Congratulations to all those persons responsible for making the recent Kuranda Spring Fair the success which it obviously was. A special thanks should go to Councillor Oliver Gilkerson and the many people who must have put in a lot of preparatory work prior to the day itself. I hope it will become an annual event. If it were to be so, then might I suggest that the entire days' activities be concentrated on, and in the immediate vicinity of Centenary Park. The Park and the surrounding streets could I'm sure, accomodate all the stalls, a soapbox derby and even the procession. Street closing too could be a simple matter. I believe one main advantage of this suggestion would be to have a better concentration of participants and public, instead of everyone and everything being spread from one end of the town to the other. Businesses around the far end of the town would be disadvantaged one must agree, but after all, it would be for only 1 day of the year and a

non-market day at that. On perhaps the negative side, I felt it was unfortunate that no electric power points were available throughout the Park. The Kuranda Lions benefited by almost \$400 whilst operating their merry-go-round in the park. But this figure could have been higher had they not had to hire a power generator. And we all know that all monies raised by the Kuranda Lions are returned to the community.

Also, for different reasons, commercial vehicles etc. will always have to be allowed onto the grass area, if only for unloading purposes. Yet it appears to me that no allowance has been made to enable these vehicles to cross from the roadway onto the grassed area without having to mount the kerb, which eventually must result in damage to those kerbs. Once again, congratulations and thanks to all who participated on Saturday 7th September.

Dear Kuranda Paper,

I agree with Helmut Jesse (last issue), . I didn't like silverchair's music either, but 3,500 young people did and I defend their right of choice. Three hours in a twelve month period seems a minimal acknowledgement that they too are part of the community. Feedback has been very positive. They appreciated it. Owners of motor mowers subject their neighbours to far longer periods of terrible noise, far more frequently, and that is also a choice. They could let the rainforest grow back, or buy an electric mower. However, I support their choice too, though I detest their noise. Uniform noise laws will help, but to unilaterally declare sound limits below performance norms at other venues will merely result in large hirers going elsewhere, we only have three or four a year anyway. In the absence of any other funding source, especially during this peiod of "once off" capital works, the result would be the financial collapse of the amphitheatre, with all its other arts and cultural activities and the loss of a facility beloved by the vast majority of residents. Where is your tolerance? You have, after all, chosen to live in a community. Isolated land is always available.

Dear Kuranda Paper, So, at the last A.R.K. meeting it was declared that the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan would be adhered to in full with no changes. That IS good news. So now, if you would, please turn to volume five - coach circulation options - and read it. You will note that in 1993, the community in it's wisdom, opted to wait and see what impact Skyrail would have. A study was then to be carried out and presumably, further discussion undertaken. This was pointed out to the Advisory Committee by the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce and Tourism Inc., as well as by K.T.A. Inc. and has been ignored, as was the submission by the Tour Coach Operators stating that without access they would be unable to continue marketing and promoting Kuranda. Can we as a community reliant on tourism match \$2 million to market and promote ourselves? Can we afford to lose it? Considering that we no longer see anything like 50 coaches in the village at one time (it's more like 50-75 a week now!) do we even have a "coach problem" to manage?

So let us hope that sense prevails, and that the K.S.M.P. Advisory Committee does insist on sticking to the plan, by shelving it's hasty recommendation made at the January 20th, 1996 workshop to limit coach access. The whole issue needs to be looked at again - and this time taking into account the above and it's affect on the whole community. 

F.N.Q.E.B. have completed their line clearing in the district and I think are to be congratulated on their more sensitive approach to the task. I have received no complaints. 



KISC DRUG & ALCOHOL BULLETIN

CHOCOLATE

Chocolate contains a stimulant drug, and cases of chocolate dependence - "chocoholics" - are easy to find. Chocolate contains only a small amount of caffeine, but has a lot of theobromine, a close relative with similar effects. Theobrimine does not account for all aspects of chocolate addiction, other components must be involved - very little research has been done on chocolate, so no one knows for sure. Poeple who develop an addictive relationship with chocolate (most chocoholics are women) usually eat it in cyclic binges rather than continually and often say it acts on them like an instant anti-depressant. Chocolate, which naturally contains a lot of fat and is very bitter, must be mixed with sugar to make it palatable. Therefore while chocolate in moderation is a pleasant indulgence, over use may not be wise. (Surprise, surprise!) taken from "From Chocolate to Morphine" by A.Weil, MD, & W. Rosen.

A THOUGHT FOR OCTOBER

This month we read a little more from St. Matthew's Gospel, open up at chapter 21 and read verses 28 to 32, only four verses If only we knew the people really thinks highly of it would probably give us some real surprises again and again, over and over Jesus talks of obedience. He always had a strong aversion to response to himself which were long on words and short on action! Jesus always saw love very much in terms of obedience. Two sons are asked to do something, one promises to do it but fails to produce, the other refuses at first but afterwards changes his mind and does it. The question Jesus puts to people around him is that of obedience. Who obeyed the father? the one who said an immediate yes and then walked, or the one who said a stubborn "no" but then returned to do the job Does this story remind us of another story Jesus told again about two sons? One disappears over the hill, off with his inheritance, off for a good time, until it is all wasted, then he turns for home and is passionately welcomed. The other never asks for anything, he stays, always faithful but in the end he ends up angry, selfrighteous, unloving. The story is an echo of the other but the further we look the more we wee a consistent pattern in Jesus' attitude to certain people. In this passage Jesus has made his listeners gasp when he said that the prostitutes had a better change of making it into God's Kingdom than the so called respectable, God-fearing burglars gathering around Him. Jesus then goes one step further. He points out that when John the Baptist pleaded for changes in the countries lifestyle, he was listened to by the same prostitutes and tax collectors, people treated with contempt, once again by these respectable and God fearing people. What is the thread through all of this then? what does it mean? it was heard all to clearly by the established men and women of Jesus' day and it was certainly one factor, if not the main factor which placed Him on a Cross Jesus saw that there is an irony at the heart of life. It is better somehow to have come through some battling within ones own self, it is better to have failed and the recover than never to have tasted failure, it is better to have sinned and be sorry than to have always enjoyed some ghastly bland innocence. There is a kind of false religion that is terrified of acknowledging this. Jesus was surrounded by that kin of religion and our own time has it in abundance. The first son in this short parable is far less real in Jesus' eyes than the second. The second has a will, he is a real person, his obedience is more difficult to get but it is far more worth getting. The good news for October is Gods honesty and realism as spoken by Jesus Thank God for the honesty and realism of Jesus.

The Anglican Diocese of North Queensland has elected a new Bishop, the Rt. Rev'd. Clyde Wood. Bishop Clyde is at present assistant to the Archbishop of Brisbane who has responsibility for the Western Region of the Diocese of Brisbane.

He was previously Bishop of the Northern Territory. Bishop Clyde will be installed on Saturday, 12th October in the Cathedral Church of St. James in Townsville.





Behind the Glass Wall is a full length regional multimedia dance/theatre cyclone awareness production. This innovative and exciting show is based on Cyclone Joy, a potentially devastating Category 4 cyclone which threatened the FNQ in 1990.

Behind The Glass Wall will premiere on the 24 October run 24-26 October at the Cairns Civic Theatre to coincide with Cyclone Awareness Week, marking the onset of the FNQ cyclone season. T h c Queensland Bureau of Meteorology is supplying computer cyclone imaging technology and graphic audio actuality to accentuate this. A very high-tech computer based Bureau of Meteorology cyclone safety exhibition will also run concurrently in the theatre

This artistic regional production marks a model partnership between the Bureau of Meteorology and the FNQ creative arts scene

in recognition of finding mutual aims - conveying a vital community safety message while promoting the FNQ region, its creative artists and unique environs.

There are a lot of talented artists in this region and I aim to expose them to a broader audience," artistic director Ms Youdell said. "We are working together cross-artform. Rigel Best, a musician of great style and sensitivity, is composing the three act production. Other talented artists from major regional arts organisations like Kick Arts (contemporary visual arts), JUTE (theatre) and Graft 'n Arts (community arts and youth) will participate in the creative process. Beliefs and how we come to them, and how we react when they are shown to be false, are explored. In so doing, the show conveys a vital community safety message while using the real life drama of Cyclone Joy as the artistic focus.

The idea for the project stemmed from a holiday conversation where family and friends were discussing differing cyclone

phenomenon and the colourful colloquial stories of the region.

Directed by Rebecca Youdell this work is based on discovery of the region's cultural identity, and is part of Ms. Youdell's qualifying work towards her Master of Arts thesis in dance.

"Old traditions and urban myths come to life as they're integrated into contemporary expressions of our culture, providing important skill building for the community's education and artistic development," said Ms Youdell. I would like to work with our community to develop arts that better reflect the uniqueness of FNQ," said Ms. Youdell.

Who Flung Dung' is a market comedy with a mystic twist. Shot at the Kuranda markets, the film is about Who Flung Dung, a good spirited fortune card reader who gives meaning to peoples lives. The tension builds when Richard (played by Jim Gosden), Christina (played by Liza Dewey) and Alex (played by Danny Simony) encounter Who Flung Dung (played by David Jones) for what they think will be a fun fortune card reading. The outcome surprises everyone because the cards never lie.

The project started in February this year when associate producer Noel Farquarson, writer David Jones and director cameraman Peter McCabe agreed to produce a short comedy film on the condition that everyone involved has a fun time. As well, the Kuranda Film Society was established and a successful short film festival screened films from the Sydney Tropicana Film Festival to 200 people at Monkeys restaurant. The Kuranda screening raised over \$300 for the Kuranda Ambulance. With inspiration set, the action followed.

In August the Kuranda community came to the fore with professional talent, crew and sponsors contributing over \$11,000 worth of time, goods and services toward the 'Who Flung Dung' project. Mareeba Shire Council through the Regional Arts Development Fund contributed \$1,000 while the markets of Kuranda donated \$600. Bill Gordon gave \$200 and Kuranda Rainforest Tours, Mike Mabbutt LJ Booker Real Estate, Benny Swartz, Mark and Cathy Freeman, Joel Bacon from Tentative Nests and Gecko Video Productions contributed \$100 each. The edited film will be entered into the 1997 Tropicana Film Festival in Sydney where an expected audience of 8,000 people will view festival entries on giant screens around Rushcutters Bay Park in February next year. We believe we have a great entry that captures contemporary North Queensland consciousness with a humourous net cast by entertaining and committed characters.



'AUSSIEHOST' OPPORTUNITY FOR KURANDA

Kuranda could become the first 'AussieHost Town' in the whole of Queensland if business people take on the opportunity and commence training by participating in the one-day, nationally accredited customer service course.

Aussie Host is all about providing excellent customer service to visitors and customers. At present, although other towns and businesses throughout Queensland have undertaken the programme, there is no 'AussieHost Town' in

The Kuranda Village Promotion Program is one hundred percent behind the idea. According to Noel Farquharson, of Kuranda Rainforest Tours, a member of the KVPP Business Development Working Group the opportunity represents a chance to differentiate Kuranda from other towns in the region and capitalise on the potential competitive advantage.

The AussieHost idea came up in one of the Business Development Working Group meetings. This Group is one of three Working Groups involved in implementing the projects identified by the community at the public workshop held in June to establish the Main Street Program (now Kuranda Village Promotion Program).

" AussieHost training is not an expense but rather an investment in the business", said Mr Farquharson. Program Co-ordinator Alison Bickell is also keen to see Kuranda become the first AussieHost Town in Queensland. "To become an AussieHost Town. 60% of our businesses need to train 60% of their staff through the accredited one-day programme. This represents a lot of people, so we want to see the training commence as soon as possible. July 1997 is the date we are aiming for to become the first AussieHost Town in Queensland. "

"Apparently other towns in the region have the same idea so we really need

to get moving if we are to be the first" said Ms Bickell.

The programme is internationally recognised and operates in 15 countries around the globe. It was first introduced in 1985 by the Minister for Tourism, British Columbia, Canada to support the growth of tourism around the World Expo 1986 in Vancouver.In measuring it's success, consider this: 250,000 people are now 'SuperHosts' in British Columbia and the Canadians have linked this to an increase of 8% in BC's visitor numbers as compared to other provinces.

The programme is co-ordinated nationally by the Inbound Tourism Organisation of Australia and locally by the Far North Queensland Promotion Bureau Ltd. It is delivered by local leaders who understand the region and environment from which the participants come, and who have been trained by AussieHost National leaders.

AussieHost is for any person or business involved in providing a service . Your customers are not only those external customers who frequent your business but also those internal customers you deal with on a daily basis : for example, suppliers, landlords, transport operators and staff. The skills you learn are applicable to all customers.

Kuranda Village Infrastructure Works BARANG STREET

Residents will notice activity on Barang Street over the next 10 to 12 weeks. These works will focus on the area of Barang Street from Arara Street to Thongon Street and the area adjacent the CWA Hall. Works will include the creation of 60-70 all day car parking spaces, widening of existing bitumen, planting of street trees and landscaping.

This is part of the new regulated parking strategy and is designed to free up parking spaces in the Village by encouraging those who park all day to leave the 60% of all available spaces they currently occupy free for the use of customers, visitors and those parking for short periods of time.

The area adjacent the CWA Hall which has until recently been used for the temporary storage of materials for the Wet Tropics Tree Planting Scheme will be landscaped to create a new green space close to the Village.

FAMOUS FIGS TO GET SPECIAL ATTENTION

Alarm was raised recently when the Far North Queensland Electricity Board tree trimmers came to town. Some of the 'prunings' were considered a little too radical for the Village and ARK contacted the Board calling for a half to plans to trim Coondoo Street's famous old figs. The Board responded swiftly with all work in the Village put on hold until a meeting could be held to deal with the appropriate treatment of these venerable and beloved trees.

On Tuesday September 24th, representatives from ARK, Mareeba Shire Council and the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce and Tourism met with several FNQEB officers

and a compromise was reached.

In recognition that, as part of the second stage of the Kuranda Strategic Management Plan the offending wires will be undergrounded within twelve months and no further trimming required, the FNQEB have agreed to trim within minimum clearance, having regard for aesthetics as well as safety and continuance of supply. A special machine will be brought in to further reduce the amount of cutting and representatives from the community will attend the cutting

The operation is planned to occur very early on a non-Market day in about three weeks time, when interstate school holidays have finished, to reduce inconvenience for locals, businesses and visitors.





Daintree ... to the Coral Sea by Peter Jarver

[Thunderhead Publishing, Kuranda]
Photographs by Peter Jarver (Master of Photography AIPP)
Text by Rod Ritchie RRP \$39.95

Quite simply, this is a book of remarkable beauty.

That beauty, revealed through Peter Jarver's stunning photographs of the landscapes from the 'Mountains of Mist', through the 'Forests of Rain', across the 'Out Back of the Tablelands' and beyond the 'Coastline of Coral', may so capture your attention that you will need after your first journey, cover to cover, to return and follow Peter's advice: "sit quietly and observe for a while, until we begin to realise what it is that has captured our attention."

Return then to the front cover and observe, Here is a man, immersed in and dwarfed by Nature, leaning against a forest giant with the morning mists of the coastal rainforest lifting up through the canopy. Here also is the mystery and magic of the forest: peace amidst the complexity of life. There is also a sense of the explorer at rest, momentarily halted in his journey, off the beaten track.

My favourite photograph? Too hard. But the two page spread of sunset over Low Isles and moonise near Green Island is just magical, while the juxtaposition of two modern day explorers caught in a dusty shaft of light within an Undara lava tube with the ochre figure of a guardian spirit from the sandstone roof of Cockatoo shelter, Jowalbinna near Laura speaks eloquently of another kind of magic.

Text for the book is the work of Rod Ritchie, whose interest in nature, and most especially the rainforest, developed into a love when these forests were threatened with destruction through logging. His pen then became the sword with which, through an independent publishing business, he fights for conservation of the environment. Co-incidentally, I had just recently picked up a copy of Rod's book "Seeing the Rainforests in 19th- century Australia". And so, as Peter had advised, by looking more deeply, more was revealed.....

For this is also a book of great integrity.

"At the end of the nineteenth century, photographers portrayed the landscape as a modified place that one hundred years of settlement had tamed." The forest glants were reduced to tongue and groove, duchesses and smallboys, or plies of smouldering ash. "In more recent times, the camera has been used to bring the beauty of wild places to the notice of a city-bound population out of touch and often unaware of the environmental destruction that was taking place out of their sight".

Peter Jarver through his camera, and Rod Ritchle through his words, have crafted a book to charm and teach, which may reach out to draw visitors across the globe or pull them back to this magnificent place we call, mostly bilthely, 'home'. Let us hope it also speaks to us all of the need for such places to be protected, defended, so that "if an identical book were to be compiled at the turn of the next century, there would be little change to the places represented in these images."

This book would make a wonderful present for someone you love.
It may also represent an investment in protecting <u>somepiace</u> you love, it there was a copy on each blackbean-veneered government desk, perhaps more beancounters would see the forest for the trees, the fish for the fish food, and perhaps the current erosion of environmental management in our World Heritage areas might be stemmed. Buy one for your local bureaucrat I

STICKY SITUATIONS - (PART B) POINTS OF ORDER

5. GAGGING OR CLOSURE OF DEBATE

The procedural motion "that the motion be now put" can be moved at any time in debate of a motion (or the amendment to a motion) it need not be suspended.

The gag or closure motion cannot be moved by anyone who has spoken on the motion or amendment.

There is no debate on a closure motion . It must be put to the meeting immediately.

If the gag is carried on a motion, then debate stops. A right of reply should be given to the mover of the motion under consideration, then the motion is put.

6. ADJOURNMENT OF DEBATE

This action implies that debate on this particular matter be adjourned to a specified date, time and place. The adjournment motion can be debated.

7.DELAYING TACTIC - THAT THE QUESTION LIE ON THE TABLE.

This motion need not be seconded if passed, original debate ceases. Later at this or a subsequent meeting the matter can be raised from the table by the 'chair'.

3. PROCEED TO NEXT BUSINESS

It need not be seconded, if passed, discussion on the original subject/matter is to cease for this meeting. It is used to avoid spending any more time on a subject/motion. If lost, debate on the original motion/subject continues.

9. THAT THE QUESTION BE NOT NOW PUT

This enables a meeting to avoid committing itself either way, especially if the result could be embarrassing or misleading. If carried, the matter can be dealt with at a future meeting If lost, the procedure is as if the closure (gag) has been carried.

10. THAT THE MEETING BE ADJOURNED

Sometimes it becomes clear that a meeting has insufficient information to make a decision or has not completed a fair debate on a major issue for which the meeting was called. Then the adjournment motion is appropriate. It should specify the date, time and place the motion can be debated.

OF HAIRIES, HIPPIES AND WHY THE TITANIC WAS SUNK

Kuranda in the late sixties and early seventies was a different place. During those years there was an influx of people who were trying to look at life in a different way. Woodstock was recent; the Vietnam war was still grinding along and Australia was wealthy, well educated and conservative. A walk up the main street displayed a different Kuranda. The bottom pub with its big oval bar, Margaret Clark's fish and chip shop where Jilly Binna is now. Kuranda must have had one of the smallest police stations and jails in Australia. They are still there today - shoved aside and mostly forgotten. The taxi house was a house and the post office and newsagency were on the corner of Coondoo and Thongon Streets. Across the road was Fitzy's pub with its silver service dining room. The corner store and butcher shop were there; and further up the road was the movie theatre; now Tropical Pulse; and Hunter's red and white store. Grace Vievers was a wonder! Around the corner was Don and Betty Wilson's Shell shop. And that was it - Kuranda's complete commercial areal Tourists still came here. Fitzy's was a favourite

honeymoon destination known all over the north. Fairyland wasn't a road but a location. Kuranda was sleepy, satisfied and very beautiful. Seemingly suddenly - a new influx of people came to Kuranda. They were the "alternative lifestylers". Their clothes (when they wore them) were different. They preached "Peace, Love, Freedom and Happiness". They set up communes and mostly Kuranda welcomed them. The nights at the Bottom Pub have never been the same since. Kuranda had thirteen lion tamers and a couple of dozen glass blowers in the days when your occupation was part of getting the "dole". Mostly they were a happy bunch - young, enthusiastic, educated and easy to live with. Cheese cloth, Indian sandais, sarongs and smiles were the uniform of the day. And of course HAIR. Lots of it - down to your shoulders - or waist - or wherever. All of the communes or collectives had names. There was the "Good Ship Lollipop" and the "Titanic" and "Rosebud" and others. Later the Rainbow House and the Mango House. Not everybody welcomed this "invasion":. It was described by a prominent Councillor of the time as "A blight on the clean living morality of an honest and upstanding shire". The Mareeba Shire Council decided to get rid of these "layabout, hairy wastrels". The commune that they decided to disband as an example to the rest was the "Titanic". The Titanic was little more than a few timber shacks and a large blue tarpauline located in Weir Road - or Intake Road as the council named it. It wasn't much but the Council had the advantage. It had been built illegally and without permission. In charge were the three "EMs"; Mike, Michael and - well "M"! Mostly the "crew" consisted of hippy chicks aged between sixteen and twenty. A more peaceful group would be hard to imagine. But the Council needed an example and the "Titanic" was it. There was much vitirolic rhetoric spouted to the press; court orders were signed and codified. It was a hot topic in Kuranda and throughout the north. Threats were bandled around like flowers had been distributed only weeks before. The end occurred on a Saturday; the Council arrived armed with their court orders, lawyers and bulldozer. It was stated that all would be crushed - including the people if they were "too silly to get out of the way". Most of the inhabitants had already left for other places. Nimbin owes many of its residents to the sinking of the "Titanic". Some of those old residents are now professors and surgeons, bureaucrats and failures. The wake was held at the Bottom Pub. What a night it was!

ORGANIC GARDENING

Weeks of dry weather have slowed down weed growth so more time to enjoy the beauty of my spring flowers. I grow no annuals (to save energy) but a little pruning of some colourful leaf shrubs has been necessary and some leaf sweeping.

If you can plant to suit your flowering plants you will be rewarded in a new garden it is not an easy task. My September lilies (Hippeastrums) are glorious - some yet to flower.

Congea vine still has many weeks to flaunt its flowers - the perfume and beauty of the Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow (Brunfelsia) is a source of continual joy to me. This year I fed and watered all 6 plants. The biggest has flowered for a month and will continue to flower. The others are just beginning to bud. Some azaleas (all singles) need less sun so hope to move them in the Wet. The native Dendrobium Nobile orchids decorate most trees round the house and are all a mass of flowers. They opened up early Sept - amazing clockwork most organic gardeners have fairies to help in their gardens - the fairies make homes in the flowers so I only pick a few for my home. The orchids are just above my reach, they need sunshine. My Saraca trees still provide bird and butterfly tucker and look lovely. Many Bottle Brush (all different) are circling near the house and the hungry birds sip and lovely foliage shade the soil.

At Kuranda Environment Association meetings we sit at a large table at the Kuranda Rainforest Resort so that we can see each other and openly discuss the matters which arise. We share the chairing of the meeting from month to month. Material is easily accessible to all in the centre of the table.

Kuranda Landcare Group and Kuranda Environment Associa tion meetings are held concurrently to reduce the number of meetings and because of our common interests.

Developers are invited from time to time to discuss their development activities so that we are in the best possible position to challenge or endorse those activities and seek action by Council or the Dept of Environment if necessary. Bob Colefax has accepted our invitation to inform the 2 October meeting of his 'Cocomo' subdivision located on the forested hillslopes beyond the Fallon Close. His is one of two subdi visions now proceeding in the area bounded by Mason Road, Fallon Close and Barron Falls Road.

The feature of the 2 October meeting will be a presentation by Revegetation Contractor, Des Bolton, who will provide info on the latest erosion control, environment protection and revegetation techniques. Special invitations have been sent out to local builders, developers and landscapers. You, too, are welcome. Coffee and tea will be on hand.

FERAL PIG TRAPPING

Calls to Craig Riedel (937 372), Rob Mortimer (937 287) and June Rees (937 602) advising of feral pig damage have been coming in steadily. The extent of the problem is now becoming apparent. Our official pig trapper, Malcolm Braes, reports on his activities at our monthly meetings. Kuranda Environment Association has been chosen by the Department of Natural Resources to manage the feral pig trapping program in the Kuranda region.

FLAGGY CREEK

Kuranda Environment Association organised a presentation by the Wet Tropics Management Authority on 12 September on Flaggy Creek. The presentation was attended by members sip. They need no water as their of the various Barron River Catchment groups, CAFNEC, farmers, affected landholders and Aboriginal councils.

My citrus trees are budding so they In a word ... if Flaggy Creek were to be dammed, the water would encroach on World Heritage declared land and threaten and/or inundate an Aboriginal burial site. There have been no environmental impact studies made of the area and very little is known of the flora and fauna populations.

> World Heritage values are declared under international agreements and it is neither simple nor desirable to impact upon them. To move the boundary to accommodate a dam would threaten the very integrity of those values for the whole of the World Heritage Wet Tropics declared area. Therein lies the best argument against Flaggy Creek as a fu ture water storage facility. However, pressure by govern ments in the name of a vital water supply for the limitless population growth of Cairns, certainly poses a major threat.





Latest news is the establishment of a legal defence tearn and the conducting of more research regarding the possible negative effects of this controversial development.

The terms of reference for the study which led Federal Minister for Environment Senator Robert Hill to finally grant conditional approval have now been widely condemned as they restricted the study area to the construction site and ignored effects on the 'region' adjacent the resort site. This area is typifled by sea grass beds which provide food for dugongs (sea cows) an endangered marine mammal whose numbers in the region have halved in recent years.

EXCHANGING CONTRACTS ON A PROPERTY WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

According to Bert van den Brink , once contracts have been exchanged on the purchase of a property, many people are unaware of the procedures which follow. "First home buyers in particular may not be aware of the steps which need to be followed and the appropriate people to contact prior to taking possession of their newly acquired property. "Being familiar with the process will ensure the settlement period is simple and hassle free, he says. If further inspections of the property must be conducted, contact the real estate agent and they can arrange access via the vendor. Contact your solicitor if you require settlement earlier or later than the contract date or if you wish to purchase any items of furniture or items not noted on the contract. The final inspection usually occurs a day or so prior to settlement. Bert van den Brink says, "During the inspection, ensure there is a key for every door of the property, including garage remote controls and shed keys. All keys will be handed over on settlement of the property. "Check all power points, toilets, taps, lights and other fixtures are as described in the contract." If your home deposit was invested, ensure your solicitor faxes an "Order of the Agent" as soon as settlement takes place. This allows the agent to divide the interest and release any deposit monies. On the settlement day you will be required to pay the full amount of the purchase price, less any deposit paid. Your solicitor will finalise these details. "Decide well ahead where you will collect your keys on settlement day, whether it be from the agent or your solicitor. Either way, let all parties involved know exactly where you expect the keys to be available. "Also ensure you have the property adequately insured from the time you exchange contracts, because the property is your responsibility from that time," he says. 
