

MAREEBA SHIRE COUNCIL NOTICE OF PUBLIC MEETING

KURANDA TRAFFIC STUDY-

Mareeba Shire Council is conducting a public meeting to discuss and receive comments concerning the traffic study currently being undertaken in the Kuranda Village. Interested persons are invited to attend at 2.00pm, Saturday the 7th December 1996 at the CWA Hall, Kuranda.

Behind the scenes work is well under way for construction of a new High School for Kuranda. The Education Department is currently in the contract documentation phase and tenders will be let on 15 January 1997 with construction due to start on 19 March 1997. Hopefully the wet season will not delay that process too much. I am pleased to be able to announce that State Cabinet recently endorsed the recommendations of a joint submission from Public Works & Housing Minister Ray Connor and Local Government Minister Di McCauley. This means that the State Government will now pay 50% of the infrastructure costs which are normally met by the local Council. Infrastructure includes bus and car set downs, sewerage, drainage and water supply. Mayor Chris Lewis, Oliver Gilkerson, Colin McDowell and myself have been lobbying Cabinet Ministers for assistance with the infrastructure costs so we are very pleased that such a favourable decision has been made. Early in the New Year, I will organise a public information meeting so that Kuranda residents can be kept up to date on progress of the construction of the much awaited High School.

SAVED FROM A PREMATURE BURIAL

After only 5 and a half months of operations the waste resource recovery in the Mareeba Shire has achieved some impressive outcomes. The following statistics reveal the amount of valuable materials removed from the waste stream in that time:

PAPER & CARDBOARD: 72, 400 kgs. ALUMINIUM: 6,226 kgs. STEEL: 7,462 kgs. PLASTICS (PETE & HDPE): 10.512 kgs. CLEAR GLASS: 15,581 kgs. COLOURED GLASS: 35, 681 kgs.

All this saved, by you - by us, to live another useful life. And extending the life of our landfills until better treatment can be introduced. PLEASE keep up the effort & keep recycling viable. DON'T CONTAMINATE RETRIEVABLES WITH WASTE.

MAKING TRACKS

Oliver Gilkerson, our own very busy Councillor

1. Children's Playgound at Centenary Park - plans are being advanced for the construction of a childrens playground in Centenary Park beneath the fig tree. The original design for Centenary Park prepared as part of the Kuranda Strategic Management plan earmarked an area near the amenities block for playground equipment. However discussions with parents and others indicate that the lawn area beneath the fig tree would be superior and landscape architects Pawsey and Prowse are developing designs for interactive animal sculptures and playground equipment. A meeting of interested parties will shortly take place to finalise the design and arrange a construction programme.

2. Kuranda Tourist Levy Negotiations - All infrastructure works in Kuranda Village under the Kuranda Strategic Management plan are fully funded by the Kuranda Tourist Levy. This levy has been negotiated between the Mareeba Shire Council and the State Government and provides for \$1.00 to be raised from visitors to Kuranda (e.g. through the purchase of a railway ticket) over a ten year period. None of the infrastructure costs are met from rates revenue. To ensure that the infrastructure works under the plan can be fully implemented and to assist in accommodating an up-grade of walking tracks at the Barron Falls railway lookout, Council is presently engaging in a second round of negotiations with the State Governemnt. It is hoped that these negotiations will see the life of the Levy Agreement doubled from 10 to 20 years and provision for a distribution annually to the infrastructure works from licence fees paid by Skyrail to the State Government. If this outcome can be achieved total revenues for the Kuranda project will likely be increased by some millions of dollars - again, without any imposition falling upon ratepayers. An amendment to the Levy Agreement between the Council and the State Government will formalise these new arrangements.

3. Kuranda High School Works - The State Department of Education has now completed the purchase of land on Myola Road and completed building designs for the new High School. However with the construction of the School will also go the need for substantial external infrastructure. This includes a road up-grade, bus and car parking on the school site, water main extensions and bicycle paths. It has beeen said that these works are entirely the responsibility of Council. Detailed design for these works has now been completed by Council officers. Total estimated costs now stand at nearly \$2 million. Over the last 6-12 months Council has lobbied hard for State Government assistance to off set these costs. The Premier was briefed during his recent visit and meetings have subsequently been held with Education, Public Works and Local Government Ministers. On November 12, 1996 the Minister for Public Works announced a Cabinet decision to meet 50 percent of the total external infrastructure costs which will result in a saving to Council of approximately \$1 million.


4. Playing Court at Speewah - Recently Council completed the construction of an equestrian ring at Roscommon, Speewah. Interest has now been expressed by residents for a tennis court at that location. Council is presently investigating the possibility of such a facility. Advance notice of an application for funding subsidy has been sent to the Office of Sport and Recreation. This will shortly be followed by a formal application under the Minor Facilities Funding Programme.


Dear Kuranda Paper,



ARK's meeting of November 20th was its last for 1996 with no meeting scheduled for December. However, the management committee will meet as usual and a close eye kept on affairs of interest/ concern. Residents should be aware that although the year appears to be winding down, there are some events of considerable import occuring. These include:

1. TRAFFIC SURVEY/STUDY of Kuranda Village: this survey is to investigate the needs of the disabled, elderly and infirm, to review parking and traffic circulation and investigate long term car and bus parking options. A public meeting will be held at the CWA hall on Saturday December 7th 2pm to discuss and receive comments regarding these issues. Residents are urged to attend. Bus operations [including shuttle services, people movers and continued access to railway area via Barang St] are presently being heavily pushed by certain sections of the business community. Residents need to balance this by making the consultants aware of the effects of these operations on residents & other Village users.

2. DCP for Kuranda & Environs: Council has advised that it is now in receipt of a draft Development Control Plan for Kuranda & Environs as well as drafts of the Strategic Plan and MS Planning Scheme. Additional investigations of water & sewerage provision and drafting of maps are now underway. When these are finalised Council will assess the documents. When they are adopted the next round of public consultation will begin. A date for this has not been set but is likely to now be sometime into 1997.

SOME ISSUES FROM NOVEMBER MEETING: note that in order not to duplicate issues covered elsewhere only some issues are reported here. You are urged to read ALL the paper including news from other organisations, clubs etc

*LOW RIVER LEVELS: Photographs of the river were distributed. So low were recent levels that the old wooden bridge below the Kennedy highway bridge was exposed. [See photographs on this page and elsewhere in this Paper]. Austa [which is the commercial 'arm' of the Qld Electricity Generating Board, the body responsible for power generation from the Barron Gorge power station] required more water to undertake transmission operations. Unfortunately water levels along the whole catchment were very low. It was not until Saturday November 9th that the extent of reduced flow was recognised by Austa, who then purchased more water from Tinaroo Dam. However, it took at least 3 days for this water to reach Kuranda. In the meantime the mud of riverbed became a death trap for at least one white egret who suffocated while attempting to escape the mire near the old bridge.

Austa are considering generating more power on a regular basis next year and it appears that without intervention to protect the environmental integrity of the Barron River we will see such fluctuations in river levels on a much more regular basis. The problem of water & power supply from the Barron River is compounded because the demand for increased power generation is triggered by higher daytime temperatures [fans, air conditioners etc] and these hot months are also when the river is at its lowest. Concerned residents should voice their concerns in the first instance to Member for Barron River Lyn Warwick and the Mareeba Shre Council.

LOCALS MARKETS: Kylie Dumar attended the meeting and spoke regarding the positive aspects of 'community' markets. She said that the commercial 'markets' operating in the Village do not provide the social focus which community run markets would. Most other communities across the region have such markets which are operated by council & community organisations. It was agreed to put the subject on the agenda for

the January 15th meeting. All persons and organisations wishing to be a part of the discussion are cordially invited to attend.

'THE ARK' DEVELOPMENT [22 Coondoo St]: Sohail Laghaifar addressed the meeting to explain his proposed development. The land is the vacant allotment opposite Frogs restaurant. It currently has as of right consent to build a 'normal' shopping complex which would completely block the views of the mountains from the street. Mr Laghaifar's proposal is to build a fully registered timber boat. Inside the boat will be 8 'cabins' to house arts & crafts. A 60 seat restaurant is to the rear and the upper deck is open to create a public meeting space from which to view the mountains. Council has approved the design because it retains the views of the mountains and the hoop pine tree, provides public space and community facilities and will provide up to 35 car parking spaces on site [basement]. Mr Laghaifar explained that his idea for the boat was inspired by his own experience as a migrant to Australia and was about romance, fate and adventure. He said all people who have come to Australia have done so by crossing the seas and he believed we should all now come together.

MT BUCHAN: ARK continues to lobby for the status of the access from Black Mt Rd not to be altered. The environmental impacts of any further development, including roadworks, would just compound the miriad of problems already facing this vital natural area. ARK is pressing for the tightest possible controls to be put in place as regards the future use of the Mt Buchan land. Many people may not be aware that the area is critical habitat for a number of rare, threatened and endangered species of animals and plants. The Wet Tropics agency has described it as being of equal or better natural value than much of the land bought back by the Daintree Rescue Program. It is also home to Kuranda's largest cassowary group. Other managemeent problems on Black Mt Rd include illegal hunting, stealing of flora and fauna, off road motorcycle and 4 wheel drive operations.



KURANDA VILLAGE PROMOTION PROGRAM UPDATE INFORMATION DELIVERY

Research carried out by the Kuranda Village Promotion Program suggests that the most effective way to increase visitor numbers and visitor length of stay in Kuranda is to tap into the Visitor Information Centre at Cairns. Initially, the group was keen to establish their own Visitor Information Centre (VIC) in Kuranda, however have modified their proposal in the light of the research.

Options include the construction of static displays throughout town and the placement of volunteers into the Cairns VIC 68 to 85% of information given out by VICs relates to the regional attractions. This means that the point of sale location for Kuranda is in fact Cairns. These figures don't negate the need for local information, however the delivery of local information may be more effective if given out by all shops and staff when meeting travellers and visitors.

Currently enquiries are being made with the FNQ Promotion Bureau to tap into their VIC with local volunteers from Kuranda.

If you're a person excited by the possibility of working in the Esplanade Visitor Information Centre, learning more about tourism, our local attractions and participating in training then call Alison on 939185 or 925451.

RETAIL MIX PROFILE

The members of the Marketing and Promotions working group are undertaking a profile of the retail mix in Kuranda. The objective is to gain a clearer picture of exactly what shops we do have in Kuranda and which shops we are missing and can work towards attracting. The information gathered will be entered into a database for future use in promotional material such as brochures and public relations literature. Business owners and their staff are encouraged to participate in the profile and are thanked by the working group in anticipation of their support. Research is currently being undertaken to determine if a standard formula exists for a retail mix in a town that attracts large numbers of travellers and tourists. An objective of the Main Street Program is to enhance the retail sector by expanding the mix of businesses as appropriate to the market. The release of Brand FNQ by the FNQ Promotion Bureau gives Kuranda enormous focus for the future and will assist us in matching our product more appropriately to the target market. Brand FNQ fits nicely with both Brand Queensland and Brand Australia to secure the growth of tourism for all operators.


*Have knowledge of Kuranda [attractions, walks, history, culture etc] or a willingness to learn more about Kuranda and communicate it to others?

If so you may be interested in becoming a part of the Kuranda Village Promotions Program volunteer program. This is an initiative of the Built Environment Working Group [who have been investigating the idea of a visitor information centre for Kuranda] and the Marketing & Promotions Working Group [who are pursuing ways to more effectively promote Kuranda].

As a result of research into other centres it was discovered that 85% of enquiries at centres are not about the town/ destination where the centre is located but rather the region or next destination. It has been decided therefore to use the existing centres at Cairns [on the Esplanade and co-ordinated by the Far North Qld Promotions Bureau] and the Mareeba Heritage Centre [30% of their visitors stop in on their way to/ past Kuranda]. It was also decided to use the existing FNQPB training program which is comprehensive and offers an opportunity for volunteers to gain and improve personal skills.

First, may I say a big 'thank you' to Megan Byrnes who gave a very interesting address at our October meeting regarding rural youth problems and the efforts she is making to alleviate what one may call "rural youth boredom"! She noted our concerns and intends to start soon by quantifying our special needs here at Speewah district and starting a communication network between herself and the local youth to ascertain and hopefully meet some urgent needs. Megan will no doubt get back to us next year with some feedback. She reports some great results in other districts and is developing a rapport with the youth of the Shire by virtue of her ability to gain the confidence of young people through communicating with them and understanding their needs. Our last meeting also contained an unexpected surprise when, at his request and my invitation, Bob Norman (Norman Properties) came along to express his view regarding reticulated water supply to Freedom County. His argument is with Mareeba Shire Council regarding certain "promises" which were allegedly given to him, both verbally and in writing, by individual members of the previous Council. No representative from Council was available to balance his statements and so it was unanimously agreed to call a special meeting, inviting our local Councillor Oliver Gilkerson and Shire Mayor Chris Lewis to answer Bob Norman's allegations. This meeting (well attended) duly took place, at which Council defended their position and stated unequivocally that no Resolutions were ever passed by the previous Council regarding this matter and that the cost of provision of reticulated water to Freedom County in the foreseeable future would be prohibitive. (Costs, incidentally, which would have to be borne by those residents provided with such reticulation). Mr Norman has, I gather, formed a splinter group of residents to fight Council and he intends to continue his efforts. There appears to be a division amongst residents, with only a minority at present supporting Bob Norman's views. No doubt the debate will continue into 1997!

Jan Birkegaard our Treasurer, has secured a list of over one hundred signatures, in an effort to have a tennis court erected at Roscommon. Council has indicated its willingness to assist with this project if enough residents out there want it, so it now looks more promising that some action may take place in 1997.

And now to the Christmas Season. It has been decided to change previous arrangements, by having our normal December (Tuesday evening) meeting as usual and to follow this by holding a combined Fire Brigade/Residents Association party/get together on the next Saturday afternoon at Roscommon. Watch for the letter drop and sign to advertise this shortly. It will be a great opportunity for all residents to get together.

This is my last opportunity to reach out to all residents before the New Year and so may I wish you all, on behalf of the Committee, a peaceful Christmas followed by a New Year filled with a generosity of spirit and compassion for each other and for our precious environment in which we live.

HEARTWORM - THE SOLUTION IS IN PREVENTION by Kuranda Veterinary Surgery

Heartworms, what are they?

They are parasitic worms which live in the heart and major blood vessels of the lungs of dogs and cats. They are spread from animal to animal by mosquitoes, of which there are plenty in the tropics. When a mosquito bites an infected animal not only does it ingest blood but also the baby heartworms called microfilaria. These then mature to infect larvae within the mosquito and await transport to your dog or cat when that mosquito next feeds. Once injected back into your pet the heart worm migrate from the skin bite back to the heart to begin the cycle over again, and in the process cause disease.

Are my pets at risk?

Simply, YES. Surveys have shown that all dogs on mainland Australia are at risk (and particularly so in the tropics with the high numbers of mosquitoes). So to the cat owners, yes all cats are at risk as well, as recent studies have shown that wherever dogs are at risk so are cats.

What does heartworm disease do to your pet?

In general they cause progressive heart and lung disease which leads to the death of the animal involved. In dogs this is usually proceeded by signs like coughing, laboured breathing, tiring easily with exercise, lethargy and a distended abdomen. In cats however 1 or 2 worms can cause death without warning. Signs contributable to heartworm disease in cats are a persistent cough, vomiting, general listlessness, troubled breathing, fatigue and collapse.

What can I do if my pet already has heartworm?

Dogs can be treated to kill the adult worms, but there is no registered treatment for

So what is the best way to treat heartworm?

Simply, -PREVENT IT-. Prevention is available for both dogs and cats in a monthly form or for dogs only a daily form. Heartworm prevention should not be confused with "Allwormers" which only control intestinal worms.

Kuranda Lions will hold their Christmas Party on the weekend beginning 6 December. The first meeting of the New Year will be on Monday, 27 January.



THE BURNING ISSUE

Welcome back to the Burning Issue. November has been a relatively quiet month which was a nice change after a hectic October. We have taken delivery of a Ford Trader Composite Pumper - no doubt some of you have seen it around -and have since been doing a lot of familiarisation and training on this appliance. Being a more modern appliance, it has much greater capabilities and it is a challenge to learn just what these capabilities are.

Following the encouraging level of support and interest from the local community and visitors alike we are about to open a bigger and better gallery in the main street of Kuranda. Under the founding directorship of local artists/craftsworkers Peter Thompson (ceramicist), Michael Gompert (jeweller) and Terry Eager (glass artist) we intend to establish a successful, vibrant co-operative of local artists.

A recent report commissioned by the Far North Cultural Industry Association identified that with 2% of the population of FNQ, Kuranda boasts 16% of the visual arts/craftworkers. Utilising the large space generously made available as a low cost by the La Baysse family we are able to showcase the work of many of these artists.

This report also stated that of the \$19.3m of Visual Art/Craft sales in this area, nearly half goes to imported goods. We want more of that income being returned to the local community.

National surveys have proven that artists working co-operatively have a much better chance of long term viability - so we see this as an opportunity not only to give the community access to our established artists, but also as an opportunity for survival of our emerging artists. We also see this as an opportunity for Kuranda,

To quote the report on the 3rd National Museums Australian Conference, held 3 weeks ago in Sydney:- "The Australian Tourist Commission impresses on Arts Organisations that they are in fact in 'the tourism business' and their research analysis shows that growing numbers of international visitors are demanding authenticity and credibility with a focus on arts, natural attractions and things that have not been discovered or overcommercialised by the masses". We believe that our venture goes a long way in giving credibility to Kuranda's long-held reputation as an arts community, as recent exhibition opening at the Regional Gallery, The View from Here.

With the street frontage available to us we can make a tangible impact on the image of Kuranda as a whole. We aim to make that exciting and reflect the quality of works on sale.

The establishment costs of our gallery are high but the support received from the artists involved and local community at large in the last two weeks by way of donation and in-kind support have been encouraging and welcome.

Your support for this venture may be shown by making a donation of \$20 - placing you on our mailing list for invitations to exhibition openings and special events. We are also seeking loans of cash to be repaid from Gallery profits. Loans or donations of materials are also greatly appreciated. Far Norths first Contemporary Jewellery and Metal

show will be held at the Cairns Regional Gallery, in Feb 1997.

The show titled BODYWORKS, curated by Jewellery Artist Seanne McArthur will showcase the works of Far North Metal Artists, from all over our vast region, from the south of Townsville to Mt. Isa and north to Cooktown. Ten metal Artists have been chosen to represent the broad cross section of jewellers and metal designers, from various skill and concept bases. The show has been put forward to challenge the notions of jewellery and body adornment, and its context within our society. Bodyworks will possibly be travelling from Cairns, for an opening further on in the year at The Crafts Council Artspace, in Brisbane.

JEWELLERY WORKSHOPS

Several specialist jewellery workshops were

held by Jewellery Artist Seanne McArthur at her residence on Saturday and Sunday 19th and 20th October. The workshops were a culmination of many months of organisation, and were funded by the Mareeba Shire RADF Scheme. The workshops were based on exploring some age-old techniques of metal working, which included the ancient art of granulation; the investigation and creation of Japanese alloys -Shibuichi and Shakudo and a textural metal technique, Reticulation, was also included. To sum up these processes, the content of the workshops was based on using copper and pure metal to create a wide variation of effects and techniques, involving decorative elements, textural effects and colour variations. The metals used were copper, fine gold and fine silver.

GRANULATION The ancient Etruscan art of granulation was explored and reproduced on Day 1 of the workshops, which proved to be a somewhat time consuming and patience trying exercise. Results were finally achieved by around 7pm (due to temperature variants and adhesive problems). We created a small workshop scale reduction kiln and also used electric kilns, which eventurally gave us successful rosults.

RETICULATION AND JAPANESE ALLOYS Day 2 was as heavy going as the granulation workshop, and although a simple process it was again time consuming, due to the laborious processes of alloying and making up metal sheet to work with. We had great results from this workshop which included the creation of Shibulchi and Shakudo - Japanese coloured alloys and the textural technique of reticulation -"Creating Little Mountains" in metal.

GETTING TOGETHER Five women attended the workshops from both local and regional areas such as Mt. Isa, Townsville, Port Douglas and Mareeba. It seemed co-incidental that we held our workshops on the same day as the Women's Conference in Mareeba. Women of the Far North interested in Jewellery making and Silversmithing gathered together to learn and create ancient metal arts. Everyone was buzzing with their new knowledge and techniques. Lots of progressive talk and networking occurred, which has tied southern, western and northern areas, in this field, with permanent connections. Jeweller and tutor Deb Pirard will be taking the techniques learned in Kuranda to her pupils and co-workers in Mt. Isa. An offer was also put to tutor Seanne McArthur to take on lecturing at the McGregor Summer Schools sometime in the future. An exciting possibility!

Opportunities were created for the potential exhibitors of "Bodyworks", a contemporary metal exhibition, due to show in February 1997. There were discussions of ideas, and the formulation of plans for the production of the Far North's first contemporary Jewellery and Metal Art Show.

Current exhibitors who attended the workshops were: Sue Whiteman - Townsville, Deb Pirard - Mt. Isa, Seanne McArthur - Kuranda, Jackie Jansse -Mareeba. Seanne will be offering further workshops in reticulation and alloys if there are any interested jeweller/metal art persons out there. Please phone Labyrinth Design

The Haunts of Christmas Past

For kids, Caloundra on the Sunshine Coast had everything. Calm waters, surf, bush, fishing, boating, and a view of the Glasshouse Mountains, glassy as Cook named them at dawn as he sailed northwards. Nana would sit long, pensive hours sipping tea on a tall stool, looking at them over the passage inside Bribie Island, from the little flap window in the kitchen. Tides went out, Tides came in, and so did the fishing boats.

From there she could see us kids on the slippery, old wooden diving boards below, hurling ourselves off into the safe shallows of the Pumicestone Passage. Most mornings, Nana and Pop joined other seniors in a pact at daybreak. Their answer to fitness was to take a dawn dip, summer or winter. At first light, they waddled down like pelicans, doughy bodies in thick, black woollen bathers with rusting buckles, to bob about together in the flat waters of adult repartee.

Was I the only kid to string along, to watch from the beach? To sit in the morning sun with the silences of Nana and Pop afterwards on the back stairs, sipping squeezed orange juice mixed with warm water and honey, and sharing vegemite toast with the languid cat? Whole afternoons at the bowling green, left to my own devices by the ladies in white, petticoat lace showing, waiting for the afternoon tea bell, when they would fuss over me with cake and scones? At night to get the children's cut, the boneless tail of the whiting Pop caught from his dinghy, where I observed the physics of oars. To spend evenings within the dark-panelled shellacked walls, playing cards with Nana, Fish and occasionally Snap, with me always winning, while Pop knitted cotton facewashers that were circular. But there were 22 grand-children. By Christmas, nearly all the cousins were there, along with the middle generation of aunts and uncles.

Christmas was when the rules changed. The most important rule was that kids were not allowed upstairs in the house, which was the total preserve of the adults. It was understood that, en masse, we were too uncouth for the finery of the house, getting underfoot, chiacking loudly, and barefoot, traipsing beach sand onto the linoleum. Given to understand also, that the matriarchs who dominated the kitchen had mammoth catering efforts from dawn 'til dark, to keep up with the army of children. Sometimes we would hear them bicker up there. So we were relegated below decks, underneath the fibro Queenslander, where by day the light was striped from the slatted outer paling walls, and therafters were lined with fishing rods, and 'bottle lines' wound tightly around shapely coke bottles. In the corner was Pop's den, a dark mystery cordoned off by more slats, with a padlocked gate. We would peer inside, trying to make out the secrets of the shadowy corners, the things on S - shaped hooks beyond the table covered in strange bottles, knives, and the sharpening stones of the retired butcher.

Our instructions were to go the short distance to the beach from the moment we awoke. We were to spend the whole day there in singlets over floral bathers with elastic bubble backs and a front skirt. Faces smeared in zinc cream, summoned only for meals brought onto the sand, we made our own world in unfettered imagination and fantasy. Here we would build those wet sandcastles at water's edge, with moats fed by the lapping tide, cave-ins, and tunnels where you and your playmate's hand would meet underneath. In the afternoons we listened to the bible stories of the travelling beach evangelist. A dab hand as an artist, he quickly illustrated the stories on flaps of butchers paper, on a makeshift easel. Music too, as we little sunbeams hymned along to his squeezebox.

Sometimes we all walked the sandbar, jutting nearly touching Bribie Island, catching retreating soldier crabs under our hats for the bait tin. In the afternoons, from the same spot, where it fell away steeply, we could line up with other anglers who had real bait from the shop, and fancy rods making exciting noises when reeling out after a throw. There we would take our Coke bottle lines and plop them in. Distracted often, to rue the better equipment of others as they landed fish after fish, fascinated by the gruesome sight of blood at the unhooking, and the futile flapping of death in a wet bessian bag inside the wicker fishing-basket. Once, I fluked a 15 inch whiting, arriving home with the line all a-tangle. Pop said my big fish was reported in the paper, but now I wonder.

Sometimes we would play in the overgrown sandhills of Happy Valley, between the caim and the surf beach. A place where lovers would hide and kids would adventure, is now a flattened carpark. There we once found a cave bordered with logs. Sworn to secrecy, we dug for days. Adults became suspicious, and finally our whereabouts were confessed. We showed the black sand we were finding. Some said mineral sands, but Pop confirmed it as gunpowder from the smugglers who used to have a tunnel under the passage to Bribie. We were warned off by the dangers of digging further underground, despite the treasure we knew was buried there.

Further round was King's Beach, where we learnt to surf and survive the dumpers with the big kids. Out walking, we would run along the edge of the sand-cliffs made by the king tide, falling orrolling down to the bottom. These towering sandhills are now levelled for a highrise holiday-letting strip at just above the high water. The foam left behind from king tides, we were told, was mermaid soap. You can still lie in the warm rockpools below the headland, examining small periwinkles. From there we kids could see the bronze Aussie lifesavers sitting in their towers watching over the surfers. The lifesavers had an annual revue in the park, where sitting on grass we would watch muscular types in tutus and boots do a Swan Lake. Growing up as waterbabies, we were all hardy swimmers. As young adults we swam to Bribie Island, braving the strong tidal rip in the passage.

Golden Beach was in the other direction, and was spoken of as 'The Black's Camp'. We could see smoke from fires. This sandfly and mangrove area had the best fishing. I thought the mud-crab on our tables was caught by Pop, but recently learnt he bought them from an Aboriginal man there. Catching and selling seafood was probably the only family income. Now Golden Beach is full of resorts and the sterile estate of Pelican Waters.

Nana once showed me a small bora ring on land near her house. Years later I watched workmen build a block of flats over it, oblivious to the site. But the really big bora ring, many metres across and deeply trenched by untold years of dancing, was further south in a clearing opposite Bribie. Nana showed me the broken shell piles of the middens, metres high.

Christmas lunch we were allowed in the house on our best behaviour, where tables were laid out in the kitchen and the dining rooms. Chicken was a luxury, only eaten at Christmas. The plum pudding always had threepences with pudding stuck in the grooves. Uncle Harry always found more thruppences than anybody. Loudly proclaimed with each mouthful after lots of mock choking, they were cleaner than ours. He gave many away to the less successful pudding-eaters.

There was often a queue for the loo, where the usual newsprint wipers-on-a-wire were replaced at Christmas by the green tissue wrappers from a box of Granny Smiths, and where the nightsoil smells mingled with the perfumed jasmine and waxy stephanotis flowers of the trellis.

Once home from the beach at the end of each day, we coldshowered on the blackened concrete in the dank smells of the corrugated shed under the tankstand in the yard. Waterlogged to the point of wrinkled skin after a day in the sea, we were already clean, but getting the sand off was the main aim. Sunburns were tended in a ritual of family touching. Short years later, sun-spots would need burning off as the price of a Queensland childhood.

Dressed in shorty pyjamas, by early evening we were turfed out into the paddock, the grassycorner block next to the house. As it got dark, we were encouraged to give chase, run as far and as fast as we could, playing tag to wind down our batteries for the night's sleep ahead. Food was served from the house, passed over the fence on the milk-stand, where the wide-necked milkbottles with their waxed cardboard lids were delivered. Often the fodder would start with melons. As the adults knifed the belly of a massive watermelon, it split open, each child handed a half moon of red flesh over the fence, to sink their face into. If there was still static energy after the meal, we returned to rough and tumble games, or were taken on a night-walk. Once at King's Beach, backlit by a full moon, we saw a noisy fight between a sting-ray and a shark, them both rising and falling in silhouette in the moonstrip on the water. On another night, we all joined a street procession with lighted candles inside concertina Chinese lanterns.

If memories are made of this, I'm set to wonder what memories our children will recall of todays Christmas season in the tropics. Theirs is just as rich, but different. They'll tell of cooling off in the Barron at the end of the dry summer, of mango feasting and bowls of fresh lychees or prawns, of decorated palm trees in the living room, of fireflies dancing in the mozzie nets, late thunderstorms and lightning before the wet, and the swirling of the Barron in flood as it roars towards the falls.





THE KURANDA PAPER DECEMBER 1996 Page 17 A THOUGHT FOR CHRISTMAS

Since the Fourth Century A.D. when Christmas was first celebrated as a major Church Festival, two portions of Scripture have always had prominence. The first portion comes from chapter Two of St. Luke's Gospel and gives us a vivid description of the events in Bethlehem The second portion comes from the first eighteen verses of St. John's Gospel, the Spiritual Gospel.We all at one time or another have had the feeling of not being able to communicate something in a way that does it justice. We may have just heard a really beautiful theme in the background of a movie or we may have just seen a terrific try scored in League the feeling is the same. We are left there speechless, unable to really communicate the wonder or the reality or the excitement This is the problem John the Gospel writer faced. He and others had experienced the presence of Jesus for three years, now he is old and is looking back. He realises that he has actually experienced a continuing relationship with the same Jesus who he first met beside the lake, now he wants to put it all into words - how can he start? How can he do it? John decides to tell a story to tell it all. He wants us to understand one great difference between what the words of God mean and can bring about and what our words can mean and bring about. For instance, when we say the word star, all that we have managed to convey is the concept of a star into the mind of the listener, but when God says the word star, they are magnificent and awe inspiring, real solid majestic and blazing I Now, let us examine another two words - light and life - John tells us that God said these words and they took shape, they became flesh (v14.). An old word for becoming flesh is incarnation. The human shape in which God sent us light and life is Jesus. John then tells us a most important consequence, the light and the life we see in Jesus can, if we choose, become light and life for our lives. It can become a whole extra level of spiritual life and that is what we mean when we say that Jesus can be our Lord and our Saviour Something else comes to us from this passage, something about the importance of our own words. Our words cannot bring physical things into being, but they can bring about both beautiful and terrible realities. A word from us can inspire someone, can encourage, can bring joy and hope. A different word can bring fear, hurt, anxiety, depression. A word can never be unsaid. That may sound obvious but it is a truth we can never hear too often. Those of us who profess the Christian faith and call ourselves Christians each of us are called to make our words bring life and light, just as the word of God brings life and light to us in the person of Jesus


Good news for Christmas

Some Christians keep special seasons each year to remember Jesus. For example, the four weeks before Christmas are called the season of Advent. The word 'advent' means 'coming', so it is a time to remember that Jesus came to earth at the first Christmas, that he still comes into the lives of people today, and that he will come again at

KISC DRUG & ALCOHOL BULLETIN ALTERNATIVES TO TAKING DRUGS

The main reason people take psychoactive drugs is to satisfy a basic human need to vary normal experience. A desire to explore the various facets of consciousness is in itself not bad, but how people do this can be a cause for

Being high does not mean being drugged. Clearly, drugs can sometimes make people feel high - at their best, energised, whole, connected. But why is it that many people achieve these states without ever taking drugs? And why do the people who take the most drugs lose the very effects they seek? The answer is that drugs do not contain highs. Highs exist within the human nervous system; all drugs do is trigger or draw attention to highs.

The fact that highs exist within is a cause for optimism. It means the potential for these states is always there, and many techniques must exist for evoking them. And there really are alternatives to drugs, because drug highs differ from other highs only in superficial ways. The state of the brain can be stimulated by many different influences, including one's own thoughts (we've all been lifted out of a gloomy state by a work of praise, a show of affection, a cheque in the mail!). The main advantage of drugs compared to other techniques is that they work powerfully and immediately. Their main disadvantage is that they reinforce the idea that the state we desire comes from something outside of us.

Non-drug highs can present problems - addictions such as killing or gambling are obviously destructive. The goal should be to get high in ways that do not hurt yourself or others, and that do not require huge expense or external resources. As well as various sporting and similar physical expression activities (e.g. dance), meditation, chanting, prayer, communing with nature, playing music and artistic expression are especially attractive ways of changing consciousness because they require little outside of oneself. There are so many ways to change consciousness it is not worth trying to list them. Methods that work for one person leave another cold - find what works for you.

People also take drugs for other reasons than getting high. There are alternatives for these as well, such as acupuncture, massage, diet as well as changing patterns of eating, sleeping, exercise and gaining new interpersonal skills to name just a few.

Since the use of drugs has become so habitual for many (glass of wine before dinner, a joint before a movie) it may be hard for some people to imagine life without them. The fact is however, if people are determined enough, they can eliminate drugs from their lives and never miss them.

Ram Dass, who experimented with Timothy Leary with LSD, psilocybin and other psychedelics in the 1960's which he promoted when he was on the faculty at Harvard, later came to feel that frequent drug experiences were an obstacle to self-realisation and that yoga and meditation were more valuable techniques.

Perhaps now is the appropriate time to think of those a little less fortunate than us, the lonely, the elderly, those not as well off. This is the perfect time to spare a thought, a visit or gift to make theirs a happy Christmas as well.

STATION NEWS:

November has followed on in the same mode as October with a reduction in the number of emergencies which is really good news especially in the lead up to Christmas.

I had a great time at Day Care, Kindy and Pre-School. All the children are learning how to dial 000 in an emergency and ask for the Ambulance, as well as being able to tell us their name, address and phone number all of which is vitally important in an emergency situation.

Some certificates have already been handed out to those who remembered correctly. More soon.

A very successful (and enjoyable) First Aid course was also completed in November and certificates have been sent to all the participants.

They really should be encouraged to take out a single subscription for themselves to eliminate the chance of a large Ambulance account should treatment or transport be needed.

People continuing with full time studies are covered by their parents family cover until the age of 25 or until they complete their studies.

TREVORS

HEART ATTACK:

PAIN in the centre of the chest behind the breast bone which can come on during activity or at rest or even wake the person from sleep, must be regarded as a Heart Attack.

The pain may spread to the arms, shoulders, neck and jaw. The patient may be nauseous and appear Pale, Cold, and Sweaty. Sudden collapse without pain may be the only sign.

If Cardiac Arrest occurs the patient will need Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation.

TREATMENT:

Do not take chances - Call for URGENT Ambulance medical treatment on 000.

If the patient is conscious, rest the patient, loosen tight clothing. Often patients with heart conditions will have medication they place under their tongue, assist them to take it.

If cardiac arrest occurs commence cardiopulmonary resuscitation if you are trained and remember call for urgent Ambulance medical





94 Schools Grab Garbage for Environmental and Cash Rewards

Enthusiastic schools across Queensland collected the most recyclables ever for the 1996 Great Garbage Grab recycling competition. In total 576.9 tonnes of recyclables were removed from landfill. A recycling truck holding 23 cubic metres would take 165 trips to the landfill to carry this amount of material from 66,000 full household recycling bins. Material collected saves valuable landfill space and helps to educate students about how to manage their waste. The Queensland Recycling Advisory Council coordinated the competition and provided cash prizes to the schools showing dedication and great effort. Schools received cash prizes of \$1500, \$1000, \$500 and \$50 in 6 studentnumber dependent categories with a special \$1000 for each category collecting the most compost. The schools took part in a year long program that started with setting up a recycling collection station at school. The competition aims to teach students about their waste and how they can manage it. Schools collected glass bottles and jars, milk and softdrink plastic bottles, aluminium cans and material for the compost. Totals collected by all schools are 529.5 tonne of glass, 26.5 tonne of aluminium cans and 20.9 tonne of plastic containers. Though not every school could win a prize, all schools were winners for learning how their actions could help their environment.

The Queensland Recycling Advisory Council is made up of the Queenslnad Department of Environment, the Litter and Recycling Research Association (Qld) and the Local Government Association of Queensland.

Many of the schools also entered into the composting category. Throughout the year 466.3m* of compostable material was collected. Compost was used by many schools for permaculture areas and as mulch.

Encouragement Prize (\$50) Kuranda State School Compost Prize (\$1000)" Beachmere State School (142.6m*) areas, in this field, with permanent connections. Jeweller and tutor Deb Pirard will be taking the techniques learned in Kuranda to her pupils and co-workers in Mt. Isa. An offer was also put to tutor Seanne McArthur to take on lecturing at the McGregor Summer Schools sometime in the future. An exciting possibility!

Opportunities were created for the potential exhibitors of "Bodyworks", a contemporary metal exhibition, due to show in February 1997. There were discussions of ideas, and the formulation of plans for the production of the Far North's first contemporary Jewellery and Metal Art Show.

KURANDA STATE HIGH SCHOOL


At the October meeting we saw a change of President. Barry Wright stepped down as President and Ken Harley was sworn in as President of the P & C. The meeting was very well attended and curriculum matters were discussed with Donna George, AES Studies - Department of Education, Nello Raciti, Coordinator of Cairns School Support Centre and Leanne Tyquin, Guidance Officer for Smithfield State High and Kuranda Primary School, Donna George advised the key factors which will determine the curriculum for the High School will be: 1) size of enrolments - the Department staffs high schools on ratio of students enrolled and 2) flexibility of curriculum. Donna also advised of ways we could overcome offering some subjects to students because of the School being small to start with. We could: 1) access the School of Distance Education for subjects e.g. economics, accounting; 2) share staff with Smithfield High School and 3) use of TAFE facilities on campus.

In general business, Krishna Buhler advised that Mareeba Shire Council is having difficulty in obtaining a suitable site for the Library. She felt that we should write to Mareeba Shire Council advising we would like to see the Library located at the High School. Ken Harley asked motion to be moved to write to the Council on this matter. Motion carried. With regards to the Swimming Pool a motion was carried to again lobby the Government/Council to have the swimming pool located in the vicinity of the High School. Ken advised Mareeba Shire Council has been lobbying hard for funds from Government for infrastructure costs related to the High School, i.e. widening of Myola Road, sewerage, etc and there had at this stage been no indication of funds being available. A motion was moved that the P & C actively support the Mareeba Shire Council in an endeavour to obtain infrastructure funding relating to the High

At the November meeting Ken Harley advised that Mareeba Shire Council representatives are still lobbying the Government for funding for infrastructure costs related to the High School. ARK and the Chamber of Commerce have also been actively lobbying the Government on the infrastructure funding issue. In relation to the sewerage, Project Services have commissioned a consultant in Cairns to prepare a report on various options for efficiently disposing of sewerage at the High School. Mareeba Shire Council has expressed extreme concern over the suggestion of use of septic tanks.

The next meeting will be held at Kuranda Primary School on Tuesday December 10 at 7.30p.m. All welcome. Esme Pratt - Secretary
