

BY-ELECTION PROPOSAL – A CONTROVERSIAL DECISION?

The Mareeba Shire Council held a Special Council meeting on 10 February to discuss how filling the vacant Councillor position, created by the passing of Councillor Kevin Davies in January, would be decided.

As the vacancy occurred in the first 12 months after the last local government election (held on 16 March 2024) the *Local Government Act 2009 (Qld)* requires that Council decide whether a by-election be held, or the vacancy be offered to the runner-up.

The runner-up in that election was Mladen Bosnic (5,319 votes) with the next highest vote being 5,283 votes. It would be fair to say that most voters would have expected that the



vacancy would automatically be offered to the runner-up given the election was held less than a year ago and Mr Bosnic was willing and able to take on the position.

However, Council has decided to ask the Honorable Ann Leahy, Minister for Local Government, for permission to hold a (postal) election instead to fill the position. The decision has received a largely unfavourable response on social media from residents, both for the perceived departure from the norm and the cost and inconvenience of imposing a by-election on voters. Councillor Nipper Brown was the only dissenting vote for the decision to hold a by-election.

The Express Newspaper reported, on 18 February, that Mr Bosnic was disappointed with the decision by Council, but that he would run in the by-election if Council is granted permission.

In a media release from 10 February, Mareeba Shire Mayor Angela Toppin said "Today, Mareeba Shire Council has decided that a by-election should be held to fill the vacant Councillor position."

"We believe that the community should decide who sits on Council, not the councillors. Our decision looked at several factors, namely the time since the last election, the results of that election and the cost of holding a by-election. After serious consideration, the holding of a by-election was seen as being in the best interests of the community."

"The role of a councillor is very important. They are a strong voice for the community and make decisions that have a direct impact on residents. Given that nearly a year has passed since the last election, we want the community to have their say in who represents them. Whoever the people choose will be welcomed to the team," said Mayor Toppin.

At the time of going to print, we are unable to confirm if the Minister has granted Council permission to hold the by-election, so no date or further details are available.

Residents are advised to visit the Electoral Commission of Queensland (ECQ) website to check and update their details on the electoral roll. Anyone considering running for the position should also visit the website for all relevant information including details of the mandatory "So you want to be a Councillor" training.

As we go to print our understanding is that should the Minister agree to the by-election, the ECQ will then set a date and start the election process, including deciding when nominations will open. Council has advised that once the nominations are finalised, there will be a dedicated page on its website with profiles supplied by each of the candidates.

We hope to bring readers more information next edition.



JUMRUM ESTATE

I am writing to you in regards to the Jumrum Estate development on Discovery Road, Kuranda.

The sediment controls for stormwater runoff are woefully inadequate and have completely failed allowing muddy water to run directly into Jumrum Creek. Despite community opposition to this project it was able to proceed and it is now clear that the developers are not meeting their environmental responsibilities. This negligence is a direct threat to the endandered Kuranda Tree frog (Litoria myola) among other species.

There has been a significant lack of planning, compliance and control over this development.

I don't understand how the developers have been allowed to open up this much land and then leave it sit over the wet season.

I have written to MP Bree James, Member for Barron River, requesting she follow up on this issue with the relevant authorities so that this situation can be rectified as soon as possible and the responsible parties held to account.

KUR-ALERT COMMUNITY GROUP WINDS UP, BUT THE NEED FOR VIGILANCE REMAINS

In 2015, an unprecedented development of scale and magnitude was proposed for Myola. The development was called Kur-World and would have consisted of 336 units, 373 small residential blocks, commercial precinct, golf course and retail town centre. This was proposed by businessman Ken Lee who had bought 620ha of mostly forested land to develop.

The Kuranda community was shell-shocked by this proposal that would urbanise Myola and duplicate town centres amongst many things. The huge project was also in breach of local planning scheme and state planning instruments.

Disappointingly, the Mareeba Shire Council's response was inadequate, irresponsible and inept, and demonstrated their lack of knowledge of the many issues involved - and demonstrated little will to adequately research the project. It also called into question whether Council bureaucracy allowed for sufficient community consultation and engagement. Councillors were even prohibited from meeting residents and attending community town hall meetings. There appeared to be only concern-mostly by the then Mayor and the CEO- for a potential \$600 million dollar development coming to the Shire, regardless of whether it was sustainable or even feasible (which as it turns out, it was not).

As a response to the gross mismanagement of the Kur-World development by Council, and then by state government (as a State Coordinated Project), Kur-Alert Inc. was formed. The aim was to secure unity within the community and gather resources to mount a strong case against the development.

Eventually, after four years of intense stress on the community, the State government finally rejected the application citing transport issues on state-controlled roads, but we know it was more than just that. The community expected our elected members to throw the project in the bin at the very start and this would have saved countless hours of dedicated work by teams of volunteers who put their lives on hold for years to do the work the Council should have done in the first place.

Kur-Alert Inc. has remained active since this time making sure that all Tablelands' councils enforce and abide by their own planning laws. Many good outcomes have been achieved such as the TLPI (Temporary Local Planning Instrument) to restrict the subdivision of blocks over 50ha to retain agricultural viability of the sector.

At the recent Kur-Alert Inc. AGM, the committee consisting of Steven Nowakowski (President), Cheryl Tonkin (Secretary) and Julie Cohen (Treasurer), voted to deregister the organisation as an incorporated body-for ease of paperwork and workload. However, the group of dedicated individuals will still exist and remain vigilant.

It was also voted that the remaining funds in the Kur-Alert bank account be disbursed evenly between three local conservation organisations. An amount of \$5,742 each has been given to Kuranda Conservation, Kuranda Envirocare and Rainforest Reserves Australia.

RAIL BRIDGE REPAIRS UNDERWAY BETWEEN KURANDA AND MAREEBA

The past couple of years have been tough on the Savannahlander. We've been impacted by record floods, intense wet seasons, bushfires, vandalism and an ageing railway. We were really hoping that 2025 was going to be when things started getting better for us but it doesn't seem to be over yet.

We have been informed by Queensland Rail that there is damage to several of the railway bridges between Kuranda and Mareeba making it currently unsafe for us to travel over.

It is expected to take around six months to repair the line. I know, not good news at all, but please bear with me.

We are trying our best to work around this and currently working on a plan that is yet to be finalised, but this is what we're thinking.

We want to pack up all three Railmotors, throw them on the back of a truck (good thing I've got HUGE muscles) and relocate them to Mareeba so that we can start the trip from there.

This will mean that if you're travelling with us during this period, you will be transported by coach between Cairns and Mareeba.

Now moving a train by truck is no easy feat so will take a few weeks to prepare and accomplish, meaning that we have had to cancel the first five trips of the year (those passengers impacted have been notified).

At this stage we are hoping to start our season on 9 April, but like I said, our plan is yet to be finalised and given approval by the relevant government departments, which may take a week or two.

So this is where we are at this point in time. Things may change that are out of our control. Especially as our wet season isn't over yet, but we will update you all with more information when we get it.

We ask for your patience and not to call the office asking for more information because firstly, we just don't have it and secondly, the admin team is working hard trying to sort everything out as quickly as possible.

And the only other favour I'd ask of you, is that if you're booked to travel with us this season, please do, despite the changes in the service. The Savannahlander needs your support now more than ever and we're looking forward to seeing you on board and giving you one hell of a good time on the best damn outback rail experience in Australia.



One of the biggest concerns in our community right now is the crime in Kuranda. The reoccurring incidents of breaks-ins, assaults, vandalisation and anti-social behaviour is not something I take lightly, and it is something I refuse to ignore.

I have received updates from both the Cairns Police and the Hon. Dan Purdie, Minister for Police and Emergency Services.

Last week Cairns Police confirmed an action plan has been established. This action plan utilises extra police on overtime, traffic patrols, Tactical Crime Squad, Mareeba Crime Prevention and Tablelands detectives.

Five key Kuranda offenders were arrested on 15 February 2025 and this is anticipated to have a significant impact on reported crime. Police will also focus on anti-social behaviour within the Kuranda CBD and engage with government and industry stakeholders.

Engagement is ongoing with government partners to identify and implement intervention strategies to address the drivers of anti-social behaviour and youth offending.

I want to acknowledge the involvement of the police, community groups, local leaders and especially the Elders who worked together, and will continue to do so, to reduce the crime and anti-social behaviour in Kuranda. Thank you.

All Kuranda residents now have access to a survey to assist in actionable outcomes. This two-minute survey is available online at bree4barronriver.com.au as well as through our social media and QR code. I encourage all residents to fill this survey out.



It will take the whole community's support to improve this problem. I will also have a mobile office set up in Kuranda on 6 March 2025. I would love to meet as many people as possible.

Last week I returned to Brisbane for our first Parliamentary sitting of the year to discuss the ongoing concerns of poor infrastructure, crime and recent floods affecting the Far North Queensland community. 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Prep in the Rainforest at Steiner School

The name 'Prep' suggests 'preparing' for something, but what exactly is the Prep year meant to prepare children for?

In most schools, the focus is on early literacy and numeracy, developing the social rhythm and routine of attending school, and learning about the social environment of the classroom. The Cairns Hinterland Steiner School also focuses on these activities, but perhaps in a different way.

Jenny Edney, Head of Teaching and Learning talks about Prep at Cairns Hinterland Steiner School, "The Prep year at our school is a place where deep connections to the sensory environment are built through verse, song, rhymes and stories, and the natural imagination and creativity of the child is enlivened through the experience of wonder.

"According to Rudolf Steiner, the 'work of childhood' is play, where each child is free to give their whole living being to the world around them.

'When we look to the future and what the prep-age child is developing within themselves and preparing for, we can see that the foundation of play supports the future development the child's freedom of thought, imagination, creativity, innovation, and exploration." said Jenny.

Educators at Cairns Hinterland Steiner School deliver literacy through story and song, and numeracy through the exploration of natural phenomena. The sensory immersion afforded each child is a rich tapestry of discovery and joyful sharing.

"In our Rose Apple (Prep) class, a typical day involves Circle Time for music, speech, and movement; indoor creative play; cooking; morning tea; baking, painting, beeswax modelling or craft; outdoor play in nature; lunch; story time; and a bushwalk or games." said Jenny.

"Importantly, we follow the Australian Steiner Curriculum Framework and we ensure the curriculum is interwoven into these activities in a natural way." Jenny said.

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THE AIR IS THICK WITH BIRDS AND BUTTERFLIES

It happens every year. The blue-black shiny Metallic Starlings are back. They move in flocks looking for the ripe berries on top of the tall, skinny *Polycias australiana*. They eat the fruit at our place and poop out the seeds at your place! The noisy Orange-footed Scrub Fowl is around the garden every night. They are always seen in pairs and they call to each other when they get separated. If that's not enough to keep you awake, the curlews have a screaming concert every few hours. They have a brown-blotchy egg that is laid in a conspicuous place in the open. The sitting hen cops the sun and the rain for about 30 days until the fluffy chick is hatched. The chick is up against it right from the start with snakes on the ground and hawks from above, all trying to make a meal out of it.

Once the rain let up, out came the butterflies. The Cairns Birdwing female is as big as a man's hand while the male is a bit smaller but has brilliant green wings. They lay their eggs on the *Aristolochia acuminata* vine. That's OK until the resultant grubs start eating the vine leaves. You don't notice them till they are a huge finger length and you can actually hear them munching. They then pupate, rarely settling on their food vine. They usually crawl away to somewhere solid, miraculously turn into a chrysalis and about 50 days later emerge into a huge, stunning butterfly.



blue of the Ulysses butterfly. The more intense blue wings denote the male with the paler blue wings the female. These butterflies dance with sharp changes of direction making it hard to get a good look at them. When they do settle, the underside of their wings is a patterned brown and when they fold them, it's very hard to see them.

There are so many birds, butterflies, katydids and 30cm long stick insects around just now that it's hard to get bored in a plant nursery where it's all happening.

DIRECT SEEDING


An easy way to plant is by putting seeds directly in the ground. This is called direct seeding. It can allow you to easily plant an embankment to stop it from eroding. This is how you do it. If you've never harvested Lomandra seed, it's very easy to do. Simply wait for the berries to dry on the grassy bush and begin to split open. Next, cut the entire flower spike off and put it head down into a tough bag. Then shake the bag around to loosen the grains from the flower spike. You'll now have a bag full of seeds ready to be scattered into their new home. It's that simple! For Lomandra plants already potted up, stop by our Nursery at 1 Pademelon Lane, Kuranda – nearly always open.

CASSOWARIES - CREATING A FAMILY TREE

Not only are we gathering information from the sightings you report to us, but we're also trying to set up a family tree for each of our regular birds. This is not easy or accurate when we can't be sure who has mated with whom to produce the eggs that the male sits on and subsequently raises as his own. Are they his or is the egg the female deposits in his nest the result of her mating with another? Could this be Nature's way of ensuring genetic diversity? More questions than answers.

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

Creating characters

Characters drive your story. Well-developed characters make us care.

Spectacular fight scenes or exciting car chases may be interesting, but if the reader doesn't really care about who these will affect, it will lower the tension, and suspense will be temporary at best.

Alternatively, let's say we have a guitarist in his 60s. Justin writes all the music for his band of 15 years. His granddaughter adores him. She's obsessed with learning his style.

But Justin's band is moving toward a more contemporary sound, looking to break into a new lucrative market. He either embraces the move or his band will kindly but firmly turn away. His confidence is shot, and he's lost the ability to create the music he loves.

Looking for inspiration to revive his mojo, Justin embarks on a road trip in his 69 Land Rover. He wants to write songs again – for himself, but also for his granddaughter. He's torn between trudging toward fame and fortune with the new sound or embracing the integrity of the music he loves.

While Justin is driving through an unfamiliar city, he cuts off the wrong person in traffic. The guy takes off after him. There's a car chase scene, (which probably isn't very fast as we are talking about a 69 Land Rover), and our musician is in trouble. We know him. We know he idolises Dicky Betts and has a strange affinity with stray dogs. We know he can be a bit gruff and slightly obnoxious when he drinks, but we like him. We understand him. When his life (and the land Rover) is at stake, we care.

Because we care, the car chase scene takes on a new importance, and we'll be holding our breath, whipping through the pages.

Creating a character

Sometimes your protagonist will pop into your mind fully formed. If not, one way to trigger the birth of your character is to fill in a character profile sheet. It's grounding to see a character's skin tone, hair and eye colours, stature – all those things that we notice first when we first meet someone. It's even more compelling to dig a bit deeper.

A profile sheet covers physical traits but also dives into the less superficial aspects of your characters. There are hundreds of various templates for these online. They can cover background of course, but also preferences in music, reading, fashion, hobbies, dreams, fears, loves, hates - the list is endless. Some detailed templates can be a bit overwhelming, so try to choose aspects of your character that are important to your story. You won't use all of this information in your writing, but the more you know about your protagonist, the more authentic they will seem to the reader.

Getting to know your character this way can become quite time-consuming, but the deeper you delve, the more detail you can find. With this information at your fingertips, all of your characters become richer and more convincing. You will know instinctively how they would act in critical situations.

Character profiles can be used for protagonists, secondary characters and antagonists as well. They're also a quick reference. If Justin has green eyes in Chapter 1, they probably shouldn't turn brown in Chapter 3.

Well-developed, active characters can drive your story.

Your main characters' goals (internal and external) are the driving force of your plot. You can often define your story by asking these four questions:

- What is my character's goal?
- What motivates him to achieve this goal?
- What flaws/conflicts might keep him from achieving his goals?
- What's at stake if he fails?

Let's take our musician:

- Goal: He wants to write music again.
 - **Motivation:** He's lost without his music, and he's a role model for his granddaughter.



- Flaws/conflict: Lack of confidence. Fear of failure. Struggle between sellout and moving on.
- Stakes: If he can't write music anymore, his career is over. He fears his granddaughter will see him as a has-been and lose faith in herself and the music she loves.

This exercise can help clarify your story in your own mind. If you're looking to publish traditionally, the answers to these questions are a clear path towards writing a compelling pitch to an editor or agent.

Characters in your first draft

As I mentioned in the last article, a first draft is where you are free unleash your ideas and ignore your inner critic. This is where you will fall in love with your characters. If you know them well enough, they may even take the lead and help you build a compelling and unique foundation for your story.

Another 2am wake up, and all because Harry the Ancient shook his head violently, sending his kelpie ears flapping very audibly.

That was it. There was no going back to sleep for me. There is so much white noise in the depths of the night, I sometimes pray for a power cut.

I wear silicone ear plugs occasionally, but I can still hear the puppy fidgeting, the ticking of the clock, the clicking of the overhead fan, and the changing tones of the refrigerator in the laundry adjacent to the bedroom, which range from a steady hum to a threatening roar. Funnily enough, a herd of curlews can go off in unison and I don't hear a thing. We won't talk about f-r-o-g-s in drainpipes though.

Sometimes, with the ear plugs in, I hear my heart beat, and although that should be comforting, I don't like it, because I will know if it stops. Then I start thinking about how it would be if I died in my sleep, and vow to feed the dogs more in the evenings, just in case. Unfortunately there is nothing on Google to instruct me on how much to give them to ensure they won't eat me before someone realises I have disappeared.

I bought the earplugs in bulk from Temu, four boxes in fact, because they don't seem to like going back in the cute little flowery box I bought for them to sleep in during the daytime, when they are not working. I probably still have them in my ears sometimes when I walk the dogs thinking how peaceful the world is at that time of the morning, but mostly I tread on them later in the bathroom, or they work their way down the bed.

But one day a few months ago, I read about the toxic chemicals used in the manufacture of a lot of products distributed by Temu, especially those with bright colours. I stopped using my bright orange Temu ear plugs and threw away my colourful Chinese polyester t-shirts. My memory is bad enough already without lead and cadmium being jammed up against my brain every night. It has enough challenges to cope with as it is. Thank heavens toilet rolls are white and made in Australia, but then again, they are mostly bleached so there's food for thought.

The trouble is, not buying non food items from China because of the use of toxic dye ingredients does somewhat narrow choice down to near zero. I feel dreadful buying from Temu, but it's pretty hard finding cheap dog walking type t-shirts that aren't Chinese. It's pretty hard finding anything at all that is not made in China, of course. I find myself looking askance at brightly coloured food storage containers and dog toys with suspicion, and as far as I know neither are recyclable except to the op shop.

So many things to think about once one is awake at 2am, aside from the fact that I really must swap the clock, seeing as it is months since it earned mention in an earlier article. I seem to write about sleep more than I actually do it. It's always hard to sleep

when this column is due because I spend hours trying to think what I can write about, after nine years. I should pretend *The Kuranda Paper* is a gardening magazine and write the same thing a year later when no-one will remember what they read a year ago.

I do remember that I wrote about sleep many moons ago, and I think, quite recently, which just goes to show that concern about lack of sleep takes up a lot of my waking hours. I recall I quoted Napoleon:

"Let her sleep, for when she wakes, she will move mountains".

He was in fact talking about China and one would hope that is not too prophetic, although perhaps the Chinese could help with the Range Road. China, after all, built the Sanyuan Bridge in just 43 hours. And the Tianlongshan highway across the mountains in Shanxi Province – 30km long with four viaducts and a tunnel – took only 15 months to complete. If you get a chance, have a look at www.youtube.com/watch?v=ivkI5eSGpnE. The engineering feats are quite amazing.

A lot of us have suggested that on social media, but we jest of course. It would, after all, make their invasion of Kuranda easier. If they land in Cairns, we can always take one or two bolts out of the bridge and maybe a couple of blocks...there's a job for an abseiler there. I don't think explosives would be necessary.

I think they might have saved a bit more money than Australia

though, with a trade surplus of \$990 billion, and the country now producing a third of the world's manufactured goods. I'm surprised that's all, to be honest, but we have to trust what the media tells us. Excuse me while I choke on my own words.

They do have a few more people than us up their sleeves though...

I'm sure we could do a deal. Free McDonalds and KFC to all the workers, of which there would be many, and we could hand back all our faulty goods for them to resell to Kmart and Target. They could make a killing just on the recycled e-goods spilling out of the shipping container at the Cardinia tip. This is a sore point, as my crockpot has died after only two weeks and the dishwasher and oven are on life support until I pull the plug, and the washing machine lid is broken. Oh, and my laptop keyboard has died, along with my will to shop.

I long for the days when I went to the shops to buy things, instead of taking them back. There was a time you could pull one wipe out of its wrapper instead of pulling out half the contents, when lids came off without tools. Those days when instructions were readable and the English version of instructions was in English, and that you didn't need a magnifying glass AND your glasses to read them. Or perhaps I am just getting older?



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
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Working with the Kuranda community to preserve our history and tell our stories

The year is 1970. The sun beats down on Holloways Beach, turning the sand to shimmering gold. A motley crew of souls, artists and ex-professionals among them, called this place home. They were the pioneers, the first wave, seeking refuge from the concrete jungles down south. They fished, hunted crocs, and lived off savings, their days filled with the rhythm of the ocean and the haze of sweet smoke. They called themselves 'hairies', a distinction they held dear.

But paradise, as it often does, attracted a crowd. Younger faces, fresh from the cities, arrived with little more than the clothes on their backs and a thirst for freedom. They were the 'hippies', drawn by tales of a carefree existence and the whispers of magic mushrooms growing wild in the rainforest. The beach became crowded, the vibe shifted, and the local council, spurred by complaints, declared war on the campers.

The 'hairies', weary of the influx and the unwanted attention, looked inland. Kuranda, a village nestled in the rainforest, beckoned. Land was cheap, the forest dense and mysterious, and the mushrooms, they said, were plentiful. A small exodus began, a pilgrimage to a new promised land.

Among them was 'Elara', a painter with eyes the colour of the rainforest canopy. She pooled her resources with two other 'hairies', a musician named 'Jasper' and a former architect called 'Silas'. Together, they bought a plot of land, a small clearing where the sun dappled through the leaves. They built a simple cabin, its walls of mud and timber, its roof thatched with palm fronds.

Word spread like wildfire. Kuranda became a beacon, a haven for those seeking an escape. The 'hippies' followed, their numbers swelling, their energy both vibrant and chaotic. They camped on the outskirts of the village, their music echoing through the trees, their laughter mingling with the calls of exotic birds.

The locals, at first, were wary. These newcomers, with their long hair, their strange clothes, and their even stranger habits, were an enigma. Whispers of drug use and wild parties fueled their apprehension. The 'hairies', sensing the growing unease, tried to distance themselves from the more boisterous element. They attended village meetings, participated in local initiatives, and tried to show that they were not just passing through.

One sweltering afternoon, a bulldozer rumbled into a clearing, its metal teeth tearing into the earth. A development company, oblivious to the delicate ecosystem, planned to carve a subdivision into the heart of the rainforest. The "hairies," their connection to the land deepening, were the first to raise their voices. They joined forces with concerned locals, forming a coalition to protect their shared home. The 'hippies', caught up in the fervour, added their voices to the

chorus of dissent.

The battle was long and hard-fought. The developers, backed by money and influence, pushed back. But the community, united in its purpose, held firm. The 'hairies', with their practical skills and their quiet determination, played a crucial role. 'Elara', with her art, captured the beauty of the rainforest, reminding everyone what was at stake. 'Jasper', with his music, brought people together, creating a sense of shared purpose. 'Silas', with his architectural knowledge, helped design sustainable alternatives.

In the end, the developers retreated. The rainforest was saved. The 'hairies', once viewed with suspicion, were now seen as valuable members of the community. The 'hippies', though still a source of some concern, were tolerated, their youthful energy adding a splash of colour to the village life. Kuranda, once a quiet village, had become a melting pot, a place where different ways of life, though sometimes clashing, ultimately coexisted. The rainforest, the silent witness to it all, continued to thrive, its green canopy a symbol of resilience and the enduring power of community.

Kuranda, with its rainforest setting and artistic community, has long attracted alternative lifestylers and counter-culture groups. It's plausible that the hippie movement, with its emphasis on peace, nature, and communal living, found Kuranda appealing. The influx of hippies to similar locations around the world often coincided with the broader movement's timeline, peaking in the late 1960s and early 1970s.

At the Kuranda Community Kindergarten, we are lucky to offer the PaL program. So, what is PaL and what does it look like at our Kindy?

Parents and Learning or PaL is a home-based parent





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engagement program. It was designed by Indigenous people to support parents to participate in their young child's literacy learning. At our Kindy, PaL is taught be Ms Tracy. Every morning parents and children have the chance to read PaL books and use PaL resources together.

During the day Ms Tracy will take a small group of children to explore a story. The chosen story is then explored in a variety of ways including games, songs, puzzles and small world play. This will happen over two or three weeks, sometimes longer if the children show that they are still interested in that particular story.

Each week the PaL bag, with book and resources, is sent home with a child so the family can continue the learning experience at home. PaL is always taught by Indigenous teachers, and this creates a culturally safe space for Indigenous children and families to explore literacy together. While the PaL program is designed by Indigenous people

for Indigenous people it is a very inclusive program that benefits all Kindy families, and all families are invited to participate in.



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We live in a magical part of the world, so no wonder Disney wants to get in on the action! The Wet Tropics is one of the most biodiverse regions of Australia and has a wealth of plant and animal species that have attracted the producers of natural history programs for decades.

The production of natural history TV programs is quite big business these days, with crews travelling the world to film interesting and engaging sequences with wildlife behaviours not seen before or filmed in new and exciting ways. Gone are the days where a wildlife show just shows a quick fleeting glimpse of the action or one single angle of the animal doing its thing. Today stories are told with Hollywood influenced camera angles and gliding camera moves, super slow motion and specialist lighting which provide unique and fascinating insights into the lives of animals using the latest technologies. Viewers are also demanding higher level of production to keep them engaged, so there's an everincreasing push for higher production values.

While much of natural history programs are obviously shot in the wild within the habitats of the various species, certain aspects cannot be done that way and some species are very difficult to film in the wild so other options must be explored.

Macro (or close up photography) is something we specialise in at Minibeast Wildlife and through our articles you will have seen many examples of super-close stills photography. While shooting perfectly sharp macro stills at the perfect moment can be extremely challenging, shooting video of these tiny animals is even more complex in some ways. Waiting for the wind to stop blowing to get one frame in focus for a still image can be very difficult and time consuming, while shooting video of a tiny bug perched on a blade of grass blowing around in the wind would result in the audience barely seeing the animal and getting motionsickness for their trouble!

Sometimes this type of work is best done in a studio, where things like wind and rain can be taken out of the equation. Importantly it can only be done in situations (and with species) where the animal's natural behaviour won't be affected, and they are completely at ease. Fortunately, many invertebrates are like this and when they are allowed to live in specially built habitat sets, carefully created to suit them, it not only enables these tiny creatures to exhibit their natural behaviours, but also to be filmed clearly and from a variety of angles to reveal previously hidden aspects of their incredible lives. Enter Minibeast Wildlife (and our macro studios). For over 25 years we have assisted natural history film crews to capture some incredible footage of these critically important animals both in the wild and within specialised studio sets. The term usually used in the credits for what we do is often 'animal wranglers' or 'invertebrate specialists', but it varies production to production. Our key role in the studio is to ensure the environments we create for filming enable the bugs to behave normally, and we work closely and carefully with the insects, spiders and other invertebrates throughout the entire process. Our knowledge

of these animals' behaviours and how to work with them, our set building techniques and location now attracts crews from all over the world every year. Our understanding of these often-minute creatures comes from years of passionately observing them in the wild and working very closely with them. We never stop learning and are constantly amazed by their behaviours and abilities.

Kuranda has been an awesome place to base our work as we can quickly jump between filming out in the rainforest, the nearby savannah woodlands, the coastal regions and of course within the myriad of special sets we create in our studios.

The productions filmed here in Kuranda include *Micro Monsters with David Attenborough, Life in Colour, Planet Insect, Earthsounds, Tiny World* and many others. Last year we hosted the BBC for a month working on a new invertebrate series called *Hidden Planet* which is still in production. Meeting our inspiration and idol Sir David Attenborough has been one of the highlights of our careers.

Disney is now producing natural history series and over the last few years, we have worked on two big Disney/Nat Geo Productions; *A Real Bug's Life* and we are currently working on the *Underdog* series. Both these have involved multiple shoots and many weeks of filming to capture all the behaviour and stories that these tiny animals have to offer.

The Australian episode of *A Real Bug's Life* is called *Tiny Heroes Down Under* and is currently streaming on Disney +. It follows the life of a tiny Peacock spider growing up in a bushland setting near a rusty tin shed – the actual location was in NSW. While you won't recognise it, most of that episode was shot here in Kuranda, both in the studio and in the local bushland. The adult Peacock spiders featured are half the size of a match head. The babies were the size of grains of sand, so it was essential to film them in a studio to get usable shots. Close-ups of the babies' faces required remote controlled cameras to reduce vibrations and for no one to even walk or move in the studio! Such shots would have been impossible outside with even the tiniest of breeze.

Whether it be allowing cameras to capture normally secretive nocturnal activities, life underground in burrows or just glimpses into the lives of animals we'd normally not be able to see, we feel that the role we play fosters an appreciation of these critically important animals and enables people to value them more. We hope that this goes someway to helping conserve them and their precious wild habitats.



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Melioidosis cases continuing to rise in Far North

Far North Queenslanders are being reminded to stay alert to symptoms of a dangerous seasonal disease, with cases of melioidosis taking a fatal toll.

The Cairns and Hinterland Hospital and Health Service has recorded 30 cases of melioidosis since 1 January, including, sadly, seven patient deaths across North Queensland. Tropical Public Health Services director Dr Jacqui Murdoch said this was a higher-thanaverage number of cases for this time of the year.

"Melioidosis is a serious disease found in ground water and soil, and it can cause death in up to 20 per cent of treated cases. Early recognition and treatment are vital" Dr Murdoch said. The disease occurrs when skin abrasions or wounds come into contact with wet soil or water contaminated by the bacteria Burkholderia pseudomallei. Dr Murdoch urged those at risk of serious illness, such as people with diabetes, kidney problems, lung problems and people on medication that lowers their immune system, to take precautions to avoid infection.

The Wonder of Seeds

Have you ever had such a surprise that it made your day? At our nursery recently, several plump green pods from a local garden arrived on the work bench for identification. After placing slight pressure on one of the pods, it released a white cascade - thousands and thousands of tiny seeds that flowed over our fingertips and the bench. They were orchid seeds of the species Geodorum densiflorus or Pink Nodding orchid! The seeds were carefully collected and planted...and now we wait. Watch this space.

And what about plants that develop their seeds on the outside of the fruit? Well, strawberries do, and so do some rainforest species. The Weeping Brown pine (Podocarpus grayae) has a luscious red fruit with the seed, as big as the fruit, attached to one end. Cashew nuts result from an arrangement like this also.

And what about the fruit of the Burdekin Plum (Pleiogynium timorese) that hides a seed capsule that looks like a miniature flying saucer? The seeds are secreted in the 'portholes' until they germinate and burst up through the soil to form a magic fairy-ring of tiny seedlings. Wonderful!

We welcome any contributions of rainforest seeds to our nursery. When you collect fruit or seeds, please make sure that the fruit is ripe and fresh. Leaving the seeds in the fruit or pods and including a small branch of leaves will help to identify the species. A label showing date and place of collection will be of great assistance. (See photo) We will do the rest to start the journey of rainforest giants. Thank you.

Plant of the Month Weeping brown pine/Northern brown pine – Podocarpus greyae

A stunning tree with shiny pencil-shaped dark green leaves and with bright lime green new growth. The leaves hang attractively from somewhat drooping branches. Secosology Protecting our inter-generational food-plant seeds

Food security and diversity

Heirloom seeds have a rich history and importance that span hundreds of years. It is estimated that over 94% of all vegetable varieties from before the 20th century have become extinct! This is why preserving heirloom seeds is so important to food security and diversity in recent decades.

Seed saving is part of the human culture. It is the practices and culture of selecting, harvesting, cleaning and storing seeds for planting in future seasons. It is an old partnership between people and plants which is an essential part of agriculture.

The seed pods of Guinea chestnut, also called Malabar chestnut or Saba nut, are ripe. The seed pods are dropping to the ground. Pods split open, nuts are exposed and you have to be quick picking up the nuts before they sprout if you want to eat the nuts. We don't seedsave the nuts, but put the sprouted nuts in a pot to grow a new tree.

Seed pods of Pink Euodia (*Melicope elleryana*) often referred to as the Pink Flowered Doughwood are opening. Pick the pods and save the seeds. I thought it was easy to cut the pod in half to remove the seeds. It turned out to much easier to put pods in a paper bag and give it a good shake. The seeds then release themselves. Several species of butterflies are attracted to both flowers and leaves amongst others, Ulysses butterfly. The tree/scrub is a host for the Atlas butterfly. It is also attractive to birds.

Several seed saver groups in our local area have a seed bank. The seed bank is a bank on the move with seeds flowing in and seeds flowing out. It is important to have a seed bank where we can access seeds, take seeds home, grow them out and return the following seed generation. The seed bank is also a backup in case we lose our seeds in the garden for some reason like a locust plague, floods or bushfire. Each variety of seeds has a plant passport which shows an identification



number, name of grower and plant, time of seed harvest, when to grow, edible or not, how to use the plant and other useful details.

Most of our seeds kept in our seed bank are varieties no longer available

commercially. These varieties have been dropped by seed companies but maintained by home gardeners and farmers.

Some of our seed varieties have arrived in Australia with early migrants. These form part of an immigrant cultural and culinary heritage. Some example of such seeds in our local area are the Open Italian lettuce, Madagascar bean and Marjorie Spear's bean.

Marjorie Spear, for whom the beans are named, was born in South Africa, moved to New Zealand in 1945, then in 1968 Marjorie and family arrived in Australia. They settled in Kuranda on a property on Black Mountain Road that they named "Harmony Farm" – a depleted property which Marjorie turned into a healthy organic farm over the years.

Marjorie was one of the first organic growers in Kuranda and she shared her seeds with a passion. Part of the property was bequeathed by Marjorie to Kuranda Envirocare, "This property to pass to Kuranda Envirocare on trust for the benefit of the public of Australia, through the promotion of the study and conservation of flora and fauna with the land to be known as The Spear Animal Reserve," was written in her will.


Marjorie Spear's bean made its way into our seed savers network and was registered in our seed bank on 17 March 2008 with the then called Seed Savers Up North group based in Tarzali. We have successfully kept this bean alive for 17 years and the seeds are available from all our local groups. Just awesome!

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





St Saviour's Thought for March

This month we open our Bibles to St Luke's gospel Chapter 5 and read verses to 11.

As we watch Jesus move towards Simon's boat and climb into it we might ask ourselves a question. What in my life could Jesus use? Are there things I may not think a great deal of, things I take for granted, which I could offer my Jesus? Could he use some of my time? Could he use some of my money? Could he use some of my professional gifts? These things are to each of us what Simon's boat was to him.

"Put out into the deep water and let down your nets. Simon is nonplussed. They have just had a frustrating night: they didn't catch a thing. However, Simon pulls out into the lake, probably expecting to say "I told you so." What happens shakes him to the depths of his being. They are inundated with fish; so much so that they have to yell for help.

What would it mean for you and for me for Jesus to say to us "Put out into the deep and let down your nets?" He might be saying that he wants us to invest ourselves in areas where we are holding back. He might be saying that he wants us to invest more, risk more, contribute more to our marriage, or our job, or our children or our own spiritual journey. He might be suggesting that if we don't expect more we will certainly not find more!

Simon responds to the great catch by feeling unworthy. He has done nothing to deserve it. But, come to think of it, when we look at the various blessings we have been given, can we really say that we deserve them? If there is any truth in that thought, then perhaps it is time for us to bow down to Jesus and acknowledge our unworthiness, as Peter did. Our Lord's great generosity and love toward us will fill us with a sense of gratitude and will give us a sense of great joy. I know that this may sound too simple, yet the good news of Christ is essentially simple! Jesus said that unless we can be childlike, which surely includes simplicity; we can't even see his kingdom.

If Jesus said to his disciples "You will be catching men,' and if we claim to be his disciples today, what can this promise mean for us? It will mean different things for each of us. But surely it means for all of us that we find some way of communicating to others that faith in Jesus Christ is an important factor in our lives. After all, if you or I discovered something of immense help to us, wouldn't we share it with others for whom we care? If Jesus used Simon's boat, what ordinary and taken-for granted elements of our lives could he use?


