Centenary Park to get face lift.

The Mareeba Shire Council is intending to upgrade Centenary Park under the Kuranda Infrastructure Project. Work on the Park is to commence mid-October and continue until early 1996.

Stage One of the development will include the relocation of unsuitable trees and other vegetation to various locations around Kuranda. The Park will remain in a fairly 'bare' state until earthworks in the Park are completed and every effort will be made to landscape and stabilise the earthworks prior to the next wet season. The Park is to undergo significant replanting with more suitable plantings for the region.

The Park is to be lower to some degree and the old highway road is to be removed and incorporated into the Park area., effectively increasing the park by 30%.

A central area has been provided in the Park enabling a large area to be used for public recreation. Playground equipment is to be provided for children and this will be constructed in the later stages of the project.

Extensive paving is to be included in the upgrade and this will be constructed to provide pathways through the park and to reduce wear and tear on the lawn areas.

A new toilet facility is to be constructed near the new roundabout end (Thoree St end) of the Park and the old toilets are to be removed. The new block will commence construction in November and should be operational by February 1996.

Detailed plans of the proposed changes to Centenary Park are available for viewing at the Mareeba Shire Council's Kuranda Office. The project engineer Mr Michael Ganza may be contacted on 939 185 for any enquiries regarding the project.

MAKING TRACKS

with Councillor Oliver Gilkerson



1. CONGRATULATIONS are due to two groups who have made great achievements over the past month. The Kuranda Rangers Soccer Club, in only its third year has shown remarkable ability and dedication in winning the Championship Trophy in its area soccer competition.

Council also acknowledges the initiative and enormous hard work of the organisers and contributors to Kuranda's inaugural FACE NORTH FESTIVAL. This wonderful Festival of Arts, culture and the environment will hopefully become an annual event.

2. NEW COUNCIL POLICIES have been developed in a number of areas of local government responsibility.

AN URBAN TREEPLANTING POLICY (applicable only to urban areas) will assist in ensuring that appropriate species are used to beautify our public footpaths with guidelines on safe distances from kerbs, powerlines and similar matters also being provided.

A NEW DONATIONS POLICY provides for four categories of financial assistance by Council to non-profit organisations. Guidelines have been developed to assist in ensuring that budget limits are maintained and there is a fair and equitable distribution of financial assistance.

A POLICY ON THE SALE AND PLACEMENT OF GOODS ON FOOTPATHS will be developed in conjunction with the Kuranda and Mareeba Chambers of Commerce. Copies are available from the Council Office.

3. RECYCLING PLANS are being finalised with a view to introducing kerbside recycling as of 1 January, 1996. To clarify: in Div 4. this major recycling initiative will only involve an extra \$5.00 garbage fee for the domestic service in the 1995/96 year.

4. A WALKING TRACK STRATEGY for the Kuranda Village and immediate surrounds has been developed in conjunction with some of Kuranda's keen walkers. The identifies a network of existing and potential new walking tracks to be up-graded and constructed on an on-going basis. Council has had initial discussions with Wet Tropics, National Parks, QEC and Queensland Rail to look at the possibilities of proceeding in the foreseeable future with a walking track link along the banks of the Barron River linking a footbridge over Jumrum Creek with the end of Weir Road.

KURANDA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

The Chamber is presently acting on several matters of concern to the Kuranda community - matters of importance to both the businesses and to residents.

Firstly - the Chamber has decided to proceed with an application to the State Government to start a Main Street programme in Kuranda. The Main Street planners develop a marketing and development strategy for the central business area and includes such varied aspects as architecture, market identification, landscaping, retailing methods and advertising. We believe that if successful with this application - the business community will be able to build on the excellent base of the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan.

The Chamber is also examining the option of requesting Commonwealth Government assistance in conducting a study on the economic ramifications of Skyrail to the community - both business and private sectors. This may give us directions in order to maximise the benefits of Skyrail and minimise adverse effects. Skyrail represents a totally new form of travel from the coast and is the largest development in people moving in this area since the construction of the railway - and that certainly had major ramifications for this area.

The Chamber is also having a membership drive as we believe that it is important that as broad a spectrum of local businesses as possible have input to the decisions that the Chamber is making. We recently requested that Council assist the Chamber in our marketing efforts by means of a levy through the Benefited Area rates. In essence every business in the central business area will be paying through their rates for the marketing of Kuranda Village - and they should have their input.

The Chamber meets on the first Monday monthly at 7.00pm at the Kuranda Sports and Social Club. Visitors with a business involvement in Kuranda are welcome.

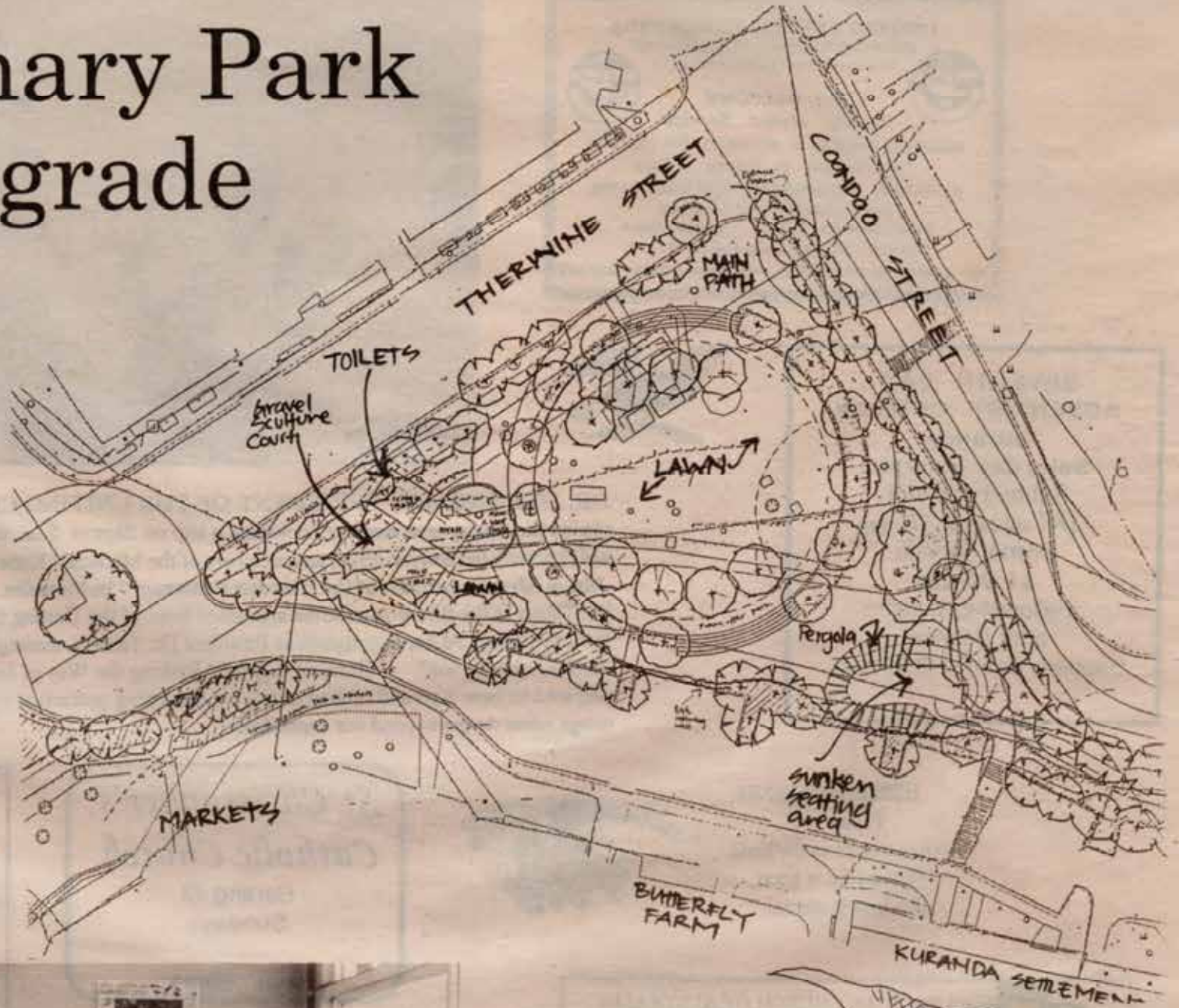

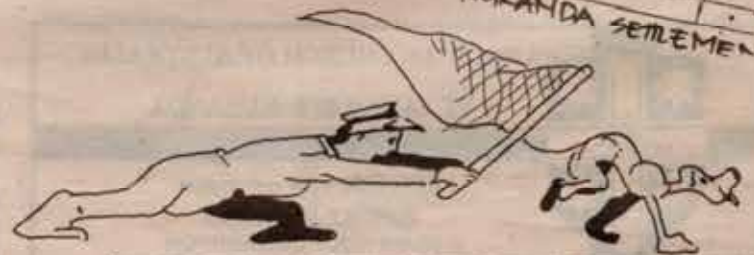

MAREEBA MIDWIFERY UTILITY FOR NEEDY

The needs of disadvantaged women before and after giving birth in the Mareeba district have been targeted through a pilot project being developed by the Mareeba District Hospital.

Funding of \$101,000 over two years for the Mareeba Midwifery Outreach Service was announced yesterday by Health Minister Peter Beattie.

Mareeba District Hospital nursing director Colleen Gray said the programme would provide ante-natal and post-natal care for women in their homes. The services would be of a social and practical nature and, while social workers in the district were doing a worthwhile job, there was a perceived need for women to be able to talk their problems over with a midwife, Ms Gray said.

The hospital served many single mothers, Aboriginal women and women from a variety of ethnic backgrounds and the midwifery outreach services would particularly target their needs.

The pilot programme would be conducted for two years and its effectiveness evaluated, Ms Gray said.

She said the submission for funding reflected the community's needs and the project was one the hospital had been trying to achieve.

"What we are trying to do is respond to the women's needs," Ms Gray said. "I'm pleased the community has supported us and the women have allowed us to know what their needs are. The project was one of 25 to receive grants totalling more than \$1.5 million announced by Mr Beattie.

Mr Beattie said the funding would address a range of issues such as equity in health, collaboration in health care sectors and consumer and community participation.



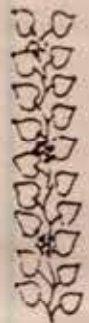

SNOEZELEN FOLLOW UP WORKSHOP

SNOEZELEN was developed in Holland with the intention of providing people who have sensory and learning disabilities with appropriate relaxation and leisure facilities. It consists of multi-sensory experiences generated in a place where attractive lighting and soft music help to establish an atmosphere of trust and relaxation. The sensory experiences provided stimulate the primary senses without the need for intellectual activity. Snoezelen has been installed in special schools, child development centres, hospitals, day centres, hospices, residential homes for the elderly, maternity units, leisure centres and private homes.

Riette Voogt is a program worker with Intellectual Disability Services. She is pioneering the concept of Snoezelen in Far North Queensland, sharing her previous experience in Holland. ORGANIC GARDENING

Marjorie Spear

Send questions to me at Black Mountain Road

I was delighted to get the prize for best country garden in the F.A.C.E. festival. Recent rains have made plants very lovely. The Saraca tree is a picture and so are the dozens of Dendrobium orchids which get no attention. They are in trees getting some sun. They appreciate bark that is a bit loose eg. Meleleucas. They don't thrive on citrus. Hundreds of Impatiens are in full flower with ten or more different colours and variations. They spread with seed and keep the weeds down. They need no attention and pull out easily if in the wrong spot. A Brunfelsia (Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow) looks glorious covered in blossoms which perfume the air. Can any reader help me with advice on how to make them flower as my other two are flowerless. I have seen them flowering in the shade elsewhere. Please help.

Summer is in the air and I hope you enjoy the next few weeks of gardening - it is worth some effort. The birds are happy with the bottle brush flowers and eating plenty of insects. The vegies are flourishing especially cabbages and lettuce. The cool nights are helping - but till rain comes again keep up the mulch and the water.

Cucumbers have not done well - I don't know why. Maybe the soil was not to their liking. Maybe cool nights.

Citrus trees are in full flower - if you notice the leaves are not healthy give them a trace element spray - copper is good. Apply it when 1/2 the flower petals have dropped as a leaf spray.

Black spots on the underside of pawpaw leaves will kill the trees. It is worse in damp cold weather - copper spray on the leaf underside is helpful and may need repeating. Check young pawpaws too.

If your bananas have leaves that are unhealthy cut them off. The spores will not spread from the ground level. Pawpaws also need the same cutting off if the leaves at the bottom are sick.

Hope to see you at the Garden Group on Saturday October 14th. Have you seen the gorgeous Bougainvillea off Coondoo St? ARK treasurer Fred has a verandah at his Feast Factory restaurant overlooking that colourful Bougainvillea.

ARTS QUEENSLAND recently awarded the sum of \$1000.00 for a professional development grant, which enabled me to travel to Melbourne, Vic. for one of the major national craft events of 1995.

Two conferences were presented and over 20 individual and group exhibitions of jewellers and crafts people, were held in conjunction with the conferences. The conferences were held by the Jewellers and Metalsmiths group of Australia, (JMGA) at Melbourne University, and the 2nd National Crafts conference at the Malthouse Theatre Complex.

Titles of the conferences were "Cultural Diversity: a Collaborative Identity" and "Making Culture: Crafts, Communications and Commerce". Several major exhibitions were also held in conjunction with these events at the National Gallery of Victoria, including "Italian Gold" a collection of curated works of world leading goldsmith-designers, Giampolo Babetto and Francesco Pavan and the Vic Health National Crafts Award of \$30,000, which was awarded to Metalsmith/Designer Mark Edgoose.

Other exhibitions included Graduate Metal 6 - a national survey of tertiary students from Australia's leading arts colleges in 1992, 93 and 94. Over 120 pieces of Jewellery and Art metalworks were on display at the Meat Market Craft Centre, who also hosted a satellite exhibition of graduates of the Hiko Mizuno College of Jewellery in Tokyo, and an installation of works from contemporary glass artists of national acclaim. Exhibitions around Melbourne were held by small commercial galleries, at Art studios, and at group workshop spaces, by many contemporary Australian designers.

A large concentration of women artists were represented at these shows, including Susan Cohn, Carlier Makigawa, Marion Marshall, Catherine Truman, Janine Tanzer, Beatrice Schablowsky, Siri Omberg and Bronwyn Goss to name a few. These shows were based on detailing the functions of jewellery and crafts within contemporary and future society, The Object as Icon, The Craftsman Philosopher, Design for Necessity, Origins Ritual and Meaning, Craft Practice - Practice Makes...

Titles of exhibitions were representative of the variation of works and makers, and the nature of issues raised during the conferences: - "The Red Field", "Systematic Reflections on a Safe Future", "The Beast Won't Sleep", "Synthesia", "Production Reproduction", "Syzygy" and "Precious Possessions".

International speakers present at the conferences were Giampolo Babetto, Goldsmith (Italy), Massimo Morozzi, Designer (Italy), Kazuhiro Itoh, Goldsmith, Conceptual Artist (Japan), Peter Hill, Artist (New York), Peter Dormer, Craft writer, Curator (U.K.), Michihiro Watanabe, Consultant UNESCO (Japan), and John Thakara, Consultant, Designer (U.K.). Along with these acclaimed International Artists, Designers, Curators and Writers were a myriad of Australian professionals, crafts people of all doctrines, delivering viewpoints on future directions of Australian crafts, and our place and entrance into the global arena.

An open forum with panels of speakers made contacts possible between all walks of craft and art life, cross communications being one of the most valuable outcomes. Topics on both agendas included "Craft and Education", "Craft and

Industry", "Crafts and Institutions", "Putting Crafts in Place", "Creativity and Commerce", "Maker vs Object", "Production Reproduction" and "Reality, Virtual Reality and the Internet", to cover just a few. (I can't fit 6 days on a page!!) Collective outcomes posed strong directions for the future growth of crafts in Australia and overseas, and a positive outlook for the survival of the craftsperson, in today's and future societies.

I was able to make contacts with fellow metal heads from all over Australia (Tas., Vic., S.A., N.S.W and N.T.) and Japan, and forged some new links for future directions and exhibitions forthcoming. 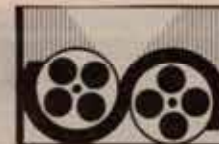

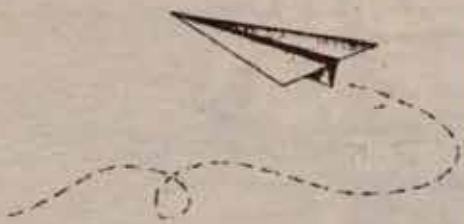

He will open with a bracket of poems for children at 6.30pm sharp, followed by a main course and dessert (\$8 adult/\$5 kids).

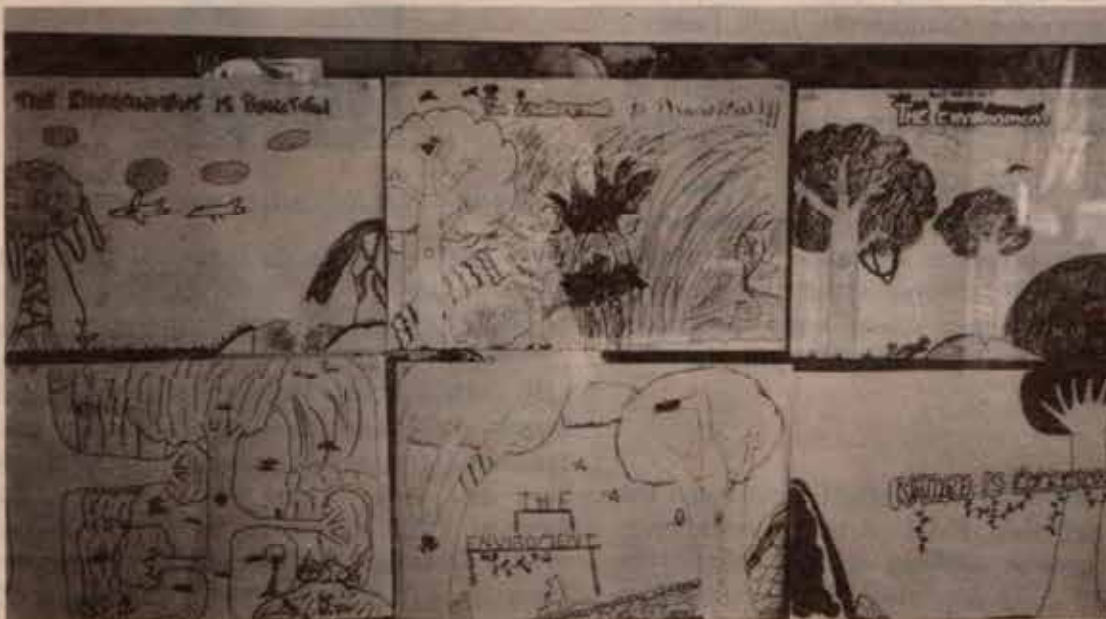

BOOK REVIEW: CAIRNS Reef to Rainforest

I begin my review of Kuranda resident and award winning Master Photographer (that's a title not a description) Peter Jarver's glossy photographic portrait of the Cairns region with a reference to another book.

In Peter Carey's novel "Oscar and Lucinda" the hero Oscar, who is terrified of the sea, must cross the ocean from the England to Sydney in the year of 1863. To curb his panic he takes a piece of transparent celluloid and draws a grid of squares on it. This is his strategy to control his phobic fear of the vast expanse of water. Square by square, framed and contained he can face and accept the unacceptable. For me this concept also helps explain in some way the quite mysterious effect a photograph can have on the eye and mind.

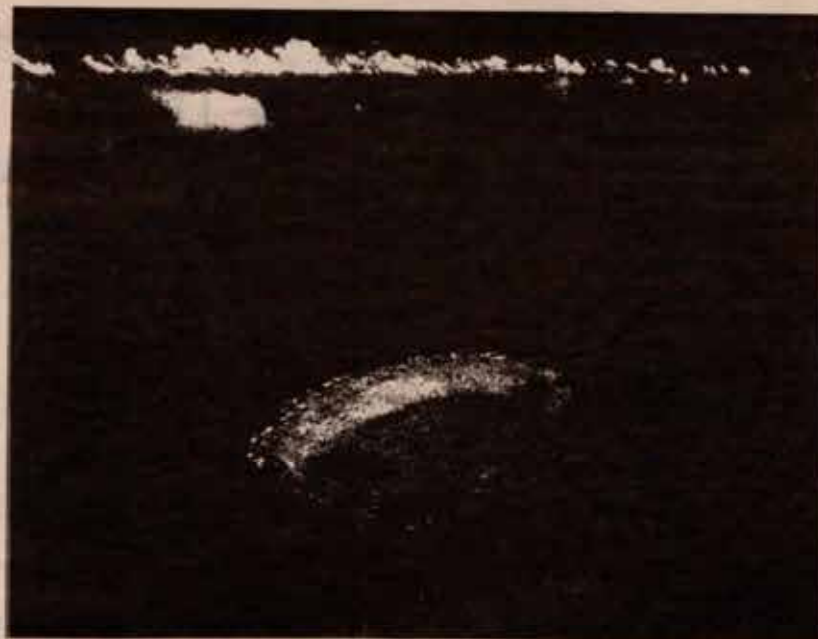
There are some truly superb photographs in Peter Jarver's book. No wonder it is a hit with tourists capturing as it does the essence of the region. For a resident it has another effect, separating individual places, times and moods from everyday life and reminding you of what a spectacularly beautiful place we live in. Anyone who has left the region for a while and then returned will be familiar with this sensation of seeing home through new eyes.

This is a real home grown product, published by Kuranda's own Thunderhead Publishing. The text is by Robert Reid, a frequent visitor to the region. The book is divided into chapters covering historic Cairns (did you know the first declared public building in Cairns was an empty brandy case hung on a tent pole?), modern day Cairns, Kuranda, Reef, Rainforest and major National Parks of North Queensland.

Peter Jarver's photographs really are splendid. The images are sometimes so perfect you wouldn't believe them true - unless you've experienced it for yourself. Then you know - yes, it's just like that. A great book to give as a souvenir, a lure or to evoke unspeakable envy. A treat for jaded eyes. I intend to keep mine in the littlest room in the house where I will hopefully remember to occasionally treat myself to the pleasures others cross the world and spend thousands of dollars to enjoy. The exception to this is any aspiration I ever had to try the Gordonvale Pyramid race the pain on the face of a competitor is so well captured on page 35 it's palpable.

It is important to keep mobile to avoid the discomfort of arthritis etc. which plague the elderly. Walking is the best exercise, using a walking stick if necessary. I have osteoporosis which means my bones are fragile and brittle. Falling can be disastrous. A physiotherapist gave me several exercises which I do regularly to help my mobility. These I do several times a day. The aches and pains of old age have decreased a lot since I started exercising regularly - some exercises can be done on a bed, so can be done on waking up and when taking a mid-day rest. Other exercises are done in the fresh air plus some deep breathing. Daily exercising, is the key to mobility of joints. Therapeutic massage is very helpful though it can be painful. A small book of exercises (easily obtainable) is a splendid investment. There is a weekly class at the C.W.A. Hall to get you started on a mobility programme.

The weather is warming up so drinking plenty of water is more pleasant. It is important to drink several glasses of water daily for kidney health but not with meals. Herb teas can replace water if you like a warm drink but tea is not recommended. No drinking with meals. I grow several herbs but my ginger roots made a great drink boiled. It is a great tonic and with a very little honey is delicious.

PROCESS WORK

Good news . . . A Process Oriented Psychology workshop will be held on the Tablelands early November. Max Shupbach Ph.D. and Jytte Vikkelsoe (Diplomat of Process Work) are arriving from the U.S. to facilitate a ten day intensive course at Thredbo N.S.W. and will be including a PROCESS IN ACTION workshop at Yungaburra. There is already an on going group in the Cairns region with some students studying for a diploma or masters in Process Psychology.

Process work originated some 20 years ago by Dr. Arnold Mindell and his colleagues in Switzerland. Its main centre today is in Portland Oregon and has institutes and training groups in many countries creating a P.O.P. network. In Australia there has been a training program for the last five years with training communities in Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Wollongong, the Gold Coast and Cairns. Max and Jytte split their time between living in Portland and teaching and travelling worldwide.

The origins of process work can be found in Jungian Psychology, Physics and Taoism. It provides a unifying theory for working with and understanding our dreams and body problems as well as relationships, groups and world events. The underlying philosophy in all levels of process work is that what ever is happening in the moment is the seed of a dreaming process that can be unfolded to reveal its meaning. Therefore a patterned and meaningful flow of life can be accessed and unfolded by following our difficulties, body symptoms, relationship conflicts and life crises. Our life situations are seeds of a process which when unfolded reveal new and challenging ways of being and provide opportunities for richer and deeper living.

The ten day intensive course is designed for work with relationships to learn and to practice a wide variety of new relationship skills and for those interested to learn process oriented relationship facilitation. We are addressing people interested in improving their relationship skills as well as professional therapists wanting to deepen their work in this area. We therefore would like to make a point in welcoming everybody. This will be held at Thredbo Alpine Village N.S.W. from the 17th to the 26th of November with a group of students from Cairns and region attending.

The Tablelands workshop will focus on Process in Action. An experiential workshop with space for discussion held at Genazzano Centre, Atherton tablelands Yungaburra on the weekend of the 10th, 11th and 12th of November.

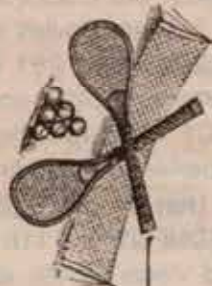
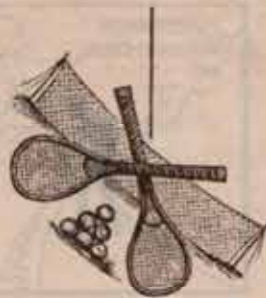

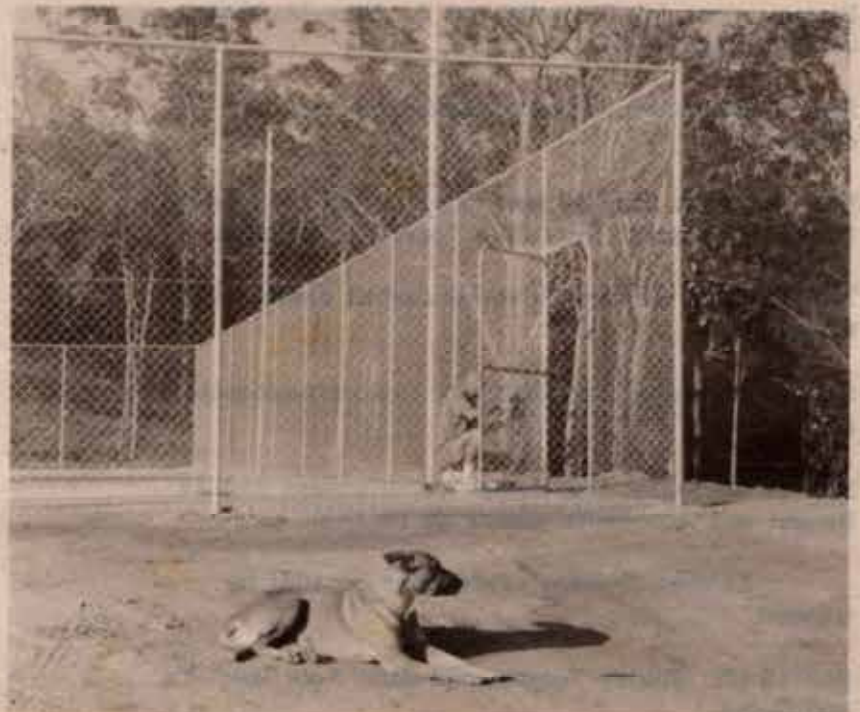


MANTAKA BUSH SPORTS CLUB

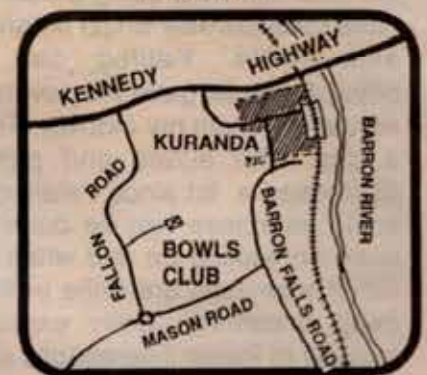

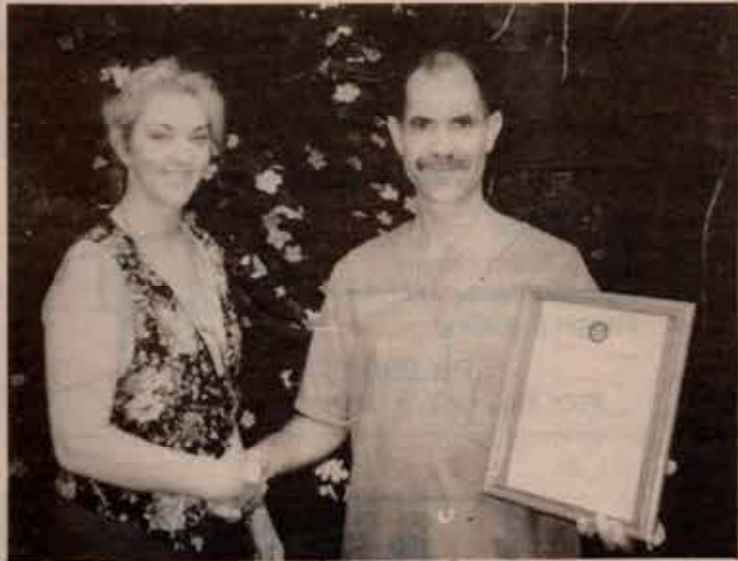

PETER ROGGENKAMP THANKS SPONSORS

The serenity of Peter Roggenkamp's hilltop home in Kuranda and the cockpit of his 270kph open wheel racing car are worlds apart. However he regularly jets away with Qantas to the country's racing circuits to indulge his passion for motor racing.

Roggenkamp, who has just begun 'Peter Roggenkamp Drive Safe', a driver training organisation, has been racing since 1973. He began racing at Townsville's now defunct Savannah Speedway initially driving a Ford Cortina. Since winning his first title of Rookie of the Year in 1974, Roggenkamp has won more than a 100 major speedway championship races around the country and in New Zealand. He won several North Queensland Speedway sedan, speedcar and sprintcar championships and was runner-up Queensland sedan champion in 1976. Also in that year he won what was then Australia's longest speedway race, the 75 Lap Little Indy Championship at Bundaberg. As a result of his performances during 1976 he was chosen to represent Australia against the U.S.A in speedway sedan test matches. To cap off a great year he was named the North Queensland Sportsman of the Year. Roggenkamp continued his successful speedway career going on to represent Australia 14 times, several as Captain, and in 1981 he won the Australasian Speedway Sedan Championship in Auckland New Zealand after which he retired from Sedan racing. At that time he began racing a speedway sprintcar which he campaigned successfully for five years winning the North Queensland championship. During that time he began rallying, winning the Queensland Country Rally Championship three times, in 1984-85 and '87. In 1988 he retired from motor sport only to be lured back in 1992 when he won a competition to race an AUSCAR Commodore on the Calder Park Thunderdome in Melbourne. Due to the huge cost of racing one of these cars he had to satisfy his need for speed by racing bicycles. However in 1993 he leased a Formula Ford open wheel racing car, which is similar to a Formula 1 car but with less power, smaller tyres and no aerodynamic aids, but still capable of speeds up to 270kph. He contested the Queensland Formula Ford Championship at Brisbane's Lakeside circuit finishing 10th. in his first ever road racing season. In 1994 he finished fifth and in November of '94 purchased his own English built Swift Formula Ford which was two years old. With two rounds remaining in the 1995 Queensland Formula Ford Racing Car Championship, Roggenkamp is lying in third place only four points behind the leader after winning the last round. He jets out to Brisbane with Qantas again this month for the penultimate round of the championship. Should he be able to repeat his last round performance and win he will assume the lead of the championship. But, completing against 20 other drivers all of whom also want to win, his task will be very difficult. However with the assistance of the local sponsors - Tolly's signs, Tropical Petroleum, Cairns auto Trimming and the local community, Roggenkamp will be doing all he can do to win the championship as a way of thanking all of his loyal supporters and bringing to Kuranda its first ever motor racing championship.

LIONS GO FOR GOLD

Lions Clubs across Australia are to share in the sweet success of Australia's Paralympians by aiming to donate \$200,000 from the sale of Lions Mints through the "Go for Gold in the U.S.A." appeal. The funds will support the 150 athletes competing at the Paralympic Games in Atlanta, U.S.A. in 1996.

At the 1992 Paralympic Games in Barcelona, Australia finished sixth in the medal count, against 93 countries competing. The Kuranda community can assist fundraising by purchasing Lions Mints, helping these athletes to participate and excel in their chosen sports.

Guest speaker at Kuranda Lions Club at its meeting on Monday 11 Sept was Jacob Baldwin, also supporting Australia's Paralympian athletes, but in his own unique way. Jacob has undertaken an historic 16,500 km trek around Australia in his electric wheelchair. His 820 day journey began in Sydney in early 1992. 


