Are you prepared for the next cyclone? If not,

now is the time to get prepared. You should check around your property now and clean it up. Clear your property of any potential missile, especially loose sheet iron, as these can kill. Make sure your house is sound, especially the roof. Ensure you have an emergency kit available consisting of tinned food, candles, matches, torch, radio, spare batteries, can opener, water containers, 1st aid kit and any necessary personal medication. Fill your gas bottle and get fuel for your generators. The emergency kit must have enough supplies in it to last you a MINIMUM of 1 week. If you have any pets from a budgie to a horse, don't forget to get food in for them. When you hear a cyclone warning, listen carefully and follow instructions. Secure doors, tape windows, store loose items inside, fill water containers, fuel car and place under cover and lock up your pets. After the cyclone has passed, please do not go sightseeing, as you will be hampering the emergency vehicles on the roads. Don't ignore warnings. You will be putting yourself in danger. Should you have to evacuate, you will need to take your emergency kit, so keep it in plastic bags. You should wear strong clothing and shoes to protect yourself from debris.

If you need medical attention, please phone 000. For assistance after the cyclone, ring the Disaster Co-ordination Centre **4092 4566**. It cannot be stressed enough how important it is for the people who know that heavy rain and cyclones to act now and have all their supplies on hand cut them off. It costs \$3,500 per hour to keep the Dept. Emergency Services chopper in the air. After any cyclone, they are kept very busy. If Cairns has the same amount of flooding as it did after cyclone Rona, the chopper will be busy servicing entire communities, so it may be very hard to access it for a few days after the event for a handful of residents in the Kuranda area. WATT-A-WHILE

Report By Dr Lesley Clark State Member For Barron River

After much planning and tendering, two major construction projects are underway in the Barron Gorge National Park, creating local employment and world-class visitor facilities. The first is a track linking the Barron Falls lookout to the railway bridge at the station below. This \$600,000 boardwalk will provide a wonderful rainforest experience as it crosses gullies some 7-8 metres off the forest floor. The planning and construction work has been awarded to local companies, Site Plan and Kuranda Constructions, with a significant labour component being contributed by long-term unemployed under the government's Community Jobs Plan. Over the life of the project, 18 people will be provided with employment and training on this scheme. I spent a couple of hours with the guys working on the project when they were excavating the footings for the boardwalk in holes 5 metres deep. I was really impressed with the quality of their work and commitment to the job, and thanks for the cuppa at smoko, guys!

At the Speewah end of the Park, an access road and a trail head with amenities is being constructed on land adjacent to the National Park, to be donated by Ron and Pam Elgar. The Mareeba Shire Council, once again providing employment for locals, is carrying out this work, estimated to cost \$500,000, for the government. This work will open up access to the historic Smith and Douglas Tracks that linked the coast and tableland in the early gold rush days. The Green Corps and Community Jobs Plan workers have been continuing the restoration work on these tracks, which come out at the Rainforest Estate beside Stoney Creek at Kamerunga.

The National Park has unique ecological, geological, historical and Aboriginal cultural features that tell a fascinating story and interpretative materials are currently being prepared with funding from the State and Federal governments. Next year work will continue on upgrading other tracks and trails in the Park so that locals and visitors can experience this magnificent area on the doorstep of Cairns.

The government's commitment to job creation is also evidenced by the KMKM Aboriginal Corporation Community Jobs Plan project which has employed 10 people for 26 weeks building the rodeo grounds and youth campsite at Mona Mona, which will host sporting and cultural events. Watch out for action in the first rodeo just before Christmas! I visited the site with Employment Minister Paul Braddy last week when participants were presented with certificates in recognition of the TAFE training modules that they had completed. We were both really impressed with what we saw and I congratulate all those involved. Projects like these make all the difference to Indigenous people who have an unemployment rate approximately three times the unemployment rate in Queensland. There are significant subsidies from both the State and Federal governments for employers who have trainees or apprentices. My first full year back as the Member for Barron River has been both challenging and rewarding. There have been many positive and exciting events in Kuranda, attesting to the strong sense of community spirit. There are still battles to be won, like the cemetery but with good faith on all sides, issues like this can be solved. I have really enjoyed working again with the Kuranda community, renewing old friendships and making new ones. The range of issues is always diversive, as are the views that people hold, but that is part of what makes Kuranda unique! Thank you for your support and best wishes for a safe and happy festive season.

HYDROPONIC GARDENING by Jan Coulter

Well my version of aquaculture is working. My Water chestnuts are thriving and I have no mosquitoes. The guppies I put in with them are keeping the water crystal clear. I have some other plants which like water too; Basella has leaves and tender tips that are exceedingly rich in vitamins A and C and may be eaten raw as a salad green or steamed. Kang Kong is an aquatic plant, with hollow stems, and usually spear shaped leaves. It is related to the sweet potato but has no tubers. It's leaves provide one of the principle greens of people living along the Sepik River in Papua New Guinea. When it rains heavily I leave the taps on the containers open so that the rain flushes them. I top up the nutrient when the rain stops and save the diluted nutrient to use on my fruit trees. THE BARRON - back to normal

The point when the weir had been completely drained on 25^{TH} October was probably as close to 'normal' as you are ever likely to see it again. It looked pretty much like the old photographs of the early 1900s before the weir and Tinaroo dam were built. Much has changed since then and most of us accept that 'normal' is the way things are now; that is, a regulated flow of water released from the dam and drawn from the weir at our will - except in extreme times of drought and flood.

In these terms, the draining of the weir to inspect the intake pipes for the Barron Gorge hydro-electric power station, went as planned. The event was well coordinated by Stanwell's Kim Forde and there was wide community participation through the Kuranda High School, the Green Corps, KURANDA EnviroCare and the Barron River Integrated Catchment Management Association. The Dept Natural Resources and the Environment Protection Agency kept a watchful eye. We were all well rewarded with a barbecue lunch prepared by the Kuranda Lions.

There were no visible natural casualties or stranded fish. Those of us who tried to walk along the river bed discovered some deep mud patches - suddenly!

Sequel to ABC-TV's Quantum show on cassowaries

The Quantum documentary on cassowaries has drawn both praise and condemnation. There were some great shots of local cassowaries and of Jax being torn to shreds on the lawyer vine, but the shots of direct hand-feeding produced a negative response. The segment certainly succeeded in publicising the debate on whether to (and how to) feed or not.

From a conservation point of view, the hand-feeding sequence was unfortunate and not part of the plan. It only takes one hand-feeding event for cassowaries to learn that people are a source of food. People live in houses with dogs; they also come in cars and buses on roads. It is easy to see how we can be responsible for enticing the birds into dangerous situations. Quite apart from the danger of injury, there is also the danger of killing the bird by feeding it the wrong type of food, not to mention the possibility of spreading the forest with seeds that have the potential to become monumental weeds.

Making food available via feeding stations is a different matter. In this case, the correct food is selected and placed where the birds will find it without associating it with people. The food is only made available at times when their natural forest food is scarce. Dependency is thus avoided.

Bat counting

Olivia Whybird had trouble finding people to count bats this time round. Just five counters recorded a few hundred bats leaving the Kuranda village colony a drastic drop by thousands.

It may be that the colony is moving to new premises. Are you aware of increased flying fox activity near your place? It may also mean that they are dying off as we reduce their habitat or that they are becoming poisoned by the spray on the orchard fruit they invade.

A shed to surpass all sheds

We are the proud owners of a 6m x 3m shed donated to us by Natural Resource Assessments Pty Ltd. The shed, valued at \$500, now houses the field equipment and trailers used by the Green Corps and ourselves. Many thanks to NRA. (This donation qualifies as a tax deduction to the donor).

Thanks to some clever wheeling and dealing, some excellent mechanical and paint work by Bernard, some clever design by Kim Prentice, the generosity of Martin Hadley and funding from the Gaming Machine Community Benefit Fund, KURANDA **EnviroCare** now has two box trailers, one 1000 litre water tank trailer and one display trailer. 

Three to four years is required before these seedlings will produce flowers. All are welcome at our monthly 2nd Saturday meetings. Just bring a plate for smoko and any questions plus surplus produce and seeds to give away. David Hume is a great help as he regularly puts a notice of forthcoming meetings on the board by the Post Office and also a signboard outside the 2nd Saturday Meeting place. These he takes home for future use. Newcomers to Kuranda will find the meetings very worthwhile. If you want some advice on the spot you can offer your garden for a meeting. Organic Gardening By Marjorie Spear

For the past 40 years I have been an ardent organic gardener – now old age and a walking stick make weeding difficult but straw and wood chip mulch help to cut the weeds. Pinto peanut is a perennial prostrate legume with a pretty yellow flower that grows well round fruit trees. In the winter I tried growing annual cowpeas but the wretched bush turkeys flew over the vegetable garden fence and ate the seeds. An area near the house unfenced was left alone and is growing well and soon I will get the plants dug in and plant Lebanese cucumber. Companion planting is my delight. Basils of all kinds are loved by the bees, keep away nasty insects and are good in cooking and herb teas. Dill is also excellent as a herbal repellent and seeds regularly every year and is also good as an ingredient in herb tea and cooking. The birds are here in their hundreds enjoying the blossoms and nectar on fruit trees and natives and bottle brushes.

Torch gingers are providing dozens of flowers to give away. Anyone wanting roots is welcome to come and dig roots for free: plus heliconia and cannas for holding the soil and providing mulch and colour. Tomatoes have done well this year – it is now time to plant seeds of wing beans. Soak the seed and then plant in pots until 8 inches high – then plant out. Most plants will remain healthy for several years. They usually fruit from March to June and must have stakes or wire. Pick them young. No diseases if the soil is good and watered weekly. Parsley and mint are flourishing in boxes near my house so I can water and weed them often and of course cut them twice daily so I can use them fresh in my salad. Neem trees are growing well and are offering support to my vigorous passion fruit vines and purple star apples have given me dozens of fruit to give away. Citrus trees have at last had a pruning – better late than never – so the fruit will be easy to pick. A good dolomite dressing when planting citrus and then every second year is advisable. Ring me 40937205 if you have any questions on organic growing.

P.S. Keep up the mulch during the summer months and give your chokoes plenty of compost, dolomite and mulch.

Rennae Brant from Kuranda High School says the project offered her the opportunity to prepare questions about experiences of older Kuranda people and as a result she has a better understanding of Kuranda. Rennae was also involved in filming some interviews as was Year 11 student Lenny Sturgess who says the project was a good practical experience and hands on preparation for a future career making documentaries. Over 60 people attended the launch of the video and all participants were given their own copy of the program. As well the Kuranda library received a copy of the documentary as well as the uncut interviews and these will be made available to borrow. The project was a great success as it involved many older and younger people from Kuranda. The stories people talk about provide a real link with the history of Kuranda and an insight into Kuranda life during this century. MORE ON THE AUSTINS OF KURANDA By W. (Bill) Austin.

My father William Austin, worked on the bridges on the Cairns to Kuranda railway, as a Bridge Carpenter, building bridges on the range. After serving as a Bridge Carpenter for a number of years he sat for a Bridge Inspector and passed his exam. He used to travel all the district from Cairns to Chillagoe and to the Tableland district inspecting bridges. He travelled on his section motor and sometimes rode on the steam engine inspecting inspecting the bridges. He worked in the Cairns district for forty odd years before he retired. He retired himself, the Railway Department did not like to part with him as he was a good inspector and after he retired, Eric Marks got his job. Eric was also a Bridge Carpenter in the Mareeba district and passed an exam for a Bridge Inspector. Quite a few Bridge Carpenters lived in Kuranda and Cairns. - Charlie Harriman, Johnston Harriman, Phill Smith from Cairns, Don Rookwood from Cairns. My father lived most of his life in Kuranda and brought his family up there. My Grandparents on my mother's side was Arthur Thomas Newman and my Grandmother's maiden name was Mary Mariah Paschen. They reared seven children in Kuranda. My mother, Harriet Annie Newman, Robert, Rose, Percy, Ernie, Ruby and Vera all got married in the early days and lived in the Kuranda District. My grandfather Arthur Newman used to build houses in Kuranda. He helped to build the Saint Saviour's Church in Kuranda and he used to dress girders for the bridges for the Cairns Railway. He used to ride his horse out as far as Dick Looks and Demon Creek. His two sons, Percy and Ernie had a bullock team and used to snig the hickory logs out of the scrub with the bullocks onto the clear ground, so he could trim them down with the broad axe, then they were carted into Kuranda Railway Siding for the inspector to pass them. They were loaded with the bullock team to get them into the siding. Sometimes, he would make bullock vokes for the teamsters, making them out of wattle. And another chap named Bethel used to make bullock yokes out of River Oak and Adam Hamilton used to make Vicki Ledger of the Marlin Coast Neighbourhood Centre, Smithfield organised a 2 yokes also. My first job I had when I left school - my father asked uncle George day bus trip for IYOP. 35 people took advantage of the trip including 2 from Veivers if he would give me a job and take me out to Speewah to get me out of Kuranda – Lani & Sarah. They were told they'd be entertaining at a retirement town. Uncle George took me out to Speewah and gave me a job off siding for his village so they prepared for their Line Dancing act plus Qi Gong and Lani took bullock team. Uncle George had two bullock teams. George Harriman used to drive along her Pois (Maori) and Sarong and did the Hula. During the 2 days they ac- one. At Speewah, I had to help Grandma Vievers to milk the cows in the morning tually performed four shows at Port Douglas Stella Maris Nursing Home, Mt and muster the bullocks for Uncle George. We would work all day with the bullocks Molloy School, Atherton School and Mareeba Garden Village and they're in their and I used to get home to get the cows in and put the calves in the pen for the night. We used to milk sometimes about fourteen cows and separate the milk to make our own butter and we used to feed pigs on the separated milk. My Auntie Rose made her own bread and we lived mostly on dry salted corned beef and sweet potatoes which we grew at Speewah, and Grandma Veivers had a vege garden across the creek. She grew cabbages and lettuce and other vegetables, and all the water for the garden was carried with buckets from the creek. They had no pump to pump water. Even at the house they only had a rainwater tank and the house was on high blocks. I had to carry two kerosene tins of water up the back steps and into the kitchen for Aunty Rose and Grandma Veivers to use during the day. If you went into the kitchen to give them a hand to wash the dishes they would hunt you out of the kitchen and say that's their job. Things are different nowadays; you have to be jack-of-all-trades.

> Well, we used to cart the timber from Speewah to Kuranda during the dry months and during the wet we used to go to Koah Railway Siding and camp at Koah and turn the bullocks down the Barron for the night. Next day we would head back to Demon Creek. It was great life to lead. We had a lot of mates and everyone helped one another. Jack Veivers had a bullock team. Jack Ray, Sam Crothers, Bill Crothers, Dave Crothers, and Aleck Moffat, all hauling from out as far as Herlies Pocket. Uncle George had a lot of cattle to be looked after. We had to go seven days a week. On the weekends we went mustering cattle down the Clohesy River and sometimes over Bridle Creek and Cedar Pocket and as far as Tin Creek and Davies Creek. We had a lot of horse flesh to do all the mustering and about six good cattle dogs. All the cattle had to be brought home to the dip. We had no buffalo fiies those days only ticks.

> As the years went by I learnt to drive a bullock team and took over the other team from George Harriman. I used to handle them on my own after learning all about driving bullocks from uncle George. I could drive the team and work the brake myself. George Harriman bought a bullock team of his own and started over at Reeds Pocket with Jack and Bert Gane. Bert had a timber lorry and used to cart the timber into Koah Siding. Sometimes we would have a spell from hauling timber and would break in some fresh horses to muster on. Bert Ingstrum used to live at Speewah those days and used to help me handle the new horses. Sometimes Bertie and I would have to plough up some ground to plant corn using three horses in a disk plough. We fed two of our good horses in the dry as sometimes we would yard up brumbies from Brumbie Gully and the Granite Ridges to keep up the supply of horses as we used to go through a lot of horses in twelve months. KISC Alcohol And Drug Bulletin"Sleeping Soundly Without Pills"

If you have trouble sleeping, you are not alone. According to *For Me* magazine (Jan. 1999 issue) up to 20% of Australians have the same problem. As well as making you tired, lack of sleep can make you more susceptible to germs and bugs. Worrying in bed and getting into the habit of not sleeping are the most common reasons for insomnia.

Some ideas for falling asleep without using possibly habit-forming medication include:

- * Dim the lights a few hours before you go to bed to help your brain prepare for sleep.
- * Avoid late night housework or aerobics allow your body to relax instead.
- * Have your main meal at lunchtime and a smaller one at night.
- * Establish a routine for going to bed warm bath, milky drink or honey and warm water, relaxing music.
- * Get up and go to bed at the same time each day to train your body into a sleep cycle.
- * Go to the Health Food shop to look for natural sleeping remedies such as chamomile, passion-flower, valerian or kava.
- * Get someone to give you a massage or give yourself a soothing head massage.
- * If your mind is refusing to shut down, keep a notepad and pen beside your bed to write in this will allow you not to worry until you read it all in the morning.
- * If you are tossing and turning after 15 minutes, get up and occupy yourself with a quiet activity that you find restful such as reading or listening to beautiful music. When you are sleepy go back to bed again.
- * Aromatherapy oils such as lavender or marjoram sprinkled on your pillow may help.
- * To promote relaxation and deal with anxiety, concentrate on your breathing and breathe slowly and deeply for a count of 4 in, and count of 8 out.







Kuranda Scouts News



2 cups desiccated coconut

(note: you can add less sultanas and nuts if you like) METHOD: First cut the dates and the sultanas up. Next, mush the dates and sultanas into a thoroughly combined mass using your fingers. Add the carob powder and honey together then add all the crushed nuts and mix together. Add the shredded coconut and combine all the ingredients totally together by forming into a solid wellmixed mass. Finally form into round balls about the size of a pool ball. Roll in desiccated coconut and place in an airtight container. Keep stored in the refrigerator. Eat & preserving Ainu language and culture. The Ainu people, like the Bliss Out. . . . Yum. . . . GUDJU GUDJU INVITED TO JAPAN

Kuranda based band Gudju Gudju (Rainbow Serpent) have returned from a recent visit to Japan to perform at the Ainu Mosiri Festival in Hokkaido, Northern Japan. The band was invited by the spiritual leader and Queen of the Ainu people, Ashirilea (New Wind). She has devoted her life to Djabuganydgi people of Kuranda, once lived as hunters and fishers, but they too have lost ancestral lands and language. Their culture has been under threat for the last 200 years.

Gudju Gudju is a long running Kuranda cultural band made up of Bama and Gadja (Indigenous and Non Indigenous) musicians. It is a band, which actively promotes reconciliation throughout Australia, seeking world renewal and harmony for all people. Two Japanese members of the band, Yuko and Hisao Suginaka, informed Queen Ashirilea about Gudju Gudju and through the assistance of ATSIC the band was able to meet up with the Ainu people and share their music and culture at the intercultural Mosiri Festival

Queen Ashirilea sent this message to the people of Kuranda. "I wish all the best to your people and I am hoping we can continue this wonderful goodwill relationship in the future. I, Ashirilea meaning New Wind, want to thank again on behalf of all native Japanese Ainu. I thank God for creating this opportunity and the Australian Government for making this event happen by making a rainbow bridge over Japan and Australia." Peter McCabe.

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
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

We always had to ride into Kuranda for supplies. Sometimes in the buggy or ride in on horseback or take a pack horse we used to call silent Bill or if it was flood time Uncle George would tell me to put the pack saddle on a big black horse he used to call Deep Water. We had another Chestnut horse we used to call Grasshopper. He was used for everything in the buggy or saddle up with the side saddle for Auntie Rosie to go to Kuranda. It was a great life to lead in the early days. We had plenty of friends, everyone helped one another. We went to all the dances that were hold in Kuranda and surprise parties. We had no telephones or television sets, but got the news by bush telegraph. Everyone would tell each other what was going on until we got the news at Speewah. So at Christmas we rejoice with the carols, the all the decorations and the trees, the presents and the gathering of the family, the church services the happy faces of children. Yet we must also be aware of questions for the future. Think of what is going on. Already the Wise Men are journeying to Jerusalem, led by their star; soon they will be at Herod's court, and having heard them, the cruel and frightened king will be planning the massacre that he believes will make sure there is no threat to his throne and his power. It was soon indeed after the joy of Christmas, the coming of the Child, that there was to come the brutality and sorrow of a callous act that would leave so many mothers desolate, so many families bereft. The first Christmas was to be for many, the last Christmas. In our own time we look ahead at uncertainties. The constant violence and brutality, the killings and unrest in Indonesia and the Holy Land, the terrible violence in Africa between rival tribes, and the murder of innocent people in East Timor following the vote for Independence. All this adds up to an outlook, in so many places, which no one can say is settled or certain. Yet there is one great certainty - it was into just the same kind of world as our own, full of crises and problems, anger and violence that the Lord chose to he born. In full knowledge he took the step of coming to our uncertain planet our all-too-easily-upset little earth, our tiny lifeboat floating in the vastness of inter-stellar space. It was certainly not into any kind of certain future that Jesus was born, nor that he grew up in, nor in which he began his mighty work of reconciliation. 

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

Station News The Kuranda Ambulance station intends to run a first aid and resuscitation course on the 11th & 12th of December. In order to achieve this we need at least fifteen people to participate. The course will be held over the weekend and the participants will receive a certificate upon completion. If you are a bit rusty on your first aid skills or have not done a course in the last 3 years now is your opportunity to get current and have some fun in the process. First aid enquiries and bookings can be made TOLL FREE on 1300 650 377. A few weeks ago we had a new member of staff join our ranks and she will take over from Clint who has taken a position in Balmoral, Brisbane. I am sure everyone will join me in welcoming Sally to Kuranda and we look forward to her presence for a long time to come. Most people would have seen some of the recent events involving QAS Kuranda in the Cairns post, and I would like to join all the other well wishers and congratulate the people involved. It was fortunate that the people involved had obtained the skills they utilised from public education sessions conducted by your local ambulance service. This reinforces the need to be current in your first aid training as you never know when an opportunity will arise to use such Knowledge and skills.

LAC & Fund-raising News Since our last contribution to the paper the Kuranda Local Ambulance Committee (LAC) have been hard at work raising funds and has recently purchased a new portable resuscitation unit. This piece of equipment is the latest available and ensures that the Kuranda community has access to the very best life saving equipment available to the ambulance industry. The committee also recently purchased a ride on mower and I am sure with the wet just around the comer this will see plenty of action. In order to continue purchasing items for the community the LAC has to continue with fundraising activities in the local community. To date the LAC has expended in excess of \$10000.00 towards enhancement projects for the benefit of the local community and is planning to expend \$6000.00 + in the 1999/2000 financial year. All of these funds are from money raised in the local area in the form of raffles, Quiz nights and the like, and by your generous support of our stall held every 3rd Saturday in front of St Saviours Church. On the 12th of December we will be conducting a children's disco for all primary school age children. The disco will be held at the CWA hall and will run from 6.30pm to 9.30pm this is a fully supervised event and children are not allowed pass outs. Keep an eye out for the flyers in the school newsletter and around town.

LEON'S TIPS Recently we have started to see a little rainfall happening in the local area and this usually brings with it those little slip ups while driving. In order to avoid the inconvenience of broken vehicles and bodies it is a good idea to get into wet season driving mode. This just means that you increase the distance between you and the car in front, you try and take corners less aggressively and you start to break a little earlier than in the dry. I think that I can speak with some experience when it comes to driving to and from Cairns at varying speeds, the most time anyone in a normal road vehicle will save is about four 4 minutes over the distance from here to Cairns, the question is, is four minutes worth risking life and limb for, and what is the likelihood of you driving aggressively for most of the range only to lose the few minutes you've saved by getting stuck behind a slow vehicle. The most critical time to take care is the first few days of rain after a couple of dry weeks, at this time the road is at its slipperiest as the combination of road grime (oil, fuel, dirt, etc) and water makes for a surface that is difficult to walk on let alone drive at speed. The last tip I will give you is to take a look at your tyre tread and ask your self if they are good enough for a long wet season? I apologise if I am teaching you to suck eggs but its better to be safe than sorry.

SUBSCRIPTIONS If you are not a current member of the ambulance services subscription scheme, you will get a large account should you use the service. For less than \$2.00 a week you can cover your whole family even if you have 15 dependants or more, so it does pay to belong. The procedure is simple and can be done next time you visit the post office. Don't leave it to late because --it happens everyday.

The Burning Issue

Welcome to the last "Burning Issue" of the millennium. On Saturday the 13th of November, Captain Ray, Karen Davies and Area Director Bill Brown attended a public meeting in relation to cyclone and Y2K awareness. It became evident at this meeting that a lot of people have concerns regarding New Years Eve and the possible problems associated if the Millennium Bug strikes. Thus the purpose of this article is to clarify certain points.

Firstly, Kuranda station will be manned by a crew of 4 fire fighters from 7.00pm on the 31 December 1999 through to 7.00am on the 1st January 2000. Before and after this time we will be on an "on call" basis as per usual. Our station is well equipped with generator power and back-up radio communications if necessary. All crew on station this night are proficient in Senior 1st Aid and Advanced CPR skills, including the use of "oxy-viva resuscitators. In the event of an emergency please use the emergency number 000. Failing this, you may ring the station direct on 40937406 or drive in to the station.

Secondly, we have concerns about people storing large quantities of fuel in their homes over this period. Please remember that it is legal to store only the following quantities of flammable and combustible liquids in and around the home:


Ensure that your LPG gas cylinders are in good order and that validity dates are checked and, of course, refilled prior to New Years Eve.

New Years Eve is going to be an unknown quantity to all of us this year but please be assured that the Queensland Fire and Rescue Authority is doing all within our power to make sure our contingency plan is in place and able to be implemented. The Kuranda communities safety is first and foremost in our minds, but a lot of the onus this year is going to fall back on the community itself. You can assist us to assist you by some very simple preparedness such as:

- using commonsense with fuel storage
- checking trees are cleared from powerlines
- knowing basic first aid
- checking gas bottles and fire extinguishers are up to date
- checking your outside fuse boxes are clean and leak free
- checking the hydrants in front of your homes are clear and accessible
- ensuring you have fire evacuation plans in place

Any assistance you may require on this is available from Kuranda Fire Station by phoning 40937406 or calling in on Tuesday drill nights. Please Note: As from the 1st of December, we will be drilling on Wednesday nights. The past few months have been busy with several call outs to Fires and Motor Vehicle accidents, but we have also managed to attend our regular Tuesday night drills and send various crew members on external courses. Debbie Tansey, Robert Lindsay and Bill Birgan all successfully completed their Road Accident and Rescue course held at South Cairns Station. Well done team!

On a sad note, Robert Sharp has left us after 3 years of service due to other commitments. Thanks to Robert for all his efforts and help and we wish him luck in the future.
