### Dear Kuranda Paper,

I am writing to update patients on the recent developments at Kuranda Medical Service. Many things have happened in the past few months. The most significant has been the sale of the practice management rights to a company called IPN — Independent Practitioner Network. IPN run approximately 120 medical practices around Australia, now including Kuranda & Redlynch. They have responsibility for administration & business services, leaving patient care to the doctors. The four senior doctors at the practice; Drs Dave Cuming, Charles McCaldin, Julia Watters & Helen Pedgrift plan to remain at the practice, Dr Cuming has recently signed a contract with IPN to remain at the practice for another five years.

Dr Aileen Underhill, our much loved GP Registrar, will finish her allotted twelve month attachment in January and be replaced from Jan to July 2009 by a Dr. Sian Edwards who in turn will be replaced July 2009 to Jan 2010 by Dr. Anna Seth. These doctors are all completing a GP training program and Kuranda Medical Practice, as an approved training practice, is privileged to have them work here.

Dr. Manju Bhargava left permanently earlier in the year to move closer to her family in Melbourne with Dr. Helen Pedgrift moving from the UK to take her place. Dr. Helen has been a fantastic addition to our team of GPs and I believe that the practice is now settling in to its most stable period in the eight years I have worked in Kuranda.

We are considering a building extension to accommodate a larger indigenous health unit but this is presently only in the planning stage.

Many thanks to all our patients for their ongoing support.

### Dear Kuranda Paper,

Despite Tom Gilmore's claims in the last Kuranda paper, in the Mareeba area – including Kuranda- plastic, aluminium, steel and glass from kerbside collections end up in landfill. These are not recycled.

According to the environment officer Lee of the CEC Resource Recovery Facility in Portsmith, the recycling plant there will extract as much glass and metal as possible. But the materials are then contaminated because they are mixed with one another, which means that no recycling company will touch them. So they still end up in landfill.

The solution appears to be separating those materials before they reach Portsmith. But due to our low population density in FNQ, most recycling is transported to Brisbane and worse then much of it on to China for processing.

Also very few companies can process broken glass and any glass we separate out for recycling is likely to be broken by the time it reaches Brisbane. So glass also goes into landfill whether it is collected separately or not.

So how environmental is recycling up in FNQ when you offset reclaiming the materials against the energy of transporting them to the place where they are finally processed?

My conclusion is to avoid buying packaged stuff as much as possible and reuse containers before

retiring them. Stockpiling them here as a future investment, until they can be processed in the north is a thought too.

# Robberies on the Railway

There would be no place more unlikely to expect a robbery than on a train or railmotor travelling up the Kuranda Range Railway. However, this is exactly what happened. And it didn't happen just once – there have been two "train" robberies on the Kuranda Range Railway over the years. Even more intriguing is that the two robberies occurred at almost the same time of the year, but forty years apart. Queensland Railways has also been robbed of payrolls in the Cairns district on three other occasions over the years.

The first robbery on the Kuranda Range Railway occurred on the night of 16 November 1933. On this occasion thieves broke into three boxcars by wrecking the padlocks on the doors. They ransacked 45 mailbags, tipping the contents onto the floor. Authorities had difficulties in establishing what was taken because the mail from all bags was mixed together. The thieves were probably looking for registered articles and envelopes containing money. It was established that the robbers looted the wagons between Redlynch and Stony Creek. The robbery was discovered at Stony Creek when the guard noticed that the locks on the wagon doors were broken. One passenger told police that he saw two men board a timber wagon as the train left Redlynch. The robbery has never been solved.

Forty years later, on 6 December 1973, two armed men robbed a railway payroll from the Cairns – Ravenshoe railmotor. The railmotor was proceeding up the range when the driver, Ron Barter, saw a large rock in the middle of the track near number six tunnel. He also saw a chain padlocked around the line. When Clive Adby, the guard, left the motor to check the blockage, two men confronted him. They were both

dressed in black with black crash helmets and dark glasses.

Bankin Mareeba. As they entered the railway yards they were held up by two men wearing crash helmets and

One of the robbers entered the railmotor and told the paymaster to give him the paybox. The paymaster obeyed, throwing the paybox out of the door. The robber left the motor but soon returned. He pointed a shotgun at the paymaster and demanded the second paybox, which was chained to the handbreak in the rear luggage compartment. When the robber asked for the key he was told that there was none on the railmotor. He then shot the padlock off with three blasts from the shotgun. Another shot was fired through the bulkhead between the luggage compartment and the passenger compartment. Presumably this was to frighten the passengers into submission and deter any retaliation.

While the robbery was in progress the other bandit padlocked a chain around some wheels of the railmotor. The robbers then took the boxes and disappeared down a drain and into the forest. Railway officials said one box contained \$6,255.29, and the other \$1,075.67. The money was for wages for railway workers between Cairns and Tolga.

The driver had to walk two miles to Stony Creek to raise the alarm. Police immediately set up roadblocks and checked possible escape routes, such as the airport. They suspected that the perpetrators were professionals. "They knew what to do, how to do it, and when to do it". Like the previous range robbery, the thieves were never caught.

Another two railway payroll robberies occurred on the same day in 1978, although there was no connection between the two incidents. The first occurred at about 10.00 a.m. when two railway workers picked up a \$17.489 payroll from the Commonwealth

Bank in Mareeba. As they entered the railway yards they were held up by two men wearing crash helmets and armed with a sawn-off rifle. The robbers grabbed the payroll and escaped on a motorcycle. The motorcycle was later found abandoned near Walkamin. Police said the vehicle was stolen from Townsville. This time the police were more successful with the investigation, and the perpetrators were caught and convicted.

At the same time as this robbery occurred a train carrying another payroll was on its way to Forsayth. When the train reached Almaden the stationmaster took the pay for that area out of a steel box chained to the floor. The box also held the pays for railway workers further up the line. There was a long wait at Almaden while the line ahead was repaired. When the train reached Bullock Creek the lock could not be opened to pay the workers there. The train went on to Fossilbrook, where a cold chisel was used to open the box. The payroll of \$12,000 was gone. Again no perpetrator was found.

The Railway Department suffered another loss on the Forsayth line in August 1981. When the weekly train reached Almaden the stationmaster went into the train to retrieve the pay box, which was now carried in a different wagon each trip for safety. When he was checking through the mailbags he found the pay box with the lock smashed off. The \$28,000 payroll was missing.

Railway officials stated that they had their suspicions about the identity of the thieves on the Forsayth line. However, with insufficient evidence to bring charges they were reluctant to make their suspicions public. The evidence pointed to "inside knowledge", but the robberies still remain unsolved.

### **DOUGLAS TRACK RE-OPENS**

On the 4th of November, Barron River MP Steve Wettenhall officially reopened the popular Douglas Track walking trail linking Kamerunga to Speewah through Barron Gorge National Park following completion of a rail overpass and elevated stairway providing safe crossing of the Kuranda rail line.

"The project has been a commendable cooperative effort between EPA and Queensland Rail and has had to be designed, engineered and constructed to overcome steep and unstable slopes" said Mr Wettenhall.

The track was closed in 2001 following safety concerns after several near miss incidents between walkers and railway service vehicles where it crossed the Kuranda rail line. Negotiation between Q Rail and EPA identified the need to provide appropriate safety for both walkers and trains as the risk of slope instability became an added consideration.

The \$190,000 project included construction of an overpass bridge to cross the rail line, an elevated stairway to connect the bridge to the track over unstable ground, and an upgrade to the track itself. It was undertaken as a joint venture between EPA and QRail and was completed in September this year.

Mr Wettenhall said "the Douglas track is a popular recreational facility as it is close to Cairns and links into a network of walking tracks in Barron Gorge NP. It is a 7 kilometre walk from Kamerunga at the bottom of the range to Speewah Conservation Park on top of the range behind Kuranda, passing through Barron Gorge NP for most of its length".

"Expanding opportunities for people, whether locals or tourists, to experience our parks is one of my priorities so I am delighted this major track infrastructure project has been completed" said Mr

Wettenhall.

# Cairns Region Could Become a Model for Sustainability

**CAST** (Cairns Action for Sustainable Transport) is a small community group from diverse backgrounds which has formed earlier this year to do something about the lack of public and sustainable transport in our region.

CAST has made a major submission to the 20 billion Infrastructure Australia fund asking for significant funding to turn the Cairns region into a model for sustainability, which was well supported by local politicians.

Cast has asked Infrastructure Australia for funding towards the 120MW Archer Point windfarm, a 100 to 500MW solar thermal base-load power station on the western Tablelands, a Cairns sustainable public transport system based on tram trains, the Cairns Southern Rail Tunnel to Mareeba and an Australia wide very fast electric rail network powered by renewable energy. The last two projects would use regenerative braking and allow vehicles and even B-doubles to drive on/off.

### **Garden Jottings - Alectura**



ecember here and another year ends with the blaze and glory of flowering trees and the first of the storms, heralds to the Wet, upon us. The ready gardener, like

the wise virgins, laying in not oil but mulches will be preparing their gardens to prevent soil compaction and washouts. Time to make the garden and surrounds safe during the cyclone season, removing old palm fronds and taking down or out branches and trees threatening structures and property egress in a big blow.

Check water features for mosquito larvae ideally stock with native fish species - but the humble guppy will also do - making sure that these cannot be carried into streams with any overflow. Note what garden features such as hanging baskets, furniture and such may become airborne and plan to secure.

The large Ginger family and Heliconias may be divided and planted out to secure maximum growth in the increasing hot and humid conditions. Remember that many Heliconias resent poor drainage, quickly rotting off from small divisions. Remember too that several of the Heliconias, particularly the dwarf "Jamaican Red" are delicacies to Bush turkeys so protection may be necessary.



lant of the Month: Medinilla magnifica. (Melastomataceae) One of the gems of this large family with over 400 species ranging from Africa, South East Asia, China through to the

Phillipines. With its long panicles of neon pink bracts and flowers, this is a most desirable shrub and, when well grown, is a stunner. With its large deep green leaves with prominent white centre rib, it may reach to 2m+. There appears some confusion between M. magnifica and M. myriantha, the latter readily available and sometimes passed off as magnifica. M. myriantha has a smaller leaf with less prominent rib and bears numerous hanging pink flowers but without the stunning bracts. Many Medinillas are semi to fully epiphytic giving clue to M. magnifica's need for partial shade and very open, humus rich and well drained soil conditions, although moisture must be present. It also makes a great potted feature plant. An increasing number of Medinillas are becoming available. Medinilla Scortechinii, with upright coral flowering spikes, is frequently offered at the Flecker plant sales and other treasures available at specialist growers. Many of the epiphytic species make excellent hanging baskets while a number have semi-climbing habit. Certainly a family of plants that should be snapped up when available as many have flowers of exquisite beauty. (Photographs on Page 18)

**Dear Brenda**, The brown frond forwarded for identification is the sterile frond of a "basket fern" probably Drynaria rigidula, fairly common in the area and the spore has probably blown in on the wind, germinating in your palm tree. The Basket Fern grows in a large clump, and has two quite different frond types. The lower 'nest' fronds, are short, papery, brown and shaped like an oakleaf. The green, more erect fronds may be up to 2 m in length and are segmented into many blunttoothed leaflets on short stalks. Of the easiest cultivation, reduced to bare basket over winter and putting out their green fertile fronds with the return of warmer weather and rains. These ferns can make very large baskets with several large specimens on branches in the figs, Coondoo Street. **Dear Clarke**, The tree in flower outside the Fire Station is Brachychiton acerifolia. In good years the entire tree is covered with its clusters of red bells on bare branches while other years, flowering is sporadic. To 10m+, young plants respond well to frequent deep watering and while preferring partial shade will tolerate full sun. A very memorable native tree suitable for most gardens.

Dear Pauline, The very tall, single trunk feathered crowned trees with yellow flowers growing north of Cairns on the main highway are probably Schizolobium parahybum (S. excelsum). Hailing from tropical Mexico, these extremely fast growing trees to 30m+ are grown from seed. Very handsome when small, caution should be exercised in placement as they are extremely brittle, easily breaking in strong winds and fallen leaf stems and seed pods are a nuisance.

**Dear David**, The stunning pale blue flowered plant seen at a recent open garden is Calathea burle-marxii 'Blue Ice' (Marantaceae). Of easy cultivation, coming from tropical South America, the plant requires dappled light, although will take some early morning sun. To 1m, it requires good moisture and will easily flag on hot dry days. Easily propagated in sand from the "knee" joints where

flower spikes have died off.

all your hopes and dreams blossom and grow and may the Bush Turkey, Orange Footed Scrub Fowl, Bandicoot, and other range of temperatures and the range may be wide sundry chewers, nibblers and spoilers for some species, narrow for others. Plants survive leave relatively unspoilt the fruits of your toil.

### **Basic Plant Requirements**

Will that new plant thrive in my garden? Many factors determine whether or not a plant will perform well with each kind of plant having its own needs and requirements. Some plants are tolerant of a wide variety of conditions, while others have very exacting requirements. Here are some of the basic environmental factors that influence plant growth:

**Daylength** is one of the most critical factor regulating vegetative growth, flower initiation and development and the induction of dormancy. Plants utilize daylength as a cue to promote their growth in spring and prepare for the cold weather. Many plants require specific daylength conditions to initiate flowers.

**Light** is the energy source for plants. Cloudy, rainy days or the shade cast can significantly reduce the amount of light available. Shade adapted plants cannot Season and may 2009 see tolerate the bright light of full sun. Plants survive only where the amount is within their toleration range.


> Plants grow best within an optimum only where temperatures allow them to carry on lifesustaining chemical reactions.

> Plants differ in their ability to survive **cold temperatures**. Some tropical plants are injured by temperatures below 15°C. Arctic species can tolerate temperatures well below zero. The ability of a plant to withstand cold is a function of the degree of dormancy present in the plant, its water status, and general health. Exposure to wind and bright sunlight or rapidly changing temperatures can also compromise a plant's cold tolerance.

> Heat tolerance varies widely from **species to species**. Many plants that naturally grow in arid tropical regions are naturally very heat tolerant, while subarctic plants and alpine plants show very little tolerance for heat. High night temperatures are often the most limiting factor for many plants.

> Different plants have different water **needs.** Some tolerate drought during the summer but need winter rains. Others need a consistent supply of moisture to grow well. Careful attention to the need for supplemental water can help select plants that need a minimum of water to perform well. With poorly drained, chronically wet soil select plants that naturally grow in bogs and other wet places.

The ability of plant roots to take up certain nutrients depends on the pH, which is a measure of the acidity or alkalinity of your soil. Most plants grow best in soils that have a pH near 7.0. Most ericaceous plants such as azaleas need acid soils with pH below 6.0 to grow well. Lime can be used to raise pH and materials containing sulfates such as aluminum sulfate and iron sulfate to lower pH. The solubility of many trace elements is controlled by pH, and only the soluble forms of these important micronutrients can be used by plants. Iron is not very soluble at high pH and iron chlorosis is often present in high-pH soils.

# KURANDA ARTS OPERATINE

A number of the Co-op's artists have recently returned from their 'sabbaticals' and new inspirations and influences are already appearing in works currently showing in the gallery.

Judith Corrighan, print maker, returned from the most incredible tour of many of the major cities and museums in Greece. She is now better acquainted with Greek mythology and its archetypes. Judith received instruction on the evolving sculptural styles of representing the human body from Archaic times to 5th century BCE. As an architect Judith was most interested in the current styles of living, including buildings, sculptures, handicrafts, and exquisite jewellery and embroideries. Judith said that generally, in Greece, the artist enjoys the clarity of the atmospheric light, and the shades of silver grey of the rocky landscape, but above all was the colour of the sea, ranging from clear sapphire to the densest inky indigo. Judith's new prints are going to be hugely influenced by these colours and designs.

Toni Rogers, fibre artist, attended Fibres Aotearoa at Whitireia College on the Kapiti Coast of New Zealand. Using a variety of new weaving techniques Toni was able to explore woven, stitched, pieced and assembled craft pieces with wires, linens and soft fibres. Toni stuck to her usual 'found objects', many from the seashore, as both altered art and the base for woven forms. Rocks, pods, bark, and small sticks became an intricate part of Toni's work encouraging creativity, process and a new individual direction. There are some new pieces in the Co-op gallery now.

Mollie Bosworth, ceramicist, certainly expanded her knowledge during her recent visit to China. She was disappointed, however, to see many of the old traditions were dying out and that the huge dragon kilns traditionally used by Chinese artisans could no

longer be sustained and were proving to no longer be efficient. Mollie also visited a number of formal Chinese gardens, taking in the artistic use of rocks, bonsai and pebble paths. Mollie has recommenced her very popular pottery classes in her studio on Wednesdays. Call the Co-op gallery if you are interested in joining in next year.



### **A Thought for Christmas**

Three children playing the part of the wise men in the Christmas story brought their gifts. The first walked up to the crib and said loudly – 'Here is a bag of gold.' The second one said, 'There's some myrrh for you.' The third one said, 'And Frank sent this.'

The Christmas story is one which all of us, whether young or old, only ever understand a little. Christmas is meant to be enjoyed. It is a time of good news. It is about God showing us how much we loved as human beings. It is a time for us to show to others how much we love them. And when we do this, in some small way we show something of how we love God.

Christmas is God's way of showing us that he loves us without conditions. Yet in a funny kind of way we think that the only way we can be loved by God is if we please God in some way or another. I like the story of the angel walking down the street carrying a burning torch of fire in one hand, and a bucket of water in the other. A woman asked, 'What are you going to do with the torch and the bucket?' ### THOUGHT OF THE MONTH FROM THE BAHA'I FAITH

# RATS AREN'T ALL BAD

Most people come to the Atherton loved rats! I've had rats as pets rablelands for its climate and spectacular scenery. I came here to study rats, Giant Whitetailed Rats that is. Most of you are probably wondering why. The truth is: I have always seemed to come naturally

loved rats! I've had rats as pets and found them to be incredibly smart animals. I became a biologist and studying rodents seemed to come naturally and I became aware of their incredibly important role in the health of most ecosystems on Earth. The Giant White-tailed Rat is a very good example of this, as it plays a crucial role in the dynamics of the rainforests in the Wet Tropics.

As some of you probably know from experience, the Giant White-tailed Rat is one of Australia's largest rodents, weighing up to 900 g. It is considered mainly an inhabitant of tropical rainforests and closed sclerophyll forests from just

south of Townsville to the tip of Cape York. It is a generalist feeder with very good climbing skills, allowing it to forage on trees as well as on the ground. Its diet includes fruits, nuts, fungi, insects, small reptiles, amphibians, crustaceans and bird eggs. It possesses extremely strong jaws and has a powerful biteforce that enable it to chew through tin cans and coconuts, or cars, as some of you have had the misfortune of discovering. Being both an important predator and prey, and its ability to disperse large seeds in the rainforest too big for other animals to carry, make it a key player in the functioning of our



rainforests.

To study them I have to go out and trap them. I have several sites that I go to on a regular basis and there I have developed a very special relationship with the rainforest and its inhabitants. I know most of the White-tailed Rats that live there, and I get to see the forest in a way very few people do. I see its daily and seasonal cycles, I get to know those who live there and experience the true beauty of the rainforest.

**The Village** ~ Arriving in the village was like stepping through a door that you always felt existed somewhere. Depending on the depth of freedom that you had been exposed to in your life; for those who had experienced only the shallow end of the fountain of joy it was sometimes overwhelming. The stunned looks in their eyes betrayed the pleasure within that rose like steam from the forest in the early morning sun.

For even the hardiest of travellers the journey up the mountain by rail or motorcar was an immense joy in itself, and then to arrive in the verdant jungle town, smaller than a city suburb, infested by market stalls and bazaars from end to end, offering the plunder that journeyers revel in, was a fantastic experience. It was as far removed from normality as the dreams of a hashish fiend are from the clear light of truth in the golden dawn.

Set among high forested hills, its small size belied the impact it delivered. The green foliage of the tropical rainforest glistening in the early morning sun under whispy cotton clouds or shrouded in the early morning mist was a splendid background to the arrangement of cafes and markets and parkland. Colourful butterflies and birds of all colours and sizes darted through the greenery in the early hours finding sustanence in the rich humidity and dissappearing into the shadows as the sun rose

Strange and exotic species of humans inhabited the surrounds. Secreted in the forest in pole homes and clinging to the hills like jungle vines or the giant ficus that grew for a thousand years. Some like Hobbit Homes that had grown organically over many years. Some of bright metal resisting the mighty jaws of the termite and some traditional farm dwellings surrounded by ponds and dams; all combining to create a generic heartland reminding travellers of their own childhood or that of their grandparents or just some long lost dream.


As the first visitors arrived for the day, just before the madding crowd spilled from the train that climbed along the precipitous slopes and serpintine track up the mountain gorge, past the waterfalls and ancient forest, the shops threw open their shutters and the smell of fresh baked goods and the aroma of coffee and cakes and candy spilled onto the streets.


All these elements combined to overload the jaded senses of the seekers who had travelled across the world on the promise of a place that might be in some way different from their ordinary existence. And now with the feast calling who would not imbibe of the sumptuous offerings of food and souvenirs, of memories to be consumed and repeated at a later date to folks back home?

"The station was a biological museum, an archive of tropical splendiferous plantlife, ferns, fronds and flowers flourishing among philedendrons in fertile soil from the forest creating a flowing mass of foliage that few had seen before and fewer knew the names of, but everyone wanted to photograph".

The streets were like the streets of villages aged by milleniums of visitors, voyagers, and travellers, "There were saints and sinners, freaks and ferals, artists and environmentalists, bankers and lawyers, chemists and architects, players and drifters, losers and winners all kinds of folks you might like to meet". It was, for a few hours each day, a snapshot of humanity, an artist's delight for images to be painted, sculptured or written about in some fashion. And they were there to experience the joy and pleasure of the unique environment as if the site were sacred or a place where the thin veil between the real world and the 'other' was so thin that glimpses might somehow seep through.

Through the day the miracle happened, the hungry were fed, the weary were invigorated, the senses were appeased, spontaneous laughter splashed the streets, bargains were sought and found, children were lost and recovered, strange items were wrapped for cartage to distant shores and weary legs carried their sated passengers back to their coaches, cars, trains, bikes and balloons to be carried off to other destinations, seeking, seeking, seeking. *To be continued...*



# Tablelands Regional Council

### News Briefs

Tablelands Regional Councillors are working on a list of infrastructure that could be improved under the Federal Government's \$300 million program to build local community infrastructure. The Council received \$1.3 million under the program, announced by Prime Minister Kevin Rudd at this week's inaugural meeting of the Australian Council of Local Government.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said the grant was a welcome boost to the region which would share in the difficult times being experienced nation-wide due to the global market downturn. "The Council thanks the Rudd Labor Government for taking this action to further boost our capacity to meet urgent needs in our communities and create long-term infrastructure," Cr Gilmore said.

Cr Gilmore said the Councillors had been asked to develop possible projects. "We are working to a very short timeframe, with projects to be delivered by September next year, so we need to move as quickly as possible," Cr Gilmore said. He said it was premature to highlight specific projects that would be funded under the grant until the Council had an opportunity to consider it at a meeting.

The Tablelands Regional Council will celebrate tree planting day across the region on 7 December. Mayor Tom Gilmore said the Council had decided to move the region's celebration of National Tree Planting Day from July to a more appropriate date later in the year to take advantage of the wet season.

"Council has resolved to invite the public to a tree-planting day at Platypus Park near Atherton which is a site that has been identified as in need of some attention," Cr Gilmore said. "The community is welcome to come along and plant a tree which will be sourced from the Council's revegetation unit at Malanda and private nurseries, if required. Some councillors will also use the opportunity to plant individual trees at sites in their divisions."

Aged housing on the Tablelands will be targeted under a funding submission to the State Government. Tablelands Regional Council Mayor Tom Gilmore said the Council would seek funding to provide additional one-bedroom units in high need locations across the region. "There is currently a high demand for affordable accommodation for seniors in the region, with residents looking for more Council

managed aged accommodation," Cr Gilmore said. "If future use. funding is approved we will look at specific locations where suitable Council land is available."

Tablelands Regional Council has offered a lifeline to the region's peak tourism body. Tropical Tablelands Tourism (TTT) asked the Council to provide more funding to help the organisation continue to operate.

Mayor Tom Gilmore said the Council agreed to provide an additional \$17,500 to the organisation. "This brings the Council's contributions to TTT in line with the total contributions of the former shires," Cr Gilmore said. "It is addition to the \$36,000 in funding the Council provided to TTT in the 2008-09 Budget.'

Cr Gilmore said the Council was a strong supporter of tourism on the Tablelands. "Council funds a network of visitor information centres to the tune of \$500,000, and these play a vital role in attracting visitors to our region," Cr Gilmore said. "Council recognises the important role the industry plays in the overall economic development of the region and is looking forward to building a stronger partnership with TTT.

**Tablelands Regional Council has signed** off on more than \$27,000 in financial and inkind support to various community groups and organisation. Mayor Tom Gilmore said the applications made for the period from 22 October to 11 November included sporting groups wanting assistance to upgrade facilities, to assist with the staging of Christmas celebrations and events and revegetation work.

Tablelands Regional Council reaffirmed its commitment to work towards using the old Kuranda Primary School site as a community centre by establishing an advisory committee. Division 8 Cr Jenny Jensen said the Council had received a good cross section of interest from the community for membership of the committee which would advise Council on the future use of the site.

"Council has endorsed the make-up of the committee which will comprise Linda Snart, Ken Harley, Chris Martin and Gerald Hobbler," Cr Jensen

The former Mareeba Shire Council purchased the site earlier this year to provide community facilities in the Kuranda area. In early October, the Council held a public meeting in Kuranda to update the community on the status of the site and receive feedback on its

At this week's Council meeting, the Council was presented with a proposal by the Candlenut Steiner School to purchase the site.

Cr Jensen said it was premature for Council to consider any proposals for the long-term use of the site until further consultation was carried out with the advisory committee.

More than 12,000 people walked through the doors of the Tablelands Regional Council-funded visitor information centres **during October**. The figure (12373 total) is more than that for the same time last year.

Tablelands Regional Council Mayor Tom Gilmore said the Council funded its network of VICs to the tune of \$500,000. "Many of them have a dual role, in that they are also museums and heritage centres, and also have a large involvement with various community groups," Cr Gilmore said.

The year-to-date figures show 119,338 people have visited the VICs in 2008.

A new skills-based committee will be established in Kuranda to advise the Tablelands Regional Council on how monies raised from an infrastructure levy will be spent. The Kuranda Tourist Infrastructure Levy is collected from tourists, through Kuranda Rail and Skyrail, and used to maintain the character of Kuranda and conserve its natural environment predominantly for the benefit of

Division 8 Councillor Jenny Jensen said the new committee would include a broader representation of skills from the tourism, business, professional and community sectors as well as traditional owners and specific urban/streetscape design skills.

"Council acknowledges the efforts of past committee members and thanks them for the time and resources they offered," Cr Jensen said.

Cr Jensen said several infrastructure projects previously identified to be funded would now be able to be progressed following final endorsement by the State Government.

These include Stage One of the upgrade of Therwine Street, from Coondoo Street to Thoree Street; Stage Two of the Thoree Street to Honey House Markets; an upgrade to the new toilet block at Barron Falls carpark; an upgrade of Wright's Lookout; construction of a walking track by Barron Falls Road and improvements to lighting in Coondoo Street.

**Sport and Recreation:** In late September Council agreed to a review of the Sport and Recreation needs of the region and the development of a new Sport and Rec Plan for the TRC. Community consultation is expected to begin early next year.

Grants for Community Groups: As mentioned in previous articles, Council sponsors small grants of financial and in-kind support to clubs and organisations within our local communities throughout the region. If your club or organisation is an incorporated body, you are eligible to apply for a grant from TRC. Council has set aside a healthy budget allocation to assist community groups and I encourage groups to make application. Each grant is not large, but can certainly assist clubs and groups. Information is available by contacting Council or me.

Congratulations: Congratulations to Yvonne Dighton of the Kuranda QCWA who recently placed second in the State Finals of the QCWA Country Woman of the Year competition. Also to Kuranda Envirocare and the recent launch of the Riverlinks Greencorps Team project which will involve various community groups - Kowrowa community, Kuranda District College, Green Corridor, Chamber of Commerce, Council weed control and QPWS.

Christmas Closure of TRC Council Offices: During the period from Christmas to New Year, Council services will be reduced due to Christmas closure. However, waste collection services will still operate and staff will be available for emergency repairs etc. Please look for the ads in the Tablelands Papers as the full details will be outlined a little closer to the time.

Meetings this month: During December, Council Meetings will be held at Mareeba (Dec 3rd ) and Atherton (Dec 17th). These meetings are open to the public and agendas and minutes are available on the TRC website www. trc.qld.gov.au.

# Dining and Wining in **India**

Alongside the road, sometimes in the middle of nowhere it seems, there is a man and his home, under a tree, surrounded by all his possessions. His charpov bed, a stack of banana leaves, an area where buffalo dung is drying in the sun and his clay stove. Buffalo pats are burning under his stove giving off a quite pleasant musty sweet smell, and combined with this is the delicious smell of chapati and dhal that the man is cooking on top of the stove. When cooled, this is dished up on a banana leaf and I sit on the charpoy bed and with fingers of my right hand I break and tear off pieces of the chapatti and fold them, one at a time, into small triangular cups which I scoop into the dhal and eat them. Delicious! When finished my banana leaf is given to a buffalo.

The wining is completely different. To begin with it is definitely not wine! This is in the back streets of Bombay. No street lights and very dark. The setting is an isosceles triangle. The base of the triangle is a dirty brick wall, and the two equal sides are formed by two large trucks that have backed up to the brick wall. They have left just enough room at the apex for a single person to pass through. The gap is guarded by two burly Indians. I'm let through and walk to the brick wall to join groups of Indians standing in groups. I join a group and glasses are placed in our hands. Later a man arrives with a toy balloon full of liquid which he pours into our glasses, half filling them, and then quickly stuffs the empty balloon into his pocket. Our glasses are then topped up with Pepsi-Cola. And we drink!







### MERRY CHRISTMAS TO THE KURANDA COMMUNITY Please do your best to keep yourselves safe- see below CYCLONE PREPARATIONS

The Kuranda Tourist Information Centre, Neighbourhood Centre, and Branch Library and Council Office have available for you, copies of a Cyclone Tracking Map, a brochure Preparing for Cyclones and fridge magnets Flood Storm Emergency 132 500. Just so you are aware, if after hours, water is flooding down your street from a burst main, or your local road is blocked by a fallen tree, the Tablelands Regional Council, Mareeba Regional Office, After Hours Emergency number 0408 770 171 should be your first call. Both the Cyclone Tracking Map and the brochure Preparing for Cyclones provide excellent advice, but ultimately Everyone is responsible for their own safety.

If you know that your home could be unsafe in strong winds, you need to identify a safe place to evacuate to (a friend or relative's home perhaps) and you need to move there before the winds are too strong. Evacuations are only ordered if storm surge or flooding is likely and to my knowledge not in sparsely populated river valleys such as our area. Residents likely to be threatened by flooding need to make use of local knowledge and evacuate to higher ground (by previous arrangement to homes with family or friends) before their lives are threatened.

# Community thanks Cairns Port Authority

On Friday, November 14, Barron Catchment Care joined with its project partners to celebrate the three year anniversary of the Green Corridor Project, and to thank what was formerly the Cairns Port Authority for its generous support over the last three years.

The Cairns Port Authority (now divided into Cairns Ports and Cairns Airport in the lead up to the airport sale) has contributed \$750,000 in cash to this project since its inception in November 2005. This has enabled significant progress to be made towards its goal of rehabilitating the entire length of the Barron River and represents historic corporate investment in the health and well-being of our Wet Tropics environment.

To date, 55 hectares have been rehabilitated along the Barron, and almost 65,000 trees planted and maintained. Thousands of volunteers have participated in plantings, and around a dozen local community members have received employment in natural resources through their involvement in Green Corp and TAFE partnership programs. As well as enhancing water quality and the health of the Great Barrier Reef, riparian rehabilitation has provided habitat corridors for native wildlife. The project is very well regarded, and boasts a high level of community support, with community planting days attracting large numbers.

The Green Corridor project is built on strategic partnerships with organizations such as Conservation Volunteers Australia, Terrain NRM, local community groups, local councils, government agencies and the community in general. Friday's celebration was held at the Green Corridor site in Myola – an impressive 6 hectare site which displays phenomenal growth rates. Plantings less than two years old contain trees which are already 4-5 metres in height.

These extraordinary and visually striking results, achieved through a cost-effective partnership model, make the Green Corridor a very attractive 'green' investment opportunity for corporate and government entities alike. This is evidenced by the major cash and in-kind contributions it has secured from other corporate entities, local and state government and the community.

BRICMA presented a gift to Chief Executive Officer of Cairns Ports Ltd, Neil Quinn, as an expression of thanks in the lead up to the airport sale. In addition, the celebration at Myola included the ceremonial planting of five trees by Member for Barron Steve Wettenhall, Mayor Tom Gilmore, Neil Quinn and other special guests.

Lunch was provided and a guided walk was conducted through the rehabilitated site.





### Christmas message

As Christmas time also heralds the storm season, don't forget to check your insurance is up to date and your valuations are realistic. Now is the time to get yourself and your family prepared in the event of a cyclone.

While you're at it, do you have an elderly or disabled neighbour? Why not check to see if they need a hand preparing for the storm season.

### **Gaming grants**

Congratulations to the Kuranda Arts Co-operative Ltd for gaining \$2,654 for computers and lighting upgrades from Queensland Government's Reef Hotel Casino Community Benefit Fund.

### Month 3 of Carbon Challenge

This month's challenge is to shed some carbon from your home by replacing incandescent light bulbs with energy-efficient compact fluorescent lights (CFL). It's a simple way to cut energy consumption with CFL lasting longer and using 80 per cent less energy than incandescent light bulbs. Using CFL in rooms where lights are on for at least four hours a day can save 90 kg of CO2 annually per bulb. So if you were to replace eight light bulbs – the greenhouse gas emission savings

would be around 720 kg of CO2 each year.

### Parliament in Cairns

Ministers busied themselves with lots of official openings during the historic sitting of the Queensland parliament in Cairns. Kuranda didn't miss out with the official opening of the Kuranda Pool. Over 5000 people visited the parliament, including a group of Kuranda District State College Students.

### Redevelopment of Cairns Heritage Wharf

The Cairns Cruise Ship Terminal will receive a \$11.2 million upgrade as part of the State Government's efforts to support tourism in the Far North Region. The re-development, to be completed in late 2009, will give cruise ship tourists a quicker and more comfortable experience when they arrive and depart Cairns by ship. Facilities will be moved to a redeveloped Wharf Shed No 3 at Trinity Inlet while Wharf Shed No 2, where the terminal is currently based, will be refurbished. All the historical and heritage elements of the wharf such as the old clock tower will be retained. Sections of the terminal will now be air-conditioned for the first time. There will also be new check in areas and bus and taxi drop off areas with covered links and a new gangway ramp. The terminal upgrade is an important step in meeting the expected increase in cruise ship visitations to Cairns over the next 15 years.

### \$50 mill reef water quality improvement

Premier Anna Bligh further recognized the danger chemicals posed to the Great Barrier Reef and outlined new legislation to tackle the problem. Following the Reef Summit, the Hon Anna Bligh announced \$50 million over five years to support regulation to prevent agricultural water pollution in Great Barrier Reef catchments. On top of existing commitments, this means a total of \$175 million has been committed over five years to tackle this problem.

the fund and Council is currently looking at a range of projects and how best to spend the money in our region.

Changes to the Local Government Act: A new Local Government Act was recently introduced into State parliament and it is expected that the Act will be passed in March next year. There are a number of changes to the current Act. The state government will also be introducing a new Electoral Act for Local Government which may include changes to Divisions under the Tablelands Regional Council area. Old Primary School: Thank you to all who attended the delegations sessions in early November and to all who nominated for the Advisory Committee. Last week Council finalised the membership of the committee and the group will meet in December to commence the task of advising Council on the various options and arrangements for the Old Primary School site. Community representatives on the Committee are Linda Snart, Ken Harley, Gerald Hobbler and Chris Martin. Along with myself and Matt Hyde (General Manager: Community Services TRC), the group will be working on a strategic plan and costing for the development of the site. Again, I have to say that it will take some time and money, but we will eventually have a community facility for the Kuranda community.

Civic Reception for Georgia Bruce: The Mayor will host the first ever Civic Reception for the new TRC for Georgia Bruce from Speewah. Council will honour Georgia's outstanding success at the Paralympics where she won two Bronze Medals. Georgia's Civic Reception will be held in Kuranda on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> Dec. Congratulations Georgia!

**Civil Works and Roads:** During the past month, our road crews have been focusing on drainage works to ensure road drains are cleaned in preparation for the wet season. Ongoing maintenance works have been undertaken plus some new signage.

New Playing Field at Junior School: This month Council works crews will be finalising work on the Playing Field at the Junior School Campus at the Kuranda District College. In a joint agreement between the School, the Education Dept and the Tablelands Regional Council the field will be completed by the start of the 2009 school year and prove a great asset to the school children as well as the community. The facility

will be available to the community and will be administered by a Management Committee.

Committee.

Land Protection and Pest

Management: Council has recently adopted a Land Protection Management Action Plan 2008-2012. This plan prioritises weeds and animal pests and will be used as the basis for the control, containment and eradication of various pest, weed and animal species. The Plan will be advertised for public inspection and submissions. Council will also establish a Pest Advisory Committee and is seeking expressions of interest from individuals and groups within the local community who are interested in being involved. Further details are available from Tim O'Brien (Manager: Health and Environment) at 40434100 or email tim.obrien@trc. qld.gov.au

Tourism matters: For some years, Council has received funds via the state government to fund tourism related infrastructure in the central Kuranda Village area. A Special Agreement in 1994 (updated in 1997) ensures that funding is available to provide additional infrastructure to cater for the large number of tourists who visit Kuranda. This funding comes from two sources; \$1 per Kuranda Scenic Rail passenger and contributions from Skyrail. Under the terms of the Agreement the funds are provided to Council and can only be expended on tourist infrastructure services and facilities and require input from the local community. An advisory committee (known as the Kuranda Infrastructure Advisory Committee or KIAC) has operated for some years. Council has recently conducted a review and soon be calling for Expressions of Interest for skills based representatives on the next KIAC. The skills areas sought are: Community (2) Traditional Owner (1) Business/Professional Services (2) Tourism (1) Urban/ Streetscape Design (1). Nomination Forms for this Advisory Committee are available from Council or by contacting me. Nominations close on **December** 12<sup>th</sup>.

**Sewerage:** Council is currently engaged in discussions with all relevant state government departments regarding the construction of a sewer rising main from Top Kowrowa to the Kuranda Sewerage Treatment Plant. Final funding estimates are being prepared. This matter has been an issue of concern for some years and it is hoped that it will now be progressed further.

### Our disappearing frogs


Frogs remained the topic of the month with a special talk by frog researcher Dr. Conrad Hoskins last Monday night. He spoke on frogs of the rainforest, their special place in the ecosystem and of the local Myola frog. Conrad mentioned that rainforest frogs have specific water quality requirements to ensure their survival. He pointed to the development in the Redlynch valley where he has found rainforest frogs have not survived that development. Only open forest species exist there now, where there was once rainforest species. A sobering thought for any future development of the Myola area. We have a few copies of Conrad's new book on frogs, available for those who

### FAT WORMS ON THE JOB Construction of our 8-bay worm farm is underway.

Under the guidance of Willy Hill, professional concretor and block layer, we now have the formwork in place, ready to pour the concrete floor. We feed the worms volumes of native animal poo, which they just love, and they produce the best soil for our potting mix. Native animals eating native vegetation and making native soil for our native plants - what recycling perfection!. The chemical mix and consistency is right so we don't have to add any fertilizers. Mission Australia is funding the project.

If you want worms for fishing, we have the biggest, yummiest worms for you - FREE. Please get your worms from us rather than digging away at the river bank, which causes erosion and undermines the trees. It'll give you more time for fishing. You know where we are.

# ARE YOU POISONING WALLABIES? Putting out scraps for the wildlife could be killing them. You might mean well, but feeding them food they are not able to digest could be giving them pain,

Bread is a particular problem mainly because of its yeast content. Processed yeast is not a naturally occurring food for our wildlife. It may grow fungi (mould) which the animal cannot cope

making them sick and even killing them.

It is illegal to feed wildlife for good scientific reasons. You can become more environmentally responsible if you think twice about whether your discarded scraps contain matters which is foreign to this environment.

### **FERAL PIGS**

While you might feel that not enough is being done to manage the feral pig problem, we are taking on the challenge by fabricating our own traps for you to use.

Catching the animals is only part of the problem. Once caught they have to be "despatched" humanly and swiftly. We are working in league with our local pig exterminators to this end. But that's not the end of it either - then the carcass has to be disposed of. You can bury it if you have the energy to dig a big hole in tough soil or you can call in a backhoe at some cost.

To rev up the government, we are collecting signatures on a petition to get more help.

### MONEY FROM PLASTIC BAGS

Congratulations to Colinda and Ray at FOODWORKS for biting the bullet on plastic bags. You'll now pay for the plastic bags you use. Colinda reports that more and more people are getting the habit to bring their reusable bags with them.

Charging for plastic bags when shoppers have taken them for granted is a brave move. There are the odd one or two who have been slow to take responsibility for their own shopping bags and vented their misguided abuse.

It may make it better (or more wrathful) for them to know that the money raised by sale of the plastic bags will be donated to worthy Kuranda causes.

### Volunteer for a special rainforest experience

Giant white tailed rats are important as predator and prey. Their ability to disperse large seeds in the rainforest, which are too big for other animals to carry, make them a key player in the functioning of our rainforests. Gabrielle Eiris Phd student from Sth America is here studying them. There are several sites that she visits regularly to inspect her traps and has developed a very special relationship with surrounding rainforest and its inhabitants. She gets to see the forest in a way very few people do. "I see its daily and seasonal cycles, I get to know those who live there and experience the true beauty of the rainforest". She'd love to share this experience with others and you would also be assisting in the research.

### Flowering this Month

Black Bean (Castanospermum australe)

The bright yellow, turning to red, flowers of the Black Bean tree are clustered on the larger branches, partly hidden amongst the dense foliage of this attractive North Queensland tree. Ranging from Iron Range to near Lismore in Northern NSW, and also found in Vanuatu, the Black Bean is well known as a shade and ornamental tree. Some have been planted beside the pensioners' cottages on the way in to Kuranda. The large seeds were eaten by Aboriginal Australians after roasting and leaching, as they are poisonous prior to treatment, and have been known to kill livestock. Today the alkaloids they contain are researched for their anti-cancer and HIV properties. The flowers attract many insects and birds, and at least four species of flying fox which are the tree's main pollinators.

Les, the Tai Chi instructor who holds classes at the Centre on Tuesdays has provided this article on the benefits of TAI CHI:

Tai chi comes from ancient China and the full name is *Tai chi chuan* which can be translated as 'Ultimate energy boxing'. This gives away its origins and original purpose as a martial art. Original Tai chi is one of the so called 'soft' or internal styles of Kung fu. Mostly these days it is practiced for its ability to heal rather than to harm and most modern forms have deleted the explosive or 'fa-jing' moves, making it suitable for people of all ages and fitness levels.

The healing aspects are based on the principles of traditional Chinese medicine and its study of the flow of energy or life force around the body. Deep breathing techniques are combined with gentle stretching and smooth relaxed movements designed to build, circulate and balance energy around the body. It is a wholistic approach to exercise which includes exercise of the mind as well, since considerable concentration and awareness is required to complete a long set of movements or 'form'.

'Chi kung' is usually practiced as a supplement to Tai chi, these breathing and stretching exercises are great to build strength, balance and invigorate body and mind. Many benefits, physical and mental have been well established with scientific studies of Tai chi and Chi Kung, but like everything, you only get out proportional to what you put in!

Classes are held every Tuesday night at the ports club.






