

### **HYDROPONIC GARDENING by Jan Coulter**

I am growing a cherry tomato at the moment called "Sweetie". Unlike the usual cherry tomato it is a stocky plant and is only about 18" high, but it is absolutely loaded with tomatoes. This plant is growing in a bucket with a stake for support. There is a reservoir of nutrient at the base of the bucket. I am also growing a variety of dwarf bean. I have four plants to a broccoli box. They too are about 18" high and are loaded with beans. I munch on them all the time and pick enough for a meal about once a week. Chinese cabbage are at peak condition because the weather has been cooler, and I have no fungi problems. Hydroponically grown vegetables are high in nutrients as they are fed exactly what they need. People too, I feel, need to have the correct diet to operate at optimum efficiency, we get along with eating any old how, but to really feel good we have to feed the body what it needs. It was reported in the Practical Hydroponics Magazine, that hydroponic growers are being called upon to supply extra vegetables for the athletes, officials and spectators at the Olympic Games. The main hydroponic crops in demand are tomatoes, lettuce and cucumbers. Hydroponic produce is being favoured by suppliers of around 13 million prepared meals, especially prepacked salads. Hydroponics offers an assured supply of high quality produce and can meet the stringent catering specifications set by (SOCOG). Soil growers apparently cannot guarantee production to the same standard of quality and on time. For Information -Phone 4093 0394.

The Land for Wildlife scheme is proving very popular with Kuranda residents. It is a voluntary, free and non-legally binding program and a Land for Wildlife sign is provided free of charge to acknowledge the efforts of the landholder. The program aims to encourage and assist landholders in providing habitat for wildlife on their properties. Even if your property is small it can still be a valuable wildlife habitat, especially creek areas which provide connectivity between large intact areas of bush. To find out more about the scheme, contact Jan at the Envirocare shop or pop in and pick up a brochure. But hurry, time is running out for applications to be lodged - deadline mid October.

Ergon Energy will shortly be commencing tree clearing under power lines, begin-

ning with the Kuranda Range feeder early October, then rural, Kuranda township and outlying urban areas. EnviroCare and Wet Tropics Management will be in consultation with Ergon throughout the tree clearing program.

# A Thought for October

### St Francis of Assisi

On the 4th of October the Church gives thanks to God for the life of St Francis of Assisi

St Francis (1181 - 1226) is surely one of the most attractive and best loved of all the saints. But he began by being anything but a saint. Born the son of a wealthy cloth-merchant of Assisi, Francis' youth was spent in fast-living, parties and on fast horses as a leader of the young society of the town. Then he went to the war between Assisi and Perugia, and was taken prisoner for a year.

By the time of his release, Francis had changed. Perhaps his own suffering had awakened him to that of others. In any case, he abandoned warfare and carousing, and began to help the poor and the lepers of his area. Then one day a voice which seemed to come from the crucifix in the small, semi-derelict church of Damiano Assisi 'Go and repair my house, which you see is falling down'.

This religious experience was a vital turning point in Francis' life: Jesus Christ became very real and immediate to him. His first action was to begin repairing the church, having sold some of his father's cloth to pay for materials. His father was not amused, in fact he was furious - until Francis renounced his inheritance and even his clothes by his dramatic stripping off in the public square of the town. The Bishop of Assisi provided him with simple garments, and Francis began his new life.

His inspiration was always religious, not social, and the object of his quest was always the Crucified Christ, not Lady Poverty for her own sake.

Francis rebuilt San Samiano, and then traveled

as a pilgrim. His compassion for the poor and lepers became famous. Soon disciples joined him, and they set up a communal life in simple wattle and daub huts. They went on occasional preaching tours. Not until later did they become a Order whose theologians won fame in the Universities.

In 1219 Francis visited the Holy Land, and his illusions about the Crusaders were shattered. He went on to seek out the Sultan, and tried to convert him. Back home, he found his Order was now 5,000 strong, and growing. Francis stepped down as head, but continued to preach and was immensely popular. He died after a prolonged illness at 45, and was canonised in 1228.

Francis' close rapport with the animal creation was well known, and he has long been patron Saint of animals. The story of his preaching to the birds has always been a favourite scene from his life. He also tamed the wolf of Gubbio. This affinity emphasises his consideration for, and sense of identity with, all elements of the physical universe, as seen in his composition Canticle of the Sun. This makes him an apt patron of natural conservation.

The 20th century has witnessed a widespread revival of interest in Francis. Some films and books have caricatured him as only a sentimental nature-lover or a hippie drop out from society. This ignores the real sternness of his character, and his all-pervasive love of God and identification with Christ's sufferings, which alone make sense of his life.

Two ancient and many modern churches around the world are dedicated to him.

At the service (always held near to St Francis day) animals that are brought along will be blessed. Arrangements to bless larger animals can be made by contacting Fr Chris.

On Sunday 8 October St Saviour's afternoon service will commence by the Riverbank near the jetty at 4.00 pm. In this wonderful setting two young people will be baptised by total immersion. Following the Baptisms the service will adjourn to St Saviour's Church for the remainder of the liturgy when four young people will receive their first Holy Communion.

The Next Sunday 15 October is St Saviour's Harvest Festival and as usual the Church will be specially decorated for the occasion with flowers, fruit and vegetables. The morning service will have a children's gift segment and at the afternoon service at 5.00 pm Fr Peter Laurence, the principal of Trinity Anglican School will be the guest preacher.

Other happenings at St Saviour's during the month are our second hand clothing sale on Friday the 29th at the rear of the Church under the covered area at the back of the Church from 9.00 am onwards followed by a Garage sale on Saturday the 30th between 8.30 am and 12.30 pm

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### WAIT-A-WHILE

Report by Lesley Clark State Member for Barron River.



While tourism is the lifeblood of the Kuranda community, the wellbeing of its families is the cornerstone. This month I was delighted to be able to announce the State Government's support for a range of initiatives that will assist local families as part of the government's "Putting Families First" strategy.

The Dept. of Families, Youth and Community Care provided \$62,500 to establish a new Kuranda District Child Protection Service, to be managed by KMKM, the primary and high schools and other community organisations. Congratulations in particular to Mike Hobbs, Principal of Kuranda State School, who prepared the funding submission that will see the employment of a Social Worker to support the families of all school aged children.

The Kuranda Information and Support Centre was also successful in obtaining \$11,800 from the same department for developing a volunteer training program and a community resource database. KISC will also be considered for additional funding to employ a Co-ordinator later this year after presenting a strong case at the Cairns Community Cabinet meeting in June.

Finally, the Kuranda Local Justice Group was granted \$49,000 under the Local Justice Initiatives Program of the Dept. of Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Policy & Development, to develop a range of traditional and community-based techniques to deal with young people in particular who break the law or are at risk of becoming involved with the criminal justice system.

Other local justice groups have successfully used methods such as shaming, running night patrols or organising camps to teach young people about their culture. When completed, the facilities at Mona Mona could well provide a venue for such camps.

Queensland Health is also playing its role in supplying Kuranda families with the appointment of a school nurse who will provide a service to students at Kuranda High School. As well, QLD Health is currently working with Wu Chopperan and the newly formed Bama Mara Guri (Healing Hands) to explore ways of improving health services in Kuranda that will benefit the health of the whole community.

Families are also in good hands with the Kuranda Ambulance Officer Leon Cartledge receiving his advanced level paramedic qualifications and a national medal for 15 years service at the recent annual QAS Awards. Also recognised at this awards ceremony was Beryl Blakey of the Kuranda

Ambulance Committee for her 16 years of continuous support. I remember working with Beryl when the long search for a site for the Kuranda Ambulance Centre ended successfully in 1995 with the purchase of a Fallon Rd site by the Goss Labour Government. Thank you Beryl on behalf of the whole community. Just as community service is a hallmark of the Kuranda community, so is creative endeavour and I was privileged to launch the Kuranda Arts Co-op into cyber space at a function to celebrate the development of their website. This site will open Kuranda's famous art and craft products to the world, earning them export dollars from people that never have to leave home to shop in Kuranda.

Creativity was also on show at the wonderful "Bugfest", whether it was in the form of innovative raft design, music, poetry or "bug" costumes in the grand parade. Congratulations to all participants and organisers, I really enjoyed my involvement and contribution to events. My only regret was that duty called elsewhere in the electorate and I couldn't stay all day.

Transport issues remain firmly on the agenda with the Black Mountain Rd intersection upgrade underway and Cabinet due to consider the final report of the Kuranda Range Transport Study in the next few weeks. Only one thing is certain, the State Government's final decision regarding the future of the Kuranda Range Rd will not please everybody, but doing nothing is no longer an option. Whilst I have supported a tunnel funded by the private sector and paid for by a toll, the 4 laning surface option with some short tunnels and bridges appears the most likely outcome, however the \$300 million cost means it will have to be a long-term project.

While dealing with difficult issues is part and parcel of politics, so is sup-







porting community achievements, and that is what makes my job so enjoyable. Congratulations to Kuranda State School for the establishment of the Parent Centre at the school, a friendly space where parents are welcomed and can get involved in their children's education.

Celebrations were also the order of the day at Mona Mona when the Land Use Agreement was finalised with the Wet Tropics Management Authority to allow the development of this Aboriginal community in the World Heritage area. Thank you to both organisations for the opportunity to participate in these important community events. I look forward to sharing more good news with you when I next I write.

FNQ Regional Plan Implementation Project



Cr. Borzi said the number of tourists visiting Far North Queensland was again on the increase. "Tourism in the Mareeba district has improved significantly in recent years," he said.

"Advice has been received by the Council that a development proposal may soon be received for the establishment of a world-class zoo on the main highway in the Koah district." The Council will continue to seek to promote activities that can best attract visitors and promote infrastructure that can provide accommodation and more of the things tourists want to see and do." Cr. Borzi said the possible widening of the Kuranda Range Road to a four-lane road from Smithfield to Kuranda would be a catalyst for development in the Shire, the likes of which had not yet been seen. "As Cairns' demands increase for more water, it would be intolerable to restrain agriculture because of water shortages. Therefore the Nullinga Dam is essential to the expansion of existing agricultural industries and the development of new ones," he said.

The Council also is seeking to earmark a site in the Shire for the eventual relocation of the Cairns Airport.
















# **Ambulance Update**

Ross's Tips

Calling 000. With luck most of us will never have to do this, however if you do, it helps to have an insight into what to expect. Triple zero is an emergency call service operated by our telecommunications carriers, and it is purely a referral service that will connect you with the service relevant to your emergency. Once you are connected to the emergency service you require you will then be asked a series of questions related to the reason for your call. The questions will usually start with details of the exact location of your incident, a call back number so you can be contacted if needed, details of the incident and the number of people involved and the general condition of the person you are calling for. It is vital that you answer the questions to the best of your ability and try to remain calm. One of the most common problems callers encounter when they ring an emergency service is the frustration of being asked so many seemingly stupid questions, however, all of the questions are predetermined to give as accurate a picture as possible to the responding service. So if you need to call 000, the best thing to do is simply answer the questions asked of you and don't hang up until you are told to by the call taker.

Subscriptions: If you are not a current member of the ambulance services subscription scheme, you will get a large account should you use the service. For less than \$2.00 a week you can cover your whole family even if you have 15 dependants or more, so it does pay to belong. The procedure is simple and can be done next time you visit the post office. Don't leave it too late because—it happens everyday.











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## Free Service for Kuranda from Tablelands Online

Don't you hate the way computers are taking over everything? You go to the bank, you talk to a computer, you phone some company, and you talk to a computer. Your car breaks down, you need to talk to its computer before you can fix it. Kids are too busy playing computer games to be healthy. When has a computer ever done anything useful for you? A lot of people have never used a computer. They have more traditional hobbies like following the Cricket or dressmaking from patterns. How could computers be of any use to you?

Well, let's say you have a bet with a friend over who was in the 1985 Australian side, and you are arguing black and blue over who is right, and considering using your cricket bat to finish the argument once and for all. The Internet can tell you exactly who was on the team, and pretty much anything else about the sport you want to know. Hundreds of people make it their business to tell the world about their cricket knowledge over the Internet. But you don't have a computer and couldn't use one anyway?! Well, Tablelands Online has set up an Internet kiosk in the Kuranda Arts Co-op, and Simon is there to show people what to do. He gives free lessons, but will also just give you a hand to find have to mess around with trying to learn how to use it at all.


How about if you like to do dressmaking, but you have done all the patterns in the shops that you like. Simon can find sites on the Internet with all sorts of patterns from around the world, not just for dresses, but for toys, ornaments, anything. Then just print out the patterns and they are yours. Any interest or hobby that you can think of is covered by someone, somewhere. You can use the computer to find other people who are interested in the same things, get advice, new ideas, or let other people know about your ideas. You don't need to know the first thing about computers.

Tablelands Online is part of the Tablelands Economic Development Community, the idea is that they get the people who live on the Tablelands to know a bit more about computers so that we aren't left behind. They have supplied the computers and the trained staff in most Tableland towns for the local people to use, but so far pretty much the only people to use the computers here are back-packers sending letters home with the E-mail service. It is a shame that

whatever it is you are looking for, and you don't more local people aren't ready to take advantage of this opportunity. Simon gives lessons that are free (except for a charge to use the Internet) and easy. He doesn't use technical words that confuse you, he goes at your pace, and he tailors the lessons to what you want to know. In as little as a single one-hour lesson, you can have a basic idea of how to use the computer or how to connect to the World Wide Web. If you aren't interested in lessons, he can just help you type out an official letter so that it looks more professional or find one little piece of information on the net. Any age, from kids to grannies, can

> If you already know what you are doing, or just need a little help every now and then, the computers, scanner, printer, CD burner and Web connection are there for the public to use. Internet use charges are: \$2 for 15 minutes, \$3.50 for 1/2 an hour or \$4.50 for an hour. Printing is charged at 25c per black and white page, or 50c per colour page. # The Kuranda Paper Computer Club



Q: How do I gain access to the 'Save Password' check box when it is greyed out when I am attempting to make a Dial Up Networking connection? A: This problem can occur if you are not logged into Windows. If you click Cancel in the logon box that appears when Windows 95/98 is starting, your password list cache file is not opened, and your passwords can't be saved. To open your password cache list file, restart Windows, type a username and leave the password blank). Then click OK Find out exactly what a program does when you install it by using the System File Checker's log feature. After installing a program, open the log by launching the System Information utility (Start/Programs/Accessories/System Tools/System Information), choosing System File Checker from the Tools menu, clicking on the Settings button and then on the View Log button. The log will tell you exactly which files were added to your computer and which were updated with a newer version.

To Close All Open Windows To simultaneously close all the windows you have open, simply hold the shift key and click the X button on the right side of the title bar.

If you use the Find command from the Start menu and you are looking for a file that contains spaces in the name be sure to use "?" as a place holder otherwise Windows will think you're looking for all instances of the individual words. For example, if you're looking for your favourite old time mp3, "Home on the Range," and you use "home on the range" as the search name you will get every instance for the words home, on, the, and range, even if the letters of the search words are buried in another word (i.e. on in phone). Enter the search name as "home?on?the?range" and Windows will find the correct file If you find a graphic you want to use as Desktop wallpaper, paste it up by right-clicking on the image and selecting Set As Wallpaper.

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




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
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## KISC Alcohol & Drug Bulletin

Living with a person who uses alcohol or drugs

What can you do?

If someone you care about uses alcohol or drugs too much and you feel angry, scared, or confused, the following ideas may be helpful:

1. Try to understand that you can only be responsible for YOUR own behaviour. There is NO way you can be responsible for someone else's actions, no matter what they tell you.

2. If you know someone who is an alcoholic or drug addict, you are not alone. There are many other people like you who have parents, sisters, brothers, cousins, children, partners or friends with a drug or alcohol problem.

3. Always listen to your feelings. If you feel upset about something, tell a trusted family member or friend. Don't keep your feelings locked up

4. If you know other people who are also concerned about someone's drug or alcohol use, talk to them often and give each other support. Ring Al-Anon in Kuranda or Cairns, Lifeline, Kids Helpline, Addiction Help Agency and Marlin Coast Neighbourhood Centre have run support groups for parents of drug users. The phone numbers for these can be found in the phone book.

5. Talk to the person you are concerned about.

Talk! If you have concerns about someone's drinking or drug use, you might feel that you would like to talk to them about it. Here are some ideas of how to do that:

1. First, find a quiet place and write down the things that bother you, make a list of YOUR feelings. You might even like to write a letter to the person you are concerned about.

2. Pick a time that the person is not busy, and has not been drinking or using drugs. Morning may be a good time.

3. Ask the person if you could have some time with them to talk.

4. Take some deep slow breaths, and relax.


5. Use "I" statements. Let them know how YOU feel when they use drugs or drink too much. You might say: "I was really scared the other night when... or I was really embarrassed yesterday when..." Let them know their behaviour is affecting you in a big way, because you care about them, they are important to you.


6. Ask the person if they understood what you said and how you feel. Ask them if could make some changes or get some help.

7. Thank the person for their time and understanding. You might also like to talk about the good times you have had with that person.

The Park has recently been reopened after extensive renovations and additions. One of the new features is a huge all weather, open-air dining area.

As Beth and Corry are volunteer wildlife carers, everyday you have the opportunity to met, pat and feed the rehabilitating wallabies that are recovering their strength before releasing back into the wild. > if you still want more adventure, there are 4WD tours to see the amazing local attractions, including the 2000 year-old Acacia Cedar Tree with link-up tours of the Mareeba Wetlands.

> Those of you who love to eat, know the best cooks are the ones who love to cook. And when you taste Beth's cooking you will understand why she spends most of her time in the kitchen preparing the superb meals that you will be devouring.

> You don't have to stay at the Park to enjoy her cooking either; all are welcome for a meal and morning and afternoon tea. And you don't have to be a tourist to enjoy a stay - Locals are equally welcome. This is just the place to get away for a time from the noise and heat of Cairns, to cool down have some peace and relaxation and be spoilt and entertained by your hosts. Whether you want to be alone or enjoy others' company or share time with Beth and Corry, that is your choice.

> There are new ideas on the agenda too. Opening soon is a special accommodation unit for wheel chair access, and smaller, less expensive units for single people.

> Once you turn off the Kennedy Highway there are many signs to show the way, and when the signs say 'All Welcome', THAT MEANS YOU.




