The attendance at his funeral was over 200 people, many who were members of the aboriginal community. James grew up with them and learned to love and respect them all. They are too numerous to name individually in this letter. Their support and kindness at this time is well appreciated. To the young aboriginals who stood at Kowrowa to salute the funeral cortege as it passed, I thank you all.

I would also like to comment on the supportive actions given by Sgt Steve Stafford and the staff of Kuranda Police, who gave up their leisure time to mow the churchyard, erect tarps, arrange seating outside the church and performed the Guard of Honour. This all showed community spirit. I have no hesitation in saying that these people are an asset to the community and should be treated as such. There was a great representation at the funeral of both serving and retired officers of Northern Region and International Police. I am proud to be associated with these fine men and women, as a member of the extended family of brotherhood of police.

The Returning Officer for the Mareeba Shire, Mr Colin McDowall, today announced that local government elections will be held on Saturday, 25 March 2000 commencing at 8.00am and closing at 6.00pm and that Nomination Day for the Mareeba Shire will be Monday, 21 February 2000. Nomination forms are available from the Returning Officer at the Council Chambers, 65 Rankin Street, Mareeba. Mr. McDowall said, "It is important for residents of the Shire who are qualified electors to ensure that their names are on the electoral roll, which closes at 4.45pm on Monday, 31 January 2000". Residents who have changed address in the recent past and have any queries in relation to this matter are advised to ring the Australian Electoral Commission on Freecall 132 326. Electors are reminded that voting is compulsory. Polling booths will be operating at the Mareeba Shire Hall, the Irvinebank School of Arts and at State Schools in Kuranda, Mutchilba, Dimbulah, Chillagoe, Biboohra, Mt. Molloy and Julatten.

Residents who will be absent from the area will be able to make application for a postal vote or will be able to vote in the Shire Office for approximately two weeks before Election Day.

The forthcoming election will elect a new Council which will serve for a period of four years and it is important for all electors to exercise their democratic right to vote in these elections". EXOTIC FRUIT AND VEGETABLE SURVEY BEGINS

DEPARTMENT OF PRIMARY INDUSTRIES NEWS RELEASE

A capability survey of the Far North's tropical exotic fruit and vegetable industries is being

carried out to determine the vast range of exotic crops being grown up north.

The survey is being conducted by the Department of Primary Industries' Queensland Horticulture Institute at Cairns, in partnership with the Cairns Regional Economic Development Corporation (CREDC) which is contributing funding and resources. Michael Daysh, Industry Market Development Manager far the Queensland Horticulture Institute, said the survey extends from Cardwell to Cooktown and west to Ravenshoe - from wellknown large scale crops including mangoes and lychees, to emerging industries such as yam beans, sapote and durian. "Research has shown that in many cases potential buyers do not know about tropical foods, where to buy them, or at what times of the year they are available," explained CREDC Board Member Giuseppe Moro. "The survey data will be used for a Compendium of Exotic Tropical Fruits and Vegetables to promote local foods to the local food service industry, which is one of the key aims of the CREDC Cairns Food Cluster ' TNQ Tastes of the Tropics'. Producers will also have the option of being listed on the Cluster's database and Internet web page for trade inquiries". The Cluster's website, to be known as www.australiantropicalfoods.com will be an important logistical tool for our food producers to educate and market their products to the world". Mr Daysh said the survey will cover commercial growers with more than 100 fruit trees or 500 square metres of fruit or vegetable crops asking about varieties, production, seasons, organics, processing and other issues. "This is the first survey that will tell us just how much of these exciting new exotics are available to the food service industry, the seasons they are available, and the growers who can supply them," he advised. The survey will be carried out by phone and personal interviews by DPI and CREDC staff. ORGANIC GARDENING

The last few weeks have given me lovely showers to help my cucumbers, chokos, herbs to eat plus Fruits like yellow passion fruit, monstereo, jak fruit and bananas. The birds are prolific but they prefer the flowers of the many bottlebrush etc that have lots of nectar. Sun birds are very busy eating and nesting. I can eat only a tenth of the fruit but kind friends who help me with shopping etc use the big surplus, and give me mangoes which do not grow in my heavy clay soil, Heliconias of 3 varieties, plus torch gingers are still flowering a lot, and friends enjoy picking them. Anyone wanting rooting bulbs phone me on 4093 7205 and dig what you want at no charge. Canna lily tubers are also available to dig. I hope for lots more light rains to bring on the citrus as moving hoses with a crippled back is impossible. Keep up dolomite dusting on the root zones of your fruit trees, especially pawpaws - pawpaws need a raised bed. If you like wampi fruits or carrot tree fruit, do come and pick for free.

A little sprinkle of epsom salts (magnesium) is helpful on plants that need a boost. Six years ago I planted 6 Neem trees and now I can get the tops trimmed off and the leafy mulch put around plants and trees to deter the nasty insects that ravage leaves and fruit. New growth will soon provide another trimming of leafy Neem branches.

Someone once said "It's one thing to get it started, it's another to stop it." That's KURANDA Employ story. We are bowling into 2000 with awesome momentum. We planted over 10,000 trees last year and we'll double it this year. Our membership continues to grow (over 230 now) along with interest and participation by people and organisations outside the membership.

- While our EnviroLink Wildlife Corridor is still our major project, there are other activities planned for this year to keep you occupied and physically fit (so you can keep up with us).
- Every Saturday morning for an hour from 8am, we meet somewhere along the Corridor (between Kowrowa and Speewah) to clear weeds and dig holes ready to plant trees or we return to previous plantings to weed or water the growing trees. Because of the thousands of trees we've planted at Big Sands, we are kept busy with maintenance until the trees grow higher than the Guinea Grass. (Big Sands is at Kowrowa - follow Myola / Oak Forest Road out from the traffic lights at the Kennedy Highway intersection for 8km. Turn right at the Bushcare sign - before you reach the general store). After a good workout for an hour, we provide a picnic morning tea.
- There are a number of willing workers who find it inconvenient to attend our Saturday morning working-bee. We've been asked to consider doing it on a week day or later in the day on a Sunday as well. Would you come if we arranged another time? Let's know:4093 7570.
- During the first term school holidays, we are planning to have a "Children's Tree-planting Day". We'll organise this so that it provides a day of activity for the children and gives parents a break. Of course, we hope parents, big brothers and sisters will also want to be part of the action-filled day. More detail on this soon.
- In August, Landcare Australia wants two million trees planted throughout Australia along the Olympic Torch route to Sydney. The Idea is that communities such as ours will plant about 2000 trees in honour of an Olympian or Paralympian. On the weekend of 5th and 6th August, we will pull together with other groups in Kuranda to plant a beautiful entrance to Kuranda (at the Kennedy Highway / Myola Road / Rob Veivers Intersection). We'll make a picnic out of it with a barbecue for the tree planters. Members of the Kuranda Village Promotion Program, Mareeba Shire Council and ourselves are beginning to plan the landscape. CYCAD SEASON

Zamia furfuracea as seen in the photo is a mature "Cardboard Cycad" or "Jamaican Sago Tree" featuring rust coloured female cones. The male cones are half the size of the female cones and are produced on separate plants after 3-5 years. Male and female plants are required for viable seed. Zamia furfuraces is from Mexico, one of 64 species of Zamia found in the Caribbean region. This hardy, fascinating Cycad looks great in a tub, in a patio garden or featured in a rockery.

HOW TO BE HEALTHY THOUGH ELDERLY

It is difficult. Diet and fresh air are important, and so is plenty of sleep and exercise. No

coffee or cigarettes. Drink lots of water. It's good flavoured with lemon or orange. Raw fruit

is good but best eaten at the beginning of a meal. Chew your food well and rinse your mouth and teeth after every meal. Weak tea is OK but avoid sugar in tea or cakes, Try arrowroot biscuits for a nibble. Use good honey in place of sugar. Encourage birds to your garden (but not friar birds who will kill all baby birds they see.) Scrub hens are a disaster if you grow bananas. You will enjoy watching the birds flitting past as you relax.

HYDROPONIC GARDENING

This time of year is difficult both for the Hydroponic gardener and the soil gardener. My tomatoes are doing fine though, they grow mi tubs of sand and are fed nutrient, when it is pouring 1 just leave their taps open and the rain doesn't cause any problems. 1 am grow m*g the tropic variety which do not seem to succumb to the variety of fungi and other problems that tomatoes usually have. My bore water has quite a lot of calcium in it which helps to protect them from blossom end rot. My friends who have town water have problems with this. My cucumbers are also doing fine. 1 am growing the Lebanese variety and to date 1 am not having any problem with moulds. My water chestnuts are doing well, even the fish 1 put in with them have had babies. When 1 first obtained them from south 1 was told they needed a fairly high strength nutrient, but 1 have not been feeding them much at all and they are thriving on the nutrient from the fish. The fish eat mosquito larvae, algae etc. and when they excrete this feeds the plants. Also and added bonus the frogs have found my little oasis and are breeding amongst the rushes. The containers are too high off the ground to have trouble with toads. Wouldn't it be good if all gardening was like this: more or less self sufficient. It must be the right time of year for parsley, 1 planted the seeds in a bed of sand and fed them nutrient and 1 have heaps of little parsley plants. For Information Ph. 4093 0394.


Long term Mareeba Shire resident, Arthur Yates announced his intention to stand for Mayor of Mareeba Shire at the forthcoming Local Government elections in March.

Mr Yates, who has had twenty years practical experience in local government, and in small business in the agricultural sector said, "This is a time for a fresh direction for the Shire. I look forward to working with the newly elected council and importantly, our community clients, in this difficult economic time. I have taken note over the last few years that our constituents have an expectation of increased consultation from Council on critical issues that effect their quality of life, the local economy and their livelihoods. The Mareeba Shire Council must take a pro-active role in diversifying the Shire economy, encouraging new industry and investment, whilst protecting the interest of existing business and the needs of the ratepayers". Continuing, he said, "The expansion of the Cairns population, which has necessitated a Regional Growth Plan, will place increased population and sub-divisional pressure on Kuranda and our Shire. It will also place pressure on the remnant rainforest and increase pressure on the Kuranda Range road. This will have a significant impact on our community.

As Mayor, I am committed to efficient and effective consultation on these and other important issues. I am against autocratic actions by Councils, which end up in public debate between constituents, e.g., the recent Speewah water issue. Council must be more receptive to economic, social and environmental life style directions being following by our community.

I believe council has a workforce, which is not fully appreciated. This workforce is capable of producing very effective results and importantly contributing significantly to the Shire's economy. In the past it has been proven that efficient public works performed by day labour has a direct capping of project cost when compared to current government policy of National Competition, that is adversely affecting small business and stripping jobs from regional communities", he said. "I am also a keen advocate of continuous improvement through training and up skilling, to keep our council staff abreast of new technology and provide them with a career path. I am a team player and I am very keen to work with councilors and others who support these directions. However, I am not prepared to compromise commitment to public consultation on significant issues that effect the community. I believe the position of Mayor demands full time involvement. There is no time for any part time leadership in this day and age. I also believe that this new direction for our council and community is paramount to take the Shire successfully into the future," Mr. Yates said.

Mr. Yates and family have lived in the Shire since 1975. They lived in Kuranda for several years. Arthur is very familiar with the area and is aware of community aspirations. He is a project Manager in civil construction. He and his wife, Cheryl, live on their citrus farm at Koah. Arthur is actively involved in local primary producer groups, a board member of the recently formed Tableland Export Cooperative, and a representative on the Barron River Water Allocation Management Plan (W. A M. P.), Community Reference Panel.



ROTARY PROJECT IN AITAPE, PNG

Kuranda Scouts News



KURANDA HIGH SCHOOL LEARNS A BALLPOINT PEN IS A PRECIOUS POSSESSION TO STUDENTS IN ZIMBABWE.

Learning Team 2 at Kuranda High School last year became aware that something as simple as a ballpoint pen could be a precious possession even a status symbol to students throughout Africa who struggle against poverty to become better educated.

It may be hard for us to believe, but yes, those stories you hear of African students begging for biros is true! Many of them whose parents have struggled to pay their school fees, cannot afford to buy biro's. The children must beg for them from tourists especially at the exam time!! That's how I found out about their plight!

Since 1996 HELLO ZIMBABWE an Australia-wide cross-cultural project now based in Cairns, has been raising awareness of the urgent need for school stationary for children in RURAL ISOLATED VILLAGES in Zimbabwe and Zambia.

Already goods donated by Kuranda High School, School of Distance Education and Smithfield High School have arrived in Zimbabwe ready for the start of the new school year. More supplies are urgently needed. Offers of assistance are sought from schools, businesses, clubs, groups or organizations and members of the public to donate old encyclopaedia sets, atlases, maps, games, textbooks, English novels, comics, sport equipment, educational cassettes, music and stories, pens, pencils and basic school stationary items.

Imagine going without pens or paper for weeks at a time at school, or the whole classroom of 45 children sharing just a few biros and having to cut up cardboard boxes to write on. Now think of the array of electronic technology our children enjoy not only in their classrooms, but in their homes! Rural Zimbabwean village schools don't have electricity, computers or the internet, they don't even have enough school stationary, library books, textbooks or exercise writing books.

African students in rural villages also must pay examination fees to sit EXAMS, sports fees to play SPORTS, plus their school fees etc. and it's no wonder they may take 2 years just to complete Sometimes life is tough with lots of ups and downs, their children out of poverty, expend their own energy building the schools out of mud bricks. Yes, those stories are true!.

During 1980-1990 the Zimbabwean Government introduced free primary education and encouraged schools to be built within walking distance in disadvantaged rural areas. Consequently, there was a phenomenal increase in school enrolments that caused a critical shortage of human resources and learning materials.







POLICE NEWS



The Story Of St. Valentine's Day

Valentine's Day started in the time of the Roman Empire. Under the rule of Emperor Claudius II Rome was involved in many bloody and unpopular military campaigns. Claudius the Cruel, as 954 9790. This was when a Christian priest named Valentine came to defend love in the empire. Valentine began to secretly marry couples despite the emperors orders. When Emperor Claudius was informed of these ceremonies Valentine was sent to prison where he remained until his death on February 14 in the year 270, when Valentine was clubbed, stoned, then beheaded. History claims that while Valentine was in prison awaiting execution, he fell in love with the blind daughter of the jailer, Asterius. Through his unswerving faith, he miraculously restored her sight. He signed a farewell message to her "From Your Valentine", a phrase that still lives today. If this is true, that would have been the first Valentine's card.

It wasn't until a few hundred years later when Valentine's Day began to develop as we know it. At the time Christianity was beginning to take control of Europe. As part of this effort the Church sought to do away with pagan holidays. Valentine's Day came to replace a mid-February fertility festival called Lupercalia. In honor of his sacrifice for love, Valentine was made a saint and Lupercalia renamed in his honor.

Until today the tradition of honoring Valentine continues. The themes of love and fertility taken from the ancient meanings of the holiday have endured and evolved with our contemporary adaptations of its meanings



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

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



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The Chinese Year 4698

The New Year's Day for the Year of Dragon is feb. 5, 2000

The Origin of Chinese New Year The Chinese New Year is now popularly known as the Spring Festival because it starts from the Beginning of Spring (the first of the twenty-four terms in coordination with the changes of Nature). Its origin is too old to be traced. Several explanations are hanging around. All agree, however, that the word Nian, which in modern Chinese solely means "year", was originally the name of a monster beast that started to prey on people the night

before the beginning of a new year (Do not lose track here: we are talking about the new year in terms of the Chinese calendar). One legend goes that the beast Nian had a very big mouth that would swallow a great many people with one bite. People were very scared. One day, an old man came to their rescue, offering to subdue Nian. To Nian he said, "I hear say that you are very capable, but can you swallow the other beasts of prey on earth instead of people who are by no means of your worthy opponents?" So, swallow it did many of the beasts of prey on earth that also harassed people and their

domestic animals from time to time. After that, the old man disappeared riding the beast Nian. He turned out to be an immortal god. Now that Nian is gone and other beasts of prey are also scared into forests, people begin to enjoy their peaceful life. Before the old man left, he had told people to put up red paper decorations on their windows and doors at each year's end to scare away Nian in case it sneaked back again, because red is the color the beast feared the most. From then on, the tradition of observing the conquest of Nian is carried on from generation to generation. The term "Guo Nian", which may mean "Survive the Nian" becomes today "Celebrate the (New) Year" as the word "guo" in Chinese having both the meaning of "pass-over" and "observe". The custom of putting up red paper and firing fire-crackers to scare away Nian should it have a chance to run loose is still around. However, people today have long forgotten why they are doing all this, except that they feel the color and the sound add to the excitement of the celebration.

Traditions of Chinese New Year. Even though the climax of the Chinese New Year, Nian, lasts only two or three days including the New Year's Eve, the New Year season extends from the mid-twelfth month of the previous year to the middle of the first month of the new year. A month from the New Year, it is a good time for business. People will pour out their money to buy presents, decoration material, food and clothing. Transportation department, railroad in particular, is nervously waiting for the onslaught of swarms of travelers who take their days off around the New Year to rush back home for a family reunion from all parts of the country.

Days before the New Year, every family is busy giving its house a thorough cleaning, hoping to sweep away all the ill-fortune there may have been in the family to make way for the wishful in-coming good luck. People also give their doors and window-panes a new paint, usually in red color. They decorate the doors and windows with paper-cuts and couplets with the very popular theme of

"happiness", "wealth", "longevity" and "satisfactory marriage with more children". Paintings of the same theme are put up in the house on top of the newly mounted wall paper. In the old days, various kinds of food are tributed at the altar of ancestors. **The Eve of the New Year** is very carefully observed. Supper is a feast, with all members coming together. One of the most popular course is jiaozi, dumplings boiled in water. "Jiaozi" in Chinese literally mean "sleep

together and have sons", a long-lost good wish for a family. After dinner, it is time for the whole family to sit up for the night while having fun playing cards or board games or watching TV programs dedicated to the occasion. Every light is supposed to be kept on the whole night. At midnight, the whole sky will be lit up by fireworks and firecrackers make everywhere seem like a war zone. People's excitement reach its zenith. Very early the next morning, children greet their parents and receive their presents in terms of cash wrapped up in red paper packages from them. Then, the family start out to say greetings from door

to door, first their relatives and then their neighbors. It is a great time for reconciliation. Old grudges are very easily cast away during the greetings. The air is permeated with warmth and friendliness. During and several days following the New Year's day, people are visiting each other, with a great deal of exchange of gifs. The New Year atmosphere is brought to an anti-climax fifteen days away where the Festival of Lanterns sets in. It is an occasion of lantern shows and folk dances everywhere. One typical food is the Tang Yuan, another kind of dumplings made of sweet rice rolled into balls and stuffed with either sweet or spicy fillings. The Lantern Festival marks the end of the New Year season and afterwards life becomes daily routines once again. This description is based upon the recollection of my own experience. Customs of observing the New Year vary from place to place, considering that China is a big country not only geographically, but also demographically and ethnically. Yet, the spirit underlying the diverse celebrations of the Chinese New Year is the same: a sincere wish of peace and happiness for the family members and friends

The year 2000 represents an Angry Dragon. As the name suggests, there is a need to be cautious. Dragons are by nature animals of great power, and an Angry Dragon year will most likely lead to some volatile situations. However, it is not all bad, as Angry Dragons are also seen as supportive, and it may well be that some anger is justified, and from it will arise the righting of wrongs and the success of justice over injustice. There will be tension, and the constant possibility of things going either way. It is not a year for making rash decisions, but rather, sleep on important issues, and avoid impulsive reactions. If you are a Dragon, this is a year of great potential for you, and it is a good year to learn. Enjoy your year. Many opportunities will emerge to develop in all spheres of your life, but remember, this is an Angry Dragon year, and so avoid impulsive behavior.

Fires And Flammable Materials

Division 1 - regulation of fires in the open Lighting and maintaining fires in the open

10. (1) a person must not light or maintain a fire in the open air (including the use of an incinerator) within 100 metres of residential premises except for the purpose of a barbecue.

Maximum penalty - 20 penalty units.

(2) However, subsection (1) does not apply if

(a) The fire is authorised by notification or required by notification or notice under the fire and rescue authority act 1990; or

(b) a person is authorised or required to light the fire in the performance of duties under another act; or the fire is lit or maintained on land which is included within the rural a or rural b zones as defined in the planning scheme of the local government.

Division 2 - nuisances

Maximum penalty - 50 penalty units.

11. A person must not light or maintain a fire if:

(a) The smoke or other products of combustion are likely to cause

Irritation, annoyance or distress to others; or

(b) the fire exposes property to the risk or damage or destruction by fire. Local law no. 31 - control of nuisances

Division 3 - compliance notices

12. (1) an authorised person may, by written notice given to the occupier and/or the owner of land, require the occupier and/or the owner to:

(a) Extinguish a fire on the land that has been lit or maintained in contravention of this part; or

(b) Take specified action, within a specified time, to remove a fire hazard on the land.

SOME EARLY HISTORY OF KURANDA

The picturesque little town of Kuranda 21 miles from Cairns, on the Barron River, and backed by Saddle Mountain, began its existence in the early 1880's. During the early part of 1877 the sum of 9,979 pounds was spent on the Kuranda Range Road, a part of the Cairns-Thornborough road, the through road to the hinterland and to Herberton. The Cairns road was steep and needed "double banking" to the top owing to sharp pinches. It was not used for long, as a shorter road from Port Douglas was discovered and this was the main coach road. However the land around Kuranda was cut up into blocks of mainly 100 and 150 acres (a few were much larger) and all were sold and the little town established.

Its' very early settlers suffered hardships from the aboriginals, some being very wild. In 1879 a man of Greek nationality traveling about seven miles from Kuranda to Groves Creek, arrived with spear wounds in his legs, after losing his pack horse and all loading, Some years later a Mr. Hobson was also murdered on his property, just opposite Myola Railway station.

However the little town progressed, never grew very large, but is renowned for its' tourist attractions, being so close to the Barron Falls and having a very unique and picturesque railway station showing many varieties of ferns, orchids and tropical plants of all sizes. It is now in 1967, to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the Kuranda State School. My father the late R.W. Warren built the original school and also the residence. The school was sold to become a home, but the residence still stands.

The country around Kuranda had valuable timber. Kauri Pine, Oaks and Hickory were best. This was railed to Cairns for milling, providing a lot of work. The logs were hauled in per bullock teams. The timber became the property of the landholders and profits from sale helped clear the land. The heavy scrub cost a lot to clear. Nearly all the settlers put in an area of coffee, supervised by an expert, Mr. Newport of the Kamerunga State Nursery. As the trees grew to bearing, the whole district looked lovely with the evergreen trees at times covered with white blossoms and later with the red coffee beans.

Mr A. Street was an asset to the district. On his property at Kuranda, he established a secondary industry, the manufacture of coffee from the beans, and his coffee, in its green and gold labeled tins, found ready sale. He won many prizes in the shows and also at the London and Paris Exhibitions. Mr. Street purchased all the beans from other growers adding to his manufacturing trade. Disaster came and they all suffered a severe blow in the 1900 black frost. All the crops were ruined except those of Mr. Street and a Mr. Driscoll. Mr. Street's were protected by scrub and were saved. Other growers became despondent and sold out. Others went in for dairy and cattle. Mr. Street also owned a small store near the school, run by his daughter. For some time the Garbutt family ran a butcher's shop and a few others were able to supply the town with milk and butter. 


