They'll be joined by **Bosko & Honey**, local hip hoppers **The Taste** (doing a special uke set) and **Brealyn Sheehan** and her amazing no-strings-music-box-ulele.

Ukulele BBQ Kuranda is co-presented by the Kuranda Amphitheatre and the community ukulele group Honey & Spice, who also prepare the delicious BBQ. 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Mobile Black Spots Erased

THREE new or upgraded mobile base stations will be built in Leichhardt under the Abbott Government's \$100 million Mobile Black Spot Programme, Warren Entsch MP announced recently.

"This is a great outcome for the Far North, with a total of \$2.19 million to be invested on new or improved mobile coverage in the area," said Mr Entsch. "Today's announcement will see 19 mobile black spots in important tourism or industry areas receive coverage."

The three base stations that are new or will be upgraded are at Coen Airport, Darnley Island and Speewah. As a result, new or additional coverage will be provided to all or part of the following locations nominated as black spots, using either a mobile phone or other hand-held device, or with an external antenna attached to a vehicle: Butler Drive Kuranda, Mossman Gorge, Cardinia, Kuranda State Forest, Myola, Coen Airport, Masons Road, Port Douglas, Copperlode Dam, Mona Mona, Speewah, Daintree River Ferry, Mossman, Whyanbeel, Kowrowa, Wonga.

"During the consultation phase, we heard about tourists on the Peninsula Development Road breaking down and not being able to call for help, from horse riders at Kuranda who feared for their safety if there was an accident, from cane farmers in Mossman-Whyanbeel who were isolated and operating heavy machinery yet couldn't communicate back to base, and business owners in Speewah who failed to even get a mobile phone signal in their home office.

"It's very good news that parts or all of these locations will now get better mobile phone reception."

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Skyrail's Nature Diary

Ulysses butterflies are probably the best known of all the butterflies in the Wet Tropics and are used as one of the symbols for the region, together with the cassowary and the fan palm. Both sexes have iridescent blue wings with black edges.

The female is a little larger than the male and has small blue crescents on the black edging of the hind wings. Ulysses butterflies fly higher in the rainforest canopy than any other butterfly and are therefore the most often seen butterfly at Skyrail. Their flight is more akin to that of bird than of butterflies and this fact takes many people by surprise. This butterfly's principal food plants are pink evodia and kerosene wood.

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Gardening in Kuranda with Alectura

ULY, the Winter solstice past and the year half spent. With the unseasonable, recent prolonged rains, careful observation reveals what plants may resent positioning in poorly drained areas and likewise, where some plants may be stressed for lack of watering during this period – too often potted and basket subjects are forgotten.

Patience is a virtue and no more so than in the task of plant breeding. A recent visit to Tropicolor and meeting with its owner Robyn Ganley confirms this truth. With her nursery all but wiped out in Cyclone Yasi, Robyn has been busy replanting her exhibition beds and also producing stunning Crotons and Cordylines from her numerous crossings. Some of Robyn's Croton seedlings, yet to be released, challenge the extravagance and flamboyance of the Thai hybrids and her Cordyline "Colin Campbell" is only one in the stunning range of colours and leaf forms this tireless plant specialist has produced.

As noted in the last month's column, the plants of Viola betonicifolia, possibly subsp. Novaguineensis in the garden bed outside the Red House have failed to thrive and may be as difficult as V. hederacea to cultivate in our neck of the woods. Maybe a reader at a higher altitude on the Tablelands may report success in maintaining either of these as a flowering groundcover.


PLANT OF THE MONTH: Petraeovitex bambusetorum syn. P. wolfei, commonly known as the Nong Nooch Vine is a comparatively recent introduction to the gardening world and has yet to be commercially released in Australia. Hailing from Vietnam and belonging to the Family Lamiaceae (Mint) family, this light vine is grown for its long pendant bright yellowhanging basket display or potted trellised feature. Planted out, it may grow slowly to 6m and takes sun to light shade. As with so many forest vines, it probably does best with its roots shaded.

Reputed seldom to set seed, *P.bambusetorum* is propagated from semihard wood cuttings and requires a good soil mix and regular watering.


P. multiflora, growing on Cape York Peninsula, is the Australian representative of this small group of vines and bears spikes of small white flowers – according to one source, these are scented.

Of easy cultivation, it makes an excellent deterioration, investment in expensive gardening books should be carefully considered, as today the Internet provides so much information. However to answer your question, the golden oldies by E.A. Menninger, Flowering Trees of the World and the Flowering Vines of the World are well worth looking at as is the more recent M. Barwick's Tropical and Subtropical Trees. R.E. Riffle's The Tropical Look is also a very useful addition to the gardener's bookshelf.

The Government Reveals its Big Vision for North Queensland

Tony Abbott and Leichhardt MP Warren Entsch revealed their vision for Northern Australia for the next 20 years in their new newly released Northern Australia White Paper. The White Paper predicts that by then north Australia will have a population of six million and that the region will become a food bowl for Asia supplied from new mega farms. The ministers' vision also includes Cairns soon getting Mr Fung's mega Aquis Casino.

The bulldozing that has just begun of 32,000 hectares of open forest at Olive Vale near Laura, using a pair of huge D11 bulldozers linked by a long chain, is part of this plan for what the Government says is 'sustainable development and innovative new crops for the north'. In the case of Olive Vale the crop is to be forage sorghum for cattle feed and in other areas it will be crops like sugar cane, stock feed and bio-

Olive Vale Clearing Temporarily Halted for a Reassessment

Despite the claims by Senator Warren Entsch that the clearing of 32,000 hectares at Olive Vale was an example of 'sustainable development' and of 'innovative new crops' the clearing has been stopped, after 2,500 hectares have been bulldozed, at the request of Queensland Deputy Premier Jackie Trad so the project can be assessed under the Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act.

The main reasons given for stopping the clearing is that Olive Vale is home to several rare, endangered and vulnerable species and because forage sorghum for cattle feed doesn't qualify as being an innovative new crop. Also another problem with these mega farms is the Gulf of Carpentaria, the Great Barrier Reef and Cape York's river systems may be severely damaged by the added sediment, nutrient and chemical runoff that will be produced.

Auditor General's Report Finds Efforts to Save the Reef Are Likely to Fail

The recently released Queensland Auditor General's report says efforts to repair Reef water quality are unlikely to be successful even after multimillion-dollar programs aimed at the preventing the World Heritage Committee listing the Great Barrier Reef as being 'in danger'.

The report also found 'the grazing and cane industries voluntary and self-assessed schemes – introduced by the previous government to replace regulation – were not achieving changes needed to improve water quality and the government's 'water quality information lacked transparency and was misleading'.

Overall the Auditor General's report finds the current efforts to cut coral-killing run-off from land degradation and over-development have been largely ineffective. This conclusion means that the Govt has been trying to hide from the World Heritage Committee that the Great Barrier Reef really is 'in danger' – possibly to try and avoid the bad publicity that this would bring to Australia. This is confirmed by the latest studies showing that the Reef has lost half its coral cover in the last 30 years.

New JCU Research Finds Turbid Water Impacts on Fisheries

Research just released by Centre of Excellence for Coral Reef Studies at James Cook University have found suspended sediment in water damages fish gills, makes it hard for them to breathe and increases the rate of diseases in fish and is another blow to the Govt's plans for mega developments in the north.

New Study Finds We Are Witnessing the Start of a Mass **Extinction Event**

A new study published in the journal Science Advances found we are currently witnessing the start of a mass extinction event the likes of which have not been seen on Earth for at least 65 million years. The research was designed to determine how human actions over the past 500 years have affected the extinction rates of vertebrates: mammals, fish, birds, reptiles and amphibians.

The fact that Australia is ranked as one of the worst countries in the world for species loss is another reason why the new Queensland Labor government needs to quickly restore strong tree clearing controls as it promised to do and especially considering tree clearing rates in Queensland are now triple what they were in 2009.


Claire said her Kuranda gallery had been operating since 2003, and during this time hundreds of people have passed through as students.



In April, two of our members attended the Kuranda District State College Anzac Day commemoration. Along with a number of representatives from service groups, we placed wreaths at the Commemoration Stone. A choir from the Primary School sang several appropriate songs while the wreath laying progressed. We were impressed with the presentation and College address by both Senior and Junior College Captains. One of the teachers, Sarah Johnson, played the Last Post on a bugle, bringing a lump to one's throat

It was great to see that the students had made their own wreaths for this ceremony. Congratulations to all – both students and teachers who were involved in this activity.



A display cabinet has recently been installed in our hall. At the moment on display are several pieces of QCWA badged china (very Art Deco). The badged ware dates back to the 1930s with the earliest examples being made by Stone's Bristol Pottery of Brisbane. This information came from a State Archives Report. We also discovered the following comments:

During World War II the QCWA undertook patriotic work, often working with the Australian Comforts Fund and the Red Cross, providing such services as mending uniforms and knitting for servicemen, serving refreshments to travelling servicemen, making camouflage nets, and making papier-mâché bowls, basins and splints for military hospitals. Through links with Women's Institutes, food and clothing parcels were dispatched to Britain. Also at this time, in 1942, the first QCWA interest group was formed: the State Handicraft Committee, initially to teach handcrafts to disabled servicemen but soon organising craft activities around the state, including summer schools and displays at conferences.



THE BOOGIE BROTHERS CD REVIEWS

Blake Mills: Heigh Ho



his is one of those albums that you just hate! As a reviewer, that is. It's just too effing good and you know you can't do it justice. How to describe the indescribable? Let's try this: a metamodern, West Coast, Astral Weeks. Just as Van Morrison in a moment of pure genius threw together the timeless classic "Astral Weeks", Blake Mills has cleared the bar with Heigh

Superb guitar playing on all levels, spacings to die for (think Dave Gilmour) some wonder phat double-bass vignettes from Don Wass, and Jim Keltner's oh-so-precise drumming.

The vocals drip with emotion and the lyrics get better with each listening. Try "Don't Tell Your Friends About Me" for a gut-wrencher. Or "Seven", "It's the seventh song on the record that always make me cry..."

The music is such a beautiful mix of bells, organs, guitars, guitarron (?) and more. Brilliant production, continuously surprising, never boring or impudent. Just full. Watch this space, Blake Mills is very special. Oh, and play it loud. You don't want to miss anything.



Chris Tamwoy Ngaw Laag (My Home)

This young man wowed us at Kuranda Roots and had many buying this debut E.P. It's the perfect introduction to his music - a fully realized swag of tracks just brimming with talent. He's in the classic singer/songwriter mold; a man with a guitar, but with something quietly massive and refreshingly real going for him.

Chris Tamwoy is in total control of his instrument. From the double-time

percussive passages on 'Unity to Brothers' to the jazzy funky little intro to 'Ah Da Sor' it's obvious a lot of hard work mixed with creative vision has paid off. It's a unique style of playing: intricate and lyrical, busy but spacious. The big country sea-scapes of his Torres Strait home are effortlessly evoked with island rhythms and yearning vocals.

These are all original songs, with one traditional T.I. hymn, and the instrumentals just sweep you out over a shimmering sunlit sea. The title track allows Mr. Tamwoy's strong sweet voice to beautifully sadden us, even as he soothes our home-sick hearts. Crisp production and some very cool beat boxing courtesy of Tom Thumb round off a solid gold debut. I think we're going to be hearing a lot more from this rising star.








Members Current Exhibitions

Mrs Kenneally's Seeds **Marcia Bird and Pam Kusabs**



Wall Yoga

Can a wall help kids practise yoga? ... OMmm yes!

Using the wall and other yoga props benefit kids by building confidence, strength, balance and relaxation through support. Here's how!

Everyday fear holds us back. It stops us from trying new things or doing our best. In yoga fear comes up frequently. Going upside down can be scary. Trying crow pose for the first time is scary. Wheel pose can bring up feelings of fear. Even relaxation and letting everything go can be a trigger for fear. Often, during relaxation, kids like to lie on their belly or side as they feel vulnerable on their back. But yoga has ways of working through these feelings and one way is by practising with support. In classes we often use props like blocks, wall ropes or bolsters to make poses easier and more comfortable. Using these props can ease feelings of fear when trying a new pose or going upside down. At home we can practise poses by using things around the house. Lounges, chairs, pillows, blankets, belts and walls. These can all make yoga more accessible. The use of props helps get into a deeper stretch while feeling safe and not afraid to fall. Props also help with balance and strength building. If we can't get up into handstand then using a wall will strengthen the muscles while also helping progression in the pose. This gives us more confidence to try a little harder. Children naturally like to show off so will want to attempt things without a safety net. If they hurt themselves they may be too afraid to try again. Introducing poses through props or with the wall can help them practise safely and test their limits without injury. Relaxation can also be done using the wall. By placing the legs up the wall and letting our body relax. This is beneficial for healthy blood circulation. Learning to use gravity to our advantage and props as our support can mean more fun on the mat.





Yoga is very good at releasing tension stored in the muscles, heart and brain. This can be physical tension but also emotional tension. If you are fearful or trying to attempt a pose your body is not ready for, you can hurt yourself and cause problems. Using props will help you safely navigate obstacles as you journey through your practise, physically but also mentally.

Whether you are coming up to an exam period, having your first child, or taking the plunge and buying your first house everyone will experience some form of stress throughout their life.

Short term periods of stress are a normal part of life, however when stress is constant and ongoing (chronic) it impacts the bodies normal functioning and puts pressure on our body systems.

Physiological or biological stress is an organism's response to a stressor such as an environmental condition

Stress is the body's way of reacting to a challenge. When a stressful event occurs, the body will activate the sympathetic nervous system and lead to the fight-or-flight response.

Because the body cannot keep this state for long periods of time, the parasympathetic system returns the body's physiological condition to normal.

Chronic Stress is defined as "a state of prolonged tension from internal or external stressors, which may cause various physical manifestations".

These manifestations can include: asthma, back pain, arrhythmias, hypertension, fatigue, headaches, irritable bowel syndrome, ulcers, memory impairment and suppression of the immune system.

Chronic stress takes a more significant toll on the body than acute stress does.

Chronic stress is seen to also affect the parts of the brain where memories are processed and stored. When people feel stressed, stress hormones get over-secreted, which affects the brain. As these hormones are secreted it will cause a temporary increase in an individual's short term memory but can also have the adverse effect and decrease their ability to form long-term memories.

When a person is under stress it disturbs the body's equilibrium and this can have an adverse effect on the body's immune system.

During times of stress, a hormone called 'cortisol' is released, which regulates the production of cytokines. Cytokines are a broad and loose category of small proteins that are important for cell signalling.

They modulate the balance between antibody and cellbased immune responses.

During chronic stress cortisol is over produced causing fewer receptors to be produced on immune cells so that inflammation cannot be ceased. Because of this mechanism chronic stress can delay wound healing and compromise the immune system.

The body becomes less effective at fighting off infection and becomes more prone to catching virus's and bugs. Physiological stress and psychological stress both have a negative impact on immunity.

Prevention is better than cure

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Magnesium is required in over 300 metabolic reactions in the body and has widespread uses in the body. Studies have indicated that the average adult intake of magnesium sourced from diet alone is below the recommended daily

intake (RDI).

Found mostly in dark green leafy vegetables, nuts and whole grains magnesium is lacking in our daily diets. Magnesium is indicated during times of stress.

When stressed the body moves

magnesium from inside its cells to outside which will ultimately increase excretion of magnesium.

This eventually depletes the body's stores of magnesium. Due to magnesium's wide spread involvement in the body it is not surprising that magnesium deficiency can have multiple symptoms relating to the neuromuscular, cardiovascular and bone and mineral metabolism.

B vitamins are well known for their role in our nervous system and energy production and may assist our body with stress.

In times of stress the body may have an increased

need for B group vitamins as they are depleted from the body. Some B vitamins are important in supporting the adrenal grands, which can be compromised when in stress. B group vitamins are known as water-soluble vitamins, which means they are not stored in the body and the body relies on a continuous supply acquired through food or supple-

R.O.U.S. (Rodents Of Unusual Size) may be a popular line from cult movie *The Princess Bride*, but North Queensland has a few of its own. The most unfortunate thing about our native rodents is their naming by colonial scientists as "rats" or "mice" - thus forever categorising them in modern minds as synonymous with disease, black death, plague and so on. Australia in fact has more than 60 species of indigenous rodents, and only five introduced species.

Probably the largest (up to 1kg) and most common of our local R.O.U.S., the Giant White-Tailed Rat, or to give it its correct name, Giant White-Tailed Uromys (GWTU) is unique to North Queensland. Everyone in Kuranda and the wider Tablelands probably has their own story about the 'pesky' Uromys gnawing through wire, wall or brickwork to gain entry to household culinary treats.

Wildlife carers who have raised orphaned GWTU assert to their endearing nature and intelligence; they report there is no 'soft release' of GWTUs; when they have been raised to maturity and feel the call to go 'back to the wild' they simply chew their way out of their enclosure or cage - no matter what material it's made from.

Reports abound about their ability to open metal food cans, with some even swearing that the GWTU has the ability to differentiate between can contents, leaving cans with unfavoured contents intact and unopened. There are even reports of GWTU's ability to unscrew jar lids!

Despite its limited habitat range, the GWTU is not in any particular danger as it is a very intelligent creature that adapts readily to changing habitat, and its breeding cycle seems to keep up with losses through predation by snakes, raptors, quolls (and the usual domestic pets, and illegal killing by householders).

A nocturnal, solitary and cautious animal, you can probably live in the rainforest for all your life and never see one - only find frustrating evidence of its passing. Despite being an opportunistic household thief, the GWTU prefers to feast upon insects, reptiles, rainforest nuts, seeds and fungi, and if you see fallen pods or nuts under trees in your yard with the centre eaten out, that's a pretty sure bet you have a resident GWTU, nesting in a tree hollow or in an under-log burrow.

Then, on the other hand, there is the GWTU's close relative, the threatened *Uromys hadrourus*, otherwise known as the Masked White-Tailed Rat, or Pygmy White-Tailed Rat, only discovered to exist in the early 1970s. These are found only in a very narrow habitat in far north eastern Queensland, including Kuranda, and habitat clearing and predation are slowly forcing this rodent to extinction; some experts believe that this Uromys is one animal in particular that is highly susceptible to severe decline

with the threat of global warming.

One could devote pages to the diversity of rodents, and perhaps a future article may expand further on the Melomys or native mice. In the meantime, please throw out your rat poisons and lethal traps – the 'rat' you are hunting may be one of our natives. Help your local wildlife, and if you have a 'rat problem' try one of the non-lethal traps available, then relocate.



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The Flies That Don't Bother Us

We are all too familiar with the small bush flies that fuss around our faces and try to mop up moisture from around our eyes and even from our mouths. We seasonally endure the biting March Flies as they attempt to drink our blood. Although this is the classic annoying fly behaviour as we know it, it does not apply to all flies. There are flies that are not in the least bit interested in us humans; their focus lies elsewhere, in their own kind – other invertebrates.

With a robust and powerful body, spiny legs and huge eyes, Robber Flies are predators to be feared in the insect world. Although their name suggests they steal a meal from another insect, they are in fact actually stealing their lives. They will often patrol a territory, keeping a watchful eye for any unsuspecting insect that looks like suitable prey. Their prey consists both of flying and crawling insects, particularly those which live above the ground in leaves and grasses. Once a Robber Fly spots its target, it zooms in and plucks the insect up with its powerful limbs, plunging its needle-like proboscis into its victim. It will then find a safe spot to land and suck the juices out of its meal. Many Robber Flies are active at night, and will often catch a large number of other insects napping. They also feed on invertebrates which are mobile at night such as crickets, cockroaches, beetles and spiders.

Another fly which occurs locally that has little interest in us is the Hairy Maggot Blowfly, *Chrysomya rufifacies*. Blowflies are a very familiar group of flies, and most people have experienced them at a barbecue or in the less pleasant company of a dead animal – irresistible to blowflies. You would think that being the first to a dead carcass would be the best thing in the world for a blowie, but not in this case. The Hairy Maggot Blowfly arrives later once all the other blowfly maggots are already at work. Its maggots then go to work attacking and feeding upon the other maggots. In many ways this species is actually beneficial to us in reducing the number of 'primary' blowflies, and also helps to reduce the incidence of fly strike on sheep.

Some flies will attack other insects in more subtle ways. Their method is not classed as predation, but as parasitism. Many species of parasitic flies have a specific target species known as a host. They usually have some sneaky way of getting their eggs onto the host without the host knowing or being able to do anything about it. Their larvae then go to work, usually eating the least important internal organs first so that their host lives as long as possible, providing them with a nutritious food source. Once they have had their fill (or when the host dies due to the damage) they leave the body and pupate in the ground. I have personally witnessed a large stick insect drop dead and several large well-fed parasitic fly maggots crawl out of the body.

With thousands of species of flies, there are of course many that are interested in pestering us and other vertebrate animals, but in the scheme of things much of their continual 'warring' takes place within their own invertebrate world.

Water Usage in Kuranda

MAREEBA SHIRE COUNCIL MAYOR TOM GILMORE has appealed to Kuranda residents to curb their water usage during the period beginning in late August 2015. due to maintenance works on the Kuranda Weir. The Barron River level will be at an extreme low and there won't be sufficient water available to supply the water treatment plant.

"Stanwell periodically undertakes planned maintenance on its power generation assets. The upcoming works will see maintenance activity at both Kuranda Weir and Barron Gorge Power station. Increased traffic for short periods may occur along Barron Gorge Road," Mayor Tom Gilmore said.

The power station will run at full capacity over 48 hours to drain the water stored in Kuranda Weir. This water will then exit the power station and continue down the Barron River. It is estimated that the weir will take two days to refill to levels appropriate for users to draw water and approximately 1.5 weeks to refill to capacity.

Following the dewater process all water intake into the power station will cease to allow for necessary maintenance works to be carried out on the penstock (the pipe that carries water from Kuranda Weir to the power station). During this time the power station will not be in operation.

"With the Weir maintenance works, we need to ensure that the reservoirs are at its maximum capacity so we can utilise this water when we need it most. During the Weir maintenance period watering by means of an open tap is not permitted," Cr Gilmore said.

Cr Gilmore said there are a number of ways residents can be water wise in the home, business and garden.

Ways in which water may be better used are:

- Use water for essential purposes only
- · Water plants only, as grass will lay dormant and bounce back after the first
- Use a broom to clean pathways rather than the hose.

It is estimated the maintenance will be carried out between 24th August and 25th September 2015. More specific information regarding exact dates will be provided by the power station closer to the time. Council will post the dates on the Website as well as inform the Media.

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Inside My Studio

Art, at its simplest, is a form of communication and is a diverse range of human activities usually involving imaginative and technical skill. It may be characterised in terms of expression, communication of emotion, or other qualities. Local Kuranda fashion designer and musician, **Leah Kelly** combines all these aspects in her daily life and when asked about the definition of her chosen medium, Leah answered "Art". Leah's art is not an action or an object, but an internal appreciation of balance and

harmony (beauty). Art provides Leah with a way to express and experience her 'self'. Her music emphasises beauty and enjoyment. For example, music's capacity to express emotion has been a central issue. Leah Kelly's fashion garments adhere strictly to her ecologically and sustainability principles, using only natural fibres such as silk and hemp in her garments and fine cotton lace. Leah's art is a discipline.

Where is your current studio?

My studio is at my home in the rainforest approximately 15 kilometres from Kuranda. 4WD access is required and there is no electricity connected apart from solar and my generator which I require for my power tools and iron. My pole home is very open and the upstairs is my studio – one massive birdcage with a magnificent view of Black Mountain. The studio is relatively new as I previously used my stall at the Original Markets, but the Markets is a very social place and I had too many interruptions on market days to work seriously.

Do you work alone or with others?

I always sew and design alone. I have had the support of many local talented women to assist me on my journey which also allows them to grow in their field as well. Heather Miller has been my magnificent photographer, Laura Woody my gorgeous No.1 model, and Jo Martin my website designer. At my 'Stall 30' (previously Earth Connections) at the Original Markets, I share with my stall partner who trades under the name of 'Hidden Echidna'.

What are the essential features your studio has to have?

I require natural light, work benches, cutting tables and dry shelving for storage of fabrics. I guess my 4WD is essential as some local clients come to my studio but they cannot get up my drive and I am required to meet them and drive them up to the house.

Describe your work pattern – hours/days/weeks.

I don't have days off. I work seven days a week with all my various commitments. I require a lot of preparation and research time with my designs and I cannot sew once the natural light goes, so I do what can be done during the day. As I am also heavily involved in music, I start that side of my life at night. I have family responsibilities which take my time too.

Describe the works you do in your studio.

I design, I cut, create, I write a lot and I photograph as I go especially when I am placing shells and crystals on a gown...and I sew. I dye my own fabrics when required and embellish the garments with embroidery threads, mainly silk and hemp, to create different textures. I use a lot of natural beads, in particular peridot and rose quartz to enhance the natural aspects of my designs.

Why is 'Art' your chosen medium?

From a very early age I collected shells and rocks. My Grandmother taught me to sew and embroider, always by hand, and my love of this medium has continued

through my life. I advanced to a University degree in Environmental Health and I have carried these natural health principles into my work with my choice of natural fibre fabrics. I stand by my ideals of being ecologically and creatively sustainable. Music has always been part of my life, I play piano and guitar, so I combine all these aspects, everything I love, into my work – 'Art' from every angle.

List three things you listen to while working.

I listen a lot to the recordings of our own groups in which I play; 'Secret Tuesdays' with Odette Gorman and Trish Molloy; and 'Gudji Gudji'—I learnt the language over 20 years ago and I have been performing with them ever since. I also listen to Etta James, Frank Sinatra and I love 'big band' music. Music is an essential part of my life, having a musician as a father, who jammed along side of Tommy Emanuel and the Bee Gees. I was always going to festivals and gigs. My uncle was one of the cofounders of the Tamworth Country Music Festival.

Your favourite tool?

My favourites would be the extremely fine crochet hooks my Grandmother gave me. She died at 98 years so they are very special to me. I also have a small port, similar to one which you would take to pre-school, in which I keep my crochet hooks and needles. I would also have to put my piano on my list. I have had it over 10 years but it is well over 90 years old and certainly needs some work now. I bought an electric keyboard as it is more portable to move to and from gigs.

How do you identify your work?

On my handmade garments I use my calico label with my logo. My daughter drew it – a stylistic tree with the needle and cotton expressing the stitching 'coming from the heart'. I scanned the drawing and had it printed.

How do you sell your work?

I have a website and sell from the net, at exhibitions, my 'Stall 30' at the Original Markets in Kuranda village, and by word of mouth. I have had good publicity over the years and that has assisted.

Do you teach or sell from your studio?

I teach, in fact, I have taught many adult women to sew. I always aim to be an inspiration to any designer and encourage many to stand by their products and not sell out by getting their designs manufactured overseas.

Do you have any other paid or unpaid work?

Our 'Secret Tuesdays' group write our own music and we perform at festivals and events around the region. 'Gudji Gudji' play at corporate functions, festivals and rallies. Our group numbers have varied over the years but there is usually 6-8 of us. I am an Arts Facilitator with a Mareeba Shire Council program CAFÉ Arts Project 2 working with our local community artists of all ages. Our bus shelter projects have been featured in the Kuranda Paper.

If you could change one thing about your studio what would that be?

I would love to upgrade the solar system to provide better lighting in my studio. I would also upgrade my four sewing machines. Artists can always do with more of everything but I would be quite content to just have more power.

If you were not working with visual art what would you be doing?

I would like to ride again. My totem for 'Gudji Gudji' is 'Yarraman Horse'. I would just take off anywhere, just ride. I am attracted to mountains and deserts.




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PROFILE The Mundanas and Nepal




This month we profile Marion and Ekkehart Mundana and look at their many activities, including in Nepal. They recently had a function at the Kuranda Recreation Centre, which many locals attended. It raised \$3500 for the Friends of the Himalayan Children to rebuild Nepal, and there was a fundraising Benefit Concert at Fogarty Park on Sunday 28th June.

Marion comes from Tasmania, where she was raised and schooled, completing her BA and DipEd there. She had two daughters. Ekkehart came from Hamelin in Germany. He immigrated to Australia with his first wife in 1988 and did his DipEd in Tasmania, concentrating on music. He then taught in Tasmania. They met and married there and had two daughters, making a family of six.

From Tasmania, they moved to teach in Tennant Creek for two years. Then in 2000 they all came to Cairns. Marion and Ekkehart had various teaching positions in the Cairns region. In 2003 they bought their present property in Kuranda and moved up. In 2007 they began teaching in Kuranda. Ekkehart is still teaching here in music and some other subjects. He plays piano, guitar and some other instruments. For two years he was coordinator of the REACH program, supporting the arts in Tablelands schools. Marion lost her left eye in an accident in 2010 and had to give up that work. She completed a Masters of Education degree at QUT.

More recently they have travelled extensively overseas. In 2013 they arrived in Nepal for the first time and were greatly attracted to the place. Two of their daughters had previously become involved in the charitable organisation Friends of Himalayan Children (FHC) which works in the region of Batase Village north east of Kathmandu, and which has a representative Som Tamang in Cairns. So the parents also became involved. Marion has begun a Graduate Certificate in Applied Research with a view to beginning a PhD in Education. They both also did an English as a Second Language course, all with a view to assisting further in Nepal. Batase Village,

along with much else of Nepal, has more recently been destroyed by the severe earthquake, so the need is now even greater for assistance.

Ekkehart is about to take leave from teaching so that they both can go back to Nepal, all the daughters now having left home. They have an invitation to assist with an educational development program in Astam Village near Pokhara in the west, as well as helping with FHC in the east. They wish to consult with the community about needs, write an educational program consistent with the Nepalese curriculum, as well as a devising a teacher training and trainer training program. They see teacher training in situ as the most important element, including use of the internet in education.

In Batase there is also an urgent need for material assistance because of the earthquake destruction. This remedial work is already under way, funded by FHC,

> using volunteers, including a nurse from Cairns. Food, tents and other essential materials have been supplied and the school (under tent/tarp shelters) has re-opened. More permanent construction is being planned and will follow. But many more remote villages nearby are stranded and cannot yet be assisted. It is a long term task. We wish the Mundanas well.


> Philosophically the Mundanas feel they are on a spiritual path that guides their educational and general approach. This is particularly appropriate in Nepal which is greatly influenced by Hinduism and Buddhism. Both of them use meditation and practice yoga. They believe in giving back to the community and in contributing through service. They believe that all religions have the same core teachings centred around a formless concept that is beyond mere words, and that merger in this spiritual 'nothingness' is the ultimate goal in life.

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

A History of Kuranda Rail by Ivana Andacic

The workers on the Kuranda Scenic Railway were known as 'Navvies'. Navvies are a shortened version of the word Navigator, used to describe the workers on major civil engineering projects. At one stage, 1500 navvies, mainly Irish and Italian, were involved in the project. During construction, 'navvy camps' were built at every tunnel and cutting. Accommodation, hotels and even churches were temporarily built on small ledges and cliff faces. Even comparatively



narrow ledges supported stores - some even catering for the men's need for groceries and clothes. townships thrived at Number 3 Tunnel, Stoney Creek, Glacier Rock, Camp Oven Creek and Rainbow Creek. Kamerunga, at the foot of the range, boasted no fewer than five hotels.


Courtesy Cairns Historical Society Mrs Dillon formerly Mary Ann Ward recalls her childhood growing up near Tunnel 10. "We had a bark house made with big sheets of bark for the roof and sides. It had an earth floor but they stretched hessian over it and pegged it down tight. Of course it was dusty, so




mother would save all the tea leaves, scatter them on the floor to pick up the dust, then would sweep it out. She had a little hand sewing machine and used to make mats with small pieces of material. Of course, she made all our own clothes, too, as there was no other way getting them except when she went in to Cairns, which was very seldom. Cooking was done on an open fire with big hooks for the kettle and a large tin for boiling corned beef. Bread and buns were cooked in a camp oven. To keep the butter cool, a hole was dug in the ground and a wet bag was placed at the bottom of the hole. Our usual food on the railway construction was delivered by the butcher, and scrub turkeys that were plentiful and that Dad had shot. Then we had gardens and grew potatoes and pumpkins, and we bought blue peas. Once a month, families travelled on a privilege ticket by train to Cairns for supplies"


Earthworks proved particularly difficult during the construction of the Second Section of the line - Redlynch to Kuranda. The deep cutting and extensive embankments that were removed totaled a volume of just over 2.3million cubic metres of earthworks. The Barron Valley earth was especially treacherous. Slopes averaged 45° and the entire surface was covered with 4.6-7.6 metre layer of disjointed rock, rotting vegetation, mould and soil.





On January 21st 1887, John Robb's tender of \$580,188 was accepted for Section Two. He and his men tackled the jungle and mountains not with bulldozers, jackhammers and other modern equipment, but with strategy, fortitude, hand tools, dynamite, buckets and bare hands. Great escarpments were removed from the mountains above the line and every loose rock and overhanging tree had to be removed by hand. It was during this type of work that the first fatal accident occurred. At Beard's Cutting, a man named Gavin Hamilton stood on the wrong side of a log as it was being rolled in a fire, and was killed.

Seedlings:


We have a fresh supply of seedlings back at KNC – please drop in and have a look at the range. Punnets are \$1 each.

Travelling With Pets

AUSTRALIA has one of the highest rates of pet ownership in the world and most Aussie pets are considered an integral part of the family. As such it seems only natural that pets regularly travel in the family car and even join us on our annual vacation. However there are various laws in Australia



governing transportation of animals in vehicles, so it's a good idea to plan ahead and research the road rules relevant to the states you will be visiting. While some states issue hefty fines for unrestrained pets, especially for dogs travelling on the back of utes, Queensland road rules do not specifically require an animal to be restrained while travelling inside a vehicle. According to the Department of Transport and Main Roads, "You must not drive unless you have proper control of the vehicle and must not drive a vehicle with an animal in your lap. While there is no legal requirement to restrain an animal that is travelling inside a vehicle, we recommend that all animals should be restrained in some way for the safety and welfare of the animal and all occupants of the vehicle."

There are several options to make sure your furry, scaly or feathered friend doesn't become a projectile if you have to stop suddenly. A robust carrier or crate secured to the car seat with a seat belt is a great option. Alternatively, dogs can be harnessed into special 'doggie' seat belts or separated by cargo barriers. It's best not to feed your pet a large amount of food and water prior to travelling. A small meal given two hours before departure is adequate and of course provide fresh water and food during breaks in the journey. A note of advice: Please don't leave your pet in a stationary vehicle, even with the windows down. A car can get hot even in a cool, shaded position as the sun and clouds can move quickly. The last thing you want is to find out that a quick visit to the shops has cost you your pet's life. Each year the RSPCA receives over 1000 distress calls relating to animals being left in hot cars. As the RSPCA points out: "You could lose your best mate in just six minutes."

If you're like us and go as far as flying your pets interstate to join you on your holiday, both Qantas and Virgin have special pressurised cargo areas for pets. Under a certain weight you can fly your special friend as checked baggage. While pricing is dependent on the weight of the animal, they do have to be housed in an approved airline container. We are hiring ours from 'Dogtainers'. Airline travel has come a long way. Working in the 'dog boarding industry', I see lots of pooches arriving from interstate in mint condition. I have never received a stressed or anxious canine yet, which is very reassuring for owners. Vets and airlines don't recommend that you drug your pet prior to flying, however I have administered homeopathic 'Rescue Remedy' with great success. According to the Flight Centre, Advice on Travelling with Pets, tiring your dog out before a flight is recommended, so they just sleep on their journey. Giving them a comforter, such as an old shirt with your smell on it is also a good idea. Most importantly stay calm. If you are calm your pet will pick up on it. What is Freemasonry?

At the conclusion of Part 6 it was indicated the next article would cover what is there after the third degree and Freemasonry in the wide world. As the writer has just returned from three months in the U.K. it was felt to be more opportune to cover freemasonry in the wide world, leaving side degrees to next month.

As already indicated over the last six articles once a Freemason, it will be possible for him to visit other Masonic Lodges throughout the universe with a warm welcome

being experienced. Fourteen Masonic visits were undertaken by the writer during the time of his U.K. visit. Various ceremonies were experienced plus an installation of a new Master, carried out by a brother who was brought into Freemasonry by the writer, and therefore carried a deep degree of personal interest.

All these ceremonies were in the same format as the Australian Masonic ritual, however, although the ritual was the same, variations took place which to the first time visitor would create tremendous interest, as he appreciates the work undertaken by the officers of the Lodge which differ from his mother lodge. In the Cairns area once a Lodge meeting has finished the festive board is composed of plates of various delights prepared by the Mason or his wife.

In England the festive board after the ceremony is a four course meal with coffee. Every Lodge has its own bar offering every type of liquid refreshment from water

to bottles of wine plus spirits and liqueurs to cover every taste. Every care must be taken in the amount of intoxicants consumed as drink driving laws apply, as in Australia.

It is often found that whilst the husband/partner is at a lodge meeting his wife/partner has joined the other females for an evening together either at a restaurant, a theatre presentation, or alternative items of interest to them. The writer requested Mary one of the U.K. wives to write an article on being a Freemason's partner, which she writes to you as follows.

"I have been involved with freemasonry over most of my life as my father along with many male members of his family were masons getting to very high ranks in the various Provinces and Grand Lodge. When father appeared dressed up, along with his little brown case, Mother would say there he goes off to play school again and give a little laugh. Some Saturday nights he and she would go out in full evening dress to

attend a Masonic Dinner and dance in celebration of an event of some significance.

"Father had the pleasure of initiating my husband and watched him progress through the offices, unfortunately father passed away before he reached the chair. Now my husband is the secretary of his craft lodge and his Royal Arch Chapter lodge, this results in our telephone ringing many times a week and I find myself taking messages of various degrees of importance. The charity work they are all

involved in takes a considerable amount of their time, it is fortunate that many of them are retired. This also involves us wives as we carry out a lot of the support work and food preparation for various events. In doing this we meet many people from various walks of life who have many interesting stories to tell, and their appreciation of the work the Masons are doing to support their particular need.

"Recently my husband and I received a request from a Mason who lived a long, long way, away to keep in touch with a couple of very mature years who lived locally to us. The wife was in need of support in the way of a person to talk to as her husband was starting to suddenly get up and go out walking for no obvious reason, and be away for two or three hours at a time. Apparently he would have no means of identification, or money on him, she herself was very frail and in no way could she hurry after him to find out his intentions. The couple had no family whatsoever

to call on for support, and had been very insular all their married life of some 60 years, resulting in no close friends either that she could talk to. Though this couple were not Masons, we are only to happy to undertake this support watch duty and advise our fellow Mason of the situations that happen. You will no doubt realise it is a pleasure and an honour to be able to give support to my husband and the various challenges that come a masons way in his care for the community. Hoping you have all enjoyed this little insight. Mary."

A Golf Course in Kuranda?

Who would have thought there was once a golf course in Kuranda! As astonishing as this news sounds, it is true. The evidence shows that Kuranda had a golf course for a short time. What became of this facility seems to be a mystery – reports of the golf course appeared in The Cairns Post from April 1928 until July 1930, after which there was no mention. On 14 April 1928 an article appeared:

GOLF IN THE FAR NORTH

Kuranda comes into its own

By W.G. Last

The next time Tom Southcombe and I foregather he is going to get a talking to. What do you think of a man who goes to Kuranda, and sets out the sweetest little golf course you can well imagine, and says never a word about it?

It was sheer curiosity that sent me poking around to find out why Kuranda has not added a golf links to the many attractions, such a feature being so necessary an adjunct of any up to date tourist resort in these regenerate days, and then a native casually informs me that he believed Mr. Southcombe had set out a links on Mr. Duggan's place. The new links are encircled by the Maze, and are only a drive and a brassie from the railway station.

If you holed out in Mr. Duggan's garden it would be a bogey five, but the Barron River would constitute a water hazard to your tee shot. A two minute walk from the railway station, and you step into the boat that is always in attendance. One minute in the boat, with another five minute stroll through a pretty winding path, and you are at the first tee.

Doubtless before the month is out Fitzpatrick's bridge will be finished, and then you can go that way to the links. Incidentally, one may mention that there appears to be an excellent opportunity for a motor car to ply for hire at Kuranda.

DESCRIPTION OF LINKS

To begin the description of the new links, all Northern golfers will be delighted to learn the "lies" will be of the choicest description, the turf throughout being buffalo couch, and the ball sits up on it looking as big as an orange. Mr. Duggan has pledged himself to throw the links open to the public on the first of June next, and there is no reason to doubt that he will keep his word.

The official opening will take place in conjunction with a carnival to which all golfers will be invited, on a date that will not interfere with the programmes of any of the other clubs. The green fees for visitors will be 2/6 per day. A pleasant feature of the place is the fact that although Kuranda is generally speaking rather hilly, there will be no Alpine climbing at the new course. There are a few steps upward at the third tee, but all golfers who go there will agree that the effort is well worth while. Otherwise the land resembles gently rolling downs.

The first hole will be about 430 yards – bogey five. A lovely tee shot, slightly downhill, lands the ball on an area of even turf, and if you do not drive more than 230 yards you can go straight for the flag. A second good wood reaches the green, but you must carry an inhospitable looking gulley with a creek in it. If you are timid play your second to the right, and you can still get bogey. The second is an innocent little mashie niblick pitch of about 80 yards, on to a delightful cup-like green. It will teach you all to keep your heads down, for the least deviation from the line will mean trouble. Bogey three – but there will be lots of eights and tens.

The third is a gem. The high tee dominates the links, and you drive across a verdant gully with a dear little creek at the bottom. The dear little creek will doubtless be called other names as the days go by. If you get your tee shot away your second should reach the pin, but standing scrub menaces you on the left the whole way. The length is about 400 yards or a bit more – bogey four.

The fourth is slightly dog-legged, with the scrub still trying to trap you on the left. A 200 yard drive opens out the green, and a mashie shot of about 130 yards reaches the flag; but for the love of Mike do not overpitch or hook, or you will not do bogey four. Simple addition makes the length of the hole 330 yards.

The fifth is a bobby dazzler. The tee is on the flat top of a ridge, and the green is on the top of another one, dead level with the first, but between the two is a great gulf fixed. A straight 200 yards smack should about reach the green, but a merciful committee will probably make bogey four. If you have hit a straight ball you have no climbing to do, but just walk around the rim of the abyss to the green. A topped ball will be easy to find, but hard on the wind. It must be mentioned that the slightest deviation to the left of the line will land the ball in the orchard, and out of bounds. The puller and slicer should make allowances.

The sixth is just free hitting to a green about 300 yards away, across delightful turf, and the eighth comes back roughly parallel with it, but in this case the line will need careful picking. Both of them are bogey four.

The seventh is a trappy mashie shot over a bunker, with a little gully to worry you if out on the left. Bogev three.

The ninth, as at present designed, is another mashie over a corner of the orchard. You step out a few yards to the right to see the flag, and then if you do not keep your head down you bang the ball into a row of banana trees. A soothing little hole to the man who uses a lofted club with dexterity, but one of the societies should station a missionary permanently at the sliprails.

DELIGHTFUL SURROUNDINGS

The surroundings of the links are delightful, and it is safe to predict that the new course will be highly popular both with tourists and northerners.

During my visit I had the very great pleasure of attending a meeting at which the Kuranda Golf Club was formed. Certainly no golf club was ever formed under happier auspices, for with Mr. Duggan doing all the work, the club escapes all the expenses that all the other clubs in the district have had to face. Inspired with a true spirit of local patriotism, Mr. Duggan is only charging local members 1/- green fee for Saturdays or Sundays, and is allowing them to practice gratis for nothing on week day evenings. Consequently the club have been able to fix the annual subscription at one guinea for men and half that amount for ladies, with 10/6 and 5/- for honorary members. With such encouragement it will be surprising if the people of Kuranda do not follow the example of the residents of Ravenshoe and "all" join the golf club.



Budget: The 2015-16 Council Budget was adopted on June 3. This is a solid budget, built on very small rate rise with no major increases in fees and charges. The long term financial plan is sustainable and the MSC position is solid. Reserves and debt levels are in a healthy position. This has not come easily. Council has spent the past 18 months refining and reviewing almost every aspect of Council services and operations and has already significantly reduced costs and improved efficiency. This has been necessary as MSC is now a relatively small local Council. We have also been fortunate to receive significant government grant funding during the past year. Currently there is a dispute over de-amalgamation funds; however this is quite separate to Council's current balanced Budget.

Recycling Option: Over the next few weeks, property owners will receive letters offering them the option of a fortnightly kerbside recycling service at their property. This service will be optional and it will incur a small cost. The letters will be mailed to the Property Owner, not the resident; if you are a renter, you will need to contact your landlord. For a kerbside recycling service to be viable, there will need to be a significant number of people taking up the option. The current recycling bins at the Kuranda and Julatten Transfer Stations will continue to operate as normal. Recycling waste is taken to Cairns for processing. Ideally, recycling will one day become standard practice, rather than an optional service.

Northern Australian White Paper: With the release of the Northern Australia White Paper, there are opportunities of further federal funds coming into this area. The development of the Mareeba Airport as a regional aviation hub is one of the projects high on Council's economic development agenda.

Community Precinct: Plans and Budget have been approved and the Builders will commence work very soon. The new Library and Service Centre will open later this year.

Signage: Recently you may have seen some new signs around the Kuranda Village. Please notice the 15 minute time limits, the Disabled Parking and the Loading Bay near the Post Office. Council is also updating signs on its facilities throughout the Shire. If you notice any signs with the former logos, please let us know.

Bus Stops Kuranda and Koah: A Bus Shelter is currently being constructed on the Highway near the Resort. Another Bus Shelter will be constructed later this year near the Koah Service Station. The funding is part of a government program.

Ravenshoe appeal: The terrible tragedy at the Ravenshoe Cafe has touched us all. This small community is incredibly strong but has been deeply affected. Many people are donating to appeals. Council itself has donated \$10,000. GIVIT is managing all donations of goods, services and money. GIVIT's website is www.givit.org.au

Koah Community BBQ Sunday 19th July: All Koah residents are invited to come along to the Koah Hall at 5.00pm for the AGM and re-establishment of the Hall operations. There will be a community BBQ also. This is a great facility and everyone is welcome. (Bring the kids too).

Re-development of Therwine Street: After a lot of consultation with the local community and businesses, the final plans for the redevelopment of Therwine Street are now on display. Works are expected to commence later this year.

Speewah Residents Assoc: Another well attended meeting was held recently. The next meeting is on Monday 7 September at 6.00pm at RosCommon. The new 60m NBN tower is expected to be commenced this month. We are still waiting to hear if Speewah was successful in the submission to the federal government for funding for Black Spot Mobile Coverage.

Speewah Bridge: Design work and load testing is well underway and the construction should commence by August-September. During the construction period, the access will remain open. The federal government will fund half the cost of the new bridge.

CAFE Project: Thanks to the work of Kuranda youth, Gail Betts, Sheila Brim and others, the Bus Shelters around Kuranda are now beautiful and loved works of art. Congrats to all involved!

Wheelie Bins: Reminder to only one bin per property (unless you opt to pay for additional bins) and please make sure the bin is not overfilled. There has been a "grace" period; however the contractors will no longer be collecting incorrect bins. The transfer Station is open 4 days a week.

Customer Requests system: If you have a complaint or request for Council action, you can easily and quickly log this. Call 1300 308 461 (both MSC Reception and Urgent After/Hours Service) or email info@msc.qld.gov.au. You are also welcome to contact any of your Councillors who may be able to assist.

Council Meetings: Council Meetings are held on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of each month, usually in Mareeba, however meetings are in other areas from time to time. Meetings are public meetings and anyone is welcome to attend.

 $\label{lem:condition} June \ was \ another \ exceedingly \ busy \ month \ which \ saw \ the \ passing \ of \ new \ industrial$ relations laws. The Parliamentary Finance and Administration Committee, on which I am a member, spent many hours examining the legislation and taking submissions and it was very satisfying to see the Bill passed.

Thank you to the people who alerted me to the incorrect positioning of a

guard rail in the middle of the cycle lane at the Smithfield roundabout. A quick call to the local office of the Department of Transport and Main Roads resulted in a crew being despatched and the guardrail being repositioned within hours (pictured before and after).

Thanks also to the members of the Kowrowa community who brought to my attention their concerns that the quality of the water supply had become poor with brown tainted water.

I contacted my parliamentary colleague Hon. Leeanne Enoch, the Minister for Housing and Public Works, to get this addressed as quickly as possible and within a couple of days the Department arranged for a contractor to attend the community to take samples for water quality testing, as well as to service both the bore and the header tank. In addition, the Department is also arranging for a full chemical clean of the bore to be undertaken as soon as possible.

Machans Beach State School will be alive to the sounds of ukuleles. At a recent visit to the school it was mentioned that

they would like some ukuleles so I donated 25 – hopefully the school can take out some titles at the next Cairns Ukulele Festival!

I spent half a day in the electorate with the Hon. Mark Bailey, Minister for Main Roads, Road Safety, Ports, Energy and Water Supply. We visited boat ramps at Bluewater and Yorkeys Knob where he spoke to boat owners about some minor problems which he has asked the Department to address.

I also showed the Minister the shabby and overgrown state of the Henry Ross Lookout on the Kuranda Range which is frequented by hundreds of tourists each day. He agreed that the Lookout needs to be upgraded and has asked the Department to look at options.

There are many other issues that have occurred in the last month such as the installation of more flashing school zone signs, another successful Festival of the Knob, more than \$3 million to improve safety for motorcyclists on the Captain Cook Highway, the opening of new blocks at St Andrews College and my cooking of about 700 sausages at the Trinity Beach SS Fete – but unfortunately space does

THERE ARE STIRRINGS IN THE UNDERGROWTH

The photo at right (courtesy Lorraine Harris: flickr.com/photos/aussiegypsy) is of "Dad", a well-known local bird. We've compared this with a photo captured on one of our motion sensitive cameras and it shows there is another bird out there (Black Mountain Road). "Dad" has been seen recently mating with his mate of many years, so he's definitely in the mood. Is this another female seeking him out?

We may soon have better insight into who's who. We are supporting a uni Masters student who is investigating a GPS tagging method and will be undertaking some of his study at one of our research areas.

His method is not invasive, involving the cassowaries swallowing a tiny GPS device in their food. The device will stay in the bird for 8-16 hours, where it can be tracked by satellite, before it



appears in its scat. It can then be retrieved and used again. This will give some insight into the movements of the birds over short distances. It will also help us identify the birds we don't know so much about in the area.

Ravenshoe Recovery

The second meeting of the Ravenshoe Café Explosion Recovery committee, held on Wednesday 24 June in the Ravenshoe Town Hall, established an independent Appeal Distribution Committee responsible for the governance and allocation of funds raised through the official fundraising platform – the GIVIT Ravenshoe Appeal.

Recovery Committee Chair, TRC Councillor Shaaron Linwood said the Appeals Distribution Committee will ensure the Ravenshoe Appeal funds will be distributed in a fair and transparent manner. The funds will be used to meet the immediate needs of those directly impacted by the café explosion but the majority of funds will be spent on the recovery process for those severely injured once they are discharged from hospital for their ongoing support and rehabilitation.

"It is imperative that the long-term needs of those significantly affected are taken into consideration when allocating funds as their recovery may take months, and in some cases, years," said Cr Linwood.

So far over \$250,000 has been raised through the GIVIT Ravenshoe Appeal with \$15,000 of financial and material support already being received by those directly impacted and their carers.

"Donations are getting to the intended recipients and those in hospital are receiving high quality care," reassured Cr Linwood.

Queensland Health and other government agencies are meeting the immediate needs of the injured and their families.

GIVIT is working directly with the Ravenshoe Community Centre and social workers at both Cairns and Royal Brisbane Hospitals to ensure the patients and their carers' immediate needs, beyond what government agencies can provide under normal policies and procedures, are met.

Families have been provided with pre-paid Master cards to meet their immediate out of pocket expenses as well as personal care packages, fuel and food vouchers.

"100% of the funds raised will be used to support the injured. GIVIT has also been distributing the generous donations provided by the general public and corporates.

"Corporate donations have included lights and iPads with pre-paid SIM cards to facilitate communication between family members away from home," confirmed Sarah Tennant, GIVIT General Manager Disaster Recovery.

The Appeals Distribution committee will meet monthly. It is chaired by Lyndal Scobell from the Australian Red Cross, with members including TRC CEO Ian Church, Department of Communities Executive Regional Director Michael Linnan, Accountant Kath Scully, GIVIT Chairman Greg Goebel and Director of Nursing Herberton Hospital Deanne Hellsten.

Yellow Crazy Ant Community Taskforce Kuranda

First Activity Report

In June 20 volunteers turned up for what is to be an annual delimitation activity. They set out with cat food and jam ant-lures and walked in pairs 50 meters out from the YCA infestation boundary (previously determined by Wet Tropics Management Authority), placing the lures every 5 meters. After repeating this process for 40 minutes they returned to the beginning, checked the lures and collected the data.

Positives and negatives were recorded on GPS units and later uploaded to maps, showing a distinct line across the landscape identifying the boundary of the YCA infestation. Areas that were not reached were

followed up and completed by WTMA and their Green Army field team.

The monitoring activity involves setting up pitfall traps to collect ants and so determine YCA density

along a 50m transect. The cups are then collected a week later and a count of YCA in each pitfall trap over time determines the effectiveness of treatments. This monitoring activity will be repeated after the June baiting treatment.

Results from the weekend showed that the YCA infestation has not extended much further than the original 27 hectare infestation area, which means the containment work that WTMA has been doing for 18 months has been successful. However, some impacted areas in Russet Park have no other native ants, lizards, frogs or invertebrates left at all and the YCA are still extremely abundant within the total area, especially along the banks of the Barron River. This is scary. The concern is that YCA could raft off during the next wet season and, if a queen is amongst them, start new colonies downstream.

WTMA Eradication Program will fund baiting treatments until late 2016 but is unlikely to achieve eradication. The Eradication Program has a limited number of operations staff, making residential area baiting treatments time consuming, taking up to four weeks to treat Russet Park. For

effective eradication it is essential to conduct the baiting treatments in a shorter space of time which is why a community taskforce is needed in Kuranda, to assist with treatments, delimitation and

monitoring.

More people are needed on the ground, resulting in a much more effective impact on YCA life cycles and therefore populations, especially along the banks of the Barron and creek-lines.

PLANT OF THE MONTH

Pleiogynium timorense – Burdekin Plum

This semi-deciduous tree can naturally reach up to 20m but in cultivation generally grows to approximately 12m. It has a dense

canopy with glossy dark green leaves, rough dark bark and yellowish-green flowers between January and March. Its edible fruit have

usually plum coloured flesh, however, white varieties have been reported.

Fruit must be removed from the tree to ripen for several days in a dark, damp place. Aboriginals are known to have buried the fruit underground

to ripen. Fruit can be cooked, eaten raw or used in jellies, jams and preserves.

The species occurs in Indonesia, Malaysia, Papua New Guinea,

the Philippines, Queensland, the Cook Islands, Fiji, the Solomons and Tonga.

A Thought for July

THIS month we read from St Mark's Gospel chapter 4 verses 35-41. Notice something in this month's reading. Whenever Jesus begins to speak in the scriptures about the kingdom of God, we may be sure of two things. What he is saying will sound very simple. Its images will be very familiar. We will think we understand it. But if we reflect on it in our minds, we will find a surprising thing happen. What he has said will vield more and more meaning to us.

In the passage Jesus image is once again simple. The kingdom is "as if a man should scatter seed upon the ground." Jesus points out how human participation in the process of nature is very largely one of spectator. This man sows at the beginning and reaps at the end of the process. In between those times the rhythm of life goes by. Jesus seems to be saying that there is much of the stuff of life which is not in our control. It demands our cooperation. It demands that we wait on the process. That is very true.

These days we are more involved in the processes of nature sometimes disastrously so, as we well know! But we again have to learn that if we intrude too much, if we insist on manipulating and directing the process, refusing, to wait on nature's time and pace and ways, we will bring real disaster. There are many levels of meaning in what Jesus says, but perhaps this is the level at which the scripture speaks most directly to us at this time.

The next image Jesus uses to speak about the ways of God is that of the mustard seed. He wants to get across to us something we see coming true again and again. It's a kind of a joke life plays. We begin something. It is pitiably small. We smile at the possibility of it ever becoming significant, but time teaches us otherwise. A chance remark dropped in a conversation remains in someone's consciousness. Quietly it begins to affect their life until there is a very different person. A few people in an area begin to meet for prayer or Bible study or worship. Nobody thinks anything of it. Then the group begins to grow, and one day there is a congregation of Christians. Very often we can become discouraged about some Christian service we are doing. Clergy can have doubts. An RE teacher can wonder if his or her efforts are making the slightest difference. Parents can lack confidence,

wondering why they seem to be abject failures with their children. And years later someone says thanks for a single afternoon, a fleeting encounter, a slight exchange of conversation, forgotten insight shared. The mustard seed is suddenly seen to have become a great tree beneath which another human being, maybe many, have sheltered and been given resources for living.

We constantly forget that God comes in little things to which we accord no significance at the time.




