Renee Geyer, and appeared on her album of the same name.

A few things floating around in my head while I was writing California were Neil Young's Albuquerque, Woody Guthrie's Deportees, Bertolt Brecht's California poems, and Grapes of Wrath by John Steinbeck.

The song before California stars a man, a woman called Anastasia, and too many horses to mention by name.

Give In To My Love is the first single from the album. Shane O'Mara came up with the big Isley Brothers sounding guitar riff, Cutting this track really made me feel like I was in a band again. Great bands have a certain swagger, like a gang walking down the street.

After a few years of 'floating' since *The Messengers* break-up I'm starting to build a history once more with a small group of players.

All the other songs have stories too. The wheel turns.



RUTH MALLOCH

Ruth Malloch was born in 1964 at Moreton Mains, a small farming community in the South Island of New Zealand, Surrounded by art at home - her father an artist of leisure, her mother an avid collector - she was constantly drawing and doodling. Educated at boarding school in Dunedin, Ruth's studies tended more towards the sciences than art. She completed a Bachelor of Science at Otago University and worked as an exercise physiologist for five years, an environment which gave her an intimate knowledge of the body and enlivened her expression of movement in her paintings, which she was still practising for pleasure.

Romance took Ruth to Africa for the first time in 1989, where she was immdiately struck by the awesome beauty of the native art, especially Shona sculptures. It was then Ruth made the decision to start painting

professionally.

Her first efforts - handpainted cushions, pastels and water-colours - were a hit in the African markets and selected shops. The success continued as Ruth travelled extensively over the next few years, selling her fabric art through quirky London shops and on her journey through the United States and Canada. Ruth's paintings are greatly inspired by primitive culture - the Maori art of her native New Zealand and Tribal African art being her most considerable influences. She returned twice to Africa during these transient years, simply to feel its impression and enrich her painting passion.

Since arriving in Cairns in 1992 Ruth has been successfully selling her art at the Kuranda Heritage Markets, Initially her niche was the fabric art under the label KUDU ART, however she soon discovered the uniqueness of her designs emboldened white T-shirts. For the first year Ruth painted every shirt by hand, but as this was not viable in the long term, the T-shirts are now screen printed. Ruth continues to maintain a gallery of handpainted originals so that something

unique is always on offer to the passer-by. To date, 1,500 originals have been sold.

The success of the T-shirts revealed the potential of Ruth's work and propelled her to the canvas. As a sell taught artist Ruth admits to experiencing a new found artistic freedom with the scope of this new medium.

Ruth acknowledges a strong obsessive element within the process of her painting. The finished painting carries with it an intrinsic relationship to her sprituality and extends meanings and connections for Ruth in answering that most basic, conscious question of "who am 17".

The works on show in the CULT exhibition at the Cairns Regional Gallery from 1st June are the accumulation of four years work. For Ruth, this has been a time of her own personal cult of obsession, and of Art, and of an acceptance of both as an artist. Ruth regards her paintings as a pure reflection of her life and invites you to share it with her in



TRAVEL DIARY · Annette, Chris ('Top Hat') & Shannon

Well we've made it back from Darkest Africa we had such a great time, saw heaps of animals, zebras, elephants, wilderbeast, monkies, gazelles, hippos, rhinos, lions, cheetah, vultures, eagles, buffalo, giraffes and heaps of different antelope.

The flight over took about 24 hours most of which was night time as we followed the night, coming back we only got four hours of night

and the rest was daylight.

We were picked up at Nairobi Airport by a representive of A & K (Abercrombie and Kent) the travel agency we went through. I think we must have got their worst driver on that trip (very interesting trip). There are no road rules as far as we could tell other than driving on the left hand side (most of the time). The driver dropped us at the Mayfair Court Hotel at about 4pm. Had a much needed shower and then went to one of the hotels' restaurants for dinner after which I went back to the room and crashed. Chris went back down to

the bar and party'd on with the locals.

Next morning we had a few hours to spare so we went for a walk, we went through some of the worst bits of the city (not that we knew that at the time). It was a very poor area, very rundown, the people live in shacks made from anything they can get their hands on, they were worse than a lot of the Aboriginals' old houses. Kenya has no form of government help for the people, so basically if you haven't got a job you don't eat. After lunch we were picked up by our safari driver Duncan, he was a great guide and friend to us for the next week. We were joined by a couple of Americans, they were a really nice couple, around our own age. They work in Saudi Arabia where nothing seems to be legal. They're not allowed any beer, wine, spirits, Playboys, etc. . . .even the bible is banned. So they were out for a good time.

Our car was a large van, you could push the top part of the roof up so you could stand with your head out to get better views of the animals. We drove to Ambaseli National Park that afternoon to our accomodation at the Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge which is at the base of Mount Kilimanjaro. The drive was very long, the countryside ver dry. We did come across one really green swampy bit with a herd of elephants there, unfortunately the driver was in a hurry so we didn't stay for photos which was a pity as it was the best opportunity for elephants. There were dozens of them, mums, dads and babies, we never saw them like that again only in small groups, but at least we

and goats and donkeys. They still live in their villages made of mud and grass, still live very primitive lives. The children have to work from a very young age, the girls have to look after the babies and the boy's tend the herds, they really have it hard compared to us. It

courses and you could eat as much as you wanted.

overcast or raining. We went out on a game drive the next day again he wanted money to pull us out, about \$10 per van and there (Sunday). We got to see heaps of zebras and wilderbeast and gazelles, was a couple of vans stuck trying to get round him. The drivers it started to rain in the morning about an hour into the drive and boy refused to pay him as it was against company policy to pay for help, did it rain, all the plains flooded and we were driving through at least so that guy just drove on. We had to wait around until some 4x4 tours a foot of water most of the time. This brought all the animals together came past to pull us out. It was a very eventful trip and we didn't get into big herds as they headed for high ground so the rain didn't stop back till late. The American couple were supposed to catch a plane us from seeing things. In fact I think it enabled us to see more. We that afternoon but we didn't make it back in time so they had to wait also saw hippo's near the road in a swamp.

We stopped for lunch at another lodge which to our amazement was. The next day we went into the city for a couple of hours to do a bit of very empty, normally there were at least 30 more vans but this time shopping before being dropped off at the airport to catch our flight there was only us and about 3 others. We found out later that they got back. We had such a great time in Kenya. We had two nights until it stuck with the flood waters so we were very lucky. We made it back to was time to fly back to Australia. We arrived back in Brisbane on our lodge in time for dinner. At about 5pm the clouds started to clear. Monday night, It was so nice to get home to our own bed. and we got our first view of the mountain. It certainly was We had a great holiday, we can't ever thank you enough for putting impressive, we sat and watched it until the sun went down. Chris got the entry in for us.

talking to some of the Masai people who told him heaps about their way of life. The Masai warriors eat only meat, goats milk, cows milk and blood which they bleed from their cows without killing them. They believe that to eat fruit and vege's is to take food away from the animals and that would anger the gods. It is also one of their customs that they must kill a lion before they can become a warrior which may be a problem later as lion numbers are dropping.

The next morning (Monday) the mountain was still visible so we watched the sun rise over it, an unreal sight. Then breakfast and into the van on our next drive to another game park. We went back to Nairobi for lunch at the Hard Rock cafe. After lunch we joined up with yet another American couple who also worked in Saudi Arabia although this couple were a bit older than us, they would have been in their late 50's, another nice couple. Now the party numbered six. We left Nairobi after lunch and drove to the next game park (lake Nakuru). We drove along a ridge overlooking the rift valley. You could see for miles, it was quite a bit greener here. We had a drive through 1/2 the game park to get to the lodge. We saw plenty of animals, warthogs with huge tusks, rhino's, flamingos and many many more. We had to share a room with the young couple as they had over booked the lodge, not that we minded as we got a very large suite with four beds, a bathroom, toilet, bedroom and lounge. We all got on so well that nobody minded. We only stayed there for one night before moving on to our third and final game park - Masai Mara.

The roads to Masai Mara were the worst I've ever seen. They wer sealed roads but the pot holes were so big and so many that nobody used the road - they all drove on the edges of the road. There was no rules to driving on these roads, you drove wherever was smoothest regardless of which side that was. I'll never complain about Queensland roads again, it made Myola road seem like a great road in comparison.


We arrived at the Mara Paradise Lodge in time for lunch. Masai Mara was so green and lush. After lunch we went out on a game drive, we got our first sight of lions and cheetah. The lions had just finished feasting on a large antelope and so were very lazy, just lying around

in the shade.

One of the cheetas jumped up on the other van travelling with us, he just wanted a look inside. The animals had no fear of people, they just ignored us for the most part. Just after seeing the lions it started raining again. There was heaps of rain in a very short period, but it was enough to turn the whole park into a swamp. We ended up sliding off the road and getting rather bogged, luckily there were a group of 4x4's there to pull us out. The next day they had to put mud chains on the wheels to help the vans through the mud. At the Mara Paradise Lodge there was a large river running around the edge of the buildings and in this river was about 20-30 hippo's so you'd sit down to your meals and get a great view of the river and its hippo's, it was so amazing to see them so close. We spent two nights here, it was a beautiful place.

Thursday we headed back to Nairobi, because of the rain the roads makes you realise just how lucky we are here in Australia. were really muddy, we got bogged about three times, the last time was Our accommodation was wonderful, our own round stone hut with for about 2 hours. There was a local car (a 4 wheel drive) stuck in the bathroom and toilet. We stayed there for two nights. The food was middle of the road blocking the road so nobody else could get through. wonderful, heaps of it the whole trip. Every meal was at least four Our driver tried to go around him but we got very stuck in the mud. Chris and a couple of others tried to get the 4 wheel drive going again We didn't get to see Mt Kilimanjaro for the first two days as it was in the hope that they would pull us out but when it finally was going for the next day.

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
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SINGAPORE DAISY

Chances are you have this plant growing in median strips, road cuttings and other public areas in your shire. There's also a good chance that council planted it there, and that the public have taken cuttings of this attractive and fast growing groundcover for use in their gardens.

However, a recent meeting of the Far North Queensland Pest Advisory Committee resolved that "concerned councils be encouraged to place Singapore Daisy in their pest management plans and that an education

program be initiated".

WHAT IS THE CONCERN OVER SUCH AN INNOCUOUS LOOKING PLANT? In just over a decade since its introduction to Australia, Singapore Daisy has become a visible problem from Weipa to the Gold Coast. It is a very vigorous plant that causes problems for home gardeners, and is now threatening other environments. The plant has escaped from cultivation and is causing concern as a weed of pasture; but it is as an environmental weed that it is of most concern - in dune areas along sandy coasts, rainforest margins, moist eucalypt forests, and Melaleuca swamps. It is very common along watercourses. It is a hardy plant that grows well on a range of soils, in full sun or semi-shade areas, choking out all other herbaceous plants and low shrubs. Singapore Daisy is listed in the USA Noxious Weed Act, and is now considered a pestiferous species in Queensland. Further planting of this daisy is considered inappropriate for coastal Queensland.

We want to stop Singapore Daisy becoming even more of a problem. In Queensland, it is predominantly vegatatively propagated, and its rapid dispersal throughout the state has been by people transporting cuttings. Its aggressive growth means many home gardeners have disposed of cuttings at rubbish dumps etc, which has allowed its spread into bushland. By discouraging further plantings by nurserymen, schools, gardeners and local governments, the future spread of Singapore Daisy will be greatly

reduced.

Your mower can spread it from one part of the garden to another.

CONTROL RECOMMENDATIONS

* Overall spray the plant with Brushoff (Metsulfuron methyl) at 40 grams per bectare:

* for spot spraying, use at the rate of 10 to 15 grams per 100 litres water.

* wetting agent should be added to the spray mixture.

* all vegetative clippings should be burnt and not disposed of in dumps etc where the plant can continue to grow.

ORGANIC GARDENING

by Marjorie Spear

Gardening is a joy in this gorgeous autumn weather. Weeds are still active and need pulling out. A good backward stretch is advisable after weed pulling. Weeds make good compost but seed heads are best put into supermarket bags and put into your wheelie bin. My wing beans are bearing well and have for 3 weeks needed daily picking best done in late afternoon - or early morning as with all fruit and vegies. Wing beans go woody in the midrib if not picked very young. In shops they are sold fat, long and woody as are chokoes sometimes.

To cook wing beans cut them crosswise into very small pieces - stir fry for a few minutes - then add herbs, liquid to taste and other vegies etc and simmer till tender to taste. (5-10 mins)

Pumpkins are ripening well - My cabbage and lettuce seedlings are growing well. Shallots are growing well and their green tops are tasty raw or cooked. They suffer no insect damage.

The Bougainvilleas are flowering - the poinsettia yellow and double red look gorgeous in full sun - some stalks from last year's pruning (must be done after flowering) pushed into poor soil are flowering bravely. No Pests. June 9th is the next garden group social afternoon.

GARDEN GROUP

The Kuranda Garden group had a very informative gathering in May at Harmony Farm. Marjorie showed people many useful edible and medicinal plants that thrive without insect attack in the tropics. Plants and cuttings filled plastic bags, which should always be brought to our get togethers. We then went to Pat Greene's lovely garden. There we enjoyed smoko as everyone as usual brought a plate. 

MOST PRECIOUS WATER

(Educational Feature)

The Barron River Basin, which extends from the Atherton side of Tinaroo Falls Dam through Mareeba, Kuranda, Lake Placid and across the Cairns coastal plain to the sea, is under scrutiny. Everybody wants its water, including Cairns, and we are realising that there isn't enough to go around. The Barron River is now the focus of a range of government and community groups. Kuranda Environment Association's May meeting brought many of these groups together to get a glimpse of the big picture.



Neighbours _

a Kuranda lifestyle column on critters who share our space

I hope you all enjoyed last month's column by Janef as much as I did. It's always interesting to read and hear stories about nature from other neighbours and not just what's happening out on my block at Oak Forest. If you would like to share an experinece with us via this column. I would love to hear from you. This month's article has been contributed by Alison of Russet Park.



We had an interesting find in the compost a few weeks ago. While ligging I inadvertantly stuck my fork through a clutch of white eggs (the size of one of the smaller chocolate easter eggs). One egg was damaged with a big tear which I pulled apart - the shell was like plastic paint, stretchy and tough - and it contained a beautiful little snake about 12 cm long and no thicker than a pencil. Unfortunately it was not ready to hatch and died as I watched but I collected one of the remaining undamaged eggs and placed it in a big glass jar in a pile of earth from the compost heap and then we waited. About a week later we noticed the egg had a little tear in it and that it was looking very scruffed and soft and so we watched and watched and watched. For the next three hours nothing happened and we decided that the poor little thing had rotted after being torn from its original resting place. However during the next hour we noticed that the egg was rocking very occasionally and seemed to be pulsing a little but still nothing else happened so we went away and did other things. Returning a couple of hours later things still looked pretty much the same, the egg was in the same part of the jar apparently unbroken, but on a second look and to our delight, the snake had hatched and was lying coiled up under a clod of earth. Apparently it is not uncommon for snakes to take such a long time to break out of their eggs but it must have been exhausted after such a long struggle. We kept it in the jar that night and then next morning took it back out to the compost heap and let it go. The other eggs had disappeared completely - hatched or eaten? We have spent a considerable time trying to identify our hatchling and got a bit of expert advice and think it was most likely a brown tree snake (also known as a night tiger) or Boiga irregularis. We have since done more research and next time we have the good fortune to


hatch a snake out we will confuse the poor little thing by trying to count scales and examine its nose holes before releasing it so that we can be sure of our identification. We do know that it wasn't a species of python because those snakes protect their eggs by coiling around them until they hatch, and other snakes such as the red bellied black snake give birth to live young. It was a great experi-

ence and our small daughter was fascinated we do regret not having seen the actual hatching but hopefully another clutch will turn up

Thanks Alison. I've never seen a clutch of snake eggs, however, I have seen plenty of brown tree snakes. I've often found them sleeping in the back shed and in the pantry and recently one must have slid into the outlet pipe of the washing machine. After a very sluggish wash and spin dry and four days later and incredibly disgusting smell wafted through the house. I pulled the place to bits looking for the offending critter but decided it must be in the roof, so the smell would eventually go away. When it was time to do the next laundry load I got a huge surprise and it was not a delightful one. After two bottles of vanilla essence and a complete flush out of pipes and machinery, the smell and scales still float around to remind

me of the poor creature's demise.

COMMUNICATION IN FAMILIES

A parent is always communicating, by words or actions, and for better or for worse, is influencing in some way the behaviour of their children. Effective communication - the transfer of feelings as well as ideas - involves listening. True listening, with the head and the heart, is vital in any genuine conversation, which takes place when each person receives the other's message in the way it is intended. Listening well is a way of helping your children understand themselves better, and letting them know you are really interested in what they have to say and how they feel. It is a way of increasing the possibility of good mutual exchange and an enhanced relationship with your children. To be a good listener means hearing what others - including members of your family, even your children - are saying from their perspective. The illustrations below show some of the ways we listen poorly. But the good news is that our listening skills are only habits we've learned, which means that we can change our habits and use more effective listening skills, if we want to. As you look at the communication blockers below, think about how you feel when you are on the receiving end!

TALKING ABOUT DRUGS

(or any sensitive issue)

As a parent, if you feel the issue is very sensitive, talk about it in a general way - about drug use in society or by people you know. You could even talk about your own use, such as what you get out of drinking alcohol, using painkillers, coffee, etc - what you find are the good and bad experiences. Try to avoid telling a moral tale, which most people find a turn-off. Your child might want to talk about their experiences, but even if they don't, you have opened up the lines of communication and shown your willingness to really listen and discuss the issues, without flying off the handle or standing in judgement over them. This does not mean you have to agree with what they have done or believe, but remember people are only open and honest when they feel safe and allowed to express themselves. Think about the times that you have felt able to truly say what you think and feel - what did the person you were speaking to do to make that possible? In the next bulletin we will look at ways in which parents can express their opinions to their children in an assertive rather than aggressive way. TREVORS TIP

MORE ON BURNS (Continued from last month)

ELECTRICAL BURNS are always more sever than they first appear, with serious damage to deeper tissues.

They frequently show "entry" and "exit" burns.

TREATMENT - REMEMBER SAFETY!!!!!

- 1) Turn off power. Disconnect the victim from the power source.
- 2) Commence resuscitation if the patient is not breathing
- 3) Treat associated injuries, including burns.
- 4) Immediately cool the burnt area with cold water once you are in a SAFE
- 5) Call for urgent ambulance medical aid on 000.

CHEMICAL BURNS:

- 1) Flood area with water for at least 15 minutes, longer if eyes are affected.
- 2) Remove contaminated clothing.
- 3) If possible identify chemical
- 4) Call for urgent Ambulance Medical Aid on 000.

SUNBURN:

Exposure to ultra violet rays in natural sunlight is the main cause of sunburn, general skin damage, premature ageing and skin cancer.

The signs and symptoms of sunburn are pain, redness, blistering and fever.

TREATMENT:

- 1) Cold showers
- 2) Application of cold compresses
- 3) Rest in cool place.
- 4) Regular cool drinks.
- 5) Blisters should not be pricked if sunburn is severe especially in children - seek medical advice.

*Prevention with Slip Slop Slap is even better. POINTS TO REMEMBER

DO NOT use adhesive dressings
DO NOT remove adhering materials
DO NOT drag clothing over face
DO NOT put ice directly onto skin

Good News For June

There is a wonderful old, old story told of Jesus returning to heaven after being on earth. The Archangel Gabriel gives Him a warm welcome and says "Lord, your work is finished", "No. No Gabriel, Jesus replies, far from it, my work has only just begun"The surprised Archangel in taken back for a minute and then says "then what means have you left on earth for it to continue"? Jesus says, "I have left a community of men and women". Gabriel looks doubtful and rather concerned "Lord, he says, but what if they fail?" Then Gabriel "I have no other way" Now open your Bible read Matthew 28 v 20 - 26, try to imagine yourself standing in a group a little apart from the group of Disciples clustered around Jesus in the passage.

There is only eleven now and Matthew recalls this as he brings his gospel to the end - WHY? Sometime as we read the Bible a single word can communicate a great deal to us. Look fully at the word eleven. As we read the four Gospels we are always aware of the twelve Disciples. But as we know something happened to break the complete circle - Judus betrayed Jesus and went away - that means that by the time Our Lord Ascension came, the moment Matthew is sharing with us now, the community has been wounded but here in the midst stands Jesus, within this damaged group and still He gives them his great commission. He assigns them his work for the rest of time - What a trust? What a commission? challenge? We begin to realise the really good news for us this is. In many senses we Christians to-day are "the eleven". Each one of us as well as the whole Christian community have many and obvious weaknesses, great differences and tensions abound, but look at the Passage again see how Matthew points out in the phrase,"they worshipped Him but some doubted"

We see that is the way it has always been and will be there will never come the perfect time or the perfect Church Always there will be reasons for doubt and differences. Jesus knows this only to well, just as He knew it on the Hilltop in Galilee, but as on that day with the pathetic little group Jesus does not hesitate a moment in giving us His work to do in our time.

He accepts the reality of each of us and that of the whole Church. He takes our strenghts, our gifts, our individual abilities as well as all the potential there is amongst us all when we work together.

He looks at us, understands us, accepts us, then Jesus calls us to do His work.


KURANDA LIONS CELEBRATE 20 YEARS SERVICE

If you are thinking about changing houses you are probably bemoaning the sad state of the property market. Instead of complaining about the market, formulate an action plan that has a high chance of success. First get rid of the idea that what you paid for the home, or what it has cost you, has anything to do with its present value. Your property has one value that is what a buyer is prepared to pay for it. How do you discover what that is? By looking at what similar properties are bringing. You do this by obtaining what the agents call a Competitive Market Analysis. This is a sheet that lists, in three categories, the prices and addresses of properties similar to yours. The first category is similar properties that have sold in the past two months, the second is similar recently listed properties that are still for sale and the last is properties that are still on the market after being listed for more than four months. Make notes about each one and write down how your home compares. Note particularly such features as aspect, presentation, location and exceptional landscaping. Then work on the factors you can improve, such as presentation. Taking into account the good and bad features of your home, reduce your price until it is in the same price range as the others in its category. Don't fall for the trap of waiting "until the market improves". You always buy and sell on the same market. Most people move up to a more expensive home so it is false economy to wait until yours rises \$10,000 and pay an extra \$30,000 for the other one. A major mistake is to buy the next home and move into it before yours has been sold. This may not only incur you in costly bridging finance - it can also mean you may get far less for the present home.

A significant part of your home's value comes from the atmosphere you have created in it. Once you remove the books, rugs, furniture and pot=plants it gets a bare look that could shave 10 percent off its value. Finally, appreciate that having a house on the market has an emotional cost. You are forced to live in a state of uncertainty. Surely it's much better to get it over with quickly, even if it does mean dropping money now. 

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
