Dear Kuranda Paper,

This letter is written in the hope of making those gardeners who use chemicals to subdue weeds and pests on their property aware of the dangers of the poisons they may use.

At the end of May, my husband decided to spray weeds along our vegetable garden fence. Although having used this particular weed poison for the past 15 years, for some reason (???) he neglected to use the safety gear he normally used previously - rubber boots, overall, gloves, mask etc. The result? 32 days in Cairns Base Hospital, 30 lbs in lost weight, kidney and liver shutdown, lungs affected to the point that 48 hrs after being admitted to hospital, Doctors predicted that he only had around 10 hours to live. There is no antidote for Paraquat, the poison used.

Fortunately, due to the Doctors and nursing staff dedicated ministrations plus his tough bushie constitution, my husband survived with a lot of medication, many hours of dialysis, several units of fresh blood, and removal of extra fluid from legs etc. However, treatment was basically a matter of trial and error. We have been told that my husband is an extremely lucky man, other victims in similar circumstances had died. All from a tiny drop of liquid brushed against his lips. Weekly blood tests have revealed that the toxin is still in his body and will take several months more to leach out.

I urge those who suffer from the "it won't happen to me" syndrome to remember this letter and be diligent in their use of poisons and the required safety gear. As well as massive weight loss and downturn in health, my husband was up for a bottle of hair colour (for me) when he finally came home from hospital - and believe me, it was a very expensive brand.

It is called representing your community The present Barron River MP has chosen not to represent her community. The State MP for Cook who represents the other half of Kuranda remains silent on the matter. As for the pool, the present MP for Barron River, after 12 years of doing nothing, only decided to support the pool after it was supported in the Media by both the Independent and Liberal Candidates for Barron River at the last State Election. We are still waiting for the pool.

A better title for Wait a While, the regular Labor Lecture, could be Wait Forever, or maybe Waiting for God To ,or maybe just Waiting, as 12 years is hardly a while. To live in Kuranda one needs a good sense of humour, as we have both a Council and two State MPs who seem not to want to represent us. Farewell Kon

On Monday 23 August 2004, Kuranda lost one of it most loyal devotees. Konstandinos cavalliotis, affectionately known to most locals as "Kon the plumber", died suddenly at his home on Black Mountain Road, aged 61, after a five year battle against cancer. He leaves his wife Maria, Son and Daughter Anthony and Jasmine.

Kon was a purposeful and practical man who dedicated his life providing a solid foundation for his family through honest hard work. Born in Brisbane, he first came to Kuranda in 1981. He fell in love with it and then, choosing it as his place, and through out his 24 years here, he never lost his deep affection for the village and its people.

He passionately loved his home and his family, and was sincerely liked and admired for his good heart, his kindness and wry sense of humour. He was dependable and capable, and ran his very successful business with honesty and integrity. Kon was a fighter in all aspects of his life, and in the two years, he bravely endured constant severe pain from treatment

HISTORY OF CONSTRUCTION A POOL IN KURANDA, ONE PERSON'S VIEW.

1992:- Many local residents would remember groups, activities and a drive to have a pool here 12 years ago. 1994:- In the Norm Provan days, our committee now has some of the documents and enormous efforts were put in to the ground work.

1998:- I don't remember those days. I transferred here as a permanent Health and P.E. teacher with 15 years incorporating Aquatics programs into a P.E. Curriculum but here I couldn't. Our school children had to be denied any Aquatics in stroke correction and lifesaving. I teach kids, particularly Aboriginal students, community kids who cannot hear too well because of the infections from the Barron. I found any water-based activities were dangerous and only fostered the ear health problems. I also know of individuals who have unfortunately drowned in this dangerous water place. I also have small children of my own and risks lives and spend extra money [in another Shire!!], drown proofing them at Smithfield pool, as many of us do.

1999: I approached my school,s Admin and limited numbers traveled at around \$200.00 per trip with a bus to Smithfield, this heavily subsidized program was not inclusive nor was it feasible in the long term.

Talking and learning more from my community I discovered so many others of us needed the same basic values for our kids and ourselves.

2000 - 2001:- People continue to move here and I get tired of explaining to parents why we have no Aquatics program and felt guilty when individuals would stop in the street and say 'how's the pool going'. Pressure increases, when tragic events happen to teenagers

who don't have enough constructive things to do. As Health teacher I developed a deeper responsibility to my kids to provide a source and place for active/safe recreation. The pool became the answer.

2002:- Father Chris Wright, and I thank him dearly for the responsibility of representing Kuranda on a shire wide, council driven Sport and Recreation Committee that looked at present and future facility needs. This valuable experience provided the springboard to access the data for establishing needs and numbers. It was here the reality showed 5,000 people and fast growing numbers, the need for a major facility/cooperative effort from our area. It also acknowledged we had been given assurances before; it was within the realms of possibility! This plan was to incorporate the years 2003 - 2008. Therefore it seemed terribly relevant to me to get a committee, become established formally before the plan was presented to Council in July 2003. 2003:- The decision was not taken lightly, needed a united front and I needed to know whether the community agreed with the idea, I had a hunch they did. From the minute we first met at the sport 'sand social club' in January and with a good attendance we were able to immediately form a committee and decided to do a petition. It gathered 1,000 signatures in 4 days, so the dream was wide spread. So we formalized through 2003 in the 14 months we have achieved:-

Petition - all areas of the community, 1,000 signatures gathered in 4 days.

User Survey - 150 completed representing 260 individuals [sample] showing 90% support for and a high usage by regular users.

Bank Accounts - this winter to become an incorporated body to be eligible for State Sport and

Recreation grants, leading to A.G.M. and opening of positions.

Letters written - to all levels of government - responses from many.

Decided on Site - High School - leasing land from ED Queensland. Agreed to and confirmed by Mr Clive Dixon Regional Executive Director of Education 6/5/04.

Lesley Clark - working with school and Anna Bligh, Education Minister, added support to case for pool to Local Council. Regular visitor to meetings.

Mick Borze - with the council is funding a \$6,000 feasibility study to establish and prove the acute need for a pool has visited us and made assurances to match Stage funding. Sept. feasibility still to be sighted by Kuranda community.

Private Consultants - Sinclair Knight Merz, Maris Radford, completing study by end May 2004. Needs already proven by preliminary findings, and has been to council and back to consultant for 2nd draft.

Surveys Prove - usage by all ages and equally by women and men, these factors are very important in the feasibility study as it fits strongly with the 2003-2008 Sport and Recreation Study.

Created figures - example scenarios of cost of running pool for this community have been provided and projections made about them.

Meet Monthly - at the Neighbourhood Centre on Wednesday evenings 7.00 pm to maintain momentum for the cause, moving back to Sport's and Social Club on Oct 20.

Sport and Recreation Department -_application for major facilities open in November, extended from September. Council pressed by committee and Dr Clark to get on it.

A Thought for October

This month we turn to St Luke's Gospel Chapter 16 and read from verse 1 to 13

In this month's reading, Jesus asks that we invest the same energy in our relationship with God that we invest in our personal affairs. Jesus often outraged his listeners. He would say things that seemed to fly in the teeth of all reality, and advocate things that seemed to offend all their ideas of religious propriety. Jesus was determined to say something so startling that it would penetrate the layers of resistance waiting to block it.

This story is a first-class example. All over Galilee there were great estates run by a manager, -- often, but not always, a Greek. The manager was very powerful and in a position of great trust. Therefore, when one was found to be fiddling with the books it was very serious

Jesus' story is of one such manager. The story may well have been based on a real incident known to his listeners. The master asks for the accounts, and the manager is caught redhanded. But he is resourceful. He rushes around doing deals with his master's customers, deals that will benefit them and therefore make them kindly disposed to him when he comes looking for a job. Thus he survives after being fired. Up to that point it is just an interesting story on human ingenuity. But then Jesus says, "the master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly."

The listening crowd must have gasped. Normally the manager would end up in prison. But, as always, Jesus is portraying the nature of God, and applying the attitudes and values of the kingdom of God. What is the most important issue here when we look from God's point of view?

Here is a man faced with a serious situation. Instead of remaining passive he puts every ounce of his intelligence and ingenuity and energy into dealing with the crisis. Jesus now asks us to

The Cairns Education Renewal Project to plan for the future of education in our region has generated a good deal of discussion in the community. Three projects have emerged in the Barron River electorate as a result of community consultation.

- 1. The relocation of the Kuranda Primary School to a new location adjacent to the Kuranda State High School to provide Prep to Year 12 College.
- 2. A dedicated middle school (Years 6-9) at Redlynch to provide an integrated Prep to Year 9 learning environment.
- 3. A new senior campus (Years 10-12) of the Smithfield State High School to be located adjacent to James Cook University with the existing Smithfield campus re-oriented as a middle school (Years 6-9) and possibly, over time, a Prep to Year 9 campus.

The Kuranda proposal was the result of extensive localized consultation with members of both the indigenous and non indigenous community. Although there was not unanimous support for the proposal it did receive clear majority support. The present primary school facilities are regarded as old, overcrowded and in need of major maintenance. Relocation would also allow the community to take advantage of State education and training reforms, especially those relating to the early, middle and senior phases of learning.

The community proposal argues the viability of both schools would be enhanced by co-location and there would be additional benefits through the shared use of education and community facilities, such as the proposed swimming pool. Savings would also be made in having both schools share administration. Issues of concern related to transport and the impact on younger students mixing with older students.

The Kuranda proposal was further discussed at the three Reference Groups comprising of principals and P&C representatives from schools in the northern, central and southern parts of the Cairns area. The proposal received strong support from all three community

reference groups and as a result there was general agreement that the proposal receive urgent attention.

The cost of a new primary school at Myola is estimated at between \$3.5 and \$4 million. It is proposed that the sale of the current primary school site and other surplus Education Queensland assets would fund this and other projects supported in the review.

I would like to thank Principals Llew Davies and John Baskerville and all the members of the two school P&C's who participated in the northern Reference Group meetings and who organized the local community consultation. Special thanks to John for the paper he prepared setting out the Kuranda proposal in detail.

A third newsletter will be distributed through schools after the holidays providing an update on the community consultation process. A report summarizing the review and its findings is now being prepared and will be submitted to the Education and Arts Minister, Anna Bligh, in early October for her consideration. This report will be placed on the Education Queensland website: go to www.learningplace.com.au, and then click on FND Learning Community, then Cairns School Renewal. This web site currently has a range of materials related to the Cairns Renewal project. Additional information can also be obtained from the Education Queensland Cairns and Cape District office on 4046

It is expected the Minister will seek further departmental and other advice before responding to the report later this year. The response will be communicated through the schools involved and the wider Cairns community.

I have found participation in Cairns School Renewal project a very interesting experience. I am very excited by the outcomes to date which have the potential to benefit thousands of students in the region. I believe that the Kuranda proposal is a good conclusion to a process of community discussion that started some years ago and will fulfill the vision of the members of the community who campaigned for the development of the school site at Myola.

SEARCHING FOR WAYS TO GET OUR VOICE BACK

In the Cairns Post (30/ 8/04) there was reference to Tableland shires looking at a new model of regionalism in Australia. Particular mention was made of Atherton, Herberton and Eacham shires "sharing a range of resources."

Desley Boyle, Minister for Local Government & Planning, is quoted as saying "What we're going to look at is a new system for councils that is half-way between leaving the councils as they are now - that is, operating within their own borders - and amalgamations."

"I am not a big fan of super-councils and I'm certainly not a big fan of amalgamating region that happens to fall within a number of country shires that the council border. Doesn't this cover a huge amount of land. The sound like our situation? risk of losing local representation,

local involvement, is too great and I think regional arrangements may be the way to preserve the local level of service contact and yet be more financially effective and more driven towards regional decision-making."

Could this mean she is hearing our call for help to regain some sort of a voice in view of the current Mareeba Shire's councillors slamming the door shut in our faces?

Hopefully, Minister Desley means bio-regional when she refers regional. This would recognise the inappropriateness of decisionmaking by a council in one bioregion for a totally different bio-

PLANNING & ENVIRONMENT COURT APPEAL

In the Planning & Environment Court against Mareeba Shire Council's approval to allow a supermarket on the Original Kuranda Markets' site, the Court ruled that the developer had to go back to Council and withdraw its application for a supermarket. This means that no approval was ever given and therefore there was no court appeal to be had.

It was interesting to learn that a developer has no option to withdraw from a court appeal if it no longer wants to proceed with a development. The appellants (ourselves - members of the community, in this case) are the only ones who can cancel the appeal.

HEALTH IN THE GARDEN

Most meals taste better with a bit of lettuce. Add it to just about any sandwich, use it in wraps or have a green salad with any meal.

Any one can grow lettuce, even if you don't have a garden, especially the loose leaf lettuce that you plant in spring and pick leaf by leaf throughout the year.

The main thing to remember with lettuce is to water and feed it. If you don't water and feed it, it will turn bitter and go to seed. So plant it somewhere, where you won't forget it.

Lettuce can be planted at any time of the year; just choose winter or summer varieties. Lettuce won't grow in cold weather and will turn to seed when the weather warms up.

Lettuce seeds may not germinate if the temperature is more than 30 degrees Celsius, so in hot weather plant seedlings or wait until it's cooler. Alternatively, you can spread the seeds on wet blotting paper. And keep them in a plastic bag in the fridge for two to three days. Then scrape them carefully into the soil, cover and keep moist.

Seedilngs will emerge six to ten days after you plant the seeds. With lots of food and water, you will have your first crop in six to ten weeks.

Lettuce seeds can be either sown in a pot and the seedlings transplanted, or scattered in place and the seedlings you don't want can be thinned out.

In hot weather it's best to sow them where they are to be grown, as transplanting them will make them bitter. If you do transplant them in hot weather, cut the tops off the lettuce to reduce that happening.

Keep lettuce seedlings mulched. Water them every second day, or every day if it is hot – preferably in the evening, as hot, wet lettuce can rot. Feed your lettuce seedlings every week with liquid fertilizer.

One Styrofoam box filled with lettuce will give you enough lettuce for 4 servings a week.



Fill the box with compost or

Potting mix. Make sure there is holes in the bottom, otherwise the box will fill with water and the lettuce roots will rot.

Choose a non-hearting lettuce variety like Cos so you can pick a few leaves whenever you want. Plant seedlings about a hand span apart. Give them a little diluted manure once a week and water them everyday.

There are dozens of lettuce varieties available. In Australia we can grow red and green mignonette lettuces all year round. They are small and sweet and take both frost and extreme heat. Cos is another all year round variety.

Creepy crawlies love lettuce. They'll crawl into the outsides leaves of mature lettuce, so wash them well before eating.

Enjoy eating your lovely, fresh and organic lettuces and keep healthy on the inside as well.

If you grow your own fruit and veggies and would like to share your experiences with the Kuranda community we would love to put them in the paper.

When essential oils are applied to the skin they are absorbed in the body, where they work to fight infection, detoxify, revitalize, calm and heal the body.




Massage – Blend your chosen oils in a carrier oil base. The usual dilution is five drops of essential oil to every 10 ml of carrier oil.

Jeff McMullan visits Kuranda District State School

Recognised Educational Leaders Conference Paper Presentation

Kuranda District State School has again received acclaim and recognition for its innovative approaches to Literacy and Numeracy especially in the field of indigenous education.

Recently, Mr Jeff McMullan better known as a former globe trotting television reporter on the "60 Minutes" program visited Kuranda's primary school to observe our innovative educational practices and successes.

Jeff, a passionate advocate of indigenous peoples of Australia, was in Cairns as the keynote speaker at a Literacy and Numeracy Conference in celebration of International Literacy and Numeracy Week. National organiser of International Literacy and Numeracy Week Ms Carmel Armstrong, knowing of Kuranda's rich reputation and awards in 2003, accompanied Jeff for his half day visit. He was very impressed with what he saw in our school.

On Friday 2 September our team from Kuranda (Leanne Plasto, Gill Tynan, Nicola House, and Denise Angelo) was invited to present two sessions at the Conference at the Cairns Casino.

Our first session, the most attended of the presentations on offer, shared Kuranda's innovative approach to Numeracy. This session, the session of choice for Jeff and Carmel, explained our *Maths Tool Kits* approach. Our team demonstrated how we maximise hands-on manipulation of concrete materials and emphasised the importance of the language element and open-ended tasks best suited to our students' learning styles.

Our second "Spotlight" session demonstrated two interactive computer based teaching programs developed in our school by Nicola House. The first is an animated CD to reinforce the learning of letters and their sounds. It is based on Gill Tynan's book "Binyi - Wuku" ("mouth work"). We've sold out of our first print run of 100 books throughout North Queensland and Carmel Armstrong wishes to order 100 more for distribution throughout Queensland.

The second demonstration highlighted one example of our school-based local-content publishing project, "Living Books" based on a story from the Torres Strait about "Henry's Toe". These books are digitally produced on interactive CD and include animation, audio and interactivity. Many include narration from members of our local community as well as graphics and text developed by our students. Jeff McMullen expressed a keenness to add his voice to be a character in Henry's Toe as a helicopter pilot.

During his Keynote Conference Address Jeff paid particular tribute to the work of some of our local schools, in particular Yarrabah, Cairns West and Kuranda in the field of indigenous education.

Jeff also supported the building of salt-water swimming pools as excellent community projects offering significant social, educational and health benefits particularly to our school aged children. He is currently working in connection with the Fred Hollows Foundation and Ian Thorpe to have pools built in indigenous communities around the Northern Territory and spoke in support of Kuranda's efforts to achieve a salt-water pool in connection with our schools. Upon his return to Sydney, Jeff immediately forwarded to us articles on the benefits of such pools. One research paper in particular is written by former Australian of the Year, Professor Fiona Stanley.

HYDROPONIC GARDENING

By Jan Coulter

It is lovely growing weather at the moment. The lettuce, herbs etc really take off. It is nice to be able to graze among the greens. I have Tomatoes everywhere; they are that rich red colour, like somebody has put colour in them. Hydroponic tomatoes taste like extra flavour has been added too. This is because they are fed the right nutrients. They are bred for flavour not durability on the supermarket shelf. Tomatoes are heavy feeders but each tomato plant would only use

about 5 litres a day. You only have to feed the actual plant not the ground surrounding it. In contrast lettuce require very little nutrient strength, if they were given the same strength as tomatoes they would be very bitter. We have a fenced area for the hydroponics garden but this is to keep the wallabies out. Everything is at waist height, which discourages bugs, but also means you don't have to bend to attend to the plants. Ph 40930 394 or Kuranda Video.

Garden Jottings for October - by Alectura

Great growing gardeners - I hope this will become a regular column. I am open to addressing any questions readers may have concerning gardening issues although I cannot promise that I will be able to answer all of them.

Presently, I am proposing that each month, I quickly review what to plant and what to prune. I will look at a particular plant family (one native and one exotic) and then give a list of things to consider and respond to any questions.

Ornamentals - seeds or punnet: African marigold (Tagetes), Cosmos, Petunia, Portulaca, Salvia, Vinca. Start Caladiums if lifted - remember to protect as both Brush Turkey, Bettong and Bandicoot find irrestible. Gardenias should be budding up. Spray off aphids and if leaves yellowing at plant top water in a tonic of 1 teaspoon soluble fertilizer, 1 teaspoon Epsom salts [magnesium sulphate] and 1 teaspoon of iron chelates in a average 9/10 ltr water can. Remember to prune late summer for bush growth - woody cutting may then be planted directly if kept watered

Vegetables - seeds or punnet: Aubergine (Egg Plant), Beans (Snake and climbing recommended), Chillies, Cucumber, Pumpkin, Squash, Melons - if space is at a premium look for bush (non-running) varieties, Lettuce (non-hearting), Sweet potato, Taro, Tomato, all Asian greens.

Things to consider this month:

Mulch, mulch and more mulch is the order of the day. As well as providing cool for roots and reducing evaporation, eventual breakdown enriches and conditions all types of soil. Ideally, nothing compostable, including newspaper, leaves your yard - you are throwing away an invaluable resource if it does.

Some tips on mulches and composting next month!

Check ponds and water features. To avoid mosquito breeding, stock, where possible, with native Blue-eye species (*Pseudomugil*) or White Cloud Mountain Minnow or, as a last resort, the humble guppy. Remember that both the minnow and guppy are not native and every care should be taken that they are not returned to creeks or rivers. Bury excess stock beside your favorite plant for a good boost.

Plant some parsley. Soak seeds in warm water overnight and start in small pots or plant directly from punnet. Consider using at edges of garden beds. You may find Italian Flat more vigorous and hardy.

Plants of the Month

Exotic: Anthuriums (Araceae)

A large genus with near 1000 species from the tropical Americas, mostly terrestrial although some epiphytic. Grown for both flower and foliage. All require moist, well drained humusy soil being careful to avoid root rot in the wet. So building up and planting in a "nest" from old tree fern or logs may help. Plant in shade/part shade avoiding sun bleach. The best known flowering type Anthurium is andraeanum and its many colourful hybrids ranging from white to deepest red with recently introduced

mauves and lilacs. The smaller flowered introductions are probably easier to grow than the specialized and larger flowered forms.

The near infinite leaf forms range from the bird's nest type probably best known in *A. hookeri* to the glorious cream to silver veined *A. crystallinum*. *Anthurium veitchii* with its pendulous, oblong puckered strap leaves up to 1m long, known as "The King of anthuriums", and *Anthurium warocqueanum*, "The Queen of anthuriums", a climber with pendulous velvet leaves prominently white veined are two special beauties that will, when well grown, make your garden special.

Propagation from seed, stem cutting and off-sets.

Native: Melicope elleryana - Pink Euodia

A pretty rainforest tree, in summer bearing thick clusters of pink flowers often from bare stem. Fairly fast growing and needs some protection from frost when young. Will take short periods of waterlogging. Does not tolerate strong winds and should be constantly pruned when young to promote density. An excellent tree to attract nectar feeding birds and host to butterflies including the Ulysses (*Papilio ulysses*)

Propagation from seed.

A Dream, A Vision, An Aspiration And 100% Community Support.

Ingredients of a Wimbledon Champ.

An estimated 350 people enjoyed Community Morning Tea in Centenary Park Kuranda on the 24th of August to welcome Australia's finest female tennis player, Evonne Goolagong-Cawley who was here on a recent visit to promote her tennis program for girls aged 7-11 years, called "EGGS," Evonne Goolagong Getting Started.

Evonne Goolagong Cawley, a member of the Wiradjuri people is one of Australia's greatest sporting heros. Evonne, a former world ranked No. 1 reached the finals of a Grand Slam singles event 18 times. She is the first Aboriginal Australian to win Wimbledon in 1971, which she went to capture again in 1980. Evonne had a very successful Tennis career winning four Australian Opens and one French Open. She was the second mother in history to win the Wimbledon title following the birth of her daughter and in 1972 was awarded an MBE and also named Australian of the Year.

Evonne received a personal tour over Djabugay Country, when she was escorted to Kuranda on the Skyrail Gondola by Uncle and Nephew duo, Willie and Billy Brim, thanks Kuranda Tennis Club to Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Council and Skyrail Rainforest Cableway.

After officially being welcomed by Djabugay Elder Aunty Enid Boyle, in Kuranda's Centenary Park, Emily Richards aged 3 years, presented Evonne with flowers and a traditional Bama Dillybag made by Rhonda Brim from Dalmba, a grass which grows in

Weka Djimbu Dancers and dancers from Kuranda District State School performed Warrama (Welcome Dance) for Evonne at the Skyrail Terminal and again at morning tea. Evonne's face glowed as she watched the "painted up" youngsters dressed in their lap lap and grass skirts, dance.

Well known local Aboriginal singer, musician and Buma Bippera Media personality, Barry Cedric, entertained the crowds at Morning Tea with renditions of "I'm an Aborigine" and other good ol' Murri favourites.

In Evonne's personable style, she shared her story with the Kuranda crowd. Her story of growing up in the country town of Barellan NSW, one of 8 children to Kenny and Linda Goolagong. She shared her dream of winning Wimbledon (like the story she'd read about in the "Princess" magazine), her vision and aspiration to be the best tennis player that she could be. She credited much of her opportunities in tennis to the community of Barellan, who in those important early years, encouraged, nurtured, identified her talent and fundraised her rise and rise in tennis. More on Evonne's story can be found in her autobiography, "Home!" which, like her, is a sincere and personable insight into the little girl, sister, wife, mother and woman behind those Wimbeldon Feats.

Mareeba and Kuranda's elders who participate in the Home and Community Care Program, shared a quick lunch at Ngoonbi Farm with Evonne before departing for the EGGS Tennis Funday at the Bartley Park tennis court.

Community events only happen with community support. There are too many people to name individually to thank you for your involvement. However, thanks to everyone who contributed on the way to make the day truly enjoyable; all the volunteers, the deadly catering and equipment teams, Kuranda District State School, Kuranda High School Media Teacher and Students for documenting the occasion, Kuranda Rotary Club, Skyrail Rainforest Cableway, North QLD Land Council, Geo Pickers and Kuranda's Indigenous Organisations, Djabugay Tribal Aboriginal Council, KMKM Aboriginal Corporation and Ngoonbi Co-operative Society.

Evonne Goolagong – Cawley launches girls tennis program at Funday in Kuranda.

After sharing her story and a "cuppa" with the community of Kuranda at Morning Tea in Centenary Park, the former two times winner of Wimbledon, Evonne Goolagong Cawley, conducted a Tennis Funday with the girls of Kuranda District State School. Evonne was here with Tennis QLD's Kristine Benjamin, a board member of Tennis QLD who resides in Mareeba, and Janine Jenner FNQ Tennis QLD Coordinator, to launch her girl's tennis program called "EGGS."

"EGGS" is a Tennis Australia and Tennis Queensland initiative with the aim of increasing the number of young girls participating in tennis, and with an emphasis on attracting girls, in particular Indigenous girls who have never played the sport before. Girls are taught the skills of tennis as well as fundamental motor skills. The program also opens the sporting door to young girls so that they reap the rewards of regular participation in sport.

Around 45 girls aged 7-11 years from Kuranda District State School participated in the Funday. They practiced forehand and backhand strokes with Mareeba Coaches Shaun Bishop and Chloe Thomas.

Leanne Plasto, Kuranda & District State School (Head of Department) said, "the girls were enthusiastic, energetic and eggs..cited. The response from the girls was fantastic, they were patient, took their turn, listened and followed instructions really well. I was impressed by Evonne's patience with them too, and the fact that she took her time and taught everyone of them the smash and volley net strokes."



Each girl received a personally signed poster from Evonne on the day. 36 girls followed up their initial interest enrolled in the 5 week program at the Kuranda District State School which finished in the last week of Term 3. A Getting Started "Smash Tournament" will be held in Kuranda during the school holidays for "EGGS" participants from Kuranda, Mossman, Yarrabah and Mareeba, to encourage and support the girls' ongoing interest and participation in tennis.

Jane De Col, Sport & Recreation Officer based at Ngoonbi Cooperative Society said "Our partnership with Tennis QLD to facilitate and coordinate the implementation of the EGG'S Tennis Program and the "Tournament" in Kuranda, supports one of our Sport & Recreation Program objectives to develop school community links for increased participation in physical activity by youth in the community. Working with the school to introduce such a program during the long lunch breaks, enables the school to support "Active Tamera Hunter preparing to serve. Learners" and increased opportunities for structured and supervised physical activity during school hours."

The GREAT TRAIN RIDE was as usual a huge success and great fun for the children and adults alike. Rotary Cairns


North and Rotary Kuranda thank the Lions Club and the CWA for their support for this most worthy of services to the community.

Kuranda Range Road

Roadworks

Earlier this year, sections of Kuranda Range Road were damaged following torrential rain. Main Roads was able to carry out emergency repairs to allow the road to be reopened to traffic with normal loading. Since then, Main Roads has been carrying out assessments to determine what long-term repairs are needed. This has taken some time, due to the challenging environment and complex nature of the solution involved. Based on expert geo-technical advice, Main Roads will soon begin repairing three road embankment slumps. Main Roads is continuing to investigate what repair works are needed on other sections of the road.

How long will the work take?

Preliminary work will start on **Monday, 13 September 2004,** with programmed roadworks to start on **20 September**. The work is likely to continue until early December, weather permitting. Work will be carried out from **Monday to Saturday.** Main Roads will avoid work on weekends when there are major festivals being held on the northern Tablelands such as the Kuranda Spring Fair.

Where will the work take place?

The work will take place at three sites between the Henry Ross Lookout and the hairpin bend. These are located near the lookout, below the water point and at the hairpin bend.

How will traffic be impacted?

Generally, two traffic lanes will operate. On occasions, traffic may be reduced to one lane with maximum 15 minute delays. Traffic will be reduced to 40 km per hour through the work sites. At some stage during the work, it may be necessary to close the Henry Ross Lookout at night. Prior notice will be provided. Motorists should factor delays times into their travelling plans.

Main Roads appreciates the patience shown by the community and affected industries. Main Roads acknowledges the prolonged traffic delays will impact on the community, however, the measures being taken are for the safety of motorists and therefore cannot be avoided. Main Roads urges motorists to drive carefully through the work sites and comply with the reduced speed limit, for the safety of themselves and roadworkers. As work progresses over the next several months, Main Roads will provide regular updates through the media, particularly when additional traffic restrictions are required.






