Kuranda Range Road Study Announced

If the path to hell is paved with good intentions, surely the road to Kuranda is lined with the pages of planning studies. In the 28-year life of this Paper alone there have been two major ones and now a third has been announced by the State government. Locals can be forgiven for being skeptical as to any material outcome. Still we live in hope. The Kuranda Range Road is fast approaching capacity and long overdue political will to address its problems is becoming critical. And that political will needs to be shown by all levels of government.

It is also to be hoped that the planning study doesn't just treat Kuranda as a dot on the engineering maps. Serious questions need to be asked about what happens to a four lane highway (should that happen) when it hits the approach to the Barron River bridge at Kuranda, for instance. Where the road meets the town it is crucial the planners meet the people.

As for justification of the spending required, although there are not export dollars to be had through Federal funding of a coal mine for instance, the amount of jobs and increased productivity to be created across the region through securing a reliable, fit

for purpose Range Road to the Tablelands makes it an investment worthy of being recognised as a long overdue and critical part of our national infrastructure.



"A \$1.25 million planning project, which will include spotlighting and prioritising the much-needed upgrades along the Kuranda Range Road, has been announced by the Palaszczuk Government.

Member for Barron River Craig Crawford said the Transport and Main Roads (TMR) project was a major step toward providing the hundreds of thousands of residents and visitors who used the road with a safe and efficient route between Cairns and Mareeba.

"At the end of this project we will have a very clear idea of what upgrades need to be done, where they need to be done and in what order they need to be done," Mr Crawford said.

"Then we'll know what we need to focus on in our planning for improving sections of road

 $between Cairns and the Northern Tablel and s, including the Kuranda\ Range\ Road.$

"There were 131 crashes on the Kuranda Range Road between 2013 and 2018 and 70 per cent of those occurred on the first seven-kilometre stretch out of Smithfield.

"This project, which is expected to start in July, will strategically look at the roads between Cairns and the Northern Tablelands to identify and prioritise upgrades."

Mr Crawford said a \$45 million package of safety upgrades to a 31 kilometre stretch of the Kennedy Highway between Kuranda and Mareeba was also planned under TMR's High Risk Roads Targeted Road Safety Program.

"Those works are expected to start in the first half of 2020 and take about two years to complete," he said.

Mareeba Shire Council Mayor Tom Gilmore welcomed the news about the planning project, commending the Palaszczuk Government for its action on the range road (MEDIA RELEASE 17/5/2019).


In an interview with the Cairns Post, Mr Crawford expanded on why yet another study is needed. Mr Crawford said that the new study will have a look at whether there are alternatives to the current road that haven't been identified. "A lot has changed from a technological perspective in the last 15 years since we looked at it."

"Mr Crawford said this study was the only way he could "hit the reset button" and bring the issue back on the table. At some stage we will have to do a business case on this and will need to prove from an economic perspective that spending somewhere between \$500 million and \$1 billion will actually deliver us a return,"

"We have to get it right, otherwise it might be 20 years until we get another shot."

Mr Crawford also said he did not believe the re-opening of the controversial Quaid private road to Wangetti was feasible, it being too far north with traffic implications for that already dangerous stretch of the Cook Highway. The current corridor appears to be the most likely with possible changes which are hoped to be identified during the study.






SKYRAIL: MAINTENANCE WORKS AND

The Kuranda Historical Society has just marked one year in existence. We are hoping that now this first year has passed (with quite a few challenges and progress at crawl pace) we can get to a steady walk at least. It is hoped the worst of the hurdles are behind us and the KHS Committee thanks our members for their patience.

Funding is of course a big challenge and we continue to pursue all available grant options. A big thank you to Jane Hollins at MSC who is providing us with advice and assistance. Our current funding priority is for professionally conducted strategic planning as we have been advised this is critical to establishing an effective organisation.

We are also seeking funding to allow us to commission custom-made permanent security window screening for our soon to be re- established (after Council works have finished) home in the old Visitors' Information Centre in Centenary Park. We obviously must be able to provide a safe, suitable home for historic items and currently that space requires work to achieve that. We are working with MSC to find a solution with the aim of combining security with public art which also is uniquely Kuranda in character. In the meantime, we are looking at temporary options which will allow us to finally set up shop.

Although we are just starting out, the Kuranda Historical Society is already receiving requests for historical information and photos of the Kuranda district. Providing a central place for all such resources, and easy access to them, is one of our prime motivations.

This month we received a request for information and photos on behalf of the new owner of the property on Black Mountain Road which once housed the wildlife "zoo" of the late Stan Stirling (established 1969 when Stan moved his



menagerie of crocs, snakes, insects etc from Cairns to Kuranda). *The Kuranda Paper* is kindly reprinting an article on Stan Stirling written by the late Peter Hohermuth and printed in May 1979 (see over page).

WHO TALKS TO THE TOADS ...

.... AND THEY TALK BACK.


Yes, the toads do talk indeed though what they say is a bit of a mystery to most people.

There are more strange and fascinating things to see at Stan Stirling's Wildlife Gardens on Black Mt. Road in Kuranda.

The place is a curious mixture of Botanical Gardens, Wildlife sanctuary, Zoo and Museum, all of it imprinted with the gentle, whimsical personality of Stan Stirling.

It is very diffcult to describe his museum, words like "a Madame Tussaud of Flora and Fauna" come to mind, but they are not adequate to the incredible collection of pickled reptiles, toads that have been with Stan for many years and "are now with him in spirit only" hundreds and hundreds of moth and butterflies, every kind of bug and beetle that ever flew, and some that dian't. (just ask Stan about the "Cooktown Marchfly)





There are cases and cases full of seashelts; bits of dry plants, and stacks of bottles. Some old and intriguing, some Avon Perfume , kitschy , cutie. On the ceiling hangs an assortment of spears and other lethal weapons once used by Aborigines.

And to everything there hangs a tale. That alone is worth more than the price of admission. The museum makes no pretense at everlasting life. The hot and humid summers have been taking their toll, gradually transforming the exhibits into a more pasic form. Ashes to ashes and dust to dust. Mainly dust.

The living animals present a less morbid picture, quite cheerful as a matter of fact. Geese honk at strangers and agressively stretch their necks at any vehicle that passes the road in front of the Gardens. Peacocks stroll through the place, totally unafraid of anyone, while in the trees the scrubturkeys come and go as they please.

There is an unmistakable rapport between the animals and Stan Even a Lizard comes running from his hide-away at Stan's call. The snakes and Crocodiles perhaps seem a little aloof, or maybe they are just shy.

In a little snelter overgrown with lush looking tropical plants, enormous spiders quietly weave away, all good and old friends of Stan's.



This is a reprint of an article from the *Kuranda Village News* May 1979. The KVN was the love child of the late Peter Hohermuth, who was owner, editor, reporter and photographer at large. His stunning photographs were also printed in *The Cairns Post* and elsewhere as The Great Big Picture Company.

Also in that issue from forty years ago was the delightful cartoon by Anne Fitzpatrick who chronicled the travel adventures in Kuranda of "Erne" and "Shirleen". Anne is also responsible for the KVN distinctive masthead. The Kuranda Historical Society is endeavouring to get all 23 issues of the KVN digitalised as well as early issues of The Kuranda Paper which only exist as hard copies. These two independent local newspapers have been recognised by State and National libraries as unique and valuable historical records of the Kuranda district in their times.





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"The view from here"

A monthly column by Michelle Murray-Beckman offering a glimpse into Kuranda's bespoke rainforest architecture along with interviews with residents who share with us why they have chosen to call Kuranda home.

Kuranda is home to a rich and diverse creative community. We are indeed fortunate to have Zane Saunders amongst that community. There are fine examples of Zane's visual art practice expressed as public art in Kuranda, including the stain glass windows at St Saviours Church and his murals at the Kuranda Information Centre and Kuranda Amenities Block, Centenary Park Kuranda.

In addition to this work, Zane has developed a very deep and unique approach to contemporary performance art. To quote from his biography, Zane "draws from his strong visual arts background, utilising modern devices, everyday objects, lo-tech gadgets, natural materials and found objects and builds immersive installation environments in which to perform".

To witness an "artistic movement" performance by Zane Saunders is to be transported into an ethereal world of the Spirit. Zane shares with his audience his

intensely personal journey of discovery. A journey which is an evolving discovery of himself and what Spirit means to him.

With each performance, the audience follows Zane as he moves hypnotically through sculptural installations, interacting with them and sometimes the audience!

According to the editors of the recently published book "What is performance art? Australian perspectives", performance art is a practice that engages with important issues of the self and being; and remains at the epicentre of expressions of gender, politics and the nature of communication itself. Transient in nature, performance art is also mobile, economical and elastic.


This description fits with my own observations of Zane's work. His work draws from visual art motifs, traditional dance, sound, screen media and contemporary performance to deliver, in his words, "a deep theatrical play in particular space and time". His work is truly mesmerising.

We arrange to get together at a local coffee shop, and I am met with a quiet man who is thoughtful and considered with his answers to my questions. Zane was born in Cairns and grew up in Kuranda where he lives. Zane is of Aboriginal descent and identifies with the Butchulla and Goongari People of Southern Queensland.

Zane's multi-disciplinary art practice began at TAFE where he studied visual arts such as painting and print making. From this base he progressed towards performance art. He can't exactly remember how his first performance came about – it just happened. I ask him how it feels with all eyes upon his every movement and in such close proximity to his audience that they almost brush past him as they move out of his way during a performance.

He tells me that he is a shy person and performing this way is a challenge. He remembers feeling very nervous when he first started performing, shaking even, and says that, "it helps if you go into another mindset". His intention with performing this way is to grow and expand - to address the fear. Zane says that he is "trying to articulate and present to the audience what is going on for me". I think we can all relate to these feelings and in this way Zane's performance becomes not just a personal conversation but a universal one.

Zane's first performance piece "Corresponding Latitudes" was in 2004 at Kick Arts Cairns, but it was "Mother Story" performed at the 2006 Enviro-Fiesta Festival that saw the artistic community take notice of him as a performance artist. In this work, there is no dialogue and the soundtrack begins with a laughter track that is nothing like the "sitcom" canned laughter but somewhat unsettling in effect. Zane describes "It was sort of speaking from an Indigenous interpretation of the earth and how much it means"; "It's story-telling — I was representing Mother Earth and how



she is a sacred entity and then how she is abused and taken as something lightly".

We talk about the intention behind his work and he articulates that although the work is planned beforehand, there is also an element of mystery where he is trying to understand what the work is saying and that he and the audience may not know the full meaning of the work. Acceptance of that is part of the process and gives both Zane and the audience an opportunity for more personal reflection.

Another cypher that Zane employs is the use of the "everyman" and he incorporates ritualised everyday actions in his work, such as shaving his face. This often evokes a humorous response which is unexpected and quite charming. In this way he is hoping that the piece will live on by providing a trigger to the audience when they themselves are engaging in the everyday act represented.

Zane's latest project is titled "Spirit". It has developed out of and made possible by the support of the Signature Works

Innovation Lab program of the Australia Council for the Arts.

The work has been developing through several iterations in collaboration with KickArts Gallery, Cairns, the inaugural Indigenous cross-artform residency at Dance North in Townsville (under the mentorship of Kyle Page) and the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair.

Zane has described Spirit variously as "an idea, a personal movement for myself to do with spirituality and embracing one's own aboriginality or origins" and as a "concern for the truth, against wrongful populist culture with a concern about the environments – the cultural, the natural, and the spiritual".

The installation part of "Spirit" comprises three components: A large house-like structure, a series of rocks placed in a circle formation, and a large sphere. The house like structure represents individuals, communities and society. The rocks provide an earth element – grounding the installation and performance and the sphere is a representation of the incorporeal - the "Spirit" in this relational trilogy. Body paint is used as a further way to express himself and adds to the intensity of his presence and his narrative.

Zane is a person of deep faith and this project is a platform to explore his feelings about western religion and Aboriginal spirituality. He worries that there exists a reckless

interpretation of the Scripture regarding how we live in the world. His performance work in "Spirit" creates a platform whereby he can articulate his feelings in a safe, constructive manner. I ask Zane if he feels the spirit moving within him when he is performing, and he immediately replies "yes". He describes himself and the performance as the vessel. He introduces the Spirit - it is then up to the Spirit and the audience to connect.

There are three outcomes that Zane Saunders is striving for with the "Spirit" project. The first is to continue to develop his artistic practice, second to encourage other artists to pursue their own practice and the third is to come together and breathe life and inspiration into the Indigenous community by re-introducing spiritual practices, keeping ties with land and continue to engage with the "Spirit".

He is continuing with his "Spirit" project in a performance to be presented at the Judith Wright Centre for Contemporary Art in Brisbane in November 2019. Titled "Cure" it will run for three nights and build on his previous work.

I would like to end with a quote by Cairns dancer and BoneMap co-director Rebecca Youdell which describes Zane and his work so eloquently.

"His body is part of a living, breathing culture, not found in the museum of objects. Within the cultural protocol politic that Indigenous artists face, Zane Saunders is finding a language for the space between the contemporary and tradition through a deeply personal spiritual and physical journey."



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Regional Arts Development in the Mareeba Shire

The Mareeba Shire Council recently announced the successful applicants of the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) community grant round for 2018-19. Eleven projects will be funded under the RADF strategy to support art, heritage and cultural projects across the Shire.

Queensland Arts Minister Leeanne Enoch said investing in creative and cultural experiences through the Regional Arts Development Fund (RADF) strengthened regional communities, boosted cultural tourism, and enhanced the quality of life in rural and remote towns and cities.

"RADF is a unique partnership between the Queensland Government and Mareeba Shire Council to support local talent, unite communities and celebrate the arts across the state.

"The Queensland Government, through Arts Queensland, is contributing \$2.08 million in 2018-19 in partnership with 58 councils statewide to help deliver cultural experiences which align with local priorities," Ms Enoch said.

Chair of the RADF Advisory Committee Councillor Angela Toppin congratulated the following successful Kuranda applicants.

- Youth Link Kuranda Youth Cre8 Pride Music Productions. Youth Link Kuranda will implement a musical school holiday program to engage at-risk young people in Kuranda.
- Kuranda Arts Co-operative Artist Promotional Videos. A series of video vignettes will be produced featuring 16 Kuranda artists demonstrating their artistic techniques.
- Frances Every Speewah Roscommon Park Mural. A mural depicting local fauna will be painted onto Roscommon Park fence with participation of community members, school students, teachers and local artist.
- Gecko Productions Kurandascope II. Kurandascope II will document the development
 of Kuranda through the stories of long-term residents.

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

Honey House Kuranda - Celebrating 60 Years in 2019



The Original Honey House 1959

Honey House Kuranda was established in 1959 by Mr and Mrs Howard Jones, North Queensland locals. The business was originally situated on the corner of Therwine Street which at that time was the main road into Kuranda. On this site, Howard Jones developed the business offering free honey tasting, beehives, beekeeping equipment displays and educational tours.

In 1968, the business was moved 50 metres up the road to today's present site where an adjoining motel was built.

The Honey House was purchased in 1977 by Jim and Olive Mealing who continued to offer visitors a very special introduction to our area's unique honeys. In 1978, the observation bee hives were introduced and to this day prove a source of excitement and interest to all.

COMMUNITY MEMBERS AND HEALTH CARE WORKERS have come together in Far North Queensland to see how they can improve the lives of people living with chronic hepatitis C. The 'Hep C Free' campaign aims to remove barriers to access for people in regional, rural and remote FNQ and share information by people who have gone through treatment themselves.

Morag and Kathy are two community members who have undergone treatment for Hepatitis C and achieved a cure. They have shared their stories on a local website at www.cairnshepc.com.

As Kathy explains, "I've talked with a lot of people living with Hep C, and one common excuse for delaying the treatment is "it's not affecting me!" So I want to create awareness of the silent, long term killer".

The new treatments were so much easier than the old treatments for Hepatitis C, I didn't have a day off work this time around," Morag said.

Hepatitis C is a viral infection that affects the liver of people exposed to the virus from blood to blood contact including via injecting equipment, from a blood transfusion before blood was first screened for the virus in 1990, from homemade tattoos, or from medical or dental procedures in other countries that don't screen for Hepatitis C. When someone contracts Hepatitis C they may not know it at all. Some people do become unwell and get an illness where their eyes and skin

turn yellow, but this is not common. Left untreated, it can cause scarring of the liver and even lead to an early death from liver failure or liver cancer.

The good news, though, is that new, easy-to-take treatments are available that will cure the virus. People can be cured in 8 to 12 weeks with oral tablets – no injections, minimal side-effects and improved energy

People living with Hepatitis C have been strong advocates for making these simple treatments widely available after they themselves and their friends went through the old debilitating treatment over past decades.



The new treatments are available at low cost for all Australians on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme. Since they became available in March 2016, over 70,000 Australians have been treated and have been cured of the virus.

More than 1000 people in the Cairns and Hinterland region have accessed the new treatments in the last 3 years. Testing for the virus is by a simple blood test available at all GPs. Many GPs, including those in Kuranda, offer the treatments and can chat to you about them.

If anyone has Hepatitis C and hasn't yet been treated, now is the time to chat to your GP. If you think you may have been exposed at some time in the past a simple blood test will let you know one away or the other. By doing this you may end up improving your health substantially, and joining in on the 'Cairns Hep C Free by 2020' campaign. Intermittent Fasting

I'm seeing puzzled faces already! Some of you will already be trying this and a few will have heard about it but be a little clueless. Don't panic and think it's like the 48-hour famine days of fundraising or water fasting or whatever other method of food deprivation you have conjured up! It's not a complex strategy but like everything health related it's not suitable for everyone. There's a couple of versions but I really want to look at the daily type of intermittent fasting that's super popular right now.

Intermittent fasting is exactly that: intermittent. We've been taught from a young age that breakfast is the most important meal of the day as you are literally breaking your overnight fast. Intermittent fasting is an extension of this where the overnight fast substantially shortens the hours you can eat. It may be just 16 hours or substantially longer. If the last meal you eat is at 7.00pm then you break your fast by having a nutrient dense, larger breakfast after 11am the next day. The trick here is to load that first meal of the day with good quality protein, good fats and a substantial amount of multicoloured veg. Sounds simple!

But why? Arguably, the biggest benefit to intermittent fasting is the protective effects against Type 2 diabetes that it may provide. The extended break allows our blood sugar and insulin levels to decrease. When we constantly eat our pancreas is pumping out insulin to cope with blood sugar levels. Insulin is glucose's chaperone to the party in the cells.

The more glucose from refined carbohydrate (most easily available from sugar, white bread and pasta) the more insulin is needed. If our cells are too full to accept more glucose and our body has stored all the glucose it can in the liver (we get a 24hour supply) then fat gets made at an alarming rate. The cells panic and stop accepting glucose by shutting some of the doors to insulin. Rinse and repeat and you have insulin resistance as the cells have literally barred insulin. This means lots and lots of glucose running around the body and nowhere for it to go! This, my friends is the path to insulin resistant Type 2 diabetes.

By fasting overnight, we allow blood glucose to drop, the pancreas stops pumping out insulin and our cells are all like 'Hey, we need some energy! Let's open the doors to some of that insulin and it's mate glucose again and let the good times roll! They'll also be using fat for energy at this point (that's an article for another day). There's added benefits too. Many studies report weight loss, lowered cholesterol, improved brain health, reduction in oxidative stress and inflammation and improved heart health. Quite a list!

However, there are some people that really shouldn't be intermittent fasting. Here's my short list but the bottom line is if in doubt ask your chosen health care provider.

- · Anyone with a history of eating disorders e.g. anorexia, bulimia, orthorexia etc
- Anyone who is under a lot of stress, anxious or has PTSD

- · Some thyroid issues won't do well with intermittent fasting so check with your healthcare provider first
- Insulin dependant diabetics (Type 2 might be able to do this under supervision- ask your healthcare provider)
- Pregnant and breastfeeding mothers
- Children and the elderly (I'll leave it up to you and your healthcare provider as to whether you belong in this last category!)

Regardless of when you choose to break your fast make it nutritious and full of foods that give you long term energy. Ditch the cereal and jam on toast and opt for protein rich options like eggs, yoghurt and fruit and even fish. Fish for breakfast — Yum! Bon appetite!

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

The Re-election of LNP and its Effect on our Forests and Wildlife

At Kuranda Meet the Candidates, Warren Entsch, our MP, said "the LNP has the right balance between development and the environment." Do the scientific studies support this?

Biodiversity Decline & What it Means for Humans

A recent United Nations global report by the IPBES (Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services) found one million species were at risk of extinction. This is approximately 25% of species in most animal and plant groups. Today, 75% of the land, 40% of seas and 50% of streams are severely altered by human activity.

The report warns the decline in native life could have implications for human populations across the globe. How much can we destroy without making life on earth for our own species no longer viable?

Australia is considered one of 17 'megadiverse' countries which share just 10% of global land but 70% of biological diversity. Yet the unique Australian plants and animals are very susceptible to extinctions and declines – and over the past 200 years, Australia has had the highest rate of mammal extinction in the world.

University of Queensland scientists looked at where most of the destruction has occurred in Australia. They found more than 90% of the threatened species habitat lost since the turn of the century has been in 12 electorates: six in Queensland, two each in NSW and Western Australia and one each in Tasmania and the Northern Territory. It may come as no surprise that our own electorate, Leichhardt, is one of these.

What Can Our Government Do?

Friends of the Earth FNQ (FoE FNQ) are concerned that the LNP does not have the balance right between the environment and development – not in Australia and not in our region. We will be calling on them to:

- Work for more investment in the recovery of threatened species and protection of their habitats
- Introduce stronger environment laws overseen by an independent national regulator
- Support responsible technological innovation that is energy efficient, carbon neutral and produces zero waste
- Encourage reduced material consumption and change from an endless growth model to one of a stable sufficiency.


Recycling Trip


Spray Free FNQ & Ecofiesta

Re-Imagined Recycled Reef

At the conclusion of the Festival, the 'Reef' will go on display at the Botanic Gardens Visitor Centre.





Artwork at the Pub Revisited

One of Hobart's most historic pubs, The Whaler at Salamanca, Hobart, was established in the early 1800s.

In 1993, Art Co-op member and master glass artist, Klaus Brucksch, was commissioned to undertake the installation of eight glass windows and three painted portraits. Klaus studied all episodes at the Hobart Historic Library and designed the actions in each window as authentically as it would have been at the time. The Aboriginal window is a scene from 'before settlement' more than 200 years ago. Five more windows followed depicting scenes from the 18th to 19th century when whaling was the main trade in Hobart. The Antarctic scene is a tribute to Douglas Mawson and all the explorers. The last, a small window, takes the viewer to the modern 20th century. The portholes used in the collection are from a shipwreck yard and surely have been part of the then whaling fleet.

The name 'The Whaler' was coined in 1829 by Rev Robert Knopwood who was an intrinsic personality looking after many disadvantaged settlers and in particular the whalers who needed personal support after their often treacherous missions at sea. The pub became the place whalers returned to through the 1800s to be paid and drink with their mates.

Focus on Kuranda


Focus on Kuranda Photography Group is a Facebook group initiated by local resident Liz Tonkin.





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

SPIDERS have evolved many fascinating methods to trap and snare their prey. While many use the static silk traps we know as webs, others such as Net-casting Spiders have taken things a step further, and actively engulf their prey in a silken net. Perhaps one of the most extreme methods of silken capture is employed by the Spitting Spiders (Scytodidae); spiders that actually 'spit' silk at their prey! A couple of species of these amazing spiders occur locally, *Dictis striatipes* is the most abundant and is a common resident of houses and sheds.

Spitting Spiders have a large dome-shaped cephalothorax (combined head and chest). The reason for the unusual shape and size of this part of their body is to accommodate a complex gland which produces a venomous silk. This sticky substance is squirted onto prey at high speed from holes in the spider's fangs.

The eyesight of these small spiders isn't particularly great compared with other hunting spiders such as jumping spiders, so they need to approach prey relatively closely before using their weapon. They usually approach to a distance of 10-20mm, but they can still manage to spit accurately over a distance of up to 60mm.

Spitting Spiders don't merely shoot a straight line of this deadly glue at their prey – by moving their aim rapidly back and forth they create a zig-zagged death trap. The helpless insect ends up with a series of sticky threads criss-crossing it and pinning it to the ground. There is little chance of the prey avoiding the threads as they are shot towards them since the entire process takes less than 1/700th of a second!

Once the victim is subdued, the spider approaches cautiously before biting its victim and ultimately feeding on its dissolved insides.

Spitting Spiders feed on a variety of prey, albeit quite small as the spiders themselves are only around 5mm in body length. While much of their prey is comprised of crawling insects, they are quite capable of taking on other spiders, often ensnaring other 'silk-masters' with a rapid-fire silk onslaught.



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This is the text of a letter sent to Speewah Residents IMMINENT CESSATION OF SPEEWAH TV SERVICES

Currently Mareeba Shire Council is the provider of the community's digital television terrestrial self-help retransmission services

On 8th May 2018, Mareeba Shire Council forwarded a letter (dated incorrectly as 2017), purportedly to all Speewah community residents, advising of a proposal to increase to the levy paid by residents for retransmission of television services in the Speewah Benefited Area (copy of letter and SBA Map attached hereto).

A ballot was included with that letter, with a closing date for submissions by residents voting on whether to pay the levy or not pay the levy (the latter resulting in discontinuation of the service). The closing date was 23rd May 2018 (also dated incorrectly in Council's letter, as 2017).

Council subsequently advised that there were insufficient positive replies to warrant continuation of the television service, and that same would be discontinued at the end of the 2018-2019 financial year.

Consequently, at this point of time, for most residents, television services will CEASE on 30th June or thereabouts.

It should be pointed out here that a few residents benefit from transmission from Bellenden Ker and were understandably reluctant to pay the levy. One would hope in the 21st Century there are ways and means of excluding these residents from the levy in the same way that the letter was sent only to residents in the SBA.

At a Residents Association meeting, we were advised that this was a Federal issue. Consequently a petition was drawn up for the local Federal Member to table in Parliament. In the absence of any response from the relevant Minister through the Federal Member, the petition was tabled, as it turned out, by the Parliamentary Petitions Committee. We are informed we are not likely to receive a reply from the Minister for three months from the date of lodgement of the petition. The Federal Member, upon being questioned at the recent 'Meet the Candidates' event in Kuranda, was unaware the petition had been tabled, so I wrote to his opposition, Daniel McCarthy, for assistance in clarifying our situation. I received the attached reply within days and it included this paragraph.

Please note in this letter: "Self help providers include local councils, mining companies and local community organisations. These organisations supply their own infrastructure to retransmit commercial and/or national television service to their local

We are being advised that our only alternative is to subscribe to Viewer Access Satellite Television (VAST). However, the cost to the householder for implementation of VAST is approximately \$900 for one television set, and approximately \$400 for each subsequent television.

In the meantime, it has come to the notice of the Residents Association that several residents had not received the initial letter enclosing the ballot. These residents are identified as being within the SBA.

This is currently being investigated, however, time is running short.

A second petition, this time to Council, which it certainly seems may be more appropriate, will be placed at the local Speewah

If you wish to continue the television service as it stands, please not only sign the petition, but indicate truthfully whether you received the initial letter and ballot paper. I believe this is very important. It could be that the ballot result was a true representation of residents' wishes, but at least we can be sure.

If you are unable to get to the shop, please advise, and we will make arrangements to have the petition brought to you.

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Container Refund Scheme Operator providing jobs for Far North Queensland

A Queensland Container Refund Scheme operator in Far North Queensland is doing all sorts of good for the community.

Containers for Change operator, Auswaste, has employed nine people since the Scheme launched in November 2018, with their latest appointment a Far North Queensland local.

Auswaste has recently taken on board Jonathan Upton, a Laura local and a regular customer at Auswaste's mobile site in town.

Kenny Reid, Auswaste owner said Jonathan will join the Auswaste team to help at their Laura mobile site once a week.

"We were just as keen as Jonathan for him to join the team. He's such a pleasant guy and was very interested to get involved and see how it all works," Mr Reid said.

"We even worked out the other day that our dads worked together in Hope Vale in the mid-60s."

Auswaste operates 10 sites in far north Queensland with their depots in Weipa and Cooktown allowing for eight mobile site runs to service the surrounding areas.

In the first six months of operation, Auswaste has had over 1.5 million containers returned through their sites, contributing to the \$352,000 that has gone back to Far North Queensland businesses and community through Containers for Change.

"We've opened 10 sites in the past six months but we're excited to keep adding more depots or mobile sites to help clean up the Cape and meet more people like Jonathan while we're at it." Mr Reid said.

"Before the Scheme started, there was so much rubbish and waste along the Cape. I'm thrilled to be a part of something that will make a difference to my community."

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


WASTE LEVY FOR MAREEBA SHIRE Commences July 1st 2019

The Queensland Government is introducing a state-wide waste levy from 1st July. Council is required to collect this levy and then pass it onto the State Government. The waste levy starts at \$75 per tonne.

Sweet Potato Falafel with Coriander Chutney via olivemagazine.com

Ingredients: FALAFELS - olive oil, middle eastern wraps to serve (optional), 1 large sweet potato (about 500g), 120g besan (chick pea) flour, 1 tsp ground cumin, 1 clove garlic (crushed). 1 tsp grated fresh ginger, ½ tsp chilli powder (mild or hot), 1 tsp chopped coriander, salt and pepper to taste. CHUTNEY – 1 bunch coriander (chopped), 1 small shallot (chopped), 1 green chilli (chopped), a small chunk of fresh ginger (peeled and chopped), juice of half a lemon

Method: Heat oven to 200°C. Either bake sweet potato (or prick sweet potato then cook it in a microwave for 5-10 minutes) until completely soft. Leave to cool for a few minutes, then split in half and scoop the flesh into a bowl. Add the remaining falafel ingredients and lots of seasoning. Mash well. Form the mix into 12 flattish balls in your hands. Put onto an oiled baking sheet and bake for 10-15 minutes until dry and golden.

Put the coriander chutney ingredients into a blender and whizz, adding a splash of water if you need to, and blend until smooth. Season, and tip into a bowl. Serve falafels in wrap (optional) with salad greens and a drizzle of chutney.

Sweet Potato, Lime and Ginger Soup (vegan) via olivemagazine.com Serves 4

Ingredients: sunflower oil, 750g yellow sweet potato (peeled, cut into chunks), 1 onion (coarsely chopped), 1 clove garlic (crushed), 2cm piece fresh ginger (grated), 450ml vegetable stock, 1 small lime (juice and zest), 250ml coconut milk.

Method: Heat 1 tbsp oil in a large pan over a low-medium heat, then add the sweet potato and cook for 5 minutes, or until the potato begins to soften. Add the onion, garlic and ginger, cover with a lid and cook for 10 minutes more. Pour the stock and coconut milk over and bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for 15 minutes. Transfer to a blender or use a

hand-held stick blender to blitz to a smooth purée. Strain through a fine sieve. Return to a clean pan and bring back to the boil. Remove from the heat, then add the lime juice, half the zest and 50ml of the cream. Season to taste.

Sweet Potato Spiralised Linguine with Vegan Puy (French) Lentil

Sauce via olivemagazine.com

Sweet potato "zoodles" are more robust than zucchini and withstand a bit more cooking. Served with a warming vegan bolognese-style sauce. Serves 3.

Ingredients: olive oil, 1 onion (finely chopped), 1 carrot (peeled and grated), 100g button or Swiss brown mushrooms (finely chopped), 1 clove garlic (crushed), 1 tbsp balsamic vinegar, rosemary needles finely chopped to make 1 tbsp, 1 tin (400g) chopped tomatoes, 250g cooked puy (French) lentils or brown lentils, sweet potatoes 2 large or 3 medium (peeled).

Method: Heat 1 tsp oil in a pan on a low heat and fry the onion and carrot with a pinch of salt for 10 minutes until soft, but not golden. Turn the heat up a little, add the mushrooms and fry for 5 minutes until they start to turn golden, then add the garlic, balsamic and rosemary and simmer until most of the balsamic has evaporated. Tip in the tomatoes, and simmer for 10 minutes, then add the lentils. Season and simmer for 5-10 minutes, until thickened.

Meanwhile, peel the sweet potatoes into long thin strips with a veg peeler or spiralizer, layer them on top of each other, then cut the ribbons into 3mm wide lengths, or use the flatter setting of a spiraliser, to make sweet potato "noodles".

Heat 1 tsp oil in a pan and fry the sweet potato noodles for 3-5 minutes until tender and it has turned a lighter shade of orange. Season, then tip into bowls and top with the lentil sauce.











As you all may be aware, from 1st July the Queensland Government is introducing a waste levy which Council is obliged to collect and hand over to the State. An initial advance payment from the State Government will subsidise kerbside wheelie bin collection and self-hauled domestic waste taken to the transfer station. Domestic waste excludes bulky items, recycling waste, E-waste, regulated waste and scrap metal. In short, this means if you are renovating at home and want to dispose of concrete and building waste, you will be charged the additional State levy of \$7.50 per 100kgs at the gate, which again is a mandatory fee

payable to the State Government. Visit Council's website for exact fees and charges and also newspapers, libraries and Council's Facebook page for the easy to read waste disposal guide.

The Therwine Street redevelopment is now complete. Funded by the Kuranda Infrastructure Program, the \$1.3M redevelopment is part of the masterplan designed to enhance the amenity of the Village and improve safety for motorists and pedestrians. Thank you to business owners, residents, visitors and motorists for your patience and cooperation while this project was being carried out. I'm sure most will agree the transformation has been outstanding.

We recently received some good news from the State Government. Council received \$70,000 to upgrade the playground equipment and soft surfaces in Gregory Terrace Park, Kuranda under the Works for Queensland program. These upgrades would not be possible without this funding and we thank the Government for recognising the need to improve these facilities for our communities.

Dog registration renewal notices will be issued soon and must be paid by 30th June 2019. A reminder that all dogs in Queensland need to be registered and microchipped. It is also important to let Council know (in writing) of any changes to your pet's registration, including change of address, your dog dies, or you give the dog away.

Street Trees of Kuranda SYZYGIUM CORMIFLORUM

Currently in flower, Coondoo Street opposite Centenary Park (just down from BP).

Family: Myrtaceae. Distribution: Rainforests of North Queensland. Common Name: Bumpy Satinash.

Derivation of Name: Syzygium: from Greek syzygos (joined) cormiflorum: a reference to the flowering habit in which masses of flowers appear directly from the trunk, presumably 'corm-like'.

Svzvgium cormiflorum is a tree which can reach 30 metres high in rainforests, though considerably smaller, 8-10 m, in cultivation (as is the case with many rainforest species). The habit is erect, with a straight trunk which may become buttressed on large specimens. The leaves are oblong, elliptic to almost lanceolate and about 60 to 210 mm long by 25 to 115 mm wide. The new growth is pink or purple in colour. The flowers are remarkable in that they appear on the trunk (described as cauliflorous), mainly in spring but they may occur in any season except summer. The flowers produce copious nectar and are up to 50 mm in diameter. They are followed by ovoid fruits, which are white, cream, pink or even reddish and around 30-60 mm long. Although technically edible they are not particularly palatable.







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I have some good news in regards to Kuranda Range road users.

We have secured \$1.25 million to go towards a research study into finding the best options for upgrading the roads between Cairns to Mareeba, including the Kuranda Range.

This is the first step required to give us a clear idea of what upgrades need to be done and where to focus on in the planning process. The study will look at whether there are alternatives to the current road which was built in the 1940s. There was a study conducted 15 years ago, however due to technology advancements we need to review all options.

Once the research plan is complete, the next step will be to start talking business cases to secure funding.

This is a good first step. This study was the only way we could hit the reset button and bring this important issue back on the table. This research project is expected start in July 2019.

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

The KCons community nursery is nearly always open at 1 Pademelon Lane (cnr Fallon Rd and Kennedy Hwy).

You can't complain about your plants not getting enough water at the moment. In fact, some are getting too much and rotting with mould. Cut off dying stems to stop the rot spreading.

As soon as the rain dries up, spread mulch to keep the soil moist.

Mulch will also help to revitalise the soil. It's a good time to plant.

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NAVUA SEDGE - major weed

At a Council weed forum last month, there was major concern about this weed invading crop and pasture land and considerable discussion on what chemicals to use and techniques to control it. But as far as the roadside spread in Kuranda was concerned, the advice was "it's just a grass". There is no plan to control it here. It looks like we're going to have to get used to it.

CASSOWARIES

Elvis and Priscilla are regularly seen in the vicinity of the overtaking lanes as you enter and leave the Kuranda Range Road. **PLEASE TAKE CARE HERE.**

Pio is back; there's been a new sighting at Possum Ridge; also at Greenforest; male birds all over are being persuaded to shoo off their last year's offspring and elope with frisky young wenches.

There are not a lot of fruit around at the moment. This is probably why we're receiving more reports of cassowaries near built-up areas. Fortunately, they eat fungi and carrion and will chase a mouse if one crosses their path.

It's NOT a good idea to feed them. Call Jax on 4093 8834 for advice.

Kowrowa YCA Infestation Update



A delimitation survey map of yellow crazy ants at Green Forest Rd, Kowrowa Another Yellow Crazy Ant site was detected in February 2019 by a resident in Kowrowa. A delimitation survey of the infestation site has been completed; delimitation is the action of fixing the boundary or limits of something (Dictionary.com, 2019). The infestation is approx 16 ha, adjacent and south of Green Forest Road. The red line—the roads, the green dots absence of YCA, the red dots-presence of YCA. The purple circle-likely boundary, giving a buffer to the infestation. Inside the circle of red dots has YCA present as they spread out in a roughly circular pattern. Treatment of the site will be from the 27th May by hand. At least three treatments will be needed before another survey to determine the decline after treatment.

We are the problem and the solution

YCA and electric ants are spread by human contact: swapping pot plants, moving soil and raw materials. To be absolutely sure you are not importing any potential ants in pots, soil and raw materials, ask if the property has been checked by Biosecurity. All local raw materials depots, local nurseries and the Kuranda Transfer Station are checked several times a year by Biosecurity using detector dogs and YCA ant lures. Or create a small "biosecurity" cleared check area on your property, easy to access. Perhaps lay out a plastic sheet or tarp. Submerge your pot plant in a bucket of water to cause any ants to float to the surface or spray the bottom of your pot with insecticide. Check the plants, pile of soil or rocks for ants moving onto the cleared area. Or remove all soil from plants before bringing to your property.

Early vigilance catches the YCA and electric ant

Finding this Kowrowa infestation is a win for the eradication program. Earlier detection ensures eradication under the WTMA program. Late detection may find us as the community on our own, with no funding for treatment as Biosecurity is now a personal responsibility under the Act. If you think you might have a suspect ant, call 0411 193 720 for a sample pick up. To get your free yard check, call Biosecurity Queensland 13 25 23. The earlier we get yard checks and take precautions when moving plants, soil and rocks, the sooner we will be rid of these ants.





wu. Fish-hawk going looking for fish. BUDAADJI: carpet snake, ancestral being. Budaadji miyamiya wanirril. Carpet snake

bringing nautilus shells. BULNGAN: the ground, earth. Nyinan bulngan-

da! Sit on the ground!

BUNGAN: the sun. Bungan magaying. Bungan djudang. Sun rising. Sun going down. BUNDA: a mountain/mountains. Bunda banggal. Big mountain.

DAYAL: male. Bibuy dayal. Little boy DIDJIRRDIDJIRR: willy wagtail. Didjirr-didjirr buwal-barra. Willy wagtail Messenger.

DJAANDA: yellow walnut. Djaanda wandang bagarra-la. Yellow walnut falling in the forest. DJILIBIRI: barramundi. Djilibiri yungang wuruu-la. Barramundi swimming in the river. DJUNBARRA: crayfish. Gudji djunbarra duga! Catch that crayfish!

GALBAL: blood. Galbal, nyandji, dadagal. Blood, flesh, bone.

GALBU: butcherbird. Galbu nula-nulaying djulbin-mu. Butcher bird singing out from the

GADJIRRAGA: taipan. Gadjirraga nyurrany bayalna! Taipan will bite you!

GAWAY: star/stars. Gaway djanadjanadang djin.gal-nda. Stars standing together in the sky. GINDAN: moon/month. Gindan magaying diin.gal-nda. Moon rising in the sky.

GULBUL: the sea. Nganydji yungang gulbulnda. We are swimming in the sea.

GUGINY: flying fox. Guginy ma: bugang. Flying fox eating fruits and blossoms.

GURRNDU: Kuranda quandong. Gurrndu gurii bugaynggu. Gurrndu good for eating.

GURRUNGGA: kookaburra. Gurrungga-nggu djama wanirril djamuu. Kookaburra bringing a snake in its beak.

GUYBALAM: Burdekin plum. Guybalam nganydja gurii! Plums taste good!

GUYU: fish. Ngabi guyu. Plenty of fish. NGUNAL: lace monitor. Ngunal djulbin-da magaying. Lace monitor climbing on a tree. NGUNBA: platypus. Ngunba yungang warabala. Platypus swimming in the creek.

NYINGGARRA: eel. Ngawunggu nyinggarra dugany gargal-nda. I caught an eel on a fishing

MURRGAN: blue quandong. Murrgan wunang djumburru-la. Blue quandong lying on the djumburru, the track.

WANGGABAL: brown apple. Wanggabal bugan! Eat brown-apple!

WANGGULAY: sulphur-crested cockatoo.

Wanggulay gawal djanang bagarra-m. Cockatoo shouting out from the forest. WUBUN: frog. Wubun yungang danigin-da. Frog swimming in the toilet.

WULAM: black brim. Wulam gurii bugaynggu. Black brim good for eating.

WURUU: river. Ngawu galing wuruu-la. I'm going to the river.

YAGAL: pandanus. Yagal gurii gunbi-lum. Pandanus good for weaving.

YIDJI: pademelon. Yidji guriilanggan. Beautiful pademelon! YIWURRA: black bean. Galin bagarra-la

yiwurra -wu! Go in the forest for black bean!

NGIRRMA EXPLANATION AND BACKGROUND

The Bama (people) of this area (bulmba) shared a common ngirrma, language.

The Djabuganydji, Bulwanydji, Nyagali, Yirrganydji and Gulunydji have lived here for millennia. The Djabuganydji called it Djabugay. The Bulwanydji called it Bulway. The Yirrganydji on the coast called it Yirrgay. The 'ay' sound at the end of these words sounds like the archaic English word

Some of their stories go way back in time. The Djabuganydji believe that once their hunting grounds stretched to the Barrier Reef. At the end of the last ice age there was a rise in sea-level that pushed the people back inland and created the present shoreline. Nowhere else in the world have people been able to preside continuously in one place for so long, passing on their stories to the present day.

The actual word 'bulmba' has many meanings: home, camping ground, territory, the weather and the authority of the elders, upholders of the Law. This bulmba is constantly changing, depending on the time of the year, the season and the weather.

Thanks to the Bulmba Rangers for help with selection of wordsearch words and to the Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Corporations for their work in preserving the area's linguistic inheritance.

A guide to the pronunciation of Djabugay words

Vowel Sounds

is pronounced as the vowel in the (English) words "some, come . eg **bama** (person)

is pronounced like the /a/ sound in "father" but longer. eg /a:/ buda:dji (carpet snake)

is pronounced like the /i/ in the word "bin". eg **bina** (ear) the vowel sound is lengthened and pronounced like the /i;/

vowel sound in "heat", "beat", "feet". eg biri: (again) is pronounced as the vowel sound in the English word /u/

"book". eg **mudu** (back) the vowel is lengthened and pronounced as the vowel sound in the words "good", "tool", "rule". eg **djungguu**: (behind)

Consonants

The sound is like a /d/ and a /j/ pronounced /dj/ simultaneously, eg **djulbin** (tree)

is pronounced as in the word "gun". eg gindan (moon) /g/ a trilled, or rolled /r/ as in Scottish pronunciation of the /rr/ word "sporran". eg burra-y (to fly)

as in the American pronunciation of /r/ in car. eg biri /r/

is like the initial /n/ in onion, like an /n/ and a /y/ pronounced simultaneously eg nyurra (you)

/ng/ as in the word "singer" eg **bungan** (sun)

when you see the n.g broken by a stop do not run the two sounds together. eg djin.gal (sky) /ngg/

is pronounced as the ng sound in the word "finger". eg nyinggarra (eel)

is generally pronounced as in the English word "eye". eg Djabugay

Stress

/ay/

When saying Djabugay words which syllables should we stress? In words of two syllables the first syllable is stressed. eg **bi**na (ear) In words of three syllables the first syllable is stressed. eg ganyarra

However, if a long vowel occurs in the second syllable of a word of three syllables, it is stressed. eg bud**a:**dji (carpet snake) In words with more than 3 syllables stress falls on the first syllable and on the syllable before the last one.eg ganyarra - ngu (crocodile).

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A Thought for June

THIS month we read from St Luke's Gospel Chapiter 24 verses 46-53. Reading the end of this Gospel of Saint Luke's Gospel is not actually an ending, it's really a beginning. Although it marks the end of Jesus being among the disciples in a visible, objective way, it also shows them



being called to the beginning of a new responsibility.

They had seen Jesus die, and had scattered, demoralised and defeated. Then the unbelievable had happened: he came among them again. Although he was changed, the disciples were quite sure it was Jesus whom they had known and followed for the last few years. From time to time he reappeared: to all of them in Jerusalem, to Mary in the garden, to a group fishing in Galilee, to a couple on the road to Emmaus. It is just after this last encounter that this Gospel passage begins. The two disciples have just come running back from Emmaus. They have gasped out the story of their encounter with what they had thought was a stranger. In the simple action of his breaking a piece of bread they realized that the person with them was far from being a stranger. It was their Lord!

The news electrifies the rest of the disciples into all sorts of thoughts and hopes and plans. Suddenly, Jesus is among them. Once again, he explains the meaning of all that has happened and is happening. He reassures them that the world is not falling apart. The ghastly cross was part of a great plan, and his coming from the tomb was the climax and triumph of that plan. Now something new must begin in

What has happened has to be communicated, and that task is in their hands. This Gospel's point is that we are those whom Jesus calls disciples. Whatever was said in that longago encounter after the resurrection is being said again today and will be said in every age. Ours are the ears that hear him - or choose not to hear him - today.

Jesus was asking for his disciples' commitment, and he asks the same of us. If we commit ourselves to him he promises us what he promised those men and women. He promises his Spirit, the Spirit we call the Holy Spirit, in our deepest being. It's a real promise which millions of men and women have found to be true. If we say Yes to him giving him our spirit, poor and limited though it may be, he gives us his. We get much the better side of the bargain!

Jesus ended this last encounter by gathering the disciples, blessing them, and going from them. As people have discovered in every generation since, he went away only to return into every one of their lives. He has already returned to yours and mine; all we need to do is to realize it. When Jesus left his disciples he did so only to return into every one of their lives. He can return to our lives as well.
