

## Firm Stand on bin use

Mareeba Shire Council will take action against householders who remove dividers in rubbish bins and continue to contaminate refuse.

Over the next few weeks, shire waste removal contractors Cleanaway will replace the dividers that some people have removed from their household bins

Mareeba environmental health officer Bruce Crunkhorn said to help maintain a good product for recycling, it was essential the recycle side of household bins was not contaminated with non-recycle material, particularly food

"By removing the divider, waste is mixed with the

recyclable material and leads to a reduction in the recycling," Mr Crunkhorn said.
"If a divider is removed from a bin, council, unfortunately, has little option but to charge for that divider to be replaced."

In the 12 months since the scheme started, 94,095kg of paper, 4935kg of PETE, 6147kg of HDPE, 49,521kg coloured glass, 22,166kg of clear glass, 10,587kg of steel and 7920kg of aluminium have been removed from the

This is in addition to council's recycling scheme, which provides for car bodies to be collected, old tyres collected for shredding and reprocessing and agricultural chemical containers collected and sent for reprocessing.



This is the last MAKING TRACKS column before the March 15 local government elections. It's difficult to believe that three years has gone by since my election as local councillor in 1994. Even more difficult at times to grasp the great changes that have taken place in our Shire during that time. In Kuranda we have tried hard to renew and extend public infrastructure, re-vegetate and improve the environment on the ground, provide new facilities for sport and recreation, put in place plans for the future, improve the facilities and equipment at SES and rural fire services, support the artistic and cultural life of Kuranda, provide a better approach to waste management and implement recycling, foster the local economy through initiatives like the Shire's Regional Development Organisation and Main Street programmes in Kuranda and Mareeba and a great deal more. But for me perhaps one of the most remarkable changes to have taken place is the stability and genuine co-operation that has developed throughout the Shire over recent times. Three years ago there was great division between Kuranda and other parts of the Shire and between Shire residents and the Council. The Leagues Club controversy was boiling over not just in Kuranda but across the Shire. The Council was petitioned by residents and there was talk of Kuranda seceding from the rest of the Shire.

Today we have, a stable co-operative and cohesive Shire community. There are many joint initiatives which are bringing the towns and districts of the Shire closer together than before. In part this is perhaps due not just to an acceptance of the great diversity of the Shire, but to that diversity (socially as well as geographically and economically) being truely valued. By valuing our great diversity and respecting the different aspirations and goals of different towns and districts within our Shire, the Shire as a whole has been able to make great progress. Of course little can ever be achieved in a "community" of any kind without mutual support and co-operation. Mareeba Shire Council over the past three years and myself as local Councillor during that period, have been very fortunate to have had support and co-operation from so many people in Kuranda and district. I take this opportunity to extend personally and on behalf of all Councillors our appreciation for that.

#### TOURISM IN KURANDA

The Kuranda Village Promotion Program is taking charge by revitalising the tourism industry within the town. The management committee of the Program made up of business, property owners and residents are soon to engage professional tourism consultants to develop a marketing and promotional plan for the next financial year. This decision is one of many that is giving the people in Kuranda more control and direction over their future within the tourism industry whilst maintaining harmony between the environment, resident's wishes and the commercial sector. Chairman of the Kuranda Village Promotion Program, Bob Madden, believes the Program has gone a long way to helping the community refocus on the town vision or providing the world with a unique experience of environmental, artistic and cultural integrity. "The people of Kuranda want to create something really special that makes us stand out amongst other destinations. If that means rethinking the established methods of distribution and promotion and trying something new then so be it." said Mr Madden. According to the Chairman of the Kuranda Chamber of Commerce and Tourism, Mark Freeman, the timing of the Kuranda marketing initiative is incredibly fortuitous in that it melds so well with the regional rebranding process currently being undertaken. "The business community believe that it is imperative that a long term marketing strategy be established to ensure the viability of the tourism industry with maximum benefit to our visitors" said Mr Freeman. Expressions of interest will soon be called for once the tender brief has been documented and finalised by the promotions working group. It is expected that the marketing and promotional plan will be implemented at the start of the 1997-1998 financial year. Kuranda has undergone many changes to visitor patterns in recent times due to the advent of Skyrail and the implementation of the infrastructure works in the centre of town. The markets have introduced more local art and craft and the newest establishment is the Arts Emporium in Coondoo Street. This initiative driven by local artists aims to give the artists of Kuranda an opportunity to display their vorks in an innovative and professionally curated space. Other initiatives include the placement of local residents into the Visitor Information Centre on the Cairns Esplanade as representative volunteers from Kuranda. For the majority of travellers, the Cairns Information Centre is the point of sale location for destinations throughout the region. Having Kuranda volunteers means that accurate and informative information on the things to see and do in and around Kuranda is disseminated. #### THE NAME OF THE ROAD IS "NO MONEY'S AVAILABLE ROAD"


The Myola road has been a school bus route since the early 1950's campaigning by previous school bus drivers, and conveyance committees led to a promise by the authorities in power at that time to have the bus route fully bituminised within five (5) years. That statement was made no less than 12 years ago. We were recently advised by the authorities now in power to start lobbying to try to have the road upgraded. The condition of the road has not improved. Certain sections of the road are very dangerous and two vehicles cannot pass safely. The corrugations and ruts allow only a very slow pace. In places all vehicles have to negotiate the road on the wrong side. Safety does not appear to count to the authorities but the big mighty dollar does.



The meeting has been convened by the Queensland Department of Main Roads to seek input to this project from the Kuranda community and to discuss any other relevant issues. Senior Main Roads officers will attend the meeting. A spokesperson stated that: "At this stage, some surveying work has been done and conceptual layouts, but we welcome comment to help develop the project to more advanced stage of design". FEBRUARY'S MEETING was very informative with a detailed presentation by FNQEB.

An outline of how power is delivered and distributed within the Kuranda area indicated the problems which cause most of our outages and the measures FNQEB are taking to reduce both the number of outages and the time to restore power. Their stated aim is to half outages within first twelve months across the region. FNQEB's Environment Officer Ken Jack showed a number of photographs taken recently in the Village and environs showing very clearly the problems caused by plants interfering with lines. Major cuplrits are mostly exotics such as bamboos, African tulips, poincianas and palms. Residents should be very careful about where (or if in some cases) they plant these: Did you know bamboo fronds have been filmed moving up to 10 metres to cause shorting of lines? The FNQEB are committed to working with residents to replace problem vegetation wherever possible and have asked ARK to assist with co-ordination. We are happy to do this if it means an improvement to the present unacceptable situation. Residents who have specific problems are urged to write to ARK PO Box 573, Kuranda outlining problems with dates, name & property address. We are endeavouring to discover patterns to assist FNQEB to resolve problems. If you have a problem tree or plant contact them regarding replacing it with a suitable species.

#### CASSOWARY CONSERVATION PLANS

Are really moving. We are getting great support from all levels of Government and the various departments concerned. Skyrail has given us support by offering to allow staff to train in basic survey techniques to allow for documentation of any sightings of birds or dung on the cableway route. Department of Natural Resources have advised us that a possible way of getting more control over illegal or unwanted activities affecting the future viability of the cassowaries in the Black Mt Rd area, would be the regazetting of the road to a forest drive and scientific area. Council will call a meeting of all interested parties soon to further discuss the idea. Residents should not be concerned about any loss of rights as the Departmentof Natural Resources is suggesting a community

partnership with permits being available through Village outlets and volunteers being further involved in day to day management. We hope everyone is going to get behind this push to save these magnificent and unique creatures. If you would like to get involved in survey work, be trained in techniques or to wish to report a sighting call Gayle on 937 487, Rob on 937 287 or Lex on 937 134. Please drive carefully as cassowaries are crossing roads including the Kuranda Range Road between Black Mt Rd and just past Rainforestation NOW!




## Chinese New Year Customs

Kung Hei Fat Choy!

"May you prosper in the New Year!"

Lunar New Year falls on the first day of the first moon, and for Chinese people this is the most important festival of the year, involving a litany of ancient customs and traditions still alive today. Key to Chinese New Year is the idea that it is a time for a fresh start, a time to wipe the slate clean. It is also a time to renew family relationships and remember ancestors. So, in the weeks before the holiday, families will clean and repaint their homes, buy new furniture and new clothes, and settle their debts. Each home's kitchen God will then bear favourable reports on his annual trip to the world of the spirits. On their front door, families display pictures of the Door Gods and red paper banners proclaiming greetings of wealth, good fortune and long life. They decorate their homes with fruitbearing kumquat trees and flowering peach branches to signify prosperity and good luck, and visit temples to pay respect to their ancestors. They also buy special food items and sweets as luckbringing presents, and collect crisp new banknotes for lai see, the "lucky money" handed out in special red packets to children and unmarried adults. A family dinner at home is usually held on the eve of New Year with symbolic dishes like abalone (abundance), oyster (good business), fish (surplus) and pork (prosperity) offered to everyone. Family members may travel halfway around the world to be with their elders at this very special time, and they will stay up to await the New Year, particularly children since it is believed that children who greet the New Year will have long lives. Ancestors are also included in the festivities. They are believed to remain in the household until the 16th day of the New Year, so during this time they are served daily with food and drink. The spirit feast may consist of five kinds of food, five cups of wine and five cups of tea, with a calendar so they can follow the feasts and festivals at family shrines. Lai See is distributed either on New Year's Eve or the first day of the New Year, accompanied by the greeting Kung Hei Fat Choy! But it is good manners for children not to open the red packet in the presence of the giver, a tradition which extends to all present-giving. The first two days of the New Year are usually spent at home, with soulcleansing vegetarian food on the first day. On the third day, any danger of family arguments is traditionally avoided by everyone going out for public festivities. The seventh day is generally known as Yan Yat, "Everybody's Birthday", giving Chinese people two birthdays each year, and the weather on that day is vital as it sets the tone for the year - a fine clear day with stars at night augurs a peaceful year. The fifteenth and final day of the New Year holiday is marked by the Yuen Siu (Spring Lantern) Festival, which dates back 2,200 years to the Han Dynasty. It is also known as Chinese Valentine's Day because it was traditionally a day on which young, unmarried women wore their finest clothes and ventured out with their chaperones to places where eligible young men gathered. The spectacle, the splendour and the tradition of Chinese New Year can be experienced throughout the holiday at the events that are listed here. Be sure not to miss any of the wonders of Hong Kong!





## Fruit Slice

cup S.R. flour (Lge)

3/4 cup sugar

#### CHINESE CHEWS

1 cup sugar

1 pinch salt

1 cup Self Raising flour

1/4 lb. Butter 1 egg

ice with lemon icing.

1 tsp. vanilla

3 tsp. cocoa

1 cup choppped dates, nuts & ginger. Cream, butter and sugar. Add well beaten egg, salt and vanilla, sift in flour and cocoa. Spread on greased shallow tin and bake in moderate oven 350 F (177 C) for 1/2 to 3/4 hr. Not longer. Cut while hot and leave in tin to cool.

#### BUTTER CAKE with MODIFICATIONS

Cream 4oz butter, 6oz sugar. Beat in 3 eggs, add 1/2 cup milk & 1/2 tsp flavouring. Fold in 8oz flour & 2 tsp BP. Bake in butter/floured tin 35-45 min, 180C.

1) Before cake is fully cooked slice along top, pour into the cut and over the top a mixture of, juice of 1/2 lemon & 1/3 cup icing sugar. Finish cooking for 5min.

2) Pour 1/2 mixture into tin. Sprinkle over 1/2 tsp. cinnamon and 1Tbsp.brown sugar. Swirl in 1/2 cup yogurt. Pour rest of mixture on top and cook as before.



## Traditions of Chinese New Year

Even though the climax of the Chinese New Year, Nian, lasts only two or three days including the New Year's Eve, the New Year season extends from the mid-twelfth month of the previous year to the middle of the first month of the new year. A month from the New Year, it is a good time for business. People will pour out their money to buy presents, decoration material, food and clothing. Transportation department, railroad in particular, is nervously waiting for the onslaught of swarms of travellers who take their days off around the New Year to rush back home for a family reunion from all parts of the country. Days before the New Year, every family is busy giving its house a thorough cleaning, hoping to sweep away all the ill-fortune there may have been in the family to make way for the wishful in-coming good luck. People also give their doors and window-panes a new paint, usually in red colour. They decorate the doors and windows with paper-cuts and couplets with the very popular theme of "happiness", "wealth", "longevity" and "satisfactory marriage with more children". Paintings of the same theme are put up in the house on top of the newly mounted wall paper. In the old days, various kinds of food are tributed at the alta of ancestors.

The Eve of the New Year is very carefully observed. Supper is a feast, with all members coming together. One of the most popular course is jiaozi, dumplings boiled in water. "Jiaozi" in Chinese literally mean "sleep together and have sons", a long-lost good wish for a family. After dinner, it is time for the whole family to sit up for the night while having fun playing cards or board games or watching TV programs dedicated to the occasion. Every light is supposed to be kept on the whole night. At midnight, the whole sky will be lit up by fireworks and firecrackers make everywhere seem like a war zone. People's excitement reach its zenith. Very early the next morning, children greet their parents and receive their presents in terms of cash wrapped up in red paper packages from them. Then, the family start out to say greetings from door to door, first their relatives and then their neighbours. It is a great time for reconciliation. Old grudges are very easily cast away during the greetings. The air is permeated with warmth and friendliness. During and several days following the New Year's day, people are visiting each other, with a great deal of exchange of gifts. The New Year atmosphere is brought to an anti-climax fifteen days away where the Festival of Lanterns sets in. It is an occasion of lantern shows and folk dances everywhere. One typical food is the Tang Yuan, another kind of dumplings made of sweet rice rolled into balls and stuffed with either sweet or spicy fillings. The Lantern Festival marks the end of the New Year season and afterwards life becomes daily routines once again. This description is based upon the recollection of my own experience. Customs of observing the New Year vary from place to place, considering that China is a big country not only geographically, but also demographically and ethnically. Yet, the spirit underlying the diverse celebrations of the Chinese New Year is the same: a sincere wish of peace and happiness for the family members and friends.

Annual General Report by the Reverend Chris Wright

KISC is a small organisation which has a special place in our Community UNDER RESOURCED and UNDER VOLUNTEERED, it still operates in an efficient manner when all circumstances are taken into consideration.

Regular Meetings of the Management Committee have transacted the business of the Centre and our tireless members have opened the Centre when they have had available time. Food parcels have been given to the needy and the monthly KISC news forms an important part of the Kuranda Paper. Our collection of Reference Books have been catalogued and over 76 books are now a part of the Kuranda Library as a Community resource. The Kuranda Health Access report is a highly respected document compiled under the auspice of this Body.

The obstacles will need much thought and deliberation as Government Funding has dried up and at present with the prevailing economic problems in the Village, it would not be appropriate to have an Appeal to the private sector. Finally, I would like to thank all Members of the Management Committee, our tireless Volunteers, the Mareeba Shire Council and everyone who has played their part in KISC this year

#### KISC ALCOHOL & DRUG BULLETIN COCAINE

In 1855 a European scientist isolated the drug cocaine from coca leaves, which South American Indians had been chewing for at least 2000 years as a cultural and religious practice. The drug was used in many European medicines and as an anaesthetic for a number of years, and was an ingredient in Coca-cola until 1903. Although it was banned except for medical use in most Western countries in the 1920's, Australia still had the highest consumption of cocaine per person in the world in the 1930's. Currently, it is one of the most widely used illicit drugs in the U.S.A. A 1993 Australian survey found that about 2% of people had tried cocaine at some time, and 1% had used it in the past 12 months. The immediate effects of a single low dose, which can last from a few minutes to a few hours, depending on the person and a variety of factors, include: reduced appetite, increased heart rate, agitation, sexual arousal, increased body temperature, enlarged pupils, increased alertness & energy, extreme feeling of well-being, inability to judge risks, unpredictable & aggressive behaviour. Increasing doses of cocaine can produce: headaches, dizziness, restlessness, violent and/or aggressive behaviour, loss of concentration, loss of interest in sex, loss of ambition & motivation, heart pain, heart attack. Prolonged use can lead to behavioural problems & fits in some people, as well as dependence &/or psychosis. Snorting cocaine can lead to nosebleeds, sinusitis and tearing of the nasal wall. Smoking freebase cocaine can cause breathing difficulties, chronic cough, chest pain & lung damage. Injecting cocaine with used/dirty needles can increase the risk of contracting AIDS, hep B & C, blood poisoning & skin abscesses. As cocaine is often cut with other substances, users rarely know exactly what drug and dosage they are taking. A high dose of cocaine will vary from person to person. As little as 10mg (1/10th of the common inhaled dose) has been known to kill people who have a strong reaction to it. Acute cocaine poisoning (overdose) can lead to faster, irregular & weak heartbeats, lung failure, heart failure, burst blood vessels in the brain. Cocaine psychosis hearing voices, delusions, suspicion and fear of persecution can result from either a single dose or long periods of high doses. People can develop a tolerance to the feeling high effects of cocaine, meaning they need higher doses to get the

Withdrawal symptoms occur when a dependent person stops or cuts down the amount they use: deep depression, suicidal feelings, nausea, vomiting, shaking fits, fatigue, weakness, hunger, long but disturbed sleep. irritability, muscle pain, craving the drug. People withdrawing from any drug including cocaine are advised to contact their local community health centre or doctor for assistance.



#### A THOUGHT FOR MARCH By Fr. Chris Wright.

Open your Bible and turn to St. Johns Gospel, find Chapter 3 and read verses 1 to 21. As you read through you come to realise that at the heart of reality there is the light of God. That light came to us in our own human form in Jesus. We are free to accept or reject that light. Jesus has a visitor, no ordinary visitor - Nicodemus is an extremely powerful man in this country; he is a member of the Sanhedrin It is Nicodemus's business to be one of the regligious teachers of his Nation. Yet, he as been drawn to this rural Rabbi whom he has probably overheard in the temple area as he passed by. Jesus has just been trying to tell Nicodemus something that this fine man finds terribly hard to understand. The moment we hear what Jesus wants to communicate, we realise that Nicodemus is not the only one to find it all to hard. Jesus is trying to get Nicodemus to understand that faith is not merely a system of thought. Faith is a relationship with God. At the same time Jesus is trying to help Nicodemus to see that the spirit of God (the Holy Spirit) is not within our control. Jesus uses two images for this. He says that Nicodemus must be born again, he must risk coming at life in a totally different way. He must risk going back to find another Nicodemus or at least a whole other aspect of himself. The second image Jesus uses is that of wind. The spirit of God, Jesus says is like a wind that blows from beyond and outside us into our lives. We cannot order it, we cannot tell it to stop. Jesus says that wind "Blows where it wills" not where we will Jesus then refers to the inevitability of his own fate; he will be lifted up, but for a great purpose. By that terrible lifting up, men and women will be drawn to him for the rist of time. It is ironic that Nicodemus should hear this, because he is the very person who one day will go with Joseph of Arimathea to the Cross and take down the body of the dead Jesus, who will be lifted up in agony and shame. Many of us have to experience a dead Jesus in our lives before we realise that he is alive within us. At this point in the simplest yet most sublime language, Jesus tells us that the Heart which has given birth to all creation loves creation. That love is so great, so deep that the heart of God has willed to enter into human form and, if need be, to die for the love of creation. 

# TEAM 2000

Running on a record of considerable achievement but with eyes fixed firmly on the future, Team 2000 candidates are taking a positive approach to the Council elections on March 15.

#### COUNCIL JOINS CASSOWARY PLAN

Mareeba Shire Council has agreed to a five point contribution to a proposed Cassowary Conservation Plan for an important area of cassowary habitat near Black Mountain between Kuranda and Julatten. Three of the largest threats which have been identified to the cassowary population in the area are vehicles travelling the Black Mountain Road, feral pigs and straying dogs.

Support for the Cassowary Conservation Plan has been growing in many quarters since local resident Mr Rob Mortimer recently brought the plight of the area's remaining birds to the attention of Federal Environment Minister Robert Hill and Wet Tropics Management Authority Chairman Thor Hundsloe. Since then the Kuranda residents and ratepayers group, ARK, has taken up the cause with all levels of government. At a meeting of the Mareeba Shire Council last Thursday, Councillors voiced their support for the urgent implementation of a conservation strategy. Council agreed to an interim contribution including:-

 The installation of cassowary warning signs at the entrances to Black Mountain Road from Top of the Range and Julatten.

2. Stepping up patrols of the road by the Council dog catcher.

3. The loan of dog traps free of charge to Government bodies and residents who have problems with feral pigs or straying dogs.

 Council to lobby both State and Federal Authorities for the placement of a ranger to patrol the Wangetti and Black Mountain region of the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area.

The Council Environmental Officer to be made available to act in a liaison and advisory capacity.

The Council also made a call for the Federal Government to urgently list the cassowary as an endangered species. The bird is listed as such at State level but not on the Federal list, meaning that special Federal funding for the conservation strategy cannot presently be accessed. Chairman of the Council Environmental Services Committee, Oliver Gilkerson, speaking after the meeting stressed that the Council's contribution was an interim one. "There is no doubt that Council will want to work with other levels of Government and the broader community in achieving maximum protection for this dwindling species", he said.

#### GONZO'S GUILT PART 2

In yet another attempt to wrest the control of Kuranda from the hands of the transport industry, Gonzo has been fined a total of \$490 for "assaulting" a bus driver, and turning off the motor of his unattended vehicle. Followers of this quixotic quest may remember that the last such conviction resulted in \$100 in damages and a year's good behaviour bond. All up, it's pretty cheap for obtaining sound legal advice direct from the magistrate as to the solution to our dilemma: both magistrates have suggested the same tactic, which is to lobby Mareeba Shire Council for a bylaw under the Traffic Acts. 44B (4) (i). Currently, under section 85 of the Traffic Regulations it states: (1) So far as may be necessary for the prevention of noise the driver of a motor vehicle upon any road shall, whenever such vehicle is stopped, stop the engine or motor or reduce the action thereof.

There doesn't seem to be any exemption provided for drivers who want to pre-air condition their bus prior to picking up their passengers. Starting a stopped bus and not moving it surely is not "reducing the action". The Kuranda police do not have the time or manpower to police parking violations and the bus companies would only consider the \$10 fine involved to be a "parking fee". By seeking a bylaw to impose a \$1000 fine may make it economically viable for the police to issue citations, and would certainly encourage the drivers to TURN THE MOTOR OFF! A second bylaw could impose the same fine for leaving the vehicle unattended while the motor is running: "unattended" being defined as "more than one meter away from the vehicle".

Fearing incarceration for any further guerilla street bravado, Gonzo is withdrawing from the fore, but will support the move for a bylaw. Is there anyone out there who will pick up the banner and organise an approach to Mareeba Shire Council? If so, the community of Kuranda will have to rally TOGETHER to support it. Contributed by M. #### FERAL PIG TRAPPING PROGRAM



We are getting better at pig trapping with Marjorie Spear boasting a catch of 3. We now have three portable traps and they need to be out there working. Please report any

evidence or sightings of pigs so we can set the traps. Debate is continuing on other means of reducing feral pig numbers including controlled shooting campaigns and immuno-contraception (specific virus affecting reproduction).

#### DOMESTIC PET MANAGEMENT

Mareeba Shire Council is to step up surveillance of stray, uncontrolled dogs and has free dog traps available upon request. The Kuranda patrol officer will have the power to impound stray dogs.

It has been suggested that the dog local law should be enhanced to include neutering of 'whole' dogs (or cats) which have been impounded, before owners can retrieve them, and further, that a licence to keep a dog or cat should include proof that the animal can be contained on the owner's property. It may be possible to have a restraining order taken out on a neighbour to have them contain their pets within their property.

It is certainly obvious that there is a need for public education as some residents don't associate these calls for better pet management with themselves or their pets.

Teena Kennedy is leading the effort on pet management and has devised a petition for residents to sign calling for stricter control by Council of wayward animals. The petition can be found in several shops in the village.

Teena, a dog owner herself, recognises the value of domestic pets to the emotional well-being of their owners. A balanced approach to pet management is needed. Teena is organising a forum on domestic pets shortly when all aspects of pet ownership can be aired.

**ELECTRIC SHOCK:** 

EFFECTS OF ELECTRIC SHOCK.

Breathing ceases or becomes inadequate Heart action may cease Burns may result from heat production or fire Falls may cause injuries

#### MANAGEMENT OF ELECTRIC SHOCK VICTIMS.

Rescuers must be certain they do not also risk electric shock. In a road accident when power lines are in contact with a vehicle or a person, NO attempt at extrication or resuscitation should be made until the situation is declared safe by an electrical authority.

In a domestic situation, it is important to disconnect the victim from the electrical supply promptly.

#### THE RESCUER MUST:

Turn off the electricity supply at the switch or at the fuse box if possible.

Disconnect the victim from the electricity supply by the use of a dry non conducting material. (eg. Dry wooden stick)

Avoid any direct contact with the skin of the patient or any conducting material touching it until they are disconnected.

Begin resuscitation. Only trained rescuers should use cardiopulmonary resuscitation if the patient's heart has stopped beating. Treat any burns and associated injuries.

Call IMMEDIATELY for Emergency Ambulance Medical Help on 000.

The divider in your bin has been replaced recently. The truck driver has reported that the divider has pest, primarily of coconut palms. However, the insect has again been removed from your bin. If the divider is not replaced immediately, Council will instruct the driver to not remove your rubbish and Council will also consider taking legal action against you to recover the cost of the divider and for tampering with the bin, under the "Environmental Protection (Interim Waste) Regulation" 1996.

#### YOUR HEALTH IN OUR HANDS

#### Kuranda Medical Service

BAT LYSSA VIRUS has recently been prominent in the media following the death of a volunteer animal handler late last year who was found to have contracted the Lyssa virus from a bat or flying fox scratch. Unfortunately little is known about the newly identified Lyssa Virus. It is not yet known whether the virus has been circulating bat populations at a low level for many years and whether there has been previous human exposure without obvious illness. The best known Lyssa Virus is rabies and bat Lyssa Virus is related to this virus, although this new form is quite distinct and very different to rabies. The transmission of this virus from bats to humans is thought to be by a penetrating scratch or bite. There is no evidence of person to person contact. People who are at risk are people who have a lot of contact with these animals and risk bites or scratches. If scratched or bitten by a bat it is recommended that you thoroughly scrub the wound for several minutes with soap under running water, as proper cleansing is the most effective way to reduce transmission. Cleaning with soap and water is more effective than antiseptic. Cover the wound and it is advised that you attend the local doctor or public health unit, as post-exposure vaccination, if given promptly, is certain to fully protect against the disease. It is recommended that anyone who regularly handles or cares for bats be vaccinated to protect them from possible exposure to this virus.

#### TREES RESTORE MAREEBA SHIRE

Mareeba Shire Council's tree planting programme culminated vesterday with the planting of the Shire's 176,000th tree. Mareeba Shire Mayor, Cr. Chris Lewis and Chairman of Council's Environmental Services Committee, Cr. Oliver Gilkerson, were on hand as a batch of 200 native trees replaced an area of guinea grass on the Kennedy Highway near Kuranda. The plantings, which have been a feature in most towns across the Shire since 1994, have included over 500 different species all of which have been native to the district.

plantings had taken place with the practical assistance of drink for stomach troubles. community groups such as Landcare. "It's another example of how we have been able to successfully work with people in the community to progress the Shire", he said.

Cr. Gilkerson observed that the plantings had brought a variety of different benefits to different areas. "Here on the Highway the plantings play an important role in improving the visual outlook. However, the great majority of the trees have gone into areas of public land such as river banks, Council Reserves and Crown land", he said. Those trees may not be quite as visible but Cr. Gilkerson said they played an important role in bank stabilisation, minimising weed growth and in providing natural habitat for a great variety of birds and animals.

PALM LEAF BEETLE IN KURANDA

Mr Keith Halfpapp, Entomology with the Department of

The Palm Leaf Beetle, (Brontispa longissima) is a major been recorded causing slight to severe damage to 22 other palm species in Australia. As the beetle and its larvae feed on the tissue of the young unfolded central spear leaflets, sustained, heavy attacks can be fatal to young palms and significantly disfigure or weaken mature trees, leaving them more susceptible to drought or other life threatening disorders. Council has taken steps to control the infestations on land under its control, but feels it necessary to alert the community to be on the lookout for this pest on palm trees in the Kuranda area. Larvae chew off large areas of the unfolded leaflet causing the underlying tissue to turn brown. On opening, the brown areas shrivel and curl, producing a scorched appearance. Unfortunately, the insects are quite small and hard to detect and there are other disorders which can cause similar symptoms, but the presence of an unbroken surface layer of tissue and the absence of insect excreta distinguishes these from palm leaf beetle damage.
