The 1996 North Queensland Track Cycling Titles held in Townsville over the New Year weekend proved to be very successful for the 3 Walters' boys from Kuranda.

16 year old Joel won the U/17 North Queensland Cyclist of the Year for 1995 and was presented with his award at the Track Titles. This award finished off a great year for Joel who had won Gold and Bronze medals at State Track and Road Titles, represented Qld. at both National Track and Road Titles and had won a Bronze medal at National level for Track racing. Joel now goes up an age division and rides for 2 years in the U/19 division. At the 96 North Qld. Track Titles. Joel won a silver medal in the 3000m Individual Pursuit, and is training hard for the State Track Titles to be held in Brisbane, Feb 2nd - 11th.

13 year old Evan, racing in his 2nd year of the U/15 Division won 3 Gold medals at the 96 Track Titles and has his sights set on the State Titles in Brisbane on Feb 9 - II. Evan improved a lot through 1995, which was his first serious year of racing. Evan was presented with a trophy for "Best Junior Rider" for 1995 in the Caims Cycling Club and he also won the Junior Road Series Trophy for 95. As a result of their good efforts Joel and Evan have both obtained sponsorship from AWA Avionics at Caims airport.

10 year old Neal was racing in his 1st year of the U/13 division at the 96 Track Titles and he won 1 Silver and 2 Bronze medals. Neal won the Arthur Strike Handicap Trophy which is an annual event for younger riders in the Cairns Cycling Club. He also won the Gold medal for U/11 Club Track Champion for 1995.

CENTENARY PARK PLANNED TO BE A BOTANICAL **EXPERIENCE**

Kuranda's Centenary Park is to be landscaped with hand-picked rainforest species, selected for their interesting and beautiful characteristics. The aim is to provide a year long display for the pleasure of visitors and locals alike.

This is another step on the long road to the creation of a number of regional botanical gardens and annexes stretching from Welpa to

1996 promises to be another busy year for the Mareeba Shire Council, and for Kuranda.

WASTE MANAGEMENT/RECYCLING STRATEGY:

As of January 1st 1996 a new door to door recycling system was introduced as part of Council's new Waste Management Strategy. A detailed report on the recycling scheme appears elsewhere in this paper. At the same time work on upgrading transfer stations throughout the Shire (with priority being given to Kuranda's) is underway. Once the sorting station at Mareeba is complete Council has agreed to take recyclables from Douglas shire for sorting and dispatch to southern manufacturers. Council is also finalising plans for a facility whereby chemical containers from farmers are collected, sorted, compacted and baled for plastics recycling. Since successfully prosecuting an absentee Biboohra landowner for uncontrolled and haphazard storage of many hazardous chemicals and minerals. Council has been pushing for the establishment of a noxious waste treatment facility in North Queensland. At present no adequate facility exists outside of south-east Queensland.

STRUCTURAL REFORM OF COUNCIL:

Council is also embarking on a major program of structural reform of the Council administration. An independent organisational and management Review Report (available at the Council offices) has identified scope for improvements in the efficiency with which Council is managed and Council services are provided for the community. Recommendations have been made which will probably see the most far reaching organisational and management reforms in the Shire's history. A flatter management structure with the most modern approach toward establising chains of command, management responsibility, performance review, delegation of responsibility, the introduction of commercial efficiencies into the provision of Council services etc. will all feature in the new arrangements.

Following a number of special meetings to examine the Report and consider It's findings, Council has moved to commence the implementation process by adopting a new corporate structure. The new simplified structure is:

It is anticipated that the new Managerial Positions will be advertised shortly. Following recommendations in the

Report, Council is also reviewing It's Divisional arrangements. Further micro reforms will follow once Managers have been appointed.

DCP- KURANDA VILLAGE:

Council will adopt it's new Development Control Plan (DCP) for the Kuranda Village very shortly. Many long hours have been spent examining the public submissions and the town planning consultant has recommended some alterations accordingly. Once adopted by Council the Village DCP will be assessed by the Department of Local Government before being "gazetted" as the new official plan. At the same time, the appointment has been made for a complimentary Development Control plan for the Environs of Kuranda. To ensure consistency between the planning instruments opportunity will be taken, at the same time for a review of relevant sections of the Shire's Strategic Plan and planning policies. The entire process of reviewing, up dating and improving the planning scheme will be in accord with proposed new State Government planning legislation and will give Mareeba Shire probably the most up-to-date scheme in Queensland.

Completion of Hunter Park Sports Complex.

*1996 Tree planting Scheme (over 60,000 trees planned across Shire).

Completion of Centenary Park (including new toilet facility).

Further Implementation of Kuranda Strategic Management Plan. Completion of planning & design work for Library and

Community Centre. * Improvements & Augmentation to recreation reserves and walking tracks.


Although a holiday season for some, the December - January period has been business as usual for ARK, with two very successful meetings. And, as usual, the agendas were jam packed with information. Just some of the items of interest covered: for full details join & receive full minutes: \$10 per year, \$5 pensioners.

*WILDLIFE REFLECTORS: Following strong lobbying by ARK and Council the Dept of Environment & Heritage (DEH) have agreed to pursue the possibility of conducting trials of new wildlife reflectors in the Shire.

*Q-RAIL LAND ON ARARA St, KURANDA: At the January meeting we were very pleased to hear that Council has agreed to designate the Q-Rail land on Arara St into the Green Belt and reject commercial development there- it now becomes community land. The DCP-Village, with this and other recommendations, will now go to the Minister.

*CATS: The Mareeba Shire Council has developed a draft Local Law for the Control of Cats in the Shire. ARK and other community groups are examining this draft to make comments. Residents can view the draft at Council offices and make comments on the draft before February 15th.

The draft covers registration, breeding, curfews etc.



*DOMESTIC FOWL IN CREEKS & WATERWAYS: ARK has received concerns regarding the release of ducks & geese into natural waterways. Apart from the obvious threat to native amphibians and fish and possible competition for habitat affecting native wildlife, there is of course concerns regarding pollution of water and degradation of creeks banks. ARK has contacted Council and DEH to assess who has responsibility in this area.

*ADVERTISING LEAFLETS: Cnr Gilkerson said that following an application to obtain police approval for the handing out of advertising leaflets in Kuranda and Mareeba, Council has now adopted a SHIRE WIDE policy against the granting of such applications. Therefore such action is not permitted and prosecution can occur.

*SPEED RESTRICTIONS IN TOP KOWROWA AREA: Council will impose a 60km per hour speed limit in this area with signs to be erected, advising speed and warning that pedestrians use this section of Myola Rd. 2.2: CAIRNS-TABLELANDS TRANSPORT OPTIONS: Eleven options (including upgrading the existing situation) were put forward for discussion during a consultation meeting with ARK management and the planners developing the options study for the Dept of Transport.

The 'Quaid" road was not an option.


The other options ranged from Smithfield in the north to the old Tinaroo Creek road in the south. The latter is not considered feasable because of the amount of environmental damage. All other options included a 'tunnel' approach for various lengths of the proposed route. Two options for increasing the range road were considered not acceptable because of negative visual and environmental impact. Clearly all routes were affected by these concerns especially in World Heritage areas although the 'tunneling' of roads

CABOMBA WEED

This noxious weed is present in some waterways on the Tablelands. The Lands Department warns It has the potential to become a serious problem it not acted on early.

The weed, submerged in water except for a few floating leaves, and the white or cream flowers produced in summer, can grow in ponds, lakes, dams and slow-moving streams. The submerged leaves are green, feathery and branch into a fan shape up to 5cm acrss. The slender stems can be up to 2m long. The plant is usually rooted in mud (1-3m deep) but can float in deeper waters.

It reproduces by stem fragments and possibly seeds, so removal by hand must be done carefully to be effective.

The removed plants must then be destoyed. An aquatic herbicide is being developed. Anyone who thinks they may have found an infestation should take a sample, call the Lands Department and report it.

would probably mean they would be acceptable but expensive. Other range options included two lanes up from Caravonica and two down to Smithfield which might improve traffic flow in lower section and a number of variations on part road - part tunnel. The 'tourism' value of the lookout is considered important.

Agreement was reached that the only long term solution was to remove the heavy traffic & through traffic from the Range and direct it towards an area west of Kuranda - preferably beyond the Barron River bridge to avoid a bottleneck there. This would mean the Range Road would essentially serve the Kuranda region as well as continuing in its role as a regional scenic drive - this should prolong its effectiveness by many years without the need for significant widening. Several options along this line were displayed starting in the Redlynch - Kamerunga area and opening onto the Tablelands in the Speewah -Douglas Track area. ARK representatives rejected these options because of the residential nature and environment values of the area and suggested that an option further west be given more support. One route which opened in the region of the Koah road would be very expensive and a route opening somewhere between Speewah and Koah is probably most feasable - this almost all tunnel, so again very expensive. There are also wind problems with such long tunnels.

The Dept of Transport has agreed to keep ARK informed as to the results of the study and ongoing consultation.

* CEMETERY SIGN: broken sign being replaced with new timber sign.

*QUEENS CREEK BRIDGE, MYOLA: has been found unsafe for heavy loads and had a load limit imposed. Will be replaced after the Wet.

*YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CO-ORDINATOR: Council has appointed Matthew Arnold.

*BLACK MT RD INTERSECTION: Council has met with the various departments concerned. The Dept of Transport still feel that closure of the intersection is their preferred option. Council has requested more research be done into other options including costings etc. When these are received council will organise a public meeting to discuss the situation with residents and other interested parties.

*CENTENARY PARK: The Advisory Committee has viewed the landscaping plan for the park and it will to be planted out with a wide range of rainforest species to allow for year long display - most are endemic to the area. A community art project is also envisaged for the Park and a public art policy is to be developed for commissions and other projects.

*MULTI-STORY CAR PARK: has not proven viable and will not go ahead. This means interim solutions will now become permanent and a motion was moved and carried at the the December meeting "that ARK write to council requesting that council return to the long term strategy for a bus parking area at the entrance to Rob Veivers Drive, as established during the community consultation phase of the KSMP Study, and pursue it with all speed, to resolve the bus parking problem."

*BARRON GORGE LOOKOUT UPGRADE: Senior Ranger Steve Collins has contacted ARK to advise that the recommendations and concerns expressed by ARK last year had been addressed in the plans and offered a viewing of the plans. More details at February meeting.

*KURANDA COMMUNITY CLEAN UP DAY: March 3rd 1996. A great effort last year with some 100 bags of rubbish collected. Volunteers needed, please contact either Bob Madden on 930 169, Farzad Nooravi 937 160 or Jax Bergersen on 938 834.

*SES BUILDING: to be completed soon and painted to complement Ambulance Station.

*KURANDA RANGERS SOCCER CLUB representative Tracey Rusch addressed the January meeting, outlining the club success thus far and problems caused by a lack of suitable venue for competition sport. ARK offered support for KRSC's efforts and Mayor Chris Lewis, Councillor Oliver Gilkerson and State and Federal Members present all offered their support.

Planning and design process for the new library is being finalized and Council is hopeful that construction will begin before the end of the year. Our librarians and users are looking forward to removal day.

KURANDA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND TOURISM

The Chamber went into recess over the Christmas break but the work to ensure our commercial future continued in the various committees of the Chamber.

The joint Kuranda and Mareeba application for Main Street funding was submitted and congratulations must go to the marketing committee for an excellent proposal. We hope to learn of the Governments decision in the near future. The indications received so far are positive.

Over the next two months the Chamber has to prepare its report to the Council asking for the establishment of a marketing budget through the benefited area rates levy. All too often - the marketing of this town is left to the pockets of just a few of the businesses. This has meant that our advertising strategy has often been implemented on an ad hoc basis and that no continuing marketing theme for the town been instituted. It is also very unfair on the minority who have been forced to carry the burden.

The Chamber has also made submissions to the Kuranda Strategic Management Committee asking that the greening of the town and the remedy of our present "tar and cement" facade proceed as quickly as possible. The Chamber supports fully the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan.

We are also eagerly awaiting Council's decisions on the many applications submitted under the signage by-laws. The Council's by-laws were the result of Chamber's submissions in the past. A larger and improved design for the Kuranda Village Guide is nearing finalisation. Businesses are reminded that entry to this important publication is only available to the Chamber's members. We hope that the guide will be given to all visitors arriving on either the Scenic Rail or on Skyrail.

*KURANDA HIGH SCHOOL: Member for Barron River, Lyn Warwick requested direction from the meeting on this matter. All agreed it was the responsibility of the Government to deliver on it's promise of a High School for Kuranda by January 1997 - and although the Minister now admits the facility will not be ready by this date, the site could be and some work begun. On the other hand no one wanted to see the school built on 'bad blood' and wanted the owners of the land paid a fair price. Council and others stated that although there had been exhaustive searches for an alternate site [to the Myola site] which would meet the requirements of the Education Department but it had been to no avail. ARK has requested the State settle this as a matter of urgency.

* TABLELAND SUGAR MILL - EFFECTS OF FREIGHT ON RANGE ROAD: Although sugar in the form of syrup will go to coast via Palmerston Highway not Range Road, construction materials, fuel and ongoing store will come up the Range. This is

cause for great concern.

*OPTUS & TELESTRA CABLES: These companies currently operate under the Telecommunications Act and do not need to confer with council nor gain approval. Member for Leichhardt Peter Dodd reported the Federal Government is now reviewing this policy. ARK will urge Council to develop a pro-active policy on this issue.

*BARRON FALLS STATION & RAIL LINE SAFETY: Following the tragic accident recently Council, Police, SES and Q-Rail are examining ways to make these areas safer. Mayor Chris Lewis said Kuranda was very fortunate indeed to have such dedicated people in our emergency services. ARK also sincerely thanks all involved.

*WET TROPICS : A disappointing turn up for the December 11th meeting but very helpful to those who did attend. Thanks to Rosemary Hill for running the meeting. The impact of Wet Tropics on us and visa versa is so important, and we have waited seven years for this draft report. Secretary Gayle Hannah said she felt there are serious problems - the plan comes in two parts - the second part, the statutory plan is the "teeth" and it appeared that the legislation was too weak to actually support proper management. She felt it was unworkable and would for the most part not halt the ongoing degradation and overall 'eating away' of World Heritage areas. There is still more than a month to lodge a submission (closing date March 1st). Copies free of charge by calling 008 061 134.

a Kuranda lifestyle column on critters who share our space

The Christmas/New Year period means I haven't got a question this month, so I thought we could talk about one of our most common neighbours in Kuranda. Frogs. And this is not referring to a restaurant in the main street!



Kuranda's frogs have almost become part of our day to day lives. They are constant companions and have provided many an artist with material for their works, whether it is painting, stained glass or quilting to name some. The coming of rain also means the return of the frog calls.

Queensland has about 110 species of frogs and we have many of these in North Queensland. More than half our frogs are found in the Wet Tropics. The more visible ones around here are Green Tree Frog, Dainty Green Tree Frog, Giant Green Tree Frog, Torrent Tree Frog and Rocket Frogs.

We have some of these in our bathroom, in the washing machine, the guttering, under the house, in the loo, just about everywhere really at the right time of the year. The Green House shop had a resident Dainty Green Tree Frog for about three months. All I did was spray it every now and then with a fine mist of water and it seemed very contented.

Once somebody rang the Environment Centre and asked if we would start a campaign calling for a boycott of washing machine company manufacturers until they made their machines frog proof. This goy had just pulled three mangled frogs out of his clothes! Like all good campaigners, he didn't just present the problem—he also provided a solution. He was an engineer and had designed a frog proof washing machine.

There are a number of reasons that are suggested for the global decline of frogs apart from being chewed up in washing machines. Cane toads, herbicides and insecticides, loss of breeding areas through urban development and even the greenhouse effect is suspected. Frogs are increasingly recognised as sensitive environmental indicators.

Frogs have also declined from protected areas such as National Parks and scientists are not fully sure as to why. Even since our northern rainforests were protected by World Heritage listing in December 1988, at least three frogs have completely disappeared from our region.

We are able to raise frogs from tadpoles in our backyard and there is a great book available to get you started. Carried out correctly, the methods suggested result in a high success rate.

Frog spotting at night is great fun. The trick is to go with two friends and take a torch each. Upon hearing a call, circle it from about ten feet away and each point your torch to where you think the frog is. Where the torchbeams intersect is usually not far from the frog. Remember though, it is illegal to collect frogs without a permit. Collecting memories is more fun anyway.

WILDLIFE RESCUE

Life in the wild has always been tough. Everything we do, no matter how large or small, impacts on the well being of our native wildlife. All too often animals that encounter man come off second best. That's why FNQ Wildlife Rescue Association is here to help. Two years after its inception, facilitators of the FNQ Wildlife Rescue Association receive more than 400 calls per month for assistance with native animals in distress, or simply for information and advice. WHAT SHOULD I DO IF I FIND AN INJURED NATIVE ANIMAL? The first thing to ascertain when confronted with an injured or orphaned animal is whether it needs rescuing, and whether this can be done safely for you and the animal. Once rescued, most animals will calm down if placed on a soft towel or similar, in a darkened box or bag. A furless joey cannot keep itself warm. If you have found a young joey you will need to wrap it securely in a warm cloth and either tuck it down your shirt or place it next to a well-wrapped warm water bottle and cover it over snugly. The animal's skin should feel warm to touch (place against your cheek or arm). Once it is nice and warm, leave it to sleep.

Native animals that require rescuing usually are too upset, chilled or ill to eat or drink voluntarily, and will become stressed if forced. It is therefore preferable NOT to attempt to give food or fluids until expert advice has been sought. If they are secure and where appropriate have been warmed, you have given them the best chance of surviving the immediate crisis.

KURANDA LANDCARE Our work is far from finished.

After the last 3 years of tree planting, we can now see many areas around Kuranda where our trees are growing well and transforming ugly wasteland into pleasant green areas. This is not just a beautification program - it also substantially reduces the fire hazard and soil erosion in these areas.

The signs we are erecting in the neighbourhood bring people's attention to the beauty of the area, and point out its fragility. If we are to preserve the special qualities of this area for our children, we must continue to be vigilant and keep repairing the damage. Vigilance is necessary because careless destruction abounds and people have short memories of what has changed. When a road is widened, or a beautiful tree thoughtlessly cut down, there is usually quite an outery. However, 6 months later we have adjusted and forgotten what it used to be like. As an area develops, this happens continuously. Just go away for a while - on your return you always notice the changes, but those who stayed have already become used to it! So there is a continual attrition and degradation of our environment and eventually we find ourselves no longer in a natural environment at all!

Our Landcare group is trying to rectify this and reverse the trend. It also shows that people can do something - they don't just have to watch it all disappear.

We also have to influence various government departments and instrumentalities. Certain procedures have been carried, and as the vegetation does not appear to be a priority, it is overlooked. This is where we, as a community, can emphasise that the natural environment is a priority to us, and we can help develop more environmentally sensitive policies. Kuranda Landcare has had considerable contact with FNQEB, the Department of Transport and Mareeba Shire Council and we will continue this dialogue in the future.

As our tree plantations become more established, many people are commenting on how good they look. The presence of these plantations shows there is an alternative and so have an educational effect as well. It is most gratifying to see so many private landholders now planting out their properties with rainforest trees. Let's hope the days of people planting rows of pine trees or palms are coming to an end, and we will see the botanical diversity of the area being recreated in people's gardens. This will attract wildlife, recreate wildlife corridors and reduce weed growth and erosion.

After a pleasant Christmas break we will be recommencing plantings in earnest, to make the most of our wet season. We will be working on Fallon Road, Gregory Terrace Park (called Desolation Park for the way the forest was flattened by the old council), Warril Drive, Barron Falls Road, Ros Common, Harris Park and Kuranda Springs. Mason Road has become a much more attractive area recently with many people planting out their properties and considerable natural regrowth being allowed to recur. However, there are a number of areas which could be revegetated and we would welcome comments and assistance from Mason Road residents.

If you would like to be involved as a tree planter or if you could supply any mulch, please give Howard Stevens a call on 938.766. Our planting sessions are from 7.30am to 8.30am every Saturday.

Tree planting is healthy in every way!

ORGANIC GROWING by Marjorie Spear

The dreadful dry hot weather we have had has made life hard for plants. Deep rooted trees are displaying lovely blossoms with no water. But shallow rooted veges like lettuce and cucmber have to be watered twice a day and well mulched and put under shade cloth tents during the heat of the day. Mignonette is doing well and so are my non -hearting lettuce. What a delight to enjoy fresh lettuce. If the soil is healthy the bugs keep away. They prefer the sap in sick plants. Permaculture is preferred by some people. It may be reliable if you like chemically grown food. The earth provides the medium for feeding all creatures. Keep the earth healthy, keep healthy with healthy food. Tomatoes are difficult to grow in summer. Try them in tubs or big pots and never water overhead. The Hardy Tom is a reliable big cherry fruit. If you buy straw mulch try using half a bale, open up the centre and fill with healthy soil. Then plant into that soil, about 15cm of soil, you can use a whole bale and make several holes depending on what you plant. A sharp knife is best to cut out the straw. Pumpkins, cucumbers, vine crops and tomatoes grow well in the straw and can ramble down the bale. For a no dig garden put layers of newspapers under your bale. Apple cucumbers and Italian do best now. They need to scramble but not over metal, it is too hot. The fruit fly menace is serious. The ABC has a leaflet on ways to catch these flies. You hang a bottle in a leafy tree and the flies feed on green fruit eg. citrus and do not need the bait in the tree they attack. Hang a mixture of vegemite and water after making a slurry first. Keep the mixture strong and if it dries out add more water. Make a small hole so the fly can get into the jar above the mix - the flies are attracted to the vegemite smell. The small hole makes it difficult for the fly to get out. A 2 It milk or coco-cola bottle are best.

Artificial fertilisers cause cells to bloat and cell walls to weaken. This makes it easy for nasty insects to attack your plants. Crusher dust from Tichum Creek is a very useful cheap natural additive to the soil if mixed in well or used to bank up the soil round fruit trees growing on a slope.

There are finer grades of rock dust which are available to plants more readily - phone me 937205 if you need to know where to buy.

KISC is very grateful to Kay for all the hard work she put in (above and beyond the call of duty and the paycheck!) to make the report such a useful document for future use by the



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
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
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MAREEBA SHIRE RECYCLYING & WASTE **MANAGEMENT SCHEME**

The Mareeba Shire Council's recycling scheme has now been running for about a month and reception to the scheme varies from " Great! It's about time!" to "@#*&!!!!!" and somewhere in between.

Council is confident that the wrinkles can be ironed out using a bit of commonsense, co-operation and EFFORT!

easy to put all our rubbish in the bin and forget about where it goes. On the other hand no-one wants more landfill regional dump at Lamb Range?

It is now a national goal to halve the amount of waste going into landfill by the year 2000. And whilst this is a worthwhile goal in itself ... it is not enough. We must also learn to treat waste not as a nuisance but as a resource. More about this on Page 14.

By participating in the Mareeba Shire Council scheme you will be doing your part towards supporting a regional waste management strategy, helping to reduce the pressure on our shrinking natural resources, save energy and reduce the negative impacts on the environment.

This scheme offers you the opportunity to be part of the solution not the problem. It also gives you the chance to " think globally, act locally".

WHAT CAN I RECYCLE WHERE DOES IT GO?

PAPER: paper products comprise a very large percentage of domestic and commercial waste. All paper is recyclable but office waste such as copy paper, envelopes etc is the most valuable. Council is working on a strategy to recover this waste. At present it is too contaminated to be used to its full potential. You could remove stamps (Amnesty International resell them for their fight for human rights - drop into Green House Environment Shop) and save office waste until you go to Cairns - NQ Recycling on Lyon St take it.

If not it is, with all the other paper waste-including newspaper, cardboard, popper & milk cartons etc taken to the sorting facility at the Mareeba dump, baled and sent to Brisbane to be made into packaging materials. Please break cardboard boxes into small pieces so they do not get jammed in the bin.

GLASS: please remember that all recyclables ARE SORTED BY HAND into colours etc. Wash out jars and bottles, remove lids and try not to BREAK anything! Good clean glass can be recycled very efficiently - glass which is contaminated becomes stubby bottles! Please do not put laminated, or milky glass, mirrors, fluoro tubes or pyrex in the recycling section as these are not acceptable. Glass goes to Brisbane. Lids & bottle tops can be recycled. REMEMBER: You can always take glass to the recycling depot at the Kuranda State School, keeping funds local. PLASTIC: All soft drink and milk bottles. Please wash out and remove lids. Lids can be revoled. This recycled

plastic is used to make non-food containers such as for dish washing liquid etc. Other plastic is not recyclable at present. Plastic shopping bags ARE NOT RECYCABLE. Plastics go to Sydney for recycling.

ALUMINIUM AND STEEL: softdrink, pet foodcans etc. PLEASE WASH OUT!! and remove labels. If you have a lot crush the cans OR take to the Kuranda State School (aluminium only). Aluminium goes to Sydney, steel to Wollongong.

MINIMISING YOUR WASTE


ORGANIC WASTE: by large the greatest amount of waste by percentage is food scraps and garden waste. Please don't throw this 'waste' out - certainly DO NOT put it in the RECYCLING section of your bin as it will contaminate paper waste etc and make things VERY unpleasant for the sorters. Organic waste such as food scraps, lawn clippings and leaves etc can be used as compost makings or mulch. Council sells compost bins at cost for \$25. Larger branches etc can be stacked on larger acreages. Consider hiring a mulcher or chipper to return these valuable nutrients back into your garden. Council is purchasing a mobile chipper to mulch large branches. if you must take these to the transfer station at Groves Creek, PLEASE separate them out from your other waste and put them in a pile where you are directed to do so. They will eventually be recycled as mulch.


In today's "throw away society", it has REDUCE YOUR WASTE AT POINT OF PURCHASE: Don't use plastic bags! Use reusable cloth bags or baskets. Buy products with minimal packaging. Reuse any plastic bags you may have (put 'loose' waste in used bags or use them to line small kitchen bins but DON'T fill too full. Tie off and put waste in waste section of bin.) Buy quality goods which last. Recycle used goods and clothing no longer wanted by giving to charity organisations. Old dumps. Remember our fight to stop the clothing can also be used as mulch under grass clippings or hay.

NEWSPAPER and CARDBOARD can also be used as mulch. If you are worried about inks etc only use on ornamentals or along fenceline. Always wet ground & paper when putting it down and sprinkle with organic fertilizer such as dynamic lifter to boost biodegrading & avoid nitrogen deficciency in plants. Keep mulch away from the stems & trunks of trees and plants so it doesn't bring pests or cause collar rot.

HOW IT WORKS

Put all your recyclable waste into THIS section of the bin - as marked. Don't jam it in and break up cardboard boxes etc so that the bin will empty properly.





Put all your waste in THIS section of the bin. Again, don't jam things in and don't put in heavy items such as rocks or construction materials.

Place bin on side of footpath with wheels facing towards the road. The truck always collects from the left hand side of the truck so it will do one side of the street first and then the other later (sometimes this may be hours later as the truck follows a circuit around town).

mechanical arm lifts bin. The truck is divided at the top into a waste section and a recycling section. The division is aligned with the divider in the bin, so that waste falls down a hopper into one section and recyclables into another. This hopper can also be controlled to close off either section allowing for bins dedicated totally to either recyclables or waste: handy in commercial areas where volume is greater.



The truck is actually divided lengthwise- like a sandwich - with recyclables on top, waste on bottom. After waste has been offloaded for landfill at the dump, the truck discharges recyclables via the top 'door' or hatch at the rear of the truck into a pile at the sorting station, for manual sorting.

When the truck arrives at the Mareeba dump, it first off loads waste for landfill via the bottom 'door' or hatch at the rear of the truck before going to the sorting station to offload recyclables.

I'VE GOT A PROBLEM

- * MY BIN'S NOT BEING COLLECTED:
- * Call Council on 921 222
- * MY BIN'S NOT BIG ENOUGH:

* Has this always been the case or is it just since the recycling scheme has been operating? Were you putting out extra bags etc before?

Perhaps you need to rationalise your waste and take recyclables such as glass to the School (they will appreciate this as they receive much needed funds from their recycling for school needs). Call Coucil for further advice. Perhaps a compost bin may help reduce waste or the use of cardboard as mulch in the garden. Otherwise, if you have a large family you may need another bin but this will cost you another \$150 per year - waste minimisation is a cheaper and more environmentally responsible option.

* MY BIN DOESN'T EMPTY PROPERLY:

- * Please don't jam things in. Break cardboard boxes, pieces of syrofoam etc up to keep things 'loose'. Don't put pieces of timber etc in which can jam as the mechanical arm 'squeezes' the bin as it lifts.
- * RUBBISH FALLS OUT OF MY BIN ONTO THE GROUND AND CREATES A MESS:
- * Don't overfill bins. The lid must close properly otherwise it will drop open prematurely, dropping rubbish onto the ground.

PLEASE DON'T

- * OVERFILL BINS
- * JAM BINS
- * REMOVE DIVIDER: not only are you wasting recyclables, you are contaminating other people's recyclables. Please make an effort give it a go.
- * BREAK GLASS IF POSSIBLE.
- * PLACE HYPODERMIC SYRINGES in the bin with needles intact. Please buy & use a sharps container (available from pharmacies). Remember, the sorting is done manually- please be considerate.

PLEASE DO

- * MINIMISE YOUR WASTE
- * COMPOST & MULCH
- * REDUCE, REUSE, RECYCLE WHEREVER POSSIBLE.
- * SUPPORT THE SCHOOL'S RECYCLING PROGRAM.
- * WASH BOTTLES, JARS & TINS. REMOVE LIDS.
- * PUT GARDEN WASTE BACK INTO GARDEN NOT BIN


TRANSFER STATION


The Groves Creek transfer station is being upgraded as a priority. Unfortunately, there has been irresponsible dumping of rubbish, should this continue the dump will be locked and a gate fee charged to cover the cost of supervision. PLEASE follow the signs and sort & dump your rubbish accordingly.

CHEMICALS DISPOSAL

The Mareeba Shire Council is establishing safe disposal sites for empty chemical containers. If there is a small amount of chemical left eg Roundup etc, add water & use it for the purpose it was intended, then further rinse onto ground (not down sink!) and dispose of empty container responsibly. These will be recycled by Council.

It has been estimated that about 25% of the contents of the municipal waste stream is made up of green waste from public and private gardens. By composting this green waste we are finding a higher value use for it than landfill and reducing landfill volumes at the same time. However, municipal composting of waste will only be viable if the quality and cost of the product is attractive to potential end users.

The proportions of various materials in the waste stream is very much affected by economic conditions. When times are bad, there is very little building activity and the amount of construction and demolition waster decrease. People also buy fewer goods and packaging waste decreases


On the other side of the coin, when times are good, people buy more and the amount of packaging increases as does building activity.

Note: the municipal wastestream excludes construction

and industrial waste.

In order to maximise resource recovery, Local Government should investigate the efficiencies offered by a vertically integrated waste management facility which treats the entire waste stream of the region as a single resource controlled by a single operator.

Concentrating local waste streams into larger regional waste streams offers three very important advantages for maximising resource recovery.





2. To be a viable alternative to virgin material, a constant source of recycled material must be available.

No manufacturer will commit to a raw material source which is here today, but may not be available tomorrow.

3. Partnerships with the private sector are possible. This is a very important advantage, because although councils are experts in public health, building regulation, waste disposal and many other very important areas, their traditional expertise does not cover the manufacturing and marketing of products out of waste or any other material. This is the expertise of the private sector. A larger, more commercially viable regional waste stream could well be the first step towards a publicly controlled but privately funded and operated waste management system which maximises resource recovery.

PART 1 of a series on Waste Management & Recycling

Should landfill diversion be the vardstick?

In order of importance, the three steps towards better waste management for a better environment (known as the Waste Management Hierarchy) are:

Avoid producing waste in the first place.

If producing waste is unavoidable, recover, recycle and reuse as much as possible.

3.

Whatever is left must be safely disposed of.

Our national objective to meet these priorities, as stated in the National Waste Minimisation and Recycling Strategy, is to reduce the amount of waste disposed of to landfill by 50% by the year 2000. This is a Federal Government target accepted by the States and by Local Councils throughout Australia.

The thinking behind this target is that in order to reduce the amount of waste going into our landfills, we will have no choice but to reduce the total amount of waste being produced and recover and recycle more.

Unfortunately, things haven't quite worked out that way.

Have we got the right target?

The problem with the Year 2000 target is that it is quite feasible to reduce the amount of waste going to landfill by 50% without significantly reducing waste production or improving recycling figures.

On the one hand, it is useful to have an accepted target for reducing landfill, and although 50% is an arbitrary target it is as good as any other.

On the other hand, we shouldn't assume that reaching this target will solve our waste problems, especially recycling problems, because to do that we need a better system, not a bigger target.

NEXT MONTH: Waste as a valuable resource.

MY SHORT STAY IN AN INDIAN ASHRAM

This was my first visit to the Osho Ashram in Poona. I arrived in Bombay one hot and sticky morning, hardly able to breathe owing to all the pollution from all the under- maintained trucks, cars and three wheeler two stroke rickshaws. What a dirty, smelly place this turned out to be. Much worse than my memories of my visit in 1973. Anyway the usual hassle of bargaining with taxi drivers as to what was a fair price to be taken to the railway station went on for about ten minutes before it was settled. And then away I went to get the first train to Poona. Arriving at the station the porters, seeing I was a foreigner were soon flocking around me asking to carry my bags and to book my ticket. I remembered from my last visit to India that it was much quicker to choose a young porter than try to go it alone as ticket sellers and by-standers always seem only to speak Hindi (there main indigenous language), as if to pay you back for not supporting the system. So off we go to number one platform, passed all the crowds along a platform and over a bridge and 200m along the next platform. Me a big strong Aussie/POM, six feet one with my shoes off, carrying just my valuables in a small waist pack and my new ticket following this small skinny 14 year old with a case on his head and a carry-all at the end of one of his equally skinny arms. Where he dropped me off was exactly where the first class carriage stopped, The old steam engine arrived after 20 minutes and I was off up to Poona. Its a bit like Kuranda is to Cairns, up in the hills and about 3-4 degrees cooler with a lot less humidity. Poona used to be where all the wealthy British who lived in Bombay in colonial times went during the hot rainy season. It was indeed much more pleasant when I arrived, even though it was the middle of the day. I lost no time, I jumped in the first rickshaw and asked for the Ashram. As there are so many visitors coming here the driver knew exactly where to go and also to set the taxi metre, as the Ashram have advised the rickshaw drivers to do so under threat of a bus service being used instead. As the Ashram contributes to a very large degree to the local economy because of the 2-5000 tourists visiting there on different days throughout the year, they are only too willing to look after us all. At the Welcome Centre I was advised to book into the hotel next door and to have a good rest because it would take until the next day for my AIDs test to be checked. The Osho Ashram is an AIDs free zone. They also made me very welcome, gave me lots of hugs, took my photo for my ID card and advised me where I might obtain cheap accommodation for my three month stay. Rooms were easy to find, I looked at 3 or 4 and chose one about 6 minutes walk away at the cost of 1500 Rs per month, that's about \$60. The next day I picked up my ID card and explored the third section of the Ashram, it is divided into three by two roads that pass through. The central section contains Buddha Auditorium which is the main meditation building which can hold 5000 people. it also has the main eating area, offices, safe valuables storage, book and tape shop and Loa-Tzu area which contains Osho's house and a beautiful white marble meditation space used for silent sitting. It is air-conditioned and immacutatly clean. and so peaceful that meditation is almost as easy as falling of the proverbial log. The top section is the Multi-versity where many black marble pyramids which are used mainly for groups and training and the lower section contains the arts complex, cafe, post-office and shops etc, Meditations start at 6am with "Dynamic meditation" which is an hour long and is divided into 5 parts. The first is chaotic breathing followed by catharsis (letting it all out, laughter, anger, frustration or whatever) then follows jumping up and down while intoning the old Tibetan mantra Hoo as you land. Suddenly you hear STOP! and that starts a totally quiet section. The meditation ends with a short celebration dance. A very powerful process, especially for those who have trouble going into silence or for those who have never meditated before. Off to the shower and into a good welcome breakfast. All meals are vegetarian and most of the fruit and vegies are grown on a farm run by the Ashram so as to secure safe healthy produce. Indian food is full of diseases that western stomachs take a while to get used to, but at least this produce is very safe as is the water which is UV treated and filtered from there own wells. A 1-2 hour discourse follows and then "Vipasana meditation" which is 45 minutes silent sitting and 15 minutes very slow walking with awareness. Next some morning tea and sometimes there is an African dance session or Heart dance session,. Both are fairly energetic, lots of fun and both finish with silence. Now is the time to relax, maybe at the pool or to stroll in the very large gardens built by the Ashram for the Poona community as a good-will gift. Or to find a little hide-a-way of which there are plenty, to chat with a friend or to be quiet on ones own before going to lunch. After lunch has settled the next event is "Nadabrama meditation" which is humming, giving and receiving energy, finishing with silence, like the other meditations it lasts one hour. This is followed after a short time by "Kundalini meditation" four sections, the first 15 minutes being to shake the body until it continues to shake on it's own, followed by 15 minutes of silent standing or sitting and then 20 minutes of silent lying down finishing with 10 minutes of celebration dance. All the day-time meditations are done in maroon coloured robes, these being very comfortable and also contribute towards concentrating the energy. You can buy these robes from street sellers of which there are many, as with so many western visitors it makes for a good local industry. The evening meal can be taken early 4,30 - 6.00pm or after the evening event in which everyone wears white in what is called "The White Robe Brotherhood""

Then you are paralysed, and if the clots happen you are dead. If money circulates, moves from one hand to the other, goes on moving, the more movement the better, then the blood circulates well, then life is healthy. But when a miser comes in, a clot has happened: somewhere somebody is accumulating, not sharing and that is a clot in the blood circulation, the man disturbs, he does not live himself and because he is blocking he does not allow others to live. 





Kuranda's Zane Saunders is one of several north Oueensland artists to have work in the Queensland Art Gallery tour of works coming to Cairns Regional Gallery from 9 February.

Ken Thaiday, Thancoupie, Brian Robinson, and Zane are the north Queenslanders among the 23 indigenous artists from nearly all Australia states, showing as part of the regional touring of works from the collection of the Queensland Art Gallery

There is a great resurgence within artistic traditions thousands of years old. However, the full diversity of Australian art is not generally well known. Because of their high profile, Western Desert 'dot' painting and Arnhem Land bark paintings are what people mostly associate with Australian indigenous art. Styles from north Queensland and the Torres Strait, where there are cultural links to PNG and Melanesia evident in indigenous works, are only recently becoming recognised



THE state boasts the oldest bridge still in use in Australia (in Richmond), the longest model railway (Alpenrail in Hobart) and the largest antique dolls house in the country.

The last can be found in the Old Colony Inn in New Norfelk. It is filled with miniature furniture, all made by one William Payne. Not a lot is known about William except that he was born in England in 1755. And apparently the dolls house was made in the mid 1800s to house all the pieces he made.

You can see the doll's house, a magical sight indeed for young and old, in the museum at the Old Colony Inn. Other

pieces in the museum include a French baby grand piano made in 1815 and Dutch Defft blue and white kitchen tiles made in the early 1600s.

In addition to the museum, you'll find tearooms, cottage-style accommodation and a harming sunken cotcage garden at the Old Colony Inn.

The earliest part of the historic Inn was built with mud and stone by convicts in 1815. It was originally a hop store. The top storey, made from convict brick, was added in 1835.

added in 1835.


It's an interesting building from both an architectural and historical point of view.

You might like to browse around the Inn and enjoy morning or afternoon tea or a light lunch in the tea room. This is open from 9em to 5pm seven days a week You'll find homemade dishes such as soups, chicken and asparagus parcels and smoked salmon sandwiches on the menu.

Accommodation is available in the charming Honeymoon Cettage. The cost of a double is \$70 which includes a full cooked breakfast. You can snjoy this in your room or in the delightful sunken cottage gardens.

SNIPPETS OF AMAR'S STORY

(Far Northern Belly Dancer)

In 1982 my life changed. I saw for the first time a real live belly dancer and was totally mesmerised by her beauty, suppleness and skill. Oh how much I wanted to dance like that - I fell in love with Dance Orientale (the proper name for belly dancing) immediately! Yes! I thought I will don the attire of the seven veils and seek belly dancing lessons! Thankfully, a seven veils costume was not required, leotards were quite OK with a scarf tied around the hips. Believe it or not thousands of years ago belly dancing was created by women for women's amusement only and not for the titillation of men.

From the start I realised belly dance was for me. I enjoyed it so much that I practised for hours every day (to the utmost amazement of my partner who knew, or thought he knew my feeling towards any form of exertion!).

Eventually belly dance became my life. I went to live in Egypt to study the dance and culture. There I met one of Egypt's most celebrated and famous dancers, Sohair Zaki, and was taught by her. She was so praiseworthy of me that it gave me the confidence to perform in public. And so I did, even in Cairo where, to my amazement, the audiences were most appreciative. After gaining much confidence and knowledge I went on to London to perform. Although work was plentiful, I decided I could not stay there as it was far too cold. To my relief an agent offered me a contract to dance in the United Arab Emirates, of course I accepted but unbeknown to me I was going to be met at Dubai airport by the biggest crook of an agent you could ever meet. This particular agent omitted to pay me for weeks, along with all his other artists and he ended up going to jail.

I was just about to return to London feeling rather foolish when I received an offer of a contract to dance in Abu Dhabi at the Sheraton Hotel. Before that contract expired I received another from the Ramada in Ruwais, and so it went on. Who needed an agent? I spent a very profitable and happy year there, living in the lap of luxury but working very hard, performing for at least an hour every day on stage. Since then I have been performing and conducting classes in the art of Belly Dance in the Cairns area, including teaching troupe choreographic skills to a number of local girls who now perform in my dance troupe "The Jewels of the Nile". So you can see that a whole new world of adventure awaits every woman. Like me, who knows where it could lead you?!!!!
