On the 2nd of July 13 walkers visited the large Penda trees off Barron Falls Road, a wonderful feeling of peace and wonderment was surely felt by all. This was to be just a warm up for the walk that followed which took us down off Barron Falls Station to the bottom of the Gorge. Quite a steep track this turned out to be and we all managed it quite well from teenager to pensioner, a very mixed group of adventurers. Once at the bottom we just drank in the

GOAL WITHIN SIGHT

A four acre block on Fallon Road has been purchased by the Queensland Ambulance Service. This will also accommodate Fire Services and the State Emergency Service in the future and will cater for the growth in the region. Phil Chirio handed over \$10,000 cheque from Kuranda Ambulance Fund Raising Committee to Jiffy Reynolds to be added to the Trust Fund. Now totalling over \$50,000. Raised by the Kuranda Committee to provide equipment and fittings for proposed Kuranda Ambulance Centre.

The Ambulance Vehicle Collection Box in the photo was made by Mr. Reg. Jacobsen of Minnie Street in 1937. He was a lodge mate of the then Superintendent Mr. Les Clark and was employed by Smellie & Co. The vehicle replica of a 1936 Dodge ambulance Vehicle which was the first metal roofed car the Cairns Centre owned. It was the first Ambulance Vehicle with a hatchback in Australia. The box collected monies for the Fund at the Kuranda Markets for years.

Dear Kuranda Paper;

The Anti Skyrail Camp is operating at a low key and successful level now. We have a good functioning kitchen. Two legal toilets, that will never pollute the area, are now on location. We are limiting our activities in the National Park for that of surveillance. Damage to the forest by protestors is virtually non-existant. We are always appreciative of help. Keeping the protestors fed so they don't need to leave the sites unprotected is an ongoing process. If you can spare the time to be present on days of action (even an hour helps) leave your name and phone number with Ann Downey at the Green Environment Shop, Kuranda (a donation of \$2 to cover phone calls would be great). We still need basic food items - powdered milk, breakfast cereals, brown rice, sugar, honey, coffee, tinned food for rainy days, butter and biscuits etc. Firewood and dry kindling is also always needed. Kero lamps, kero, candles and 12 watt batteries accepted gratefully. Donations including money can be left with Ann Downey also. We have an accounting system that acknowledges gifts. Thanks for help so far.

Dear Kuranda Paper;

It seems to me that the recently released "Range Road Plan Shock" came hard on the heels of the (nearly) final butchering of the proposed Skyrail tower sites. I wonder if Mr Chapman was as "shocked" as the other landowners and residents of Carvonica undoubtedly would have been, reading their Tuesday paper.

It also seems, to me, that there is a lot more to these issues than is being publicised. Call it paranola, but I have a natural mistrust and disrespect for any ethic which keeps me in the dark about issues which affect the future quality of life of myself and my children.

I don't sit in judgement of Ken Chapman and other developers for their perception of what's a "fair buck". I do, however, feel incensed and and insulted by a governing body which; instead of being staunch and focussed on the reasons WHY environmental restrictions have been imposed, persistantly manipulates the "small print" and picks at loop holes to achieve a task which is "deemed worthy" by a small amount of people (by no means a true representational cross section of the attitudes of the individual residents of these areas).

It is easy to see how society got so confused and convoluted, when daily, we allow decisions affecting all our futures, to be made by people whose motivation and integrity are regularly shown to be remiss or questionable at best. . . People supporting an ethic which manipulates us into accepting the great "Double Standard".

Dear Kuranda Paper,

Faulkner's approval of the Skyrail project was on the condition that if any World Heritage values were adversely affected, that Skyrail would be immediately stopped and the forest regenerated. Damage to the forest has occurred, and the fragile ecosystem has been affected.

The most valuable area of the forest is the western side of Red Peak, as zoned red by the Wet Tropics and noted by Dr.'s Olsen and Goosem. The tower sites in this area were the first logged by Skyrail, and the steep clay slopes have been since left bare. The recent rains have badly eroded the hillsides, undermining the slopes' stability and washing silt into the creeks. There has been no damage control by Skyrail at all.

When questioned while logging was in process, neither Skyrail employees nor the DEH could answer what effect clearing would have, or what more damage would be done by digging foundations.

Damage allegedly caused by some 20 bush-wise blockaders is nothing in comparison with the damage that would be caused by Skyrail's construction. Crews treking into the sites with their heavy equipment for up to the next year, plus the cyclonic downforce from the helicopter blowing out the canopy - all to allow 600 tourists per hour into the forest at Red Peak and Deans Lookout, would completely destroy the forest's fragile ecosystem.

A 10m long track, which was made and used by police and loggers when the trees were felled, Mr. Greg Wellard (Regional Manager, Department of Environment and Heritage) now alleges was cut by blockaders. Over 8km of tracks have so far been cut by Skyrail, and after the last bout of destruction, tracks were left trashed, stomped, muddy, wide and bare.

Contractors for Skyrail logged in the rain, felling trees which were temporarily unoccupied by the bhlockaders, who had the sense enough to know what damage is caused by walking muddy tracks in those conditions. Following the logging, blockaders used the stockpiles of branches and leaves to cover the tracks and tower sites, which minimises further to damage and encourages regeneration. Skyrail has done no regeneration, no weed clearing - not even as requested by Dr.'s Olsen & Goosem in 1992.

"Every area cleared will be regenerated, every act of destruction blocked, Skyrail will be stopped. Regardless of who owns the project, or what they say, we have a commitment to stopping the project. The members of the blockade would like to give a warm thanks for the overwhelming support we have received with regard to supplies and equipment."


Skyrail's negligence and total lack of environmental knowledge is criminal. For example, one of the famous antiseptic dips was located in the middle of a Lantana grove, on the ridge near Red Peak. This could only make more likely the tracking of weeds into the forest. If Skyrail cannot even recognise the most troublesome forest weed on the east coast, then they have no business being in the forest.

To bring public attention to the project, orange flags have been raised at tower sites opposite the Barron Falls lookout, opposite Kuranda and on the Range road. Each site is proposed to have a 40m high fabricated steel tower, with cables strung between them.

If the Queensland office of the Coordinator General (Premier's Department) had not interfered with the approval process in the first place, then the advice from Wet Tropics, the DEG, Australian Heritage Commission, Commonwealth Rainforest Management Unit, not to mention CAFNEC and PAKS, would have been listened to. All this advice pointed out the damage Skyrail would cause - which is now happening. All this advice said STOP SKYRAIL, which must now happen.

Where is Faulkner's "ongoing monitoring system"? If the DEH spent as much time monitoring Skyrail's destruction as monitoring the blockade, they would have recognised the damage done, and the project would already be stopped.

Contact her on Ph. 938933 A welcome to eleven new members. Pleasing to see our ranks growing. These people recognise the need to be part of this 'watchdog" group. Cairns/Mareeba rail link

Dept of Transport believes bus services are adequate for the region and are unlikely to promote rail use.

Contributions

Dept of Transport informed Dr.Clark that "It is expected that the amount contributed by Skyrail will be based on a 'per ticket sold' basis and that the amount would be set with due consideration of the viability of the Skyrail project."

This is not ARK's understanding of the levy agreement.

Wet Tropics tree planting

It is welcome news that this scheme is to continue over the next two years and the Commonwealth Gov. has committed a further \$3m. Cr. Gilkersons report

Oliver outlined the forthcoming budget. We feel better informed about where our rates dollar is being spent.

Medicare Office

The health insurance commission has no future plans for a Medicare office in Mareeba based on an insufficient turnover of claims. Mareeba Shire Council seeks ARK's support in making further representations because it does not think the Commission has taken full recognition of the needs of this area.

Ambulance/Fire/SES site.

A site has been selected and extensive community input is invited on design and landscaping. ARK is the forum for such input.

ARK will continue its dialogue for undergrounding and bundling of electrical cabling to preserve the environment and to increase efficiency of supply.

Telecom

Marjorie Spear requested ARK write to Telecom requesting upgrading of our exchange to provide itemised accounts, a more reliable service and other facilities as enjoyed in Cairns.

Pavement Use

Tables, chairs, placards and goods for sale on pavements in the village to be investigated.

Advisory committee for the Kuranda management plan. Summary of Gayle Hannah's report:

- Shire Engineer will recommend priority of works.

- Council will employ Design Engineer to co-ordinate Plan.

- Collection of levy - Many people may not be aware that Council wil not receive any levy monies from Q.Rail until it is proven that Council is collecting money from all other forms of transport into the village this includes buses and private vehicles as well as Skyrail.

- Investigation will continue into feasibility of parking station to be shared with a private enterprise partner to facilitate collection of levy monies and traffic control

- Coondoo Street design - businesses on the south side are requesting reconsideration of the widening of the north side as they say this discriminates against them. However, the Advisory Committee believes that when the south side is redeveloped in an attractive manner, pedestrians will cross to it.

- Council urged to preserve the integrity of the Management Plan but to be flexible in considering compatible developments.

- Your views and suggestions on the Management Plan should be directed the the Advisory Committee via ARK.

Walking Tracks

Hugh Edwards, a Landcare and Environment Action Program trainer, reported that 12 students have completed 70m. of walking tracks, have been trained in first-aid and are continuing with TAFE courses.



After representations from A.R.K., Mareeba Shire Council has erected Wildlife Warning signs on some Kuranda roads. These will do little to reduce native animal deaths caused by vehicles. The number of road kills is likely to increase with the completion of the new highway. The speed of through traffic would seem to be the major problem. Trucks travelling to and from Mareeba probably account for a fair percentage of kills. Local drivers should show care on Myola and Black Mountain roads and the highway stretch to Speewah.

Most motorists having hit a bird or animal are inclined to drive on with a shrug. Injured animals are left to be finished by later traffic. There are people in Kuranda who will care for injured wildlife; many vets will treat native fauna free of charge. The Kuranda Veternarian Centre is very good in this regard as in all other aspects.



PRESS RELEASE

This Sunday, 31st July 94 at 10.00 am at the Barron Falls Railway Station a raily will be held to show community support for the Kuranda Tourist Railway and opposition to Skyrail.

The 10.10 am train will be welcomed and momentarily delayed white leaflets are handed out. Music, fire dancers and jugglers will feature at the front of the train. At 10.15 there will be and abselling display as a banner is hung over the edge of the Barron Gorge. The train will then be walked into Kuranda accompanied by singers, dancers and banner waving.

The purpose of this rally is to draw people's awareness to the threat which Skyrall peses to the financial viability of the Calms-Tablelands Railway Service.

Until now the major focus of the P.A.K.S.campaign has been the environmental problems of Skyrali. What appears not to be understood by the community is Skyrail's impact on the viability of the Cairns - Tablelands Railway Service and more importantly the future of the Scenic Railway which presently keeps Kuranda a popular tourist destination and through route to the Tablelands

The Kuranda Scenic Railway is an established and successful tourist attraction. The State Government has used the Tourist Railway's success to cover financial losses on the Rail's freight service. By allowing Skyrall to take, as it must, a substantial slice of business away from the Tourist Railway, the Cairns - Tableland Railway could become economically unsustainable. Rail freight charges would be further increased and what purely imagined initial benefits Skyrail may have in reducing traffic on the Range Road will be lost as heavy freight trucks continue to take over the Rail's business and use the Range Road. Buses would still come up t empty and collect tourists from the Skyrail in the same way they do from the Railway now, Tableland bus tours, and the flexibility of the motor car for site seeing, would be untouched by Skyrail. Road traffic reduction, as predicted by Skyrall's Ken Chapman, is a myth. Upgrading the railway would achieve more benefits for both tourism and the community.

Skyrall has been allowed to work in secrecy. The Development Agreement with the Government is not open to public scrutiny. Queensland Rail is not obliged to reveal financial details of Skyrail's likely impact on the Railway's profits. They are giving away a healthy monopoly of the Barron Gorge tourist business with out a fight

The Railway has recognised potential for supporting both an expansion of tourism and a growth of industry on the Tablelands. It is presently under used, inelligient and neglected. It appears to be accepted Government policy to encourage this worsening situation by allowing Skyrail to take some of the Railway's business. A present Government estimate for bringing the Rai way up to acceptable operating condition is put at \$64 million. We believe the Government is not sincere in its efforts to preserve the Tourist Railway and are looking to Skyrall as an excuse to close the line and avoid this maintenance cost.

Skyrall should be recognised for what it is, a poorly researched and ill conceived grab for tourist dollers which would financially cripple the Railway and justify its staged closure from Kuranda onward, if not the whole line north of Calms. Skyrall could never stand on its own as a major tourist attraction. If the Railway is closed Kuranda may be forgotten and Skyrall would be dismantled like a carnival joy ride. If this were not true Skyrall would have established itself independently on another site that offered equally, and perhaps more, spectacular views of the coast and rainforest.

What is a Tele-centre? It is a place where a number of computers, modems and printers etc are linked by phone to businesses and homes to set up a network so as to test for any problems or drawbacks with a computer/phone/satellite link . This will assist to design a foolproof system for the future. The Australian government is giving grants to rural areas to set up these Tele-centres, sometimes called Tele-cottages for this testing purpose. The grant covers cost of equipment and up to 2 years salary for 5 or more people. This number can be increase depending on which direction the centre goes. Centres could provide word-processing, accounting, graphic design, tour booking data, education (via links to libraries and universities), the uses are endless. People could work from their homes receiving work via a modern and returning the finished product via modern or courier. Mark Freeman and myself are looking for 2-3 other computer literate people to join with us to look at the feasibility of putting in a submission to government to get Kuranda a Tele-centre of it's own. 





KURANDA HEALTH ACCESS PROGRAM Report from Fran Kelly

The Kuranda Health Access program was initiated by the Kuranda Information & Support Centre (KISC), who applied for funding through the Qld Health Dept for a project worker. Their submission for funding was successful and I have been employed (as at 16th May) on a part-time basis for a 12-month period to implement the Program.

The Program

The Health Access Program aims

-promote and encourage community participation and access to visiting/existing health services

-work with the community to identify gaps

within existing health services

-develop, in consultation with the community, possible strategies to address the gaps/health issues arising.

The Program is targetted at the residents of Kuranda and surrounding areas and is managed by the KISC Management Committee. In looking at health needs and issues, the Program will be focussing on much more than physical illness - it will also include aspects of physical, social and mental wellbeing.

Program update

To date, I have been working with the Management Committee, key health service providers, and individuals to establish clear guidelines and strategies to address the goals and objectives of the Program. (This includes basic details like the HOW, WHY, WHEN and WHO of the Program).

I am currently in the process of setting up a steering committee to oversee the Program. This group of people will be drawn from community health professionals, representatives from various organisations, as well as individuals from within the community, representing various groups, e.g. young people, etc. The Steering Committee will provide community-based knowledge on health issues, as well as provide contact between the community and the Program, community participation, and a two-way flow of information. The idea of having this group is simply to ensure that the Program is directed by people from within the community - both health providers and individuals.

Where to from here?

At this stage, it has been agreed that one method which will be employed to find out about health issues, needs and priorities, is via a needs analysis survey. This 'survey' will be

in the form of a questionnaire, designed to collect information that will give a good indication of the 'needs' of the community - re services available, gaps, additional resources required, issues, etc. The survey will be widely distributed, and we are hoping for a high response rate! In addition to the survey, we will be holding public meetings where groups of individuals can discuss the issues, and more information will be gathered. Information about the survey and the meetings, will be widely publicised via this Paper, noticeboards, and through established groups. We hope to gain a broad overview of the health-related issues in this community, including those about services currently available, how they are responding to needs, where are the gaps, what additional services/resources are required.

Where will the Information collected go?


Once the information required is collected, the results will be widely available to the community - so that you know what issues people are raising and the sorts of needs that This information will be disseminated via public forums as well as the Paper, and again noticeboards. From there discussions and workshops will take place as to the possible strategies to be employed to meet the needs/issues that have arisen.

While the project is limited (by budget) in the strategies it can adopt to address the issues arising, the information gathered will serve as a convincing body of knowledge to argue for additional resources/services. Thus, the Program may culminate in funding submissions to various bodies to gain resources required to implement the sorts of strategies identified to meet the needs.

Some of the issues/needs arising may be able to be met within the confines of the Program - strategies such as information provision/workshops around specific areas, accessing resources external to Kuranda are all examples of such possibilities.

This Program is designed to be a community-based project with the overall aim being to gather information from the community re its needs - and for this information to form the basis of future planning and strategies to be employed to meet the needs arising. It is NOT an exercise to produce an impressive report, with lots of information -- end of story! The success of the Program in these terms is dependent on YOUR involvement. Your participation in the community survey is VITAL in ensuring that the information gathered is REAL information about the whole community, which can then be



WARNING - MAJOR ASPHALT THREAT !!

Whereever you look more asphalt is appearing! It is obliterating the Kuranda we knew. As a community we have achieved much recently, however, the greatest danger remains - the destruction of the character of Kuranda. It seems that we are concentrating on specific issues and losing sight of the broad picture! We need to keep a vision of Kuranda as it could be, in our minds. We should be bold enough to demand that Kuranda be developed as a unique destination - one where the forest vegetation is the priority! A vision of a village of large spreading forest trees, mottled sunshine coolness and soft green vegetation everywhere, people meandering along malls and walking trails, or sitting in the shade sipping refreshments. Buildings blending subtly with the vegetation, and no vehicles anywhere in sight! We could further enhance the village with babbling brooks, waterfalls and possibly piped bird-calls. It still is possible, if we have the will. If we believe in making Kuranda a World-class-destination, we must demand it!! A few ornamental plants does not make a statement to the worlds.

Let's look at this more closely.

Firstly, the only distinctive feature that remains in Kuranda is the forest setting. Surely, we must guard this at all costs! We should treat remaining trees as national treasures, as another country would treat an historic village.

Secondly, we should put more effort into restoration, as the Europeans do for their national treasures. Landcare have put in 4500 trees around Kuranda over the last 12 months, but this is just a drop in the ocean. To save Kuranda, we must have visions of forest plants and trees everywhere we look. We can have development, but it needs to blend with our natural setting, not dominate it. I think that current planning requirements for parking are substantially to blame.

Thirdly, we must design accordingly. If the main features of Kuranda again become forest trees, then we will need our services underground, our buildings will need special features such as leafless roof guttering and our cars will need to be hidden away.

How should we approach to this? May I suggest the following-

- MSC should require all developments to provide a landscaping plan of forest species to cover 40% of the site. Cairns City Council now has very strict landscaping requirementssurely Kuranda deserves to have the most stringent landscaping requirements of all.
- Impress on MSC to cease on-site parking requirements as these encroach on the ability to provide adequate landscaping.
- The payments to MSC to date, in regard to provision of parking, must be well in excess of one million dollars. This and future payments should be put in a trust account to provide a hidden, preferably underground carpark, immediately adjacent to the Coondoo St. shops, for residents, as was suggested in the recent Vision workshops. Another carpark has been suggested for visitors in Rob Veivers Drive. This was costed by the Management Plan consultants and they found it to be feasible for such a carpark to be financially self funding.
- We must act decisively now, and accept that carparks are necessary, and should be hidden away from view. Our streets are already congested with parked cars, and the new design plans will substantially reduce available parking as the landscaping progresses. To not have definite plans for carparks appears to be a major oversight.
- All vacant land around the village, and particularly around new developments could be cleared of weeds and planted with rainforest by a combined effort of landholders, Council, LEAP and Landcare programs.

It appears certain that without such an all-out effort, which requires a clear commitment more than it does funds, Kuranda will degenerate into just another tacky little tourist town.

But enough of words!! We have all had a gut-full of meetings, workshops, and feasibility studies! LANDCARE NEEDS YOU NOW - WE HAVE AT LEAST 20,000 TREES TO PLANT THIS YEAR!

We now plan to revegetate the whole of Fallon Rd. from Kennedy Highway to Masons Rd., also Kennedy Highway from the Rainforest Resort to Rob. Veivers Drive, and denuded areas of the Top of the Range Estate.

The way to tackle this is a little at a time. What we propose is to have a regular planting hour each week. Just one hour per week! Most of our planters prefer to start early, so the rest of the day is free. So, let's make it 7.30 -8.30am every Saturday. Of course, we do not expect you along every week, but ask that you mark your calenders so that you will remember to be involved when you can. We will also arrange for you to ring an area organiser so we have an idea of the numbers. We have about 120 members on our books. We will be contacting you soon to check on your availability, and we ask any new people wishing to join in this very worthwhile community project to ring me on 938766.

Organic Gardening Marjorie Spear

Gardening lately has been a joy plenty of sunshine and generous rain so watering has only been necessary for seedlings and celery, which does like plenty of water and sometimes lettuce which has a shallow root system. The insects are mostly having a deep sleep but be prepared. My choko vine has been fruiting well. Picked really young they are delicious and cook quickly if chopped up skin and all. No water needed but a tasty sauce gives flavour and a taste sensation.

Lots of shrubs are flowering well expecially Azaleas. Only some varieties thrive in Kuranda with no disease. The single mauvy-pink are hardy grown of course in an acid soil with a spoon of sulphur sprinkled annually around the roots.

The Saraca tree which comes from overseas is gorgeous with masses of huge golden florets. It is not gigantic and the birds and Birdswing butterflies spend hours devouring the nectar and pollen. I enjoy watching them as the tree is only a few feet from my upstairs verandah. It is not easy to find Saraca trees for sale and there are different varieties. I can tell you where you can buy a seedling if you phone me. The tree flowers three times a year and is not decidous.

Another tree worth growing is the Dwarf Malay coconut. It is pretty and being dwarf the fruit are easy to pick. You can enjoy the flesh before it gets real hard. The branches are not difficult to dispose of when they fall with old age. The dwarf is not a heavy bearer so picking up fallen coconuts is not a chore as with the usual towering coconut which I do not recommend. Never park your car under those monsters. You can get a smashed bonnet from a fallen branch.

Grapefruit are doing well. My juicy golden fruit look and taste lovely. Phone me 937205 if you would like to barter something for grapefruit. Citrus trees do not like bare soil in their root zone

which extends from the trunk to the drip line of their canopy. If there is sufficient sun you can grow beans or peas or Aibika etc: or Busy Lizzies. You can also mulch with straw or heliconia stalks as I do but not round the trunk.

My yellow Jacobinia flowered fantastically till early July. The honey eaters are now hoping the bottle brush flowers will provide as much food as the jacobinias did. New plants grow well from rooted stalks if anyone wants some to grow phone me. My Zyga cactus is flowering well. It needs morning or late afternoon sun. Water well when the soil dries out. I grow zygas in pots and nourish them about 6 months after flowering. Zygas are available at nurseries that flower at all times of the year but winter and Christmas are common flowering times. Disease resistant if well nourished and not overwatered. Use a friable soil. Heliconia and flowering ginger roots are still available to anyone who wants to dig them out. TALKING HERBS

This month: Herbs for Hair

Barbara Burke

I'd like to dedicate this article to all the hair in the Kuranda region. The already 'converted' will know that (1) it's generally ideal to shampoo a mere once a week.

(2) Most shampoos strip the hair and scalp of natural oils neccessitating the use of a 'conditioner' which leaves a build up on the hair, not to mention the cost.

(3) Diet plays a large part in healthy hair and scalp, here's a recipe which will do your hair and your pocket good!

Buy a bottle of good shampoo from the health food shop, tip half into a jar and store. Put 4 tablespoons each of any of the herbs below into a saucepan with 2 litres of water. Boil for 10 minutes. Strain thru' a cheesecloth or double chux and allow to cool.

Fair hair - elderflower, chamomile, calendula.

Dark hair - nettle, sage, rosemary.

Dandruff - bay, nettle, comfrey, willowbark, chamomile, rosemary, mallow root.

Hair loss - nettle, rosemary, thyme, sage, southen wood. Oily hair - lemongrass, lemonpeel, willowbark

Normal hair - bay, basil, nettle, clover, lemon balm, comfrey root,

Dry hair - mallow root, clover, comfrey root, orange peel, elderflower, chamomile.

My favourite mix is nettle, rosemary, sage, bay leaves, chamomile and comfrey root. I add a dropperful of lavender or teatree oil when the herbs and shampoo are mixed.

Now pour the herb liquid into the shampoo bottle and gently shake

To the remaining herb liquid add enough cider vinegar to make the whole up to 2 litres.

Use a 2 litre milk or juice bottle. Mark this mix 'Herb Rinse' The shampoo is more runny than usual, but it works beautifully. Set up the rinse before you hop in the shower. 1/4 cup of 'rinse' mixed in a jug of warm water. Pour this over your hair after shampooing. Happy Hair!

AMBULANCE LAND PURCHASED

A four acre block on Fallon Road has been purchased by the Queensland Ambulance Service. This will also accommodate Fire Services and the State Emergency Service in the future and will cater for the growth in the region. The State Government will require Council consent for the establishment of emergency services on the site which is zoned rural residential. Dr. Lesley Clark said that she hoped the local community would support the proposal but encouraged anybody with concerns to contact her. When all relevant local authority approvals are in place then the Government will call for expressions of interest for constructing a residence for the Ambulance Officer and the operational Station. The Minister agreed that the Kuranda community could have some input into the design of the buildings and landscaping so that they are appropriate for the Kuranda

Kuranda Post Office - the future?

Many residents took part in the recent survey conducted by the Post Office to obtain the community feeling in respect of moving the Post Office and what type of office it should become. These are the results of that survey.

There was a total distribution of 1095 forms to all delivery addresses, post office boxes and poste restante serviced by the Kuranda Post Office. The total return was 208 responses or 19%. This reflects a very high level of community interest as 8-10% is normally considered very high in an unaddressed

The survey responses are as follows:-

- 93% responded "You can move the Post Office and the boxes to Morong Street."
- 92% responded "Better in the older brick building".
- 90% responded "post office boxes and retail post office should be in the same location".
- 95% responded "I want a garden style Post Office".

Unfortunately - the Mareeba Shire Council rejected the consent application at their meeting on the 7th. July for the following reasons.

- 1. It was against the wishes of the eight letters of objection received by the Council.
- 2. There was a concern about adequate parking.
- 3. As a community facility it was against the present Development Control Plan designation of Village Residential.
- 4. It was in a cul-de-sac.
- Car parking would diminish the scenic river views of the area.

In response I tender the following observations on the above points.

- 1. All but two of the objections were from people who live in or are related to the residents of Morong Street. They have very real concerns about the changes that the Post Office would bring to Morong Street. Their belief that the Post Office would force people to park on their streets and footpaths have credence just as they experience the same difficulty now on market days. However - it is easy to design the street to ensure that the residents will have even greater privacy than at present and that the single lane section of Morong Street would in essence become a private road.
- 2. With the redesign of Morong Street there would be 15 on street car parks and 14 off street car parks in Morong Street - a total of 29 parks. Per shop - this is considerably more than any other commercial street in Kuranda and we need every car park we can obtain in Kuranda now. Indeed - it is more car parking than is available at the existing location.
- 3. The Council has foreshadowed that the existing Development Control Plan is totally unsuitable and they have instructed the preparation of a new DCP in accordance with the information developed through the Kuranda Strategic Management study. Under all of the information displayed of this proposal - the site is given the same designation as the rest of Coondoo Street and the remaining residences are re-classified and Village Commercial
- 4. The road where the Post Office was proposed is not a cul-de-sac. It is a split road with a separate entry and exit. This makes traffic control and safety a relatively easy matter.
- 5. The only point on the property where the river is visible is from the roof of the garage. There was no intention of parking cars on the roof of the garage. The additional suggested seven car parks are on the lower section of the street and do not occlude any view of anything.

The Post Office is now in a very invidious position in that it cannot stay where it is because the size is now too small to handle the mail volumes already being experienced. It has already occurred that mail bags have not been unpacked because we had nowhere to put the mail. This means that we can no longer provide the quality of service that we wish to provide and you can no longer get the quality of service that you deserve. It cannot expand on the present site because of very real economic reasons and it cannot split the operations against the wishes of 90% of its clients.

The Post Office cannot move to the top half of Coondoo Street or to Therwine Street because under the changes to be made under the Strategic Management study - traffic volumes and parking become a nightmare. It cannot move to anywhere else in Thongon Street because there is nothing available and it cannot move to Thoree or Barang Streets because it is too steep for our elderly and infirm to walk to.

And it cannot move to Morong Street. We have run out of streets!

My only option is to challenge the Council's decision through the courts and I have instructed this to commence. My advice is that there I have a very good chance of success - but with courts you never

I hate Litigation because it is a waste of money for me and for the ratepayers.

Kath and me had hoped to preserve a beautiful residence in the village where we have already lost most of our old homes to commercial expansion. We had hoped to give this community a Post Office that reflected the feeling of Kuranda - green and lovely - and to provide premises with the ability to expand for many decades and at a cost that the Post Office can afford. There is now some doubt if we can

I advise that I cannot say for certain where our future Post Office will be - or even if it will be in the commercial area of the village but the decision must be taken before the end of August and it must move before the end of November.





Charity Begins At Home by Dick Burge

The house was in disrepair and drunken fence posts staggered around the paddocks. The buggy shed with its tangled skeins of old harness collaged on the walls, was occupied by a chook squattocracy. At the end of the bottom paddock was a windmill still pumping water into useless troughs. Near the windmill was a sturdily-built galvanised iron shed, evidently built at a much later date than anything else on the property. It had a huge lock on the door. My mother had warned me never to try to open it, because, she said, there was a big tiger snake living in it. She always referred to it as "Uncle Charlie's shed".

It was about this time I first met Uncle Charlle. From instances my mother mentioned, he must have lived here for a while about the time when I was born. He was a small, quiet, unobtrusive man. He had arrived unexpectedly one day in a motor truck and my mother went out into the yard to greet him.

"Hello Charlie, it's been a long time," she said.

He acknowledged her greeting with a big smile and a nod of his head. Later that night, I overheard mother and Uncle Charlie talking in the kitchen. I heard him say he would gradually do a lot of necessary repairs about the place. Listening intently, I heard the words, "I will put it in my purse for safe keeping", indicated to me that he must have given my mother some money.

"They can say what they like; but you have always been a good brother to me," she asserted.

For the next three weeks, this quiet, even taciturn, little man was as busy as a wasp building a mud nest, hammering, sawing, repairing and replacing things that needed to be done around the house. The last week of his stay was occupied in covertly transporting the old portable blacksmith's forge from the buggy shed, together with some bags of coke that he had brought with him, down to the shed in the bottom paddock. Every morning, after breakfast, he would disappear into the shed only to reappear at tea time. Being curious, I asked my mother what he was doing down there, only to be told:

"Never you mind, he's fixing something, and you keep well away from that shed."

From that time on, one month every year, Uncle Charlie would arrive and repeat this procedure.

Every time he came, my mother's finances seemed to improve considerably. Gradually there was a new stove, new lino, new blankets and sheets, and even a new carpet for the dining room.

By the time I was sixteen, I had finished school and was working in the local paper shop. I had decided I wanted to join the navy. I read in some of the papers at the shop, about the wonderful life which could be mine when I turned eighteen. Just before my birthday, I informed my mother and Uncle Charlie (he was on one of his annual visits) of my intentions.

"It isn't right to leave me on my own," my mother objected.

"Let the boy go and I will come and live with you," said Uncle Charlie, rescuing the situation

Everything turned out perfectly, I joined the navy, and Uncle Charlie moved in with my mother full time.

On my first leave home, I was amazed at the improvements around the place - a new garage with a tractor and a "Falcon" parked alongside Uncle Charlie's utility. Cows in one paddock, sheep in another, the house newly painted, everything so spruce, tidy and trim.

The first night home, I noticed a framed motto on the kitchen wall, something that had never been there before. It read, "CHARITY BEGINS AT HOME" in large red letters. I asked my mother where she had obtained it?

"It's just something that took my fancy in the second-hand shop in the town," she explained.

I became a leading seaman, and later, a petty officer. After a four year lapse I went on leave again. I didn't know the place, Uncle Charlie had turned it into a beautiful little farm. An electricity generator with a pump supplied water to the house from new tanks. There was a solar system on the roof for heating. On asking my mother where the money had come from, she told me that Uncle Charlie had had a stroke of good luck.

Later that year, I was called before the Captain of my ship, who, tactfully told me that my mother and her brother had been killed in a horrific road accident. After recovering from the shock of this terrible news, arrangements were made for me to take leave immediately, and I flew home in time for the funeral.

The day after the funeral, in company with a solicitor, I was conducted into the bank manager's office. There was another man with the bank manager, who, I assumed, was another bank official. The safe-deposit box was opened and the contents examined and checked. The wills of both my mother and uncle named me as the sole beneficiary. There were quite a few official-looking documents belonging to my uncle. I was a bit bewildered, as they were all in the name of Charles Fox and not Forbes as was my mother's maiden name. The solicitor advised me to leave things for him to sort out.

That night, a car came into the driveway at the farm and the strange man from the bank meeting stepped out. He informed me he was Senior Detective O'Hara of the Sydney C.I.D. He said he would like to come inside and have a word with me concerning my uncle. I took him inside and seated him at the kitchen table. I sat opposite. He asked me about my uncle and I told him all I knew about him. How he appeared one day out of the blue, how he had looked after my Mum and myself, how hard he had worked fixing up the place, and that he had lived with my Mum since I joined the navy. Detective O'Hara told me it was quite obvious I was completely ignorant of my uncle's background.

THE LAST GREAT TRAIN RIDE

Forsayth at 5.30 am. We walk quietly under the dwindling star canopy as the first dawn light touches the edges. Young cows sitting on the dusty verges of the bitumen strip, stare politely. We walk past the charming old hospital heavily shaded by mango trees and frangipani, a light glowing on the outpatients verandah. The little school in darkness. First Street, Second Street, Third Street and the delicious smells of a cooked breakfast welcome us to the hotel dining room. Seventy two travellers have stretched Forsayth's bed space to the limit, The Golddfields Hotel has called on back up and our night was spent at the home of the Station Mistress. The Last Great Train Ride is about to begin. Freight cars have been shunted off, others attached. Car No 2 is a pullman seating carriage and car No 1 has sleeping berths. Ours is a corridored compartmented carriage and will be our home for 20 leisurely hours.

A glorious "dry country" sunny day and our guard tells of the delights to be seen along the way, the stops we are to make. We pass the Undara Lava field strewn with rivers of porous rock, strange "walls" thrown up as the lava moved 190,000 years ago. Then climbing into lightly forested country and the line hugs the bouldered ridges with dry water courses running alongside. Rock wallabies, camouflaged in dark coats, with long thin whippy tails bounding among the rocks, careless of the passing train slowing for a camera session. Vegetation is sparse and occasional water holes poorly filled, three years of drought. We slow down to negotiate every long curve and hill, a row of heads, eyes peering forward, hang out of the windows, someone plucks a gum leaf as we pass, we cheer our engine to greater efforts. In a bend or two, a stop, all out and up through the boulders, ironwoods and bloodwoods, to view an ancient water hole, a natural rock formation, a collecting place known and used by aboriginals since the Dreamtime. All aboard and it's Einasleigh for morning tea, the tiny station full of wonderful home baked goodies, tea and coffee. We have plenty of time to explore Einasleigh, walking across the long trestle bridge, some to the old hotel for a beer and a yarn. Our engine is shunting freight cars busily, and trucks and people appear to off-load mail, and goods, and to order the groceries for next week. And so to Mt.Surprise, whistle blowing a warning to roaming stock. Cattle yards, and the bitumen running alongside to Georgetown and places west to the Gulf. We wave to cars and campers, "don't you wish you were us on our train", we yell. Lunch on the shaded cafe patio while our engine works over time collecting yet more freight cars. Some in need of a culture hit visit the Feather Art Gallery. The whistle blast summons us, bounding over the tracks to swing aboard closing the wrought iron gates at the top of the steps, where we cluster between the carriages waving to Mr.Surprise. There is a frightening series of metal plates covering the buffers, brake and power connections, grinding back and forth in mad tectonic frenzy, not for the faint hearted the walk between carriages.

Fishing comes next, we only half believe our guard's statement as he speeds along the corridor laughing with delight at our sceptical responses. He hands us the menu for the evening dinner stop - do we have to catch our own we mutter nervously, as the empty river beds wander beneath the bridges. Fossilbrook, water, and we jump on to the lines and on to the river bank. The engine driver and the guard sling in a hook and lo! and behold a Black Bream and a tortoise are in the bag in five minutes flat. We look for gold and find shining mica, but no fossils. Our engine is hissing, is there a note of resignation as six travellers clamber aboard the engine cab - three inside, three out front with their legs dangling over the buffers wind streaming their hair. The lines, fading to the horizon, appear crooked and wobbly, with biggish gaps at the joints, "what stops the engine coming off the line" one asks as we jerk violently from side to side "...there's this flange...." our driver gives a mirthless laugh, puts the engine in neutral, swings out on the front platform and points out things of interest, rock formations, a pioneer's grave, soda springs where an entrepreneur set up a bottling plant on the edge of the creek in far off times, the gas was so powerful the bottles all burst and the project fizzled. We pick up speed again, the round brass knob has to be struck every 7 seconds throughout the journey or the emergency scream sounds, this is to keep the driver awake. His co-driver is the look-out for trouble on the line, stock, roos, people, rocks and the work gangs. Ootann flashes passed as we hit a steady 40k on this flat section - we saw a shed and a track and a man waving his hat at Ootann. Then we stopped, the travellers left the engine cab by the high stepped metal runged ladder and a new group took over speeding us to Almaden and dinner. A long halt, and a three course meal at the Cafe, the hotel was some peoples preferred fuel stop, and the engine shunted and shunted freight cars off and on. Almaden station was crowded. A surprise, travellers, locals and the station master there to witness an outback extravaganza. A very large, big horned, wild eyed cow stood on the platform ready for the game, leering, head-butting and snorting in manic fashion she heaved herself up the steps of the waiting room in pursuit of the engine driver's bag of bread. In she went and then backed out unexpectedly fast, a roar and she was charging up the platform scattering all in her path, eyes rolling. We cheered! The lights were on in our carriage and we settled down for the dark stretch. Lappa, Dimbulah and through to Mareeba. . To us locals the familiar countryside with red soil, the ground-down results of volcanic action of aeons ago, signalled the home stretch. The Railway Institute served supper to-wards midnight with a game of darts and snooker and we chattered about our journey, a special cake baked by our engine driver crowned the evening.

Years ago, he said, Uncle Charlie was a member of a gang of notorious bank robbers. The last big job they pulled was a gold bullion armoured car. Eight ingots of gold were stolen, each worth a quarter of a million dollars. Three of the gang were captured with six of the ingots. My uncle escaped and was put on the wanted lists throughout the country. At my father's funeral, when I was only a year old, an alert Victorian policeman recognised him from the "Wanted" posters and he was arrested. He was brought to trial and was sentenced to twelve years gaol. They never found the other two ingots, and Uncle Charlie adamantly maintained, right throughout his trial, that the armoured car company, or some of its staff, had put it over the bank, and the six ingots recovered by the police, was the total loot of the gang. I made a cup of tea and O'Hara continued.

Charlie Forbes was paroled after serving eight years. We then lost track of him. Those papers of his in the safe-deposit box at the bank, showed Charlie changed his name from Forbes to Fox by deed poll. He went to Tennant Creek and registered a gold mine that he named "Sweet Charity". Every year he would come to Victoria and sell his gold. It must have been a pretty good mine according to his bank account. Yet, nobody had ever found gold where he had his mine, and it

had been prospected over and over in the past.

After he had driven away, I sat at the table, stunned, to say the least, when my eyes focussed on the framed motto on the opposite wall. "CHARITY BEGINS AT HOME". My mind raced over the facts. I remembered the taboo shed, the blacksmith's forge, the bags of coke and the annual visits by Uncle Charlie to Victoria, selling his gold in small lots; gold that was supposed to come from the "Sweet Charity"

Did the gold that he smelted in the shed, come from the mine, or was it the stolen gold?

Perhaps the answer is in that motto on the wall, "CHARITY BEGINS AT HOME".

Our little engine shunted on yet more frieght, a total of 22 cars to pull down the line to Cairns. And then a treat, from an old shed in the Mareeba yards we rolled out a little bit of history, an ambulance car first used to carry butter and cold goods early this century, then set up as a mini-hospital with bedding, drug cabinets, oxygen, stretchers and all the paraphernalia to transport the ill on the long slow journey to hospital. All aboard again, some already asleep in their bunks, others playing cards and reminiscing about other great train journeys in other great countries. Through Biboohra and Koah along the Barron River the smells of the tropical night and the rumble of the trestle bridges as we pass over the rivers and creeks. Familiar lights, homes of friends, and so quietly into Kuranda, the last stop for us, but for others there is still the long slow two hour descent to Cairns and breakfast on the platform. Many seasoned train buffs and the nostalgia for the days of steam, and stories of the heroic exploits of engines complimented this very special railway journey, The Last Great Train Ride from Forsavth to Cairns.
