REST IN PEACE

On Monday October 15, friends and family of Lex Brigginshaw gathered in the Kuranda cemetery to say their last goodbyes to a loyal friend, honest and hardworking colleague, good neighbour, loving uncle and brother-in-law. Also present in spirit were his many professional friends from Australia and around the world, and other ffiends and family who sent their love and condolences.

Lex was born in Rockhampton in 1951 and took up work in the insurance industry firstly in Brisbane, then Sydney. He quickly rose to the top of his profession and was respected worldwide by all whom had business dealings with him. He travelled extensively and loved both wild and remote places as well as the sophistication and high culture of the world's capitals. He loved the arts, most especially classical music, opera and antiquities. Time spent in Asia engendered a great admiration for Oriental art He was deeply moved by beauty

wherever it occurred but was also deeply affected by any hint of injustice, prejudice or inequity. He was a dedicated supporter of many conservation and social justice groups including Greenpeace, ACF and Amnesty International.

ex moved to Kuranda in 1988 with his late partner, Rod Thurley, and together they ran Orchids Restaurant (now Monkeys). Following Rod's death, Lex continued to work, dote on his pets and garden and still found time to give of his talents to many community organisations including the Association for Regional Kuranda, Kuranda Amphitheatre, the Kuranda Paper, Rotary and many other small but time and energy consuming community causes. Lex never forgot the natural beauty and charm which had led he and Rod to settle here and he fought hard to seek proper development controls to protect both the environment and humanity of the little town which had won their hearts. His love of nature often led him off the beaten track and so it has to the end: He had just finished a 3 week tour of Botswana and Madagascar when he was taken suddenly ill in Johannesburg.

A true Piscean, he sometimes found the tides of change hard to navigate and was sometimes painfully sensitive to the suffering in the world. But the flip side to this was that he would always help a friend in need, feeling deeply others'pain. In these troubled times, it is a solace to know that he is beyond the cares of this world but, nevertheless, we will miss this most unique of persons. Farewell Lex

Flying-fox Concerns
You may have noticed that there are not as many flying-foxes around Kuranda than there used to be. This decline has been occurring throughout the Wet Tropics area. A monitoring program for Spectacled Flying-foxes started in 1998 and estimated their numbers in March and November. March counts have since been abandoned after Cyclone Rona in 1999 gave us terrible weather and many of the counts were unusable. Cyclone Steve hit about the same time last year justifying the decision.

It is vital to continue monitoring the species because:

It is very important species to the rainforest as they are both pollinators and

They cause large amounts of economic damage to fruit crops.

In a 12 month period (Nov 98 - Nov 99) this programs estimated a decline from 114,000 to 75,000 almost 35%.

In 2000 the population was just under 80,000 due to a colony that had been missed during previous counts

The Wildlife Preservation Society of Queensland has been successful in obtaining funding from the Threatened Species Network Community Grants Program, a joint initiative of the World Wildlife Fund Australia and the Natural Heritage Trust, to continue the monitoring with a count of Spectacled flying-fox camps in November.

The Flying-foxes hang in the tops of trees during the day. These sites are called camps. The first step in the program is to find these camps. All known camp sites are checked for occupants, and members of the public can help by reporting on sites that are currently occupied or have been in the past. We don't know where the Kuranda camp is at the moment. If you have seen flying-foxes hanging in trees during the day or a number of them flying out of the forest at dusk, either in Kuranda or else where please call the number below.

The counts will be conducted on the 17th, 18th and 19th of November. They are conducted by volunteers who surround the camp sites at dusk and count the bats as they leave to feed. Counts take only 1 hour starting at 6:00pm. Camps are located throughout the Wet Tropics region.

KURANDA WATER CHARGES

Following is an explanation of water charges at Kuranda:

Residential property - \$220.00 annual access charge. Business property - \$460.00 annual access charge. Plus in all cases, 40c per 1,000 litres up to 300,000

litres and 75c per 1,000 litres thereafter.

The first rate notice will include a half-year water access charge of \$110 (or \$230 for business), plus excess water used last financial year. In November, there will be a water bill for all water used for the July/October period.

The second rate notice in February will include a half-year access charge of \$110 (or \$230 for business).

In March there will be a water bill for all water used for the November/ February period.

In July there will be a water bill for all water used in the March/June period

NATURE STILL THE BOSS

When it's wet we want it dry, When it's dull we want it fine, When it's cold we want it hot, Always wanting what is not.

But, regardless, we get what's going whether we like it or not!

We proudly showed off the extensive tree planting we have done over the past three years to the bus load of Kuranda's volunteers on Saturday 13th October. Within 24 hours, fire had raced through the most visible section of our work, reducing about a hectare of it to a moonscape.

It was thanks to Laurie Moller, our bobcat hero, that more was not lost. Laurie saw the fire coming and used his bobcat to cut a fire break, stopping the fire in its tracks. We didn't realise what a green heart he really has. Many, many thanks, Laurie.

One reason the fire so effectively annihilated that section of planting was because it was heavily mulched. Mulching is a must to retain moisture in the soil and promote the underground micro-eco-systems that promote healthy plant growth. Without the mulch (and without constant watering in the hot, dry weather we've been having), we'd be losing many tree seedlings. However, mulching on a large scale also carries the risk of fuelling fire. We need to adopt better ways of laying the mulch so that the seedlings are protected without increasing the risk of fire.

VOLUNTEERS SHOWING VOLUNTEERS

The bus tour of Kuranda which showed the volunteers what all the other volunteers were doing, went well. It was made possible by funding won by киганда *EnviroCare* under the International Year of the Volunteer program. We took off from the Council carpark at around 9am and sped out to Big Sands (Kowrowa), via the future Myola Shire (only joking), to see our tree planting. We left the bus on the bitumen and walked through the now young forest which had been a sea of guinea grass and lantana only 3 years ago.

By this time we'd worked up a thirst so we headed for the Kuranda High School for morning tea, stopping to inspect the new Myola fire engine in its purpose-built shed. But alas, as the door was thrown open in grand style to reveal the state-of-the-art machine, there was only a bedraggled ute to be found. The fire engine was otherwise occupied. So much for pomp and ceremony.

We enjoyed the morning tea of all morning teas put on by the High School's P&C volunteers and saw the fabulous facilities available to our local students.

The bus took us via the Fallon Road Ambulance Station where the features of ambulance travel were demonstrated, to the Amphitheatre. This was an eye-opener for many of us who had no idea about the extent of this community-owned and loved facility.

By this time, we were thinking about cool drinks and a CWA lunch, but we still had the new boardwalk through the Jumrum Conservation Park to test. This was no ordeal. It is an easy, pleasant stroll between Barron Falls Road and Barang Street, and led us to a sumptuous lunch provided for us by the volunteers of Kuranda's Country Women's Association.

The final leg was past the new premises for the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre (beside the BP) en route to the Tourist Information Centre, where the volunteers explained how they meet, greet and tell visitors to the town what Kuranda is all about.

Star of the roadshow was Peter (Dr Gecko of FM88 radio) McCabe, our Master of Ceremonies. He was brilliantly witty and kept a racy pace via a roving PA system on the bus. Our bus driver was Ken Vievers who had that bus doing uphill-back slides and 3-wheel pirouettes on a 5 cent piece. This was no ordinary bus trip!

REGULAR SATURDAY MORNING TREE PLANTING

We are working on the Barron River bank, planting trees which will be able to survive inundation from time to time. This is a critical part of our EnviroLink Wildlife Corridor which runs through to Speewah.

We meet at 8am on the side of Myola/Oakforest Road (after Mantaka and before Kowrowa - about 7km from Kuranda), do our tree planting for an hour, then enjoy home-made morning tea. Please join in. It's free.

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 7th November at 7pm at the Sports Club, Fallon Road.

A Thought for November

This month we open our Bible to St Luke's Gospel Chapter 16 and read verses 19-31 In the passage we read about the rich man and the poor man Lazarus. In the passage Jesus asks us some questions

How do we deal with our physical and tangible possessions?

How do we deal with our spiritual gifts? And guess what Jesus requires an answer.

All through this chapter of Luke's Gospel Jesus is talking about us and our possessions. He says again and again that this is one of the most important relationships in our lives, and that we will be judged largely on the way we have dealt with it. He has also been saying that possessions can be both outer and inner. Our relationship to our outer possessions, from which we take so much pleasure, is only an outward sign of our relationship with our inner possessions, our spiritual riches. We can be very rich outwardly and very poor inwardly. We can be poor outwardly and rich inwardly. We can sometimes be rich both outwardly and inwardly, but only if we are prepared to be good stewards of our riches before God. The chapter ends with Jesus telling the story of the rich man and Lazarus. On the surface it is a simple and straightforward story, and we can take a moral lesson from it about the uses of riches

But it has other levels of meaning, most certainly to the men and women of Jesus' time and nation.

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To them he was presenting the rich man as an image of themselves, rich and comfortable, but irresponsible and without compassion for others. On another level Jesus was questioning his countrymen's use of their spiritual riches. They claimed a special relationship with God, but how was this spirituality seen in their actions? "Between you and us there is a great chasm." It is not that Lazarus would not go to help, he cannot go. The division is too great, and it is too late. Again Jesus is emphasizing the way judgement takes place in human life.

We judge ourselves by making our own choices and living the consequences. When, in the story, the rich man beseeches Lazarus at least to go to his still-living brothers, the answer he gets is a terrible one. They have placed themselves beyond reach, and cannot be made to hear. The terrible truth is that we can by our own patterns and choices place ourselves out of the reach of God. That will certainly not be God's wish for us, but it will nevertheless take place. We are free beings, free to make moral decisions. There is of course always a way back, but only we can choose to take it. Throughout our lives Jesus continually offers us grace to help us to choose his kingship rather than that of the tyrant in each one of us, which we know as the Self.

So when Jesus asks us.

How do we deal with our physical and tangible possessions?

How do we deal with our spiritual gifts? How do we answer?

PRESCHOOL NEWS

The Kuranda State Preschool Centre has recently had a face lift, and it looks fantastic. The building has been painted inside and out and a colourful new shade sail has been erected over the play area. The children's cubby house has also been repainted and is presently under going repair work. Changes to existing playground equipment and some landscape gardening are planned for the near future.

In the past 12 months, the centre has purchased a number of high quality resources and equipment to promote early literacy and numeracy through play- based activities. Computer equipment has also been upgraded, along with resources to develop balance, co- ordination and motor skills. Curriculum planning continues to follow the Preschool Curriculum Guidelines, as well as school – based learning programmed. WAIT-A-WHILE REPORT BY DR LESLEY CLARK STATE MEMBER FOR BARRON RIVER

World events continue to dominate the thoughts of many people and for Kuranda the impacts are real, with tourism being such an important industry. I drew attention of the particular problems facing Far North Queensland in the Parliament last week.



The Federal government's own Tourism Working Group estimated that the current crisis will take one billion dollars out of the nationa economy and the industry will need two years to recover. The Working Group made a range of recommendations to assist the industry, but to date only \$20 V has been made available to assist businesses and fund a marketing campaign - fair short of what the industry needs.

The State government last week announced its own assistance package the first State to do so. It consisted of a six-point plan and has been welcomed by the industry. Under the plan:

A Tourism and Related Industries Immediate Response Group has beer established to monitor industry conditions and develop response options;

\$10 million will be allocated to provide low-interest loans for smal tourism and related businesses experiencing extreme difficulties due to the impact of the Ansett collapse and terrorist activities. The Government will approach financial institutions to encourage them to consider offering temporary relief for business borrowers directly affected by recent events. All Government agencies will investigate the capacity of existing programs to be directed towards assisting those affected.

The Department of Employment and Training will examine the capacity of vocational education and training to address employment and training issue: arising from the current economic conditions.

The Premier will urge the Commonwealth Government to adopt a more interventionist approach in the current economic environment, including further urgent relief for tourist operators, counter-cyclical expenditure and the provisior of active labour market programs.

I was also pleased to support the Health Action Group at their meeting with the Cairns District Health Council to discuss the provision of additiona health services in Kuranda. While Kuranda receives a service from Smithfield, still believe we need to plan for a Community Health Centre in Kuranda that car provide an outreach service to all the small communities in the Kuranda District The issue has now been taken up by the Health Council and I will be working with District Manager Marlane Byrne to determine how best to proceed.

Congratulations to Cherri Ferrari, co-ordinator of the Kuranda Neighbourhood Centre for your determination to find a new home. The cottage on the corner of Barang Street will provide the opportunity to extend the range of services that can be offered and I look forward to exciting developments. The cottage will need quite a lot of work, but I'm sure the Kuranda community wil lend a hand. I was pleased to provide a couple of old desks - the legacy of my children's high school days.

International Year of the Volunteer is coming to a close. I invited organisations to contact me with the names of volunteers so that I could provide an official certificate of appreciation from the State government. I have provided these for many groups but it's not too late, if you missed out ring Sally in my office on 40382800. I will also be presenting the IYV medallions very shortly to some very deserving people in Kuranda. To each and every one of you out there that give of your time for our community, making a difference to the lives of others, my sincere thanks.

Belt up and buckle your seat belt, grit your teeth, and hang on - you are in for a wild ride! What the Big Dipper is to airspace - Hummer is to the ground. Regarding Nimda (and virus e-mails in general): Most versions of Internet Explorer default to three panes. Top-right is your list of messages and bottom-right is the message itself. The problem is that if you want to delete an e-mail, you have to select it. When you select it, the message opens automatically in the bottom-right pane. If you go to View | Layout, you can turn off the preview pane. Now, you don't have to open a message in order to delete it. The advantages are a reduced likelihood of mail-borne viruses; you can delete spam without opening it and potentially setting cookies from a spammer's site. The disadvantage is if you want to view a new message, you have to double-click to open it up in a new window.

If there is something you see that you're not sure about, you can right-click the suspect e-mail, go to Properties, Details tab, and click the View Source button. Finally, you can forward spam to abuse at whatever.com without ever having to open the e-mail; you can read the headers from the detail tab of the properties window, etc. Anyway, it seems this logic protects me from yet another batch of e-mail viruses. Between the above tactic and my Yahoo e- mail account which also lets me delete e-mails without having to open them. Everything so far is pretty good. As an aside, you can also turn off WAV file playing somewhere in IE's options. I think its Play Sounds under the Advanced section. Just a thought.







WINDOW The Woman in the Window by Alma De Groen is partly set in Leningrad during the Cold War Period in the 1950's and partly in Australia in the 23rd century. The play looks at a time in the life of Russian poet Anna Akhmatova (1889 -1966). Akhmatova was kept under surveillance in Stalinist Russia for long periods between 1934 and 1936. Anna was forbidden to write her own poetry, allowed only to translate works approved by Stalin and was required to show herself to Russian police by standing at her window twice a day. As the poets' apartment was searched regularly for forbidden writing her friends in real life preserved her poems by committing them to memory. SMITH & DOUGLAS by Ron Elgar

Gold! Gold medals galore for our swimmers; gold for our wedding rings; gold fillings in teeth; gold taps in bathrooms for the very rich; gold for the funeral masks of the Pharaohs; gold that signed the death warrant of the Incas; gold glitter for the faces of our little children. Gold! One day we may find that gold has lost its value, and copper is all the rage. Who knows?

On a more local plane of thought the above names might conjure up Smithfield and Port Douglas. Correct! For some people the names Smith and Douglas are synonymous with walking tracks. A great deal of time and money is being spent, right now, on up-grading the walking tracks in the Barron Gorge National Park. The result will be spectacular! Just imagine! You might enter the tracks in Kuranda and emerg, maybe days or weeks later, at Atherton. Impossible? By no means! These tracks and trails are all there, waiting development by some generous department at local, state or federal level.

Both the Douglas and the Smith tracks from the developing camping grounds to Kamerunga are nearing completion. The Douglas track begins (or ends) about 500m north of the park entrance at Stony Creek (Kamerunga), traverses the National Park below Red Bluff, crosses the railway line east of tunnel 14, continues up the slope to Glacier Rock (roughly speaking) and then west to Speewah, crossing Surprise Creek, and continuing through to what has been called Freedom County. The Smith track begins (or ends) Anthony Riley, Jeremy Pollard, at Speewah and passes south of Stoney Creek Falls before

Donahue, Matt Levers, Chris So why rave on about gold and then switch to tracks? Sachiikidis, Darren Coleman, I'm sure many locals know the answer to that. Gold was Elias Wright, Scott Diamond, discovered at Hodgkinson during the 187o's; a little later David Diamond, Ashley Levers, the Atherton Tablelands were opened up for pastoral use Robert Donahue, Clinton - around 1 the early 1900's. But the only shipping port Green, Chad Taylor, Rowan and area where supplies were available was 225 kms north Carroll, Jesse Lewis, Richard at Cooktown. High transport costs prompted miners and Bing, Greg Baird, Raymond pastoralists to demand a shorter, more direct route to the Hudson, Eric Hudson, Gerald coast (about 60 kms) – and the establishment of a port.

Lawson, Ryder Bryant, Ben Thus it was that Sub-Inspector Douglas land party left Thornborough on the Hodgkinson goldfields on September 17th 1876. Descending from Glacier Rock they arrived at Smithfield on September 23rd. At the same time Bill Smith and his party worked their way along what is now the Smith track in the opposite direction, arriving at Thornborough two days after Douglas arrived at Smithfield. The two tracks were identified.

> These tracks became, and remained the main traffic routes from Smithfield on the coast to and across the Tablelands. The opening of the Cairns/Kuranda Rail in 1891 changed this means of travel. However, during the construction of the first leg of the railway, the Douglas track was used as an access for workers.

> There are plenty of historical sites along these tracks. Bottle dumps, dwelling house remains, rail worker's camp, areas cleared for spelling the horses, pits dug in search of gold, and so on. Given time, walkers and tourists may be able to view these relics from the past. Who knows, Stoney Creek Station, then much used, now disused, could be resurrected and used as a staging post: passengers will alight and walk to Speewah or Kamerunga; others will board the train and proceed to Kuranda or Cairns. Either way, the two historical tracks will be in great demand. I believe the whole shebang will be finished well before Christmas this year.

The photos show the entrance to the Smith track at the Speewah Camping Ground (the land at present – September 2001 - is still privately owned by Ron Elgar) and the same track at Tyrconnell Gold Mine where it passes over the creek. The stone-pitched dray road can be clearly identified. When I walked over the crossing it seemed time had stood still; as if it was one hundred years ago. I imagined the Cobb & Co coach and horses and its passengers, and before them the miners, the Chinese, the Aboriginals, all playing their part in what is now local history.

I was taken to the track by Cate Harley who, with Andrew Bell, run the Tyrconnell Historic Gold Mine, near Thornborough. Gentle reader, if you have not been to that area, and if you can do so - then go! It is a truly fascinating, timeless place, and a tribute to the spirit of the old pioneers. Our three grand-children panned for gold near the dray road - and found some! Well, enough to buy an ice-cream.

I hope Smith and Douglas, if they are watching, will both approve the efforts that have been made to resurrect their tracks so that many people from all over the world can enjoy walking them, even if their packs are full of life-giving water and not problem-making gold! Happy walking, and see you on the tracks!



HYDROPONIC GARDENING By Jan Coulter

RECYCLED CONTAINERS- I cut 25I containers in half vertically and end up with two containers, which are very useful for growing herbs etc. A hole needs to be drilled about 5 cm from the bottom on one end for drainage. I like to put together my own herbal tea and I grow peppermint, and lemon balm as well as other herbs in these containers. If you want to grow cucumbers or watercress this hole can be a little higher to allow for a higher reservoir level.

If you cut the top out either side of the handle they are perfect for growing tomatoes. They grow right through the summer, when it rains heavily I leave the tap at the bottom open to allow the rain to flush through. Broccoli boxes are very useful too. Chinese vegetables grow very well in these and in a very short time you have all the greens you need.

My lettuce are growing well at the moment but as there is very little greens about the birds have found them. I was always told to share with the wild life but they are taking more than their share. The wallabies are even reaching over the fence to eat my tomato plants. I have planted out some waterchestnuts again, they grow well when I add a little nutrient to the water.

I have put some guppies in too so as to control insects. Fresh waterchestnuts really taste nice, they are like a cross between coconut and apple. For Information Ph4093 9394.



WHAT IS ORGANICS?

"Organic" implies wholeness and can be applied to a way of life and to the food we eat. Food grown organically enhances the perfect formulas of nature. No chemical pesticides and fertilizers are added to the soil, instead, it is enriched through composting (kitchen scraps, lawn clippings, hay, manure) and sprays such as Bio-dynamic 500 derived from matured cow manure. The young plants are nurtured through the addition of mulch (lawn clippings, purchased hay) and other organically-derived sprays (e.g. seaweed and garlic).

An organic way of life comes about when we eat such food and begin to feel healthier and more in harmony with nature. This inevitably affects a more caring attitude towards our environment and others.

SPROUTING FOR LIFE

Sprouting is something we all know about in connection with seedlings in a nursery, or in our own garden. However, sprouted seeds, grains and pulses are proving to be an invaluable source of life force (i.e. of the energy that sustains and enlivens all living beings).

All that you need is a small handful of seeds, a big empty jar and water. Soak the seeds overnight in plenty of water and, in the case of mung beans, lentils and chick peas, drain and eat. Smaller seeds such as alfalfa, take a little longer, and need to be drained and the jar's opening covered with muslin and an elastic band. They like to be washed morning and evening, and will take about 4 days. (See or ring Gangashwar, if you have any trouble with them).

And further, try unhulled buckwheat, sunflower seeds (not kernels) and whole wheat. Soak as above, drain and place in four to six centimetres of soil. Water gently for seven days, cut and eat.

Lovely greens!WHY RAW FOOD?

I had been living a 'healthy' life and eating almost only vegetarian food for many years, so, when in my early forties I was diagnosed with an immune-deficiency disease, I was very surprised.

I was guided to a raw food health farm to try an 'alternate' cure, that is, 'alternate' to the usual operation and radiation therapy. There was no fridge or stove and we ate two meals a day (with no snacks in between). We drank water till midday, then had a raw fruit meal. At 5pm we had a raw salad meal (with either extra protein or carbohydrate in the forms of nuts or sprouted seeds; grains or legumes).

The above was 12 years ago and I am enjoying a quality of life that has to be experienced to be believed.

The fact is, that raw food, especially organically grown, is filled with life force and it is this energy that can naturally eliminate the offending

cells which result in immune-deficiency diseases.

Cooked food, on the other hand, has lost its life force through the cooking process. Some people will say my body cannot tolerate only raw food. I would say, from my own experience (I was brought up on cooked food) that we are attached to it on deeper levels, perhaps, as in my case, because it related to childhood nurturing. Further, I would venture to say it is the conditioned mind that cannot live without it, not the body.

RAW FOOD RECIPE USING SPROUTS

(From One Straw Organics)

Your Organic mung beans, alfalfa, chickpeas and lentils (the latter when available) - to sprout. Organic unhulled buckwheat, wheat and sunflower seed -to grow into greens (handful of each).

See article on 'Sprouting for Life'.

Organic unhulled tahini (amount to make a dressing)

Organic tamari (soya sauce) (amount to make a dressing)

(optional)

(From Jeff, Joan, Neil or Papa John's Market Stalls (the latter- April to October at Rusty's Markets), Punnet of organic tomatoes or four medium organic tomatoes

1 organic shallot (finely chopped)

½ bunch organic parsley (finely chopped)

1/4 bunch organic rocket (finely chopped)

(when available)

¼ bunch organic coriander (finely chopped) (when available)

1 organic carrot, medium (grated)

1 organic beetroot, medium (grated)

Organic lettuce leaves to lie salad on and eat Organic lemon juice (amount to make a dressing)

Organic honey (amount to make a dressing)

(optional)

When rocket and coriander are unavailable can use 2 cloves of organic garlic (finely chopped). Make dressing in a bottle, combining organic tahini and organic lemon juice, and (optional) organic soya sauce or organic honey.

- 2. Combine all other ingredients (except lettuce leaves).
- 3. Line an open dish with the lettuce leaves.
- 4. Place the salad mix on them.
- 5. When ready to serve, shake dressing and pour over salad.

Serves two as a meal, four as a side-salad.

ORGANIC GARDENING

Lettuce and parsley are flourishing now. I have a large comfrey plant and use 2 raw leaves (chopped) daily. Chokoes have been a mainstay, sliced thin and cooked slowly. My 5 acres of lovely fruit trees, vines, flowers etc. give me much joy as they do for the hundred of butterflies and birds (which I enjoy seeing them flying around my home). Mulch has been a salvation for my plants and fruit trees.

My bore water cannot provide much but the mulch keeps my plants alive. My mulch is prunings and the stalks of torch gingers, which are very prolific. Bananas also provide plenty of mulch from excessive growth but few bananas because no moisture.

I have had a wonderful crop of grapefruit and give them away as they fall. Lettuce - radish - and tomatoes are still thriving with no nasty sprays.

I listen to the news and music on the TV and radio but I cannot see the TV pictures.



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
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
