lives, and in some cases homes, are still in the process of being restored to 'normal'.

A rumour came to my attention that the Kuranda Aquatic Centre is being considered for closure.

As a frequent recreational user of the pool I was spurred on to find answers.

After speaking with Mareeba Shire Councillor Lenore Wyatt I was reassured this was not the case as a new contractor has been signed off by Council for its continuing care and maintenance.

Council is aware the Kuranda pool is under-utilised by the community which motivates me to encourage the community to attend this little jewel of ours, whether it's attending water aerobic sessions, swimming laps or a general splish splash. Perhaps consider holding your child's next birthday party at the pool.

Otherwise in the future we could find ourselves in the position of a "use it or lose it" situation.

Granted, the Kuranda pool has seen better times being therapeutically frequented when it was a magnesium pool. If you would like to see magnesium reinstated at the pool, please contact Lenore Wyatt via email outlining your reasons for the request.

I realised how beneficial this pool could be as I witnessed three Aquatic Therapists work to enable a quadriplegic wheelchair-bound person experience the weightless freedom of being supported while floating on his back. The whole process was so careful, considered and trusting – it brought tears to my eyes witnessing a moment of lightness and liberation. Add to that magnesium replacing chlorine and we all benefit more together.

Country town swimming pools, like we have in Kuranda, are special and rare. Especially sharing with plovers and being observed by a pademelon or two. This pool is owned by everyone in our community so I urge everyone to be proactive and press Lenore Wyatt (LenoreW@msc. qld.gov.au) and the Mareeba Shire Council to reinstate the magnesium.

I'm following up the standard of cleaning in the change rooms. It's only by chipping away collectively and becoming a citizen caretaker do we see the changes we all deserve. We can then relax and become loving users of our Kuranda Aquatic Centre.

### **Kuranda Weir Recovery — End of Year Update**

As 2024 comes to a close, we want to update the Kuranda community on the progress of the Kuranda Weir recovery following the significant damage caused by ex-Tropical Cyclone Jasper almost a year ago.

This project has been challenging, but we are proud of the progress made to restore vital infrastructure and ensure its resilience against future extreme weather events. CleanCo deeply appreciates the patience and support of the Kuranda community as we continue this important work.

#### **Key Milestones Achieved**

- Earlier this year, we safely brought the Barron Gorge Hydro Power Station back online.
- A coffer dam (temporary rock wall) has been constructed to divert water flow, enabling us to work safely and reinforcing the site ahead of the wet season.
- We excavated the embankment area and have begun pouring the foundations for a new, more resilient concrete wall that will replace the destroyed earth embankment.

#### What's Happening Now

As part of Stage 2, construction will continue through the wet season, with safety our top priority. Here's what we are focusing on:

- Specialist engineers are working with the construction team to build mass concrete blocks that will form the permanent concrete wall, designed to be more resilient than the original weir.
- The new structure is being built to a standard that supports a service life of at least 40 years.
- The permanent wall requires approximately 2000 cubic metres of concrete enough to fill an Olympic-sized swimming pool.

#### Thank you

We understand that these works may have caused some disruption, including increased traffic and noise. CleanCo is committed to minimising impacts and keeping you informed of any significant developments, and we thank you for your ongoing patience and support as we work to complete these vital recovery efforts.

We also acknowledge the Djabugay People and appreciate

#### **KURANDA RANGE ROAD CLOSURES**

Please note that night closures on the Kuranda Range Road (Kennedy Highway) have been extended to **20 December**. Reconstruction works on the road are progressing with night closures in place from 9pm to 4am every night to 20 December – except Friday and Saturday nights.

#### Let through times during night closures

Queued traffic at the top and bottom of the Range will be let through at midnight (12am) only. Road users must be in the queue by midnight to be let through – the road will then be closed again until 4am.

Variable Message Signs (VMS) will be in place on the approaches to the work sites to ensure motorists are aware of the changed traffic conditions. Changes in dates due to poor weather will be posted on the VMS.

Tenzin Kunsang is a classically trained singer-dancer born in exile in India.

I am pleased to share with you an update on ongoing projects and initiatives around Kuranda.

#### **Managing Our Waste Footprint**

Managing our waste is one of the most important ways we can help protect our environment and this was highlighted during National Recycling Week last month. Recycling is an activity in which the whole community can participate, and the Council provides facilities at transfer

stations and drop-off points to support this.

In 2023–2024, Mareeba Shire Council recycled more than 3,100 tonnes of materials, which is the equivalent of over 620 African elephants!

Council has also recently teamed up with Mareeba Recycling and Containers for Change to open two new bag drop stations - one in the park just south of the Mareeba Heritage Museum and the other in Raleigh Street Dimbulah, following the success of the bag drop in Arara Street, Kuranda.

Bag drops are a wonderful initiative where you can receive 10 cents back for each eligible container recycled. Download the Containers for Change app and set up an account for the refund and visit Council's website for further information. Cash it, don't trash it!

Council also recently hosted three home composting workshops in Mareeba, Koah and Mutchilba to raise awareness about reducing green waste going into landfill while creating nutrient-rich soil for the garden.

#### **Discount Green Waste Days in December**

**Kuranda Transfer Station** 

Saturday, 7 December and Sunday, 8 December 2024 As the wet season approaches, take advantage of discounted green waste disposal days.

Clean, uncontaminated domestic green waste will be accepted for just \$5 per load, with multiple loads allowed.

#### **Bridge Upgrade for Oak Forest Road, Mona Mona**

At November's Council meeting, a contract was awarded for upgrades to the bridge crossing the Barron River on Oak Forest Road, Mona Mona.

The bridge services the community of Mona Mona and provides access to nine rural properties.

An inspection of the bridge in 2021 identified that deck upgrades were required. The bridge is a single-lane concrete causeway that links to an ageing timber bridge structure. In its current condition, the bridge has a loadlimit of five tonnes.

Council is delighted to announce we have received \$320,000 in funding under the Australian Government's Safer Local Roads and Infrastructure Program (formerly the Bridges Renewal Program), in addition to \$80,000 in Council funds. The contract has been awarded to Neater Constructions for a total of \$450,667 (excluding GST).

The works will include new steel supports, protective coating of the existing steel girders and a new timber deck, which will achieve a 44-tonne load capacity. The bridge will not be raised to a higher level as this would increase the cost significantly.

The works will begin after the 2024/25 wet season and should take approximately six weeks to complete.

#### Science, snow and Steiner: a field trip to remember

This term, 19 students from the Cairns Hinterland Steiner School (Classes 7-10) embarked on an unforgettable educational field trip to the Australian Capital Territory (ACT). The trip was designed to enrich students' understanding of Australia's history, culture, heritage, and democracy.

The adventure began early as the students, and their teachers, boarded a flight from Cairns to Sydney. A walk and picnic lunch at the Sydney Harbour Bridge served as the perfect pitstop before they continued their journey by bus to Canberra and onto their accommodation which bordered a state forest. Each morning, students enjoyed a brisk walk through the adjacent bushland, encountering Eastern Grey Kangaroos and Crimson Rosellas. The morning verse was spoken in a peaceful clearing in the crisp, fresh air, setting a serene tone for the day ahead.

The schedule was action-packed, starting with a visit to the Australian National Library, where students marvelled at the sheer scale of its 271 kilometres of book-laden shelves spanning over five buildings. A hands-on session at the Australian Electoral Commission provided an engaging mock voting experience, deepening students' understanding of democracy. This was followed by a guided tour of Parliament House, including the Senate and the House of Representatives. Walking up Parliament Hill was a highlight, offering a powerful moment to reflect on the principle that, "The people are always on top of the government." At sunset, the group participated in the Last Post ceremony at the Australian War Memorial, during which student speakers laid a symbolic wreath for those that have died during their service for Australia in times of war.

Art and culture were brought to life with visits to the National Gallery of Australia and the National Portrait Gallery, where students admired diverse artworks, from classical to modern and expressionist pieces. The evenings were a delightful 'out-breath', featuring activities such as

ice skating, interactive sports simulations at the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) and stargazing at the National Observatory at Mount Stromlo. Guided by two passionate PhD students, the astronomy session included hands-on demonstrations about gravitational force and planetary orbits, culminating in telescope views of the Moon and Saturn. Another highlight for many was undoubtedly the visit to the science-themed park Questacon, where students discovered the wonders of science through interactive and playful exhibits.

The trip's grand finale was a journey to Thredbo, where students braved icy winds to hike towards the summit of Mount Kosciuszko. This adventurous hike tested their resilience and teamwork, with many experiencing snow for the first time. The joy of a snowball fight and a thrilling ride on the Alpine Coaster added excitement to the day.

A heartfelt thank you goes to camp leader and schoolteacher Mark Mather for organising this enriching and well-structured trip. The students' discipline, determination, and team spirit were exemplary, and we are confident that the memories made during this adventure will stay with them for a lifetime.

This trip was supported by funding (\$750 per student) from the Australian Government under the Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER) program.

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
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#### What's Happening at the Amphitheatre

#### KAST Christmas Members Event - Sunday 22 December, 4-8pm, Top Pavilion

KAST Theatre crew are staging a community Christmas event to entertain and spread the festive cheer. A Variety show that includes children's activities, face painting, Bubbles, our own Fairy Jenny, craft activities, interactive physical theatre, Christmas Carols, a Santa performance, variety acts, and an original pantomime by Janet Bowron, this is an afternoon and evening for the whole family.

This is a KAS members' night – if you are not a member, memberships are available on the night (all memberships are half price for the end of the year).

#### **Future Master Plan completed**

The Future Master Planning process is now complete, and has produced a highly practical and professional planning document and guide for future Committees. Aside from hosting, planning, and delivering events, the KAS Committee is responsible for the maintenance and planning for the large amount of infrastructure and gardens on Amphitheatre grounds.

Stemming from community consultations at the beginning of the year, this project reflects the input of participating members and community for maintenance and capital projects for the Amphitheatre.

It includes a 10-year maintenance plan, and 30 pages of architectural drawings with recommendations for upgrades and innovations for Amphitheatre infrastructure from the community. The Committee will present the document to Council in January, and it will be on display in the Amphitheatre Understage foyer and on our website.

#### **Music Industry Gathering**

Many in our community are keen for the Amphitheatre to regularly host the large live gigs that were the mainstay of the venue in the 1980s and 90s.

The Australian live music industry has changed dramatically in the past two decades. Streaming services now dominate listening practices, removing a once reliable income stream for artists. Combined with increased touring costs, corporate promoter practices, screens replacing live music in pubs, noise and compliance restrictions, and the huge impact of the Covid years, circumstances have changed touring practices, audience behaviours, and drastically reduced revenue streams for independent artists and venues.

To this end, KAS volunteers attended the Cairns Music Industry Gathering held over the weekend of 8-10 November, to participate in 'Live and Local' – a Live Music Development program for local communities. An initiatiative from the Federal Live Music Office and APRA AMCOS, it is intended to 'strengthen the ecology of local grassroots live music communities'. This program is open to all local Councils.

The forums gathered local artist and venue feedback, and provided examples of Councils throughout Australia supporting the local live music scene via dedicated policy.

This provided us an opportunity to network, and advance the Amphitheatre and its diverse infrastructure as a venue to host all kinds of live music events, as well as facilitating productive discussions with representatives from Cairns music industry, the Live Music Office and Queensland Music Festival.

Our next KAS AGM is in February 2025, and there will be a number of Committee positions available. #### LOCAL AUTHOR RELEASES A NEW BOOK CELEBRATING THE BIRDLIFE OF KURANDA

Local author, photographer and artist Buck Richardson has added to his previous published works including Mythology: Discover the Magic and Tropical Queensland Wildlife from Dusk to Dawn Science and Art with a new compilation of local birds – Birdlife of Kuranda. Now available at the Kuranda Arts Co-op (corner of Coondoo and Thongon Streets) where Buck is also an exhibiting artist.



"When I first moved to Kuranda village with its vibrant creative community in tropical Australia with my wife and young family, we hand-built our own timber home together on the edge of UNESCO's World Heritage Wet Tropics. The World Heritage listing, declared in 2005, meets all four natural World Heritage criteria by showing exceptional natural beauty, major stages in Earth's evolutionary history, outstanding examples of ongoing ecological/biological evolution, and a proliferation of biodiversity.

It was the vibrant colours, patterns and interactions of this myriad biodiversity of species in dynamic equilibrium that we could observe 24/7 that blew me away. As artists and photographers, our home was a natural observational platform or 'bird-hide' embedded within the rainforest. Initially we captured what we could draw and hand-cut to make hundreds of bespoke screen-prints on fabric. These featured frogs and butterflies, and birds and fish, as globally this is where two natural wonder World Heritage areas meet - the Wet Tropics Rainforest and the wondrous Great Barrier Reef, both based on outstanding biodiversity.

All in our 'backyard.' What a privilege! This booklet documents the birdlife I have had the privilege to photograph in our home territory of Kuranda." Buck Richardson, Kuranda.

#### Help fight electric ants by booking a free yard check

Far North Queenslanders are being called on to help protect our environment, economy and way of life by supporting efforts to eradicate electric ants. National Electric Ant Eradication Program principal project officer Robert Ibell encouraged people to look for electric ants and report them to Biosecurity Queensland by calling 13 25 23.

"Early detection and reporting are key for eradicating electric ants, which have been found in many areas of Far North Queensland, including the Daintree," Mr Ibell said.

"Electric ants are one of the world's worst invasive pests, with potential to impact our outdoor lifestyle, unique environment and profitable tourism and agriculture industries. They can inflict a long-lasting venomous sting, which causes moderate to severe pain and, in rare cases, severe allergic reactions (anaphylaxis). They can also make our pets blind. Left untreated, electric ants will kill and displace native wildlife and animals, disrupt the ecosystems and harm the environment. Native flora and fauna, along with agricultural crops and fruit trees, will fail to thrive."


"Our free yard checks are quick and easy and can be booked by calling 13 25 23 or visiting www.daf.qld.gov.au/anthunt," he said.

Mr Ibell said areas with electric ants received targeted bait treatments that were harmless to animals and humans.

"We use a small granular bait specifically designed for electric ants, under strict permit conditions issued by the Australian Pesticides and Veterinary Medicines Authority," he said.

"We use half a teaspoon of this treatment per square metre, and the granules contain less than one per cent of the active chemical. It is harmless to humans and animals at these

concentrations. We do ask people to lock up their chickens and other pets for the first 48 hours - not because the treatment could harm them, but because we need the electric ant workers to take the bait back to the queens. If chickens or pets pick up the bait, it will not make it to the queens. The treatment breaks down in direct sunlight after 48 hours, or sooner if wet.'









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#### **Quirky Chooks!**

It's been a year since we introduced Kerry Geck as our new artist and her quirky ceramic chooks and vessels have been really popular with our visitors. Kerry digs her own wild clay from her property, processes it and then creates unique ceramic objects. She is obsessed with wild clays and her practice supports sustainability, and a realisation that clay is of the earth and can be dug up by our own hands.

#### Documenting your work by Toni Rogers

Even if now, you may not think you need to document your work, there is sure to be a time in the future when someone is going to be looking at it saying, "What is this? What is it to do with? Who was the person who made it?"

We all know the wonderful found objects with no story of making or usage, and no documentation of process or materials. How many of us have family albums with no identification of long gone relatives? Believe me, it does not take long for those details to be utterly forgotten. You have to consider that if you do not document things now, in 100 years someone else will make something up about it from guess work.

The sort of information you need:

- You: Name, date and place of birth, background (this provides clues to influences), education and training, work experience, travel etc., exhibitions and publications.
- Your work: What your work deals with generally and what the sources of ideas are, and where the shifts and changes have been made and ideas you were dealing with when you made it. What record you have of your work i.e. its size, date and place of making, materials and processes, design drawings etc.

Most of you will already have biological information about yourselves. As well, the following list of headings is a very basic checklist of the sort of information you could consider using to document each of your works. The amount of space you provide for each entry can be varied depending on your needs, and there is no doubt there are other headings you could add. It could be photocopied for card index, filed in a plastic sleeve (with photos and reviews etc.) or it could form the basis for a computer database.

You could also document your work in some photographic form, when sending slides, prints and photographic images to someone else. You need to make sure the basic information is clearly included on it: your name, the form and title of the work, materials etc. - and the photographer's name because this is usually necessary for copyright purposes.

The following form can be expanded, with plenty of space for categories, as needed:

- Form: Title, Part of Series, Date made, Size, Materials, Process, Cleaning instructions.
- Record: Exhibited, References, Purchased by (date), Price value.

What I have discovered is that if something is not written down – it simply did not happen. Toni Rogers

# THE YEAR THAT WAS @ ANDA PAPER.



2024 marked the 33rd year of uninterrupted publication of Kuranda's own independent community newspaper, and with the July 2024 edition, the start of our 34th. A very special thank you to all the fabulous, generous artists, writers and photographers whose creativity graces our pages, adding that bit of Kuranda creative spark to each edition. And of course, as advertising is our sole source of income, we simply could not remain viable without the continued support of our wonderful local advertisers. Thank you. Don't forget that every edition of The Kuranda Paper is available on our website – if you want to read a past edition that you may have missed.

Our front page for the final edition of 2023 warned of the seasonal perils of cyclones, flooding and bushfires – "Stay safe and be prepared". This is an annual reminder to take necessary precautions, have a disaster plan and support in place, or perhaps join one of the local emergency services such as SES and rural fire brigades. With hindsight though, no one could have been fully prepared for the extraordinary weather event that was Cyclone Jasper, and its flooding aftermath, which would go on to shape our 2024 on many levels, catastrophically for some.

The new Kuranda Heights cemetery was progressing, with earthworks completed. Options for the Barron River Bridge at Kuranda were presented to the public for feedback.

The Adult section of our 2024 Short Story Competition A Spirited Tale opened for entries.

Rainfall for December 2023: 1951.1mm (Total rainfal for 2023: 4417.2mm). Rainfall for January 2024: 539.3 mm



Our masthead featured a photograph by Steven Nowakowski capturing a sodden Kuranda and swollen Barron River on 18 December 2023 - the day after the flood peak from Cyclone Jasper. From the air, the extent of the devastation to the Kuranda weir, the riverbanks and Kuranda railway line are not evident.

Our front page celebrated the Koah Sports and Social Club and Dream BIG! Circus School's Australia Day Award win by Mareeba Shire Council (MSC). Our short story competition deadline was extended in the face of the 'lost months' of December and January. Grateful thanks were given to our local SES, who with rural fire brigades, responded to over 140 requests for assistance caused by Cyclone Jasper. MSC provided an overview of its response to the extensive damage caused shire wide by Cyclone Jasper and associated flooding and warned it could take 18 to 24 months to fully address.

Vale to Cliff Timmins 'The Kuranda Ice Cream Man' and also to Peter North. Peter gave generously of his time to many local community groups including the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre, Envirocare and the Kuranda Media Association, as well as writing for many years his iconic gardening column under the nom de plume of 'Alectura' (brush turkey).

The Kuranda CWA Hall continued to provide an essential venue for the community, hosting two Cyclone Jasper Community Recovery Hub days in January. It was good to see the hall also receiving some long overdue maintenance made possible in part by a donation through dispersed funds from the disbanded Kuranda Traders Association – just one of many local groups to receive such assistance.

Rainfall for the month: 237.1mm



Our masthead featured a detail from an original painting Birdwing on Scarlet Ginger by Candida 'Candy' Raymond. BatReach shared photos of some of the many injured wildlife it takes in for rescue and rehabilitation, providing a life-giving haven for vulnerable, and endearing, native animals for almost three decades. The BatReach volunteers are passionate and hardworking, and donations are always welcome to support this important work.

The Kuranda Medical Centre updated the community on the challenges they are facing in trying to recruit and retain General Practitioner doctors, leading to difficulties in meeting the demand for appointments. They requested community support and patience for the staff at the Centre when booking.

The Queensland Local Government election was set for 16 March, with 11 candidates vying for the six Councillor positions available. The outcome of Mayoral contest was already known with Mayor Angela Toppin being returned unopposed.

Council repairs continued following Cyclone Jasper with a total of 190 roads across the Shire sustaining damage, roughly half the roads in the Shire. Council partnered with Containers for Change to increase recycling options in Kuranda with five new street bins for recyclables. Buluwai Rangers worked with Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service (QPWS) on fire management, helping to create quality habitat for endangered Northern Bettongs.

The Kuranda Writers Group changed coordinators with Eve Stafford taking up the baton. Cate Lamont, Neighbourhood Centre vice president and board member retired after many years of service to the community.

Rainfall for the month: 893.9mm



Our masthead featured a detail from an original painting Rainforest Concert by Henri Hunsinger. Our front page story was a call out for the Kuranda community to come together to support four-year-old Tariella, and her family, as they faced the challenges of seeking medical treatment for her childhood bone cancer.

We opened up the Children and Young Adults section of our A Spirited Tale/Tail short story competition for entries.

A new Mareeba Shire Council, with some old and some new faces, was sworn in on 26 March. There were ongoing repairs to the ravaged Kuranda Range Road, providing plenty of inconvenience and frustration for road users. The Kuranda Scenic Railway services—which were cut following the extensive damage to the lines in December—were restored in March, but ongoing rain caused further temporary closures. Suzy Grinter in her A Grinters Tale spoke for all of us as she lamented the extended Wet - "We used to go troppo frequently in the wet but for periods of two or three weeks, not four months".

Despite the extended Wet, community groups were getting back into the swing of things with the Amphitheatre hosting local theatre and their always popular Love Bomb music night. Here at the Kuranda Media Association we finally managed to hold our rain-checked AGM with the 2023 Committee returned. Capital works around Kuranda also progressed despite the rain, including reinstalment of Hans Pehl's iconic ironworks and the start of an extensive redevelopment of the Kuranda Skate Park.

Rainfall for the month: 449.7mm



Our masthead for the month featured a detail from an original painting by artist, and extraordinary wildlife carer, Rebecca Koller, featuring four of her flying-fox patients. Our front page story Community Under Stress highlighted the hard hit Speewah community which had launched a petition to impel Telstra to upgrade their backup batteries at their towers – because a loss of power in a very short time meant loss of communications, including emergency calls. This loss of communications following loss of power was not limited to Speewah and became evident across the Far North during Cyclone Jasper when Ergon crews were overwhelmed and at times unable to access lines to restore power. It remains an ongoing concern.

Also hard hit by damage caused by flooding following Cyclone Jasper was the Kuranda Riverboat. Because water levels were at an all time low caused by the break in the Kuranda Weir wall, the Kuranda Riverboat was unable to operate since mid-December. It did seem that planned repairs to the Weir would mean river levels could be restored soon and the Riverboat cruise again. Repairs to the riverbank and Esplanade walk continue, but it is a huge job.

We published our Adult short story winner The Piano Teacher by Ann Harth, and runner up A Spirited Tale by Suzy Grinter.

We said Vale to Brian Davidson, who had been instrumental in the early days of The Kuranda Paper. Well known local, Beverly Henderson, retired after 22 years of volunteering at the Kuranda Visitor Information Centre.

Rainfall for the month: 134.6mm



Our front page highlighted the critical construction works underway by Cleanco Queensland to repair the Kuranda Weir wall to both restore water levels in the Barron River at Kuranda, and allow for power generation at the Kuranda Hydro to recommence following flooding in December. Our masthead featured an aerial photo by Steven Nowakowski showing the river in its former glory with the Kuranda Riverboat in operation.

The documentary Stories of Jasper (interviews with locals affected by Cyclone Jasper), was released and can be viewed on the Mareeba Shire Council website. Works continued at the Barron River Bridge in Kuranda with single lane operations put in place, making travelling the still unrepaired Kuranda Range Road even more frustrating.

The Yellow Crazy Ant Community Taskforce took to the streets of Kuranda surveying for signs of these invasive ants and educating community members. The Envirocare column gave an update on the 15 frog monitoring stations, eight of which Djabugay Bulmba Rangers are monitoring, as well as the purchase of four acoustic monitoring devices and the recording of frog calls.

The Kuranda ITF Taekwon-Do group scored gold, silver and bronze awards at the NQ Games AAITF National Taekwon-Do Championships. The Kuranda Arts Co-op column featured the beautiful botanical art of Robyn King. We published our second runner up short story Log by Malcolm Frost. The Kuranda Historical Society had begun the work of entering information into the The Collecting Bug record system, with the view to establish a website presence once enough records (200) have been entered.

#### Rainfall for the month: 37.5mm

July in Kuranda was starting to feel 'normal' again. There was so much on offer we devoted the entire front page to music, theatre and festival events – July in Kuranda - A Cultural Feast including the Kuranda Roots Festival which was set to celebrate its 22nd birthday.

Our masthead for the month featured a lush landscape photograph of Emerald Creek by Kevin Explores - well known on social media for his aerial photography. The Kuranda Riverboat was back in the water and the Kuranda Weir repairs were continuing and on time. Anzac Park improvements were underway. The Kuranda Riverwalk was re-opened although there still remained much more work to restore it to its former amenity. The Kuranda Skate Park redevelopment was progressing.

We published the winning stories in the Children and Young Adult categories of our short story competition - Spirit Whispers and Ballet Slippers by Jasmine Sporre (Young Adult) and A Battle through Bushes by Buster Pearson (Child).

The Cassowary Art Trail and Kuranda Conservation announced the latest in plans to promote and educate visitors, and locals, about our amazing cassowaries.Planned is a giant cassowary statue, in the spirit of Australia's iconic 'big' attractions. The statue will be handpainted by local artists and located in Centenary Park. Djabugay launched the latest updated versions of their Djabugay Language work books, first printed in 1989. Available through the Djabugay office.

And it was our 33rd birthday! The very first edition of *The Kuranda Paper* was published on 26 July 1991.

#### Rainfall for the month: 114.9m

Our masthead featured a detail from an original painting Back to Country by Mamu artist Melanie Hava. Our front page celebrated the awarding of an Excellence in Early Childhood Education and Care award to our very own Kuranda Community Kindy, presented at an awards night in Brisbane. Well into 40 years of providing caring and stimulating early education, the Kindy truly is a community treasure. Well done and congratulations.

The Kuranda Walking Tour app for mobile devices was launched. The app allows locals and visitors to explore three Kuranda 'trails' – a Nature Trail, History Trail, and the Public Art Trail. The Anzac Park refresh was completed and the amenity much improved. The Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre moved operations temporarily to the library site as mould was treated and renovations made to the Centre.

There were several long-time community members to pay tribute to and farewell. Vale Michael O'Neill, Elaine Cushman and remembering Coral Stratford on her anniversary. A reminder that The Kuranda Paper does not charge to publish death notices or memorial notices for local community members and we are always happy work with loved ones to honour their loved ones.

The Hakko Cultural Festival held at the Kuranda Amphitheatre in July was a great success, increasing the possibility of it to become a regular festival addition in Kuranda. Artists from the Kuranda Indigenous Tourism Hub participated in the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair in July and were a vibrant presence.

#### Rainfall for the month: 128.5mm

Spring in Kuranda. This year the Spring festivities were spread across the Village and the Amphitheatre, while the Cairns Hinterland Steiner School also held its annual Spring Fair at the school grounds on Boyles Road. In the Village, Fairies, Mad Hatters, music and good food certainly brought the spring spirit alive. Let's hope for a revival of community-led spring festivities so many remember and cherish.

Our September masthead featured details from a hand embroidered Flower Power 'scrappyball' by Gayle Hannah, using recycled and salvaged materials. On the theme of sustainable crafting, Chelsey Reis shared her ideas on a how a regenerative lifestyle can be lived, even with a simple act of patching and mending clothes.

The annual Speewah to the Hat (Red Beret Hotel – Redlynch) Charity Walk raised \$5150 which was distributed, as always, to local causes and individuals in need of help. Surely one of the best reasons possible to take a walk – so lookout for it again in 2025.

The Kuranda CWA hall received a new coat of paint in its 87th year.

Yellow crazy ant annual surveys in Russett Park returned good news with no ants detected. Spot treatments continued in Green Forest Road areas and the monthly surveys of Kuranda streets continued. Continuing measures must be taken to ensure that there is no spreading of invasive ants through potted plants and cuttings, potting soil, green waste, hay, straw, manure, old timber or furniture items which have been on the ground.

#### Rainfall for the month: 58.4mm

Our masthead for October featured our first ever glass artwork. The fused glass artwork Renewal After Fire is by local artist Kate Prynne, who also offers personalised workshops. Our front page recognised the work of Cathy Retter who was awarded a Wet Tropics Cassowary Award – the Thorsborne Award for Community Conservation and Rehabilitation, for her decades of environmental activism and work, including through Kuranda Envirocare and the Yellow Crazy Ants Community Taskforce.

A year's worth of planning, gathering and making by local fibre artist Toni Rogers was coming to fruition with the opening of her collaborative exhibition Travellers Crossing, with Tablelands artist Helen Hume, in early November.

The Kuranda Medical Centre updated the community to say that although appointments continue to be difficult they have been successful in getting some locum doctors to improve the situation, with a permanent doctor to be here early in the new year. Another complication affecting the Centre are the number of DNA (did not attend) appointments—i.e. people who book but don't turn up—which threatens the viability of the Centre.

Council announced upgrades to Coondoo Street to commence soon following securing of funding footpaths, planter boxes and some lighting of the

The Kuranda District State College had much to celebrate having secured State funding of \$2.65 million to upgrade their Multi-Purpose Sports facility.

#### Rainfall for the month: 37.5mm

Our masthead featured feathers in the process of being stitched onto fabric by Toni Rogers, some of multiple thousands in her exhibition works.

Our front page paid tribute to the essential community venue of the Kuranda CWA hall celebrating 87 years, and all the members of the Kuranda QCWA who have maintained it and made it available for so many purposes through the years, the most recent of which was to provide a polling place during the Queensland State election held on 26 October.

The State election saw the Barron River electorate live up to its 'bell weather' reputation, unbroken since 1974. A bell weather seat is one where 'so goes the seat, so goes the government. The new MP for Barron River is Bree James (LNP) and, as is tradition, The Kuranda Paper will provide her with a space to directly address the Kuranda and district residents. Water levels in the Barron River were projected to stabilise in mid-November following completion of foundation works for a permanent concrete wall.

  - Police, Ambulance or Fire: 000
  - o SES: 132 500
- Clean up your yard, secure loose items and move possessions to high ground if you live in an area prone to flooding.
- Take appropriate steps to protect your property.
- If necessary, get sandbags ready early, contact the local SES for
- Pack an emergency kit. Have enough supplies to last at least 3 days, locations that are easily isolated should keep supplies for 5 to 7 days.
- Get to know your neighbours.
- Purchase a battery radio to keep informed about disasters in case you become isolated and lose power and communications.
- Familiarise yourself with the Australian Warning System symbols.



#### Advice (Yellow):

An incident has started. There is no immediate danger. Stay up to date in case the situation changes.

#### Watch and Act (Orange):



There is a heightened level of threat. Conditions are changing and you need to start taking action now to protect you and your family.



#### **Emergency Warning (Red):**

An Emergency Warning is the highest level of warning. You may be in danger and need to take action immediately. Any delay now puts your life at risk.

#### What do I do during an event?

- Listen to advice from Emergency Services.
- Be aware of your surroundings and action your emergency plan.
- Keep informed visit MSC Emergency Management Dashboard and the Bureau of Meteorology.
- Keep in contact with your friends or family.
- Follow on Facebook My Police Tablelands, QLD Fire Department and Mareeba Shire Council.
- Listen to local radio stations ABC Far North (Cairns / Kuranda 801AM, Mareeba 106.7 FM, Dimbulah 91.7 FM, Mt Molloy 95.7 FM), Black Star (96.7 FM), KIK-FM (88.7 FM) 4AM (558 AM).
- Download Emergency Apps SES Assistance QLD, Emergency +, BOM, Red Cross First Aid and SunWater.

#### What do I do after an event?

- Listen to advice from Emergency Services.
- Stay away from fallen powerlines
- To report electric shocks or fallen powerlines 24/7 dial 000 or call
- Never drive in flood waters, there could be hidden dangers.
- Returning to affected buildings? Be mindful of electricity and gas connections, water and food safety, fallen trees.
- Phone Ergon Energy on 13 22 96 If you have lost power or are experiencing electricity supply problems.
- Visit Mareeba Shire Council Emergency Management Dashboard for up-to-date information on road conditions and power
- Contact your insurance company to lodge a claim and seek guidance for the next steps.

How does Mareeba Shire Council respond during a disaster? Local governments are primarily responsible for co-ordinating disaster events in their local government areas.

MSC is responsible for the development and implementation of a local disaster management plan. Coordinated disaster management is achieved through the LDMG (Local Disaster Management Group).

Membership of the LDMG is comprised of representatives from Council, State Emergency Response Agencies (SES, QLD Police, QLD Fire Dept), Department of Health, Department of Education and Department of Transport & Main Roads

The LDMG has four sub-groups that support different sectors and assets of the community. The Economic Sub-Group, Public Health and Environment Sub-Group, Built, Environment / Infrastructure Sub-Group, and Community Support Sub-Group.

In the event of a disaster, the LDMG may establish a Local Disaster Coordination Centre. Requests for assistance will be directed through this centre and escalated as necessary.

Council hosts the Emergency Management Dashboard to provide residents with up-to-date information from multiple state agencies and sources in one place.

Council will keep the community informed of any changes to services during this time, such as water outages or rubbish bin collections, via the MSC website and Facebook Page and broadcast messages via local radio stations.

#### How does Mareeba Shire Council respond after a disaster?

Immediately following an event, Council's primary responsibility is to restore its essential services as soon as possible. This includes:

- Ensuring access to local roads
- Maintaining water and waste services
- Continuing kerbside waste collection

You can help Council by reporting incidents on 1300 308 461.

After addressing immediate needs, Council begins other restorative works such as repairing local roads and restoring public facilities and infrastructure.

State and Federal funding are often required to repair disaster damage through Disaster Recovery Fund Arrangements.

#### **Cyclone Jasper and Flooding Event Recovery**

Mareeba Shire was heavily impacted by Cyclone Jasper and the flooding event that occurred in December 2023.

The Myola rain gauge received an incredible 2.4m of rain within 7 days, which is the average annual rainfall.

With over 900 calls and 185 requests for assistance during the event, Mareeba Shire Council faced unprecedented requests for support.

More than half of our Shire's road network was affected, as well as critical infrastructure, underscoring the severity of this weather event.

Nearly one year on, and the work to restore infrastructure continues.

Mareeba Shire Council has been very grateful to receive assistance provided through the jointly funded Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) for the Jawaree Road repairs.





#### Jarawee Road, Kuranda

The works for Jarawee Road are approximately 20% complete with the excavations on the eastern side now finished, and design works awaiting approval. Once the final design is complete, the works should move fairly quickly.

Earlier this year, Council worked to restore access to the Riverwalk. Council is currently advocating for make to improvements to the popular walking track. Council also undertook works to reopen the walking tracks in town.



#### **Kuranda Water Treatment Plant**

The December 2023 flood caused significant damage to the Kuranda Water Treatment Plant. Council were able to restore the facility to ensure clean drinking water for residents as well as make repairs to the sewage treatment plant.

#### **Barron Falls Road and Hilltop Close**

The landslip repairs have now been completed at Barron Falls Road and at Hilltop Close, with both projects receiving assistance provided through the jointly funded Commonwealth-State Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements.

Without the support from the Queensland Reconstruction Authority and its Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements, Council would not be able to afford to make these repairs. The funding helps ensure the safety of our infrastructure and the wellbeing of our community.

#### The story of Christmas in Kuranda

What was Christmas time like in Kuranda in the era before television and the internet? How did the citizens of the town and their visitors amuse themselves in the festive season?

The story of Christmas in Kuranda reveals a rich tapestry of community festivities, cultural expressions, and occasional poignant moments. Here's a comprehensive look at how Kuranda has celebrated Christmas over the years:

In the early 1900s, Kuranda's Christmas celebrations were grand and community-focused. The 1910 Christmas Carnival, for instance, featured a variety of sports events starting on Boxing Day, a grand fancy dress ball, cricket matches against visiting teams, and lawn tennis competitions. These events extended into the New Year with activities like progressive euchre parties and dances, culminating in a special excursion from Cairns on New Year's Day for a cricket match.

The revelry included a wide range of costumes and disguises at the grand Christmas Ball which took place at the Kuranda Hall on the evening of 25 December. Participants dressed up as characters from different nations and even as iconic figures like Charlie Chaplin. The celebrations were not just limited to the locals but also attracted guests from surrounding areas, indicating Kuranda's popularity as a holiday destination during the festive season.

Music played a significant role in the celebrations, with bands of serenaders starting their performances on the stroke of midnight on Christmas Eve, moving from one hotel to another, creating a festive and lively atmosphere.

In more recent years, Kuranda has embraced more organised events to celebrate Christmas. For instance, the merchants in Kuranda have been active in organising events such as the Kuranda Twilight Trading night (14 December – see page 3), where local stores and businesses stay open late, and the community enjoys an evening of shopping, dining, and entertainment. This event reflects a modern approach to community celebrations, focusing on supporting local businesses and providing entertainment for families and visitors.

Throughout its history, Kuranda's Christmas celebrations have been characterised by strong community involvement. mainly the older generation of people that remember these beetles, as they are sadly in decline. The mass emergence of these beetles during the Christmas season is becoming a thing of the past. Scientists are trying to discover why, and we need your help!

Christmas beetles belong to the scarab family of beetles. We have over thirty species of Christmas beetles in Australia, with colour forms which include brown, green, blue and even stunning gold. The majority of species are found along the east coast of Australia, and most are endemic (found only in

The life cycle of these beetles is the same basic cycle as most beetles. In this case, eggs are laid underground in grasslands adjacent to eucalypt trees or forests. The grubs (larvae) feed upon grass roots and their growth is dependent on soil temperature. Those in warmer climates may emerge a year later, whilst those in cooler regions may spend two years underground. The larvae are called curl grubs - they are crescent-shaped with a pale, reddish-brown head and three pairs of legs, but can be quite difficult to distinguish from other beetle larvae.

After pupating, the adults time their emergence with warmer conditions and are also stimulated by rainfall. Different species will emerge at different times throughout the summer; perhaps to avoid direct competition. Other factors can influence the exact timing of their emergence, such as seasonal variations in weather patterns. Most Christmas beetles emerge from November to February, but as we know, many appear in late December. But in the last 15 years, the number of beetles emerging each year is declining. Why is this? We simply do not have enough information currently to know for sure. There are some contributing factors. One is definitely habitat loss, as grassland areas and open woodland areas are cleared for developments. The second is our use of insecticides in the garden and around the home, and the third is climate change. These beetles are essential to a healthy ecosystem, as they provide food for mammals, birds and reptiles at a time when these animals are raising young.

So, how can you help with saving the Christmas beetle? The University of Sydney has teamed up with Invertebrates Australia, an organisation that is dedicated to the conservation of invertebrates all across Australia. They have a project called the Christmas Beetle Count, and they are asking you to record when you spot a Christmas beetle. This is called citizen science, and it is an exciting way to be part of a large research project.

The steps to be involved are simple:

- 1. Download the iNaturalist app. This can be on your smart phone or mobile device, or you can also access it on a computer
- 2. Create an account this is completely free
- 3. Search for the project "Christmas Beetle Count'
- Take a photo of the Christmas beetle that you have found. Christmas beetles are nocturnal, so it is likely you'll find them flying to lights at night, but you might also spot them on gum trees through the day.
- 5. Add your observation and photo to the iNaturalist app and include as much information about where you found the beetle as possible. Even if you haven't joined the project, any sighting of a Christmas beetle will be included. Be sure to update the geoprivacy to open (which gives the exact location the photo was taken), or obscured, which will round the location data to a 20km radius.

And that's it! But what if you don't know how to identify a Christmas beetle? The Australian Museum has an app that will help you ID a Christmas beetle - it's called Xmas Beetle ID Guide. iNaturnalist will also help to ID your beetle from the thousands of records it already has on beetles. A few guidelines are that Christmas beetles tend to be oval in shape, and are quite chunky beetles. They are often iridescent in colour, but not always. Their head has a sort of 'duckbill' shape, and their back legs are thick, like they are wearing a set of leg warmers.





Our community nursery is pumping, the trailers are hardly ever home, our amazing bin stickers are getting the conservation message out there and contributing to our ability to fund our activities.

We are surrounded by dedicated, loyal and energetic supporters who report cassowary sightings, bring in seeds, work in the nursery, do our accounting, paint fabulous bin stickers for us and keep coming back year after year.

Hour upon hour has been invested by volunteers who meticulously record on the WildNet database all the details about the cassowaries that have been seen throughout the entire Kuranda region for past decades.

Week after week, the same hard workers come to the nursery to build infrastructure, move things around, shovel gravel, load soil, prick out tiny plants, pot up thriving seedlings, keep us clean and dusted, offer suggestions.

At around 11am we gather around the coffee table and share a sweet treat, tell improbable stories and have a hearty laugh. We're good friends.

Dealing with growing things is never boring (unless you have 100 lomandra plants to pot up) because every change in season brings in new species, plants we've never raised before, like Licuala, and we're always learning.

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
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### NORTH QUEENSLAND WILDLIFE TRUST — **FUNDING ANNOUNCED**

Christmas cheer has come early with another record funding allocation of over \$75,000 from the locally founded and operated North Queensland Wildlife Trust.

The North Queensland Wildlife Trust (NQWT) was established in 2004 by the Freeman family who own and operate Hartley's Crocodile Adventures, Kuranda Koala Gardens and Birdworld Kuranda. The Trust is focussed very much on grass roots conservation efforts, hands-on wildlife care, critical habitat acquisition, conservation, research and preservation. At the Freeman attractions, there are easy mechanisms for visitors to make an active contribution to the conservation of native species and local habitats with funds accumulating weekly.

In further recognition, Peter and Angela Freeman were also recently awarded the Chairman's Award for Excellence at the North Queensland Tourism Awards for their dedication to conservation and wildlife.

#### The funding recipients are:

Gondwana Rainforest Trust - Funding \$3,000 to support the acquisition of Lot 92 Cape Tribulation Road (RP738993). Located at Cow Bay in Far North Queensland. The Trust is securing this 8.9 hectare property due to its exceptional value to nature conservation. Strategically located at Cow Bay it adjoins the Daintree National Park and World Heritage Area.

Far North Queensland Wildlife Rescue - Funding \$4,085 for critical medical equipment and for the purchase of urgently needed incubators and additional funds to assist with the carers buying wildlife food as \$50 for animals eating insects, mice, crickets etc.

Kuranda Envirocare - Funding \$4,995.20 For interpretive signage and to support the Kuranda Tree frog's monitoring program as well as to create habitat for this very endemic frog. Signage is hoped to engage the public and will hopefully bring volunteers to support the program.

The Agile Project Wildlife Rescue - Funding \$3,000 Turf for maintenance of pre-release and rehabilitation sites. This funding will help purchase replacement turf for rejuvenation of release sites and allow greater involvement

by the community by providing labour for the turfing and maintenance process.

Bats and Tree Society of Cairns (BatSoc) Inc. -Funding \$10,000 – Annual support for the Kuranda creche and release facility in time for pupping season. The creche facility provides housing for sick, injured or orphaned bats prior to their release back to the wild. The particular focus of this funding is the Spectacled Flying-fox which is an endangered and keystone species of the Wet Tropics.

And last but not least, Rainforest Rescue - Funding \$50,000 – to support the acquisition of 110 Cape Tribulation Road to be converted from a disused sugar cane farm back to a viable rainforest habitat. The North Queensland Wildlife Trust has committed the first funding to provide the initial large acquisition contribution to assist Rainforest Rescue in raising the \$425,000 required to protect this partregenerated property. Once restored it will be the subject of an application for Nature Refuge covenant to ensure it is protected in perpetuity.

More exciting announcements are also expected to come soon regarding the Magnetic Island Koala Hospital.

#### Kuranda's own tree frog



Much of Kuranda Envirocare's recent work has focused on averting the decline of the critically endangered Kuranda Tree frog (Litoria myola). Without intervention Kuranda's own tree frog would inevitably slide into extinction.

With limited budget and resources Kuranda Envirocare must target the areas where our efforts can be the most effective, which means understanding the habits and requirement of a healthy Kuranda Tree frog population.

Habitat destruction is the principal cause of its decline. Land clearing in the last 100 years has left the frog in small and isolated populations.

The male and female frogs do not live in the same areas, only coming together to breed. The males live close to water, usually within 20 metres of a creek. They do not live along the Barron River, only in small areas of creeks that feed into the river, often just upstream of the junctions.

The female frogs, however, live high in the rainforest canopy, from about 30-180 metres from the creek. That habitat is the one most affected by land clearing and therefore targeted by Kuranda Envirocare for revegetation.

Large areas of guinea grass are very dangerous for the continued survival of the frog. Corridors connecting known populations with other creeks without any frogs or with at risk populations are also necessary.

Kuranda Envirocare works with Dr Conrad Hoskin at JCU and many local volunteers to monitor the number of frogs in each population.

The good news is that frog populations have recovered in some areas where replanting has occurred such as lower Cain Creek and areas of Owen Creek. Where rainforest was retained along creeks and surrounding areas, populations have remained.

It's up to all of us, the Kuranda community, to pull together and ensure the continued existence of the Kuranda Tree frog. If you have a creek on your property, consider joining the Frog Friendly Neighbourhood through Kuranda Envirocare, or join a Kuranda Envirocare frog friendly planting.

These surveys help us keep on the front foot, detecting invasive ants early. The great news is, no invasive ants were detected! Be sure to do your part by getting your free yard check at least once a year, as invasive ants can hitch a ride from Cairns or Mareeba in common items like garden plants, mulch, turf and used garden items.



**Book Review** – *Manga Classics: Pride and Prejudice* by Jane Austen, story adaptation by Stacey King, art by Po Tse. Manga Classics, 2023. Review by Meg.



**Publisher's Blurb:** Beloved by millions over, Pride and Prejudice is delightfully transformed in this bold new manga adaptation. All the joy, humour and romance of Jane Austen's original story is perfectly illuminated by rich and sumptuous art, and faithfully adapted for a new generation of readers!

Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* is one of my all-time favourite books — so much so, that a few years ago, I made a project of finding and reading as many adaptations of it that I could find (a bit nerdy of me, I know). While I had previously found a graphic novel version of the book, before now, I had not come across a Manga adaptation.

For those who aren't familiar, 'Manga' is a style of comic book originating in Japan. It's also read from right-to-left, which is backwards from what you might be used to—this means that each page begins the top right corner. I really liked that this was helpfully explained with text and a diagram at the very beginning of the book, as it did take a little getting used to in the first few pages.

As far as adaptations go – it wasn't my favourite. I think it did a good job of conveying the essence of the story, with all the major plot points hit upon, and the overall themes of the book being conveyed adequately. I think that for myself as a reader who, at this point, knows the original book almost inside out, I was disappointed that they didn't use as much of the original text for dialogue as they could have, instead opting to simplify or modernise the language.

I will say the art is beautifully rendered, and I also appreciated that there was a cast of characters list at the beginning you could refer to. I do also think that the art was great at depicting the humour of the original text, while balancing it with the trademark Manga art-style.

I'd recommend this adaptation for a younger audience – tweens and young adults, who are maybe looking to test the waters of adult classic books. I think it's a good way to try a classic, and be introduced to the story, without the barrier of the regency period language that can be a little daunting to new readers at first.

Manga is also a great starting point for reluctant readers, as well as helping to develop visual literacy and critical thinking skills. For those interested, we have a range of Manga Classics available in the library to try, and you can view our entire Manga collection online via our website.



#### **Kuranda Writers Group**

We had an attendance of seven at our meeting this month which included our newest member, seven-week-old Roger. Toni Rogers, was absent, but some of us had seen her at her exhibition, *Travellers Crossing*, at the Tableland Regional Gallery – an inspiring and thought-provoking collection of unique creations.

Eve started us off with an article from *The Guardian* about Jamie Oliver's recent young adult fantasy novel partially set in Australia. *Billy and the Epic Escape* involves a Central Australian Aboriginal girl who can read minds and speak to animals because "that's the indigenous way" and has her using words from the Gamilaraay people of New South Wales and southern Queensland. The issue demonstrated how we live in a time where celebrity often trumps competence. The author, editor and publisher did not conduct even the most basic research for the book they were producing. Jamie Oliver has expressed regret and asked for the book to be withdrawn.

With Christmas fast approaching, Eve brought a couple of children's books that earned admiration and probably a couple of future sales. *The Anatomy Busy Book* is an interactive depiction of the human body in all its glory. *How Do I Feel?* by Rebekah Lipp and Craig Phillips is an illustrated and comprehensive dictionary of emotions.

The discussion turned to our writing goals and the types of feedback (if any) we are each looking for. All writers are unique in their aspirations, and it's important for requested feedback to match and support the intent of the creator. Respect, sensitivity and clear understanding of the author's purpose is vital when offering feedback.

The list of books we are reading is diverse and fascinating. *Revolutionary Psychology* by Samaul Aun Weor, *Still Life* by Sarah Winman, *Horse* and *March* both by Geraldine Brooks, and *Cherrywood* by Jock Serong. Roger and his mum were reading parenting books and *The Humanure Handbook* by Joseph Jenkins.

At 11 o'clock, we observed a minute of silence to mark Remembrance Day (formerly called Armistice Day) – the 11th of the 11th.

Our writing homework this week was to write letters to the editor. Two of the letters will be submitted in this edition of the paper. Although not adhering to the suggested task, inspiration sent a couple of members in different directions with a short story and picture book text

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You never know when you are in for a surprise!

I found a tomato plant in my garden with some small tomatoes. They had an unusual pattern and some parts of the tomato were black.

I have never seen them before. I did not plant them so I thought maybe a bird brought them in a dropping! They tasted really nice so I went surfing the net and found out that they are Black Cherry tomatoes.

I saved some seeds. This is what I did - to get rid of unwanted seed-borne diseases I fermented the seeds. Remove the seeds and pulp. Put in glass jar with some water. Leave for a few days. A foam or crust will form on the surface, indicating that the fermentation has occurred and the surrounding pulp has dissolved. Rinse seeds. Get rid of debris and empty seeds. (Empty seeds float). Spread the wet seeds out on non-stick paper to dry. Leave to dry for a week or so in a shady spot indoors. Don't dry in sun.

Next I did a viability test on these tomato seeds. I planted 10 seeds in a pot. I have learned to always use labels for all the different seeds I sow no matter if it is in pots or directly in the garden. Then I wait. If it is very sunny and windy I water the pot every day. Then the seeds start to germinate and in this case all 10 seeds germinated. So the viability is 100%. If you

sow 10 seeds and 2 germinate your viability is 20%. However, seeds will not germinate if they are sown at the wrong time of the season. Some plants are definitely winter crops and some are definitely summer crops. Some grow all year round. The seed has a memory and knows when the conditions are right for germination. One winter I sowed a row of Rocket. For three weeks nothing happened. I thought I might have sown at wrong time so I sowed a second row of Rocket next to the first row. Another three weeks passed and nothing happened. Then I thought that my seeds were too old. I decided to have one last go and sowed a third row. Two days later the first row of Rocket started to germinate. In the end all three rows germinated. Tell yourself to be patient.

There is a Guiana chestnut tree in the garden, it has just finished flowering. The tree has many names - Water chestnut, Provision tree, French peanut, Malabar chestnut, Mexican fortune tree, Dollar plant and Saba nut. Once the nuts are ready to harvest the pod will drop to the ground and split open. The nuts are yummy to eat fresh and raw as well as fried in the pan. I don't save the seeds/nuts for later planting but plant in a pot straight away. They are fast to germinate. Give it a go, it is great fun.





#### Alternative Communications Post Cyclone Now Available


Following the devastation caused by Cyclone Jasper and its massive rainfall, many parts of the Kuranda area were completely isolated. The restoration of services including internet, telephones, mobile phones and road access took hours or days, placing many residents in real danger in case of life-threatening injuries or other emergencies.

It became clear to many in the community that an alternative communication system was required during this danger period and a number of locals have banded together to implement such a system. The system is based on a radio repeater located at Mt Haren, the highest point in the area, operating in a radio band that is best suited for communications through the local geography and vegetation. The repeater planning allows for it to operate at least four days without mains power.

A number of volunteers have bought radios that can work with the repeater and they will provide a means of communicating for isolated locals in their area. Messages given to these volunteers will be transmitted, via the repeater, to other volunteers outside the immediate area who can pass the messages on to emergency services. These out-of-area volunteers are amateur radio operators who may have normal communications still operating or, through their hobby, have equipment that is capable of contacting amateurs in other parts of the State and can pass on requests for help.

Messages can be passed to the radio volunteers either by visiting them at their residence or calling them on UHF CB Channel 5, the legally designated CB emergency channel.

While emergency messages are the main purpose of the network, personal welfare messages can be sent as a second priority: an example could be a message to concerned relatives out of the area about the condition of locals. The following diagram shows how this network of radios is connected.



Additionally, the Mareeba Shire Council Disaster Centre will have a radio on the network. This will enable them to obtain additional information from the radio volunteers about conditions in their area. As the SES are also represented at the Disaster Centre, relevant information can be passed to them.

While the volunteers will do all possible to provide this assistance they, and the equipment used, are subject to the extreme conditions that occur with a cyclone and no guarantee can be given.

There is a Facebook page, Kuranda Area Communications Network, where additional information is available.

The project has been supported by the RFDS (provision of facilities in their Mt Haren radio hut), Cairns Amateur Radio Club and Tablelands Electronics and Radio Club (members supplying radios and providing communications outside the disaster area), Kuranda Mens Shed (making antennas), Mareeba Shire Council (provision of some hardware) and the Repeater System/ACMA Licence Fees have been provided by local resident, Howard Small.

#### St Saviour's Thought for Christmas

Each year at Christmas I enjoy the Christmas nativity scene and carols, which in their soft familiarity, often allow us to forget the harsh details of the birth of Jesus. In the romantic version Mary smiles, her hair is unruffled. She looks fresh as a daisy, unlike any newly delivered mother. Jesus is silent and still, clean and pink and happy unlike most newborns. But we need to think and imagine a little more accurately about the birth of Jesus.

Joseph would not leave Mary behind, alone to face the shame and difficulties by herself, so he took her with him to Bethlehem. We may want to accuse him for making a young first-time pregnant mother travel such a distance. It's no wonder she had the baby after that kind of trip. Donkeys don't carry evenly, they swing their hips as you ride. It would be a lot more of a roller coaster ride than a ride down the Range on a bus. We can forget all this, the difficulties and obstacles, but St Luke's Gospel brings them into play.

We have a story of a young girl surprised by her pregnancy which would bring shame and dishonour and a puzzled man engaged to be married to her. Mary and Joseph believed, but she must have been afraid and he must have had his doubts.

St Luke's Gospel provides the detail about the census for taxing explains why a couple living in Nazareth had their child in a Bethlehem stable, but it also shows more of their difficulties for the taxes and the census were part of the Roman occupation of Judah. Mary and Joseph belonged to an oppressed people living in an occupied land.

I always imagine Bethlehem as it is today and was when Jesus was born — an overcrowded city, full of rotting garbage, full of people and noise and jostling everywhere. And let's be honest, stables stink. The stable may have been warm but it would have smelled of manure, animal hair and rotting straw. The stable of a busy innkeeper is not spotless, the smoke from the torches; Mary is tired and dirty from a long trip and despite the angel's assurance, she is afraid. Mary has

no midwife, and it is hard to imagine that Joseph attended prenatal classes. So this young mother must give birth in a stable with only the help of an old inexperienced man.

It is our human inclination to soften the dirt and suffering and fear, but we must recognise that Jesus was born into poverty, dirt, homelessness and fear, into a very real world, our world. Jesus was born a wrinkled, bloody baby to a scared young girl in a stable.


The world of our imagined nativity scene needs no redemption, it is perfect already. But Jesus was born into the world we know with all its wonders and with all its hatred, fear, dirt and pain. God so loved the world and God so loves you and me as we are.

But that harsh manger scene is transformed into something warm and sweet by the presence of Jesus himself. We see a stinky stable as something warm and mysterious and wonderful because we see it in the light of Jesus Christ.

If we can see something warm and mysterious and wonderful in the nativity scene, it is by the same light of Jesus Christ that we can see something warm and mysterious and wonderful, and see that God loves us, in ourselves and in one another. My prayer this Christmas is that we might experience something warm, mysterious and wonderful in ourselves, in one another and throughout the entire world.
